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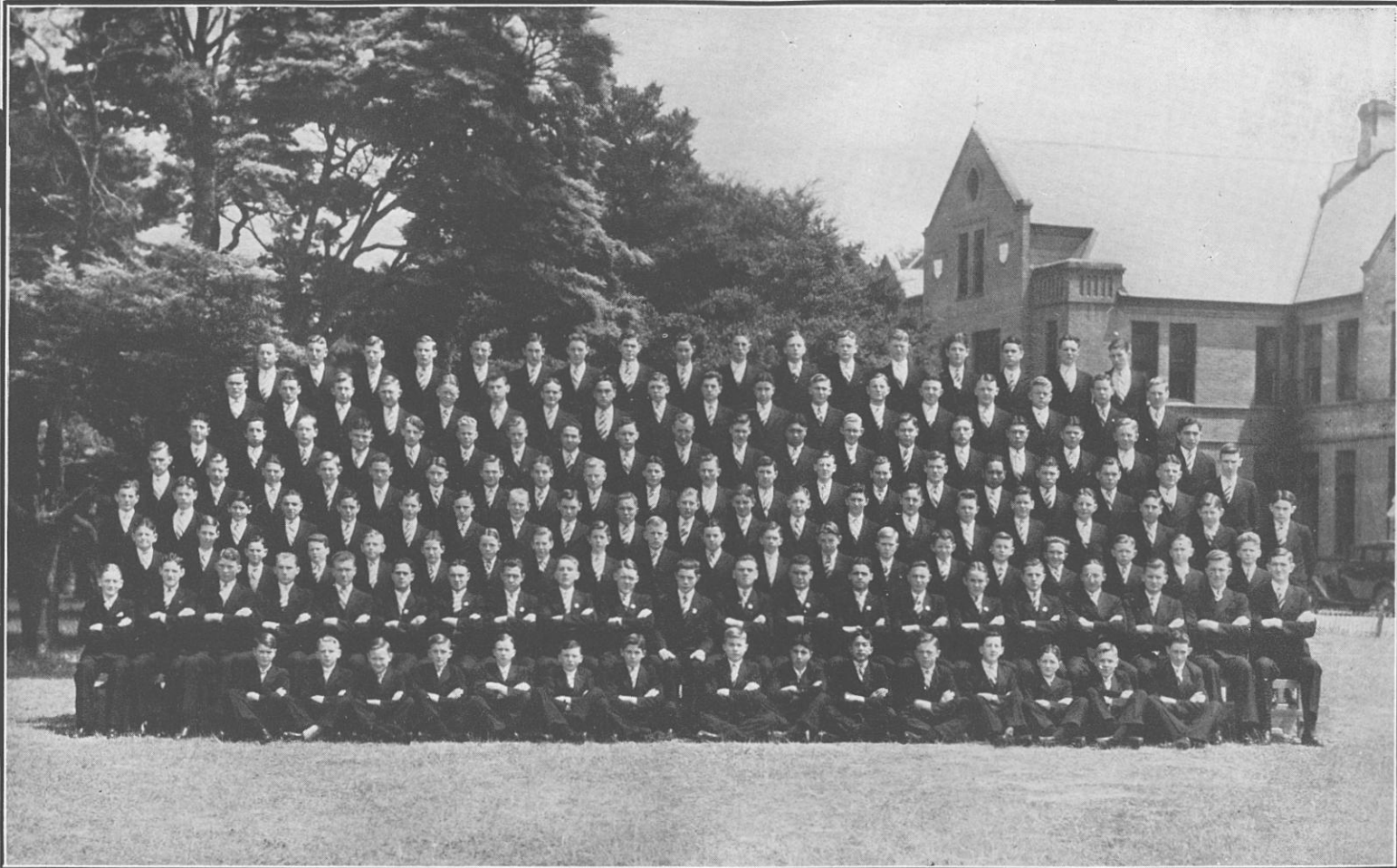

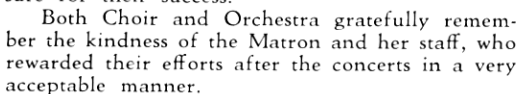

Catholic Colleges Tournament

THIS year it was our turn to act as hosts for the Tournament, and all the games and the debating contest were held at Silverstream.

The series of contests ended very happily for us, since we were successful in retaining the Hooley Shield for football and in winning from St. Bede's both the O'Connell Shield for debate and the Kennedy Cup for oratory.

This first match of the triangle was played on Thursday, August 17.

In the second half R. O'Connor was injured, being replaced by Morgan. After a penalty kick, which failed, Menehira scored a good try, which Wilson converted. Silverstream managed to retain the lead, in spite of several very dangerous movements among the Wellington backs. Wellington were still attacking when the final whistle went, the score being: Silverstream, 13; Wellington, 10.

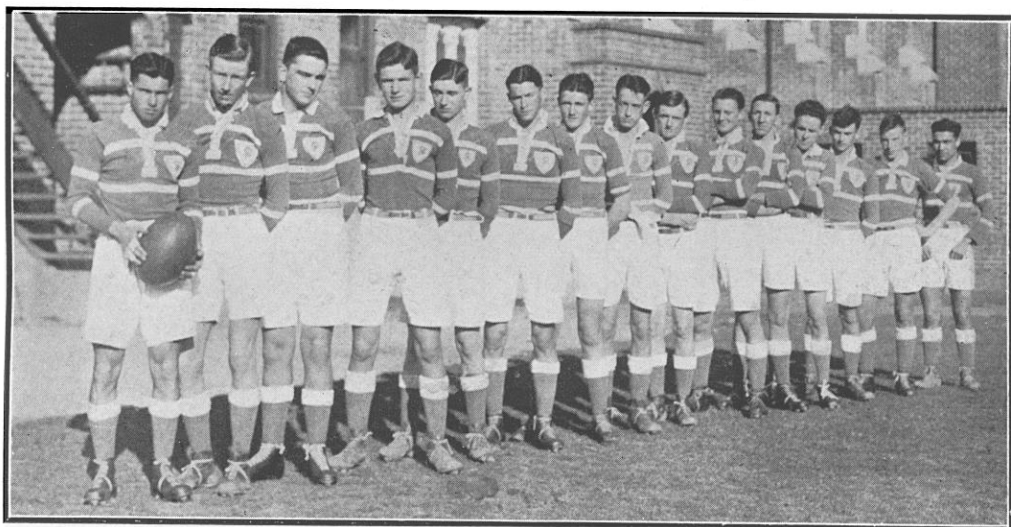

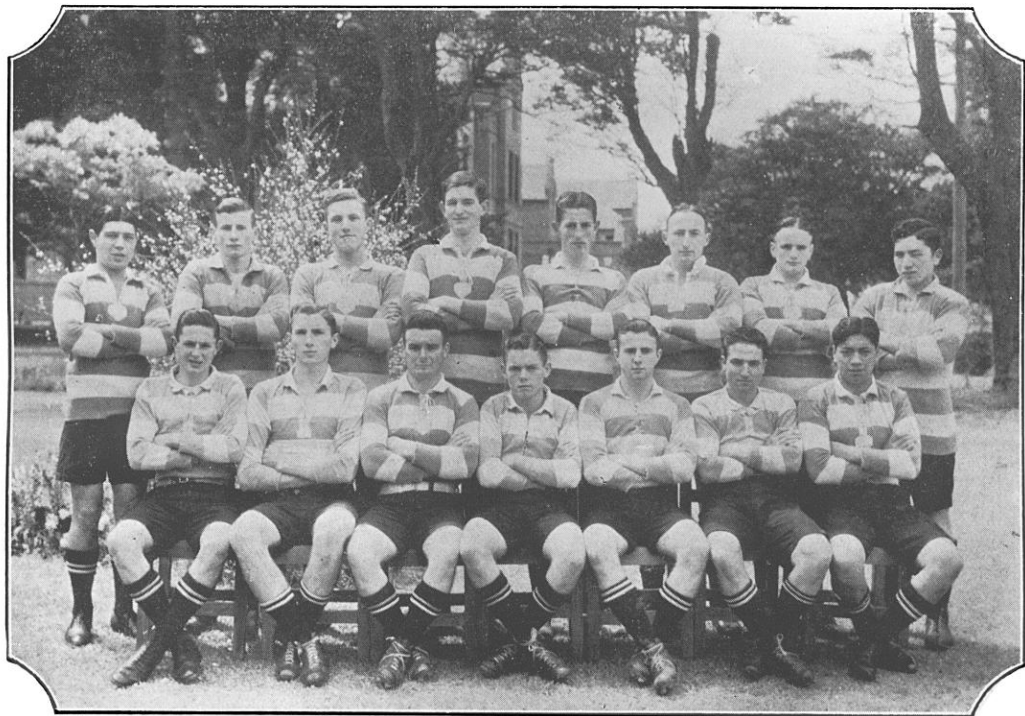

Silverstream 8—0.

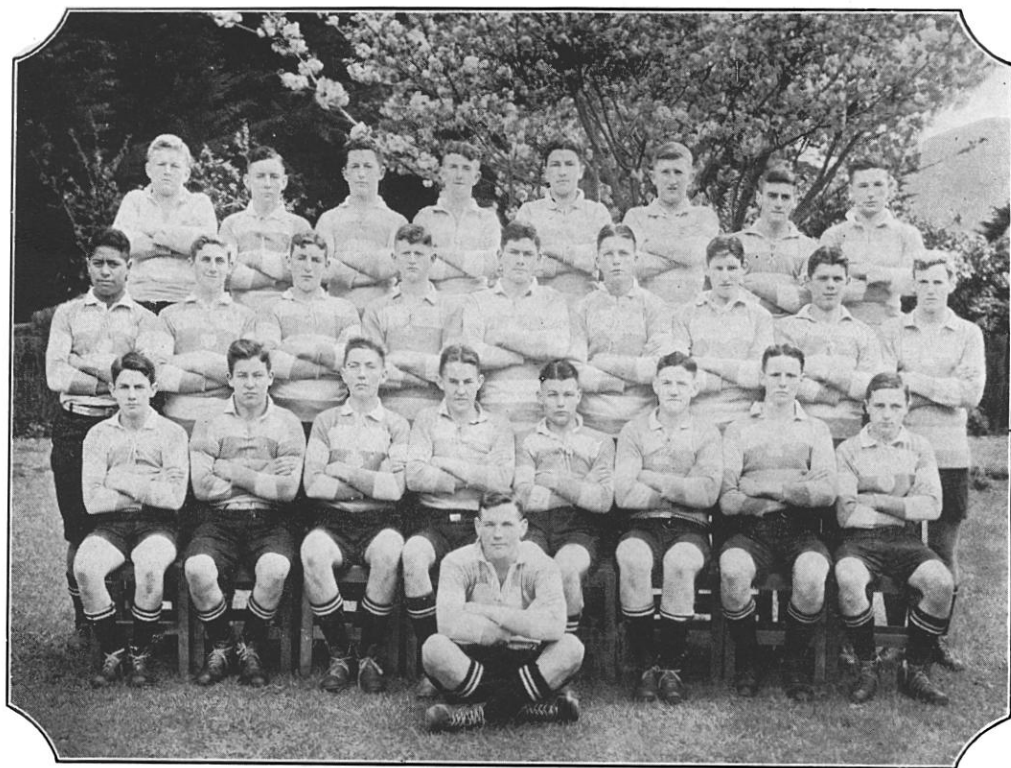

THE COMPANY.

Res Militaris

THE year 1933 has been most successful from a military point of view. The results of the Imperial Challenge Shield Competition for 1932 came to hand in the early part of the year. Silverstream gained the premier honours for the Dominion, and so became the holders, for the first time in the history of the College, of the Governor-General's Trophy.

For gaining first place in the Central Command, in the same competition, the College holds the Keibell Shield. In the Imperial Challenge Shield Competition, Silverstream gained thirty-seventh place in the Empire; 1,684 teams competed in the competition, the first 100 forming a group of merit. In the Earl Roberts Memorial Competition (1932) for long range shooting, Silverstream won the Wellington 5A Area and the Central Command shoots, and so gained possession of the Barton Rose Bowl. In the Dominion shoot in the same competition, our representatives did not do so well, but nevertheless the team gained tenth place in the Empire. The "Weekly Press" team was well up with the leaders.

THE BARRACKS.

The whole school went into barracks for the week preceding Easter. Captain F. Reeves, who was in charge, resided at the College, and everything was carried out under military conditions. The buglers roused the company at 6.30 a.m. every day; at 7 a.m. the whole company in full uniform attended Mass. Breakfast was preceded by a period of uniform-cleaning. At 9 a.m. the work of the various units began and continued, with a break for lunch, until 3.30 p.m. The evening study was devoted to cleaning equipment, and instruction for the N.C.O.'s. The sounding of "lights out" at 9 o'clock was very welcome.

ARTILLERY.

The Artillery Section did excellent work during the week. The Drivers had 12 horses to attend during the day; excellent horse lines were erected, and grooming and feeding began at 6 o'clock every morning. A riding school did much to train many in the art of horsemanship. Special credit is due to Captain Reeves in this matter. Extra classes were held outside of drill hours, in order to train as many boys as possible. The battery staff, after gaining proficiency in signalling, were instructed in the use of the field telephones. The gunners made such good progress that, at the end of the week, they were able to fire ten rounds of blank (five rounds per gun) under Service conditions, the drivers and battery staff doing their parts as laid down.

INFANTRY.

The Infantry Section followed out a more advanced programme than in former years. The

Lewis Gun Section in particular did good work, every member gaining his badge. No. 2 Platoon did much open order work, while Nos. 3 and 4 Platoons confined themselves to squad drill and rifle exercises. During the week a film, "The Fighting Patrol," was shown by Captain Goss, assisted by Captain Andrews, V.C. Immediately afterwards, Nos. 1, 2, and 3 Platoons put into practice the lessons taught by the film, by carrying out an attack on a position held by No. 4 Platoon.

The final day was devoted to a mock battle in the morning and a military sports meeting in the afternoon. The Infantry took part in running, jumping (broad jump and high jump), putting the shot, and relay racing—the team the majority of whose members reached a certain set standard being acclaimed the victors. The competition was won by Sergt. Paino's section: T. Tullock, A. Amohia, C. McCarty, C. Mariu, P. Abbott, D. Stellin, C. Allsop.

The Artillery had prepared a programme suited to their work. Teams representing the gunners, drivers and signallers took part. The wrestling on horseback was won by "D" Sub-Section (Drivers: K. O'Connor, H. Caulton, B. Harker, P. Donoghue, B. Vile). The tug-of-war went to "A" Sub-Section (Gunners: T. Collins, E. Welch, J. Cleary, J. Twohill, V. Hallagan). The last to remain in the musical chairs contest was Gunner Des. Bourke, who won the event for "B" Sub-Section.

Colonel F. C. Symon, S.M.G., D.S.O., A.D.C., R.N.Z.A., visited the College during the week, and expressed his satisfaction at the progress of the Unit.

The College Authorities wish to place on record their appreciation of the work of Captain Sugden, Officer-in-Charge of 5A Area, and his instructors, Sergts.-Major Taylor, Ritzema, Kidman, Collins, O'Leary (Infantry), and Sergt.-Major Peterson, Bombardiers Bradshaw and Day (Artillery). Our thanks are also due to Captain Joyce, who supervised the firing of the 18-pounders on the last day of the barracks. To Captain F. Reeves, who took such an interest in the military training of the boys of his old school, our gratitude is due in a special measure for his untiring energy and enthusiasm and his valuable assistance at all times.

MINIATURE RIFLE SHOOTING.

The indoor range was again put to good use during the year. In order to raise the standard of shooting several inter-section competitions were held before the Company fired in the Imperial Challenge Shield Competition. As the result of last year's training, many boys showed a decided improvement; quite a number are first-class shots with the Vickers rifle.

Sergeant E. W. Tacon annexed the trophy and medal for miniature rifle shooting, firing three possibles in three competitions; 24 out of 25, and 98 out of 100 in two others. The same boy won a place in the long-range team, often topping the list in the practice shoots; he tied for first place in the Command Shoot with a score of 68 out of 80.

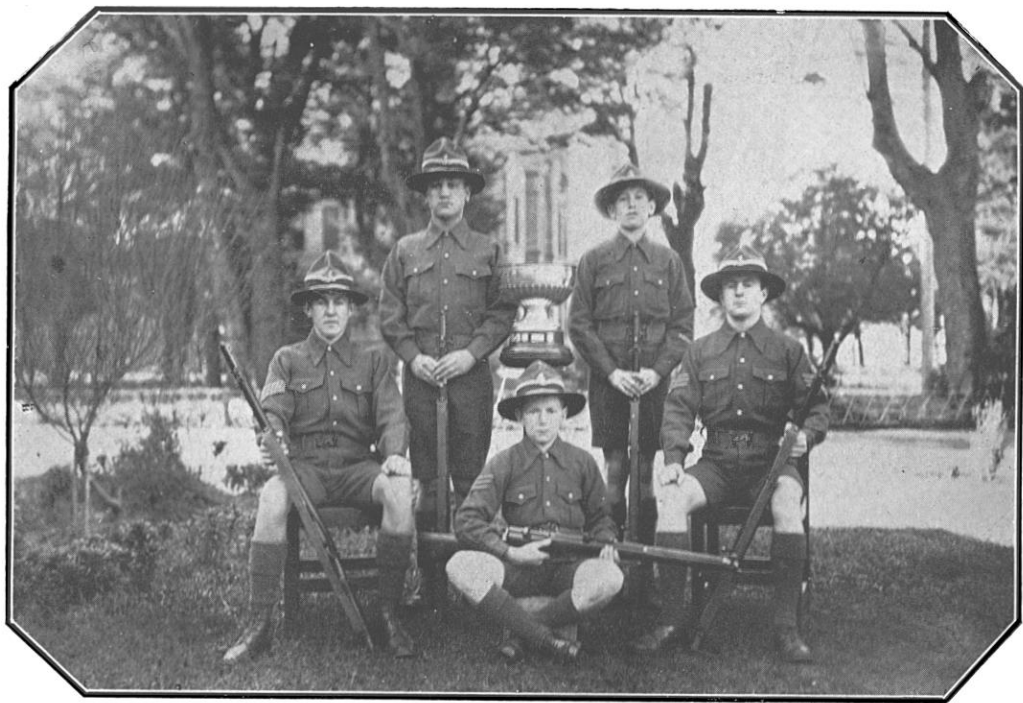

team in the Earl Roberts Empire Cadet Trophy competition.

On the evening of Saturday, June 24th, the massive Dominion and Command trophies awarded for the competitions were presented to the College by the Area Officer, Captain C. V. Sugden, N.Z.S.C., for retention by the College for one year. The Area Officer, after congratulating the Unit upon its sustained interest in musketry, and upon the very great amount of time and practice devoted to this branch of the military activities of the College, traced the history of the competitions, and of the magnificent trophies connected with them.

The Imperial Challenge Shields Competition was inaugurated in 1911 by the National Rifle Association of Great Britain, with the object of encouraging every British-born boy to learn how to use the rifle. The competition is open to every officially recognised boys' association in the British Empire. Team work is recognised by the award of trophies, and individual merit by the award of medals and badges for meritorious individual performances. The essence of the competition is to raise the mass standard of shooting, hence the competitions are essentially productive of team work.

To encourage "mass efficiency" His Majesty the King, in 1925, graciously presented a Challenge Trophy for competition between national teams of the Mother Country and the Great Dominions. To qualify as a "National Team" each competing country must exercise not less than 3,000 lads whose scores are to count.

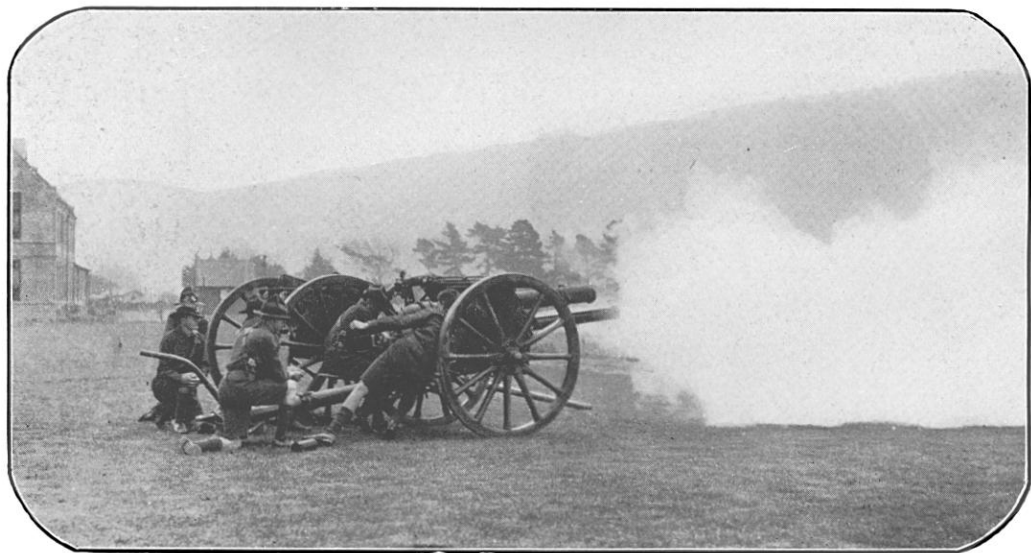
an allowance of .025 per firer, or 2.5 per hundred firers, is added to the average score, thus lending encouragement to the larger units to compete.

The Senior Shield is awarded to that team in which the majority of the firers are over 15 years of age, and the Junior Shield to the unit in which boys under 15 predominate, and which gain the highest average scores in the competition.

The Senior Shield was won for the year 1932 by the Royal Marine Volunteer Cadet Corps, Deal (Young Jollies) with a team of 8, and an average of 96.875.

The Junior Shield was won by No. 928, Woodbridge Public School Cadet Corps, Ontario, Canada, with a team of 9, and a gross average of 98.1.

In 1932, H.M. THE KING'S TROPHY was won by the Dominion of Canada, the National Team numbering 3,001, with an average score of 85.751 per firer. The following qualified in order of merit:—South Africa, 3,002, 82.516; Great Britain, 3,004, 72.398; New Zealand, 3,007, 68.184. The highest possible score is 100.

For team competition the Senior and Junior Imperial Challenge Shields are awarded. A Unit is required to exercise the whole of its Unit strength, and is permitted to discard 50% of the scores. The strength to count is therefore 50% of the Unit strength, but no team may consist of less than eight firers. It is obviously easier to raise the standard of shooting of a small unit than one numbering three or four hundred, therefore a handicap allowance is made. For every firer in excess of 8, in the strength to count,

are awarded in conjunction with the Shields as follows:—

When the winning Unit of the Senior Shield has a strength to count of less than 40 firers, Earl Jellicoe's Sword, with a replica for retention by the Unit, is awarded to the next leading Unit of which the strength exceeds 40, and vice versa. This Sword was won for 1932 by No. 62, Hamilton Central Collegiate Institute Cadet Corps, Canada, with a team of 74 and a gross average of 95.987.

When the winning Unit of the Junior Shield has a strength of less than 15 firers, the Sword of the late Field-Marshal Earl Haig is awarded, with a replica to the next leading Unit of which the strength to count exceeds 15, and vice versa. This Sword was awarded for 1932 to No. 136, Calgary Public Schools Cadet Regiment, "A"

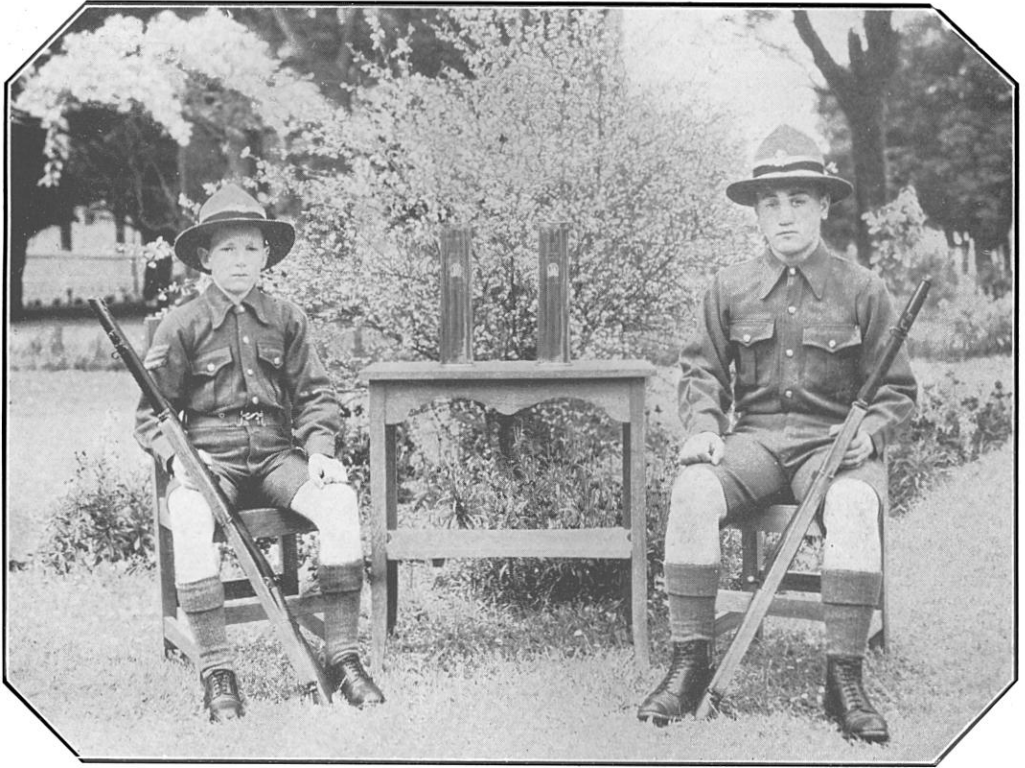
Company, 3rd Battalion (Hillhurst School), Canada, with a team of 34, and a gross average score of 97.797.

For internal competition in Great Britain and each Dominion, the "Lord Roberts" and "Governor-General" trophies are awarded to the leading Unit of each country.

The New Zealand Trophy was awarded by Admiral of the Fleet, the Earl Jellicoe, when Governor-General of New Zealand. This trophy was won for 1932 by "C" Company, 3rd (Cadet) Battalion, the Wellington Regiment (SILVER-STREAM COLLEGE). The team numbered 69,

The Kebbell Shie'd.

In New Zealand, the Central Military Command has for many years won the main shooting honours for the Dominion, and upon the cessation of the annual Army Rifle Meeting for financial reasons, Colonel F. C. Symon, S.M.G., D.S.O., A.D.C., R.N.Z.A., Commanding Central Military Command, in conjunction with the wishes of the donors of the trophies, re-awarded certain magnificent trophies to the Command leaders in the Imperial matches. The Kebbell

Major Bunbury and Q.M. Sergt. Rodgers, to receive on behalf of the Cadet Unit.

To encourage individual effort, silver medals are awarded to those firers gaining the possible score of 100 points, and bronze medals to those who score 99. One medal only was gained by a New Zealand Cadet in 1932, being won by Sergeant H. K. Waters, of Wellington College, for his score of 99. This announcement was warmly applauded by the assembled Cadets.

Each firer who gains a score of 90 or more is classed as an "Empire Marksman," and each firer making a score of between 85 and 89 is classed as an "Empire First Class Shot." Empire Marksmen receive a worsted badge, single rifle

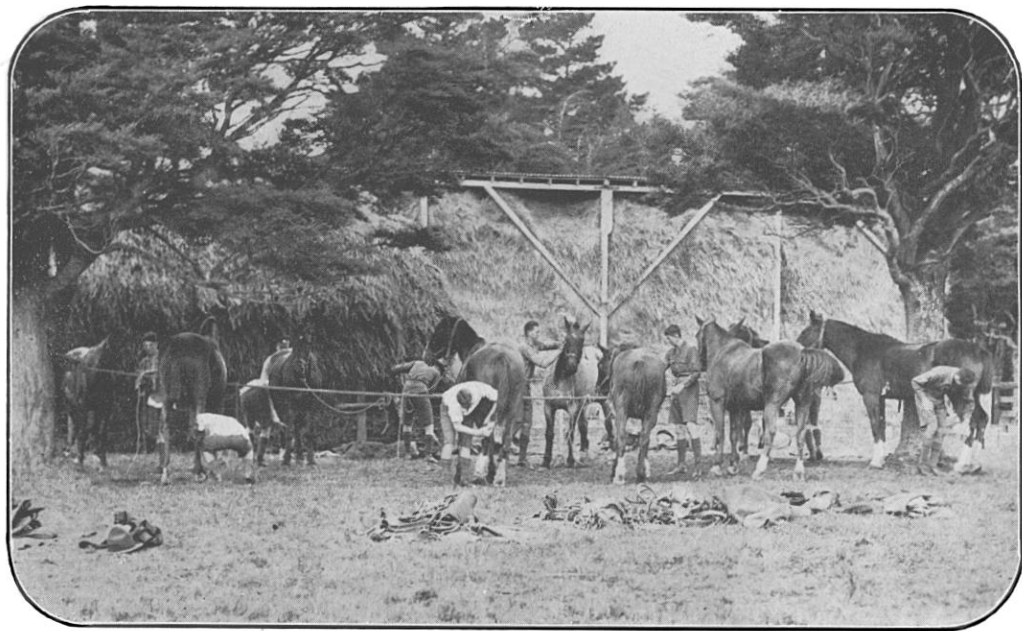
and star on a blue ground, and Empire First Class Shots, a worsted badge—single rifle on a blue ground. When the Unit average exceeds 75, the rifle is coloured white, and for lesser units' averages the rifle is in red. Of Silverstream's team of 69, 26 Cadets received Empire Marksman's badges, and 29 Empire First Class Shots' badges. Each Cadet received his badge from the Area Officer amidst the applause of his comrades. The badges in this case were white on the blue ground, the Unit average being 89.916.

The King's Medal.

His Majesty the King awards each year a bronze medal to the chief instructor of the most successful Unit in each country or Dominion, in

miniature ranges, the major Empire Competition, in which .303-inch ammunition and service matches on the full-sized range is fired, being the Earl Roberts Empire Cadet Trophy Competition.

Throughout the Empire, each country is organised into Military Commands or Districts, for military purposes, there being in New Zealand, three Military Commands, namely. Northern, Central and Southern Commands. By means of Area and Command qualifying matches, a team is selected to represent each Command in the Empire, the team consisting of a team leader and four frirers, who fire an advanced series of service matches, under strict supervision. The score gained by each team is placed in a sealed envelope on the range and forwarded to England, together

recognition of the fact that a high standard of efficiency depends upon the quality of the instruction afforded and the pains taken to impart it. The medal is awarded to the Rev. Fr. J. J. Kennedy, S.M., M.A., of the College Staff, to whose self-sacrificing work the success of the Unit was due. Fr. Kennedy devoted practically every evening of last winter to the individual coaching of the Cadets, and his efforts resulted in raising the 1931 average of the Unit of 43 to the winning average score of 89.916. Captain Sugden, in presenting the medal to Fr. Kennedy, thanked him for his whole-hearted co-operation, and congratulated him upon the success that had attended his efforts.

Earl Roberts Memorial Competition.

The Imperial Challenge Shields Competition is fired entirely with .22-inch ammunition on

with observations as to shooting conditions at the time of the firing of the match, and with anthropometrical details of team members, for comparative purposes. In their qualifying shoot for Command representation the team from Silverstream College gained a score of 281 out of a possible 320. Unfortunately, the team did not reproduce this form on the day of the Empire shoot, when, with a score of 234, it secured tenth place on the list.

The trophy was won by Liverpool College (England), with a score of 285, only 4 points ahead of the Silverstream qualifying score.

Headquarters Central Command had allotted the "Barton Rose Bowl" to the team representing Central Military Command in this competition, and this trophy was now handed to the Rector of the College, who in turn presented it to Sergt. Morgan to receive on behalf of the Cadet Corps.

Captain Sugden congratulated the College upon its performances in winning the trophies, and trusted that the interest would be maintained, and that this clean sport would ever hold an important place among the activities of the College.

The Rector's Reply.

The Rev. Fr. Dowling, Rector of the College, in addressing those assembled, expressed his gratitude to the military authorities for the interest and assistance granted to the College, and for the encouragement extended, which had culminated in great honour to the College. He congratulated the Cadet Corps upon the state of efficiency it had attained, and upon winning the trophies now before them. Rifle shooting as a College activity enabled the smallest lad to represent his school in the College team, and the time spent on the range learning self-control, nerve control and accuracy was time well spent.

on the eve of their departure to duties in the Nelson district, all happiness in their new surroundings, and thanked them for the interest they had taken in the College.

The Rev. Fr. J. J. Kennedy, S.M., M.A., attributed his keenness in this side of College life to his own school days, when at Geraldine his old headmaster, Major Montgomery, inculcated into the senior boys not only the love of shooting, but the necessary training in the care and precautions required when using firearms. Many regrettable accidents were due to faulty training, and he believed every boy should be taught to use the rifle with full knowledge of its dangerous potentialities. As a school sport it called for steady nerves, a healthy body and a clear eye, and was therefore worthy of a place side by side with the more fully recognised sports such as cricket and football. For the future, he would, if possible, double his efforts to maintain the

TIME IS OUR ENEMY.

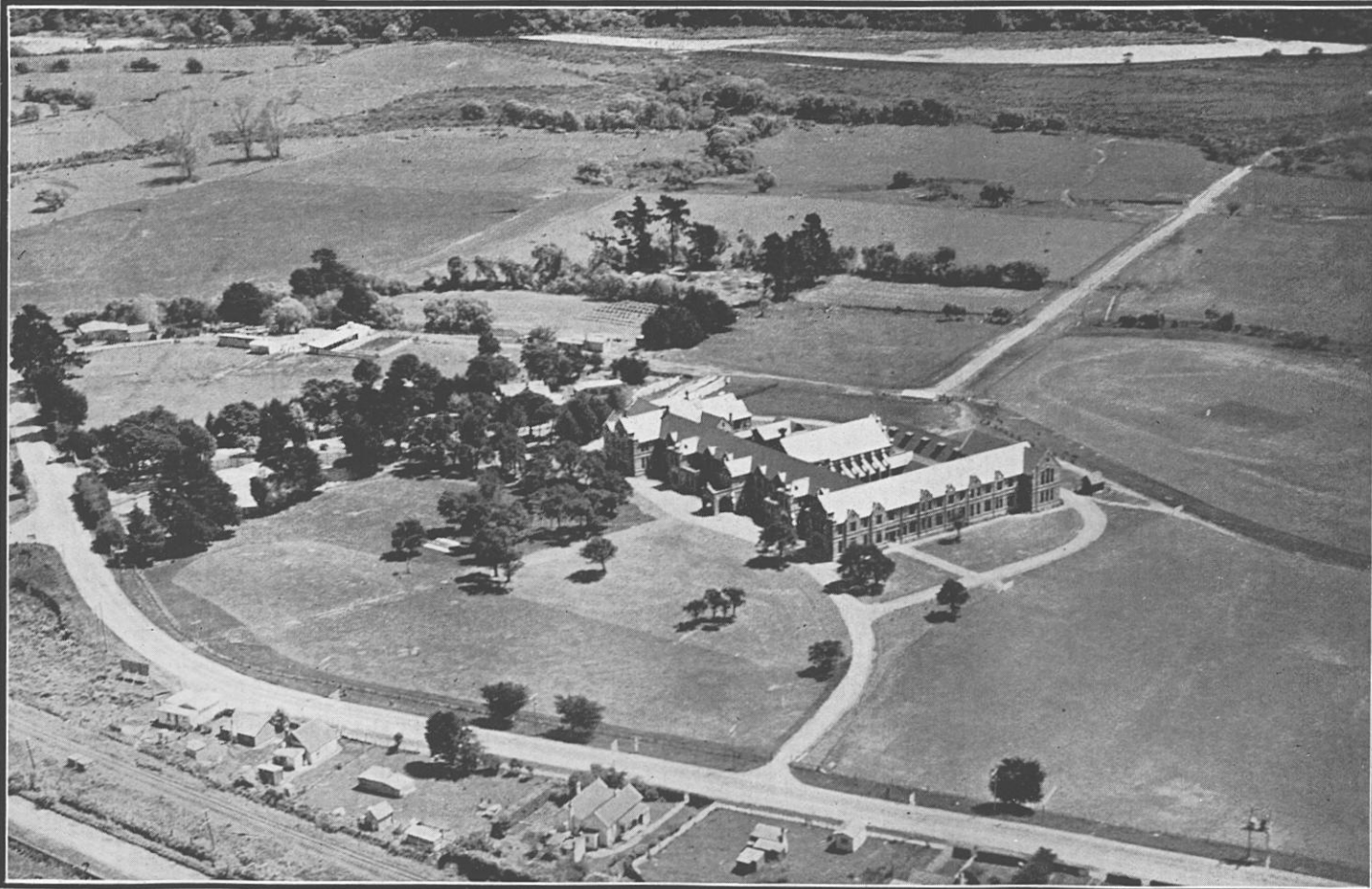
Time is our enemy—yes, only he

In Memoriam

REVEREND FATHER STANISLAUS MAHONY, S.M.

By the death of Father Mahony, on August 25th, the College has lost a true friend and a very loyal Old Boy. Born in London in 1868, Stanislaus Mahony came to New Zealand as a child and received his primary education from the Marist Brothers in the old school in Boulcott Street, Wellington, the very street in which he was to spend so many years of his priestly life, and which now displays his own life memorial, the church of St. Mary of the Angels. He entered St. Patrick's College in 1885, as the second boy to be enrolled on the list of boarders of the new College, a fact of which he was always proud. He was a keen and successful student and a capable performer in the field of sport. His reminiscences of old College games were a never failing source of interest to the younger generation of Patricians.

From College he went to St. Mary's Seminary, Meane, to study for the priesthood, and in 1893 he was ordained with His Grace Archbishop O'Shea and the late Father Daniel Malone. He was appointed to the teaching staff of his Alma Mater. This, however, was not his first experience as a teacher in his old School, as he had been called from the Seminary to serve in that capacity during the years 1888-1889. From 1894 to 1901, he taught at St. Patrick's with marked success. In the records of "Blue and White" he is known as an able master of mathematics and an energetic sports master.

From the College he entered parochial life, and exercised his sacred ministry at the Cathedral, Christchurch, Hokitika, Leeston, Nelson, Wanganui, and finally at St. Mary of the Angels, Wellington. Long before the Marist missionary band was organised, Archbishop Redwood, discerning Father Mahony's priestly zeal and outstanding ability as a preacher, made him his associate in a series of successful missions throughout the archdiocese.

But it is as the builder of St. Mary's that Father Mahony will be remembered by the majority of people. In 1918, it was his grief to witness the destruction of the beloved old church by fire. The thought of a temporary structure to replace the old was in the minds of many, but he determined to commence immediately the erection of a building that would be worthy of its position in the city. The tremendous zeal and sheer courage by which he overcame the innumerable obstacles, directed and supervised every detail of the great work, and financed the huge undertaking are fittingly commemorated and everlastingly rewarded in the magnificent Gothic church which is the pride of Wellington.

REVD. FATHER E. McHARDY, S.M.

On May 17, 1933, Father McHardy died at the Home of Compassion, Wellington. In our last issue we recorded the extraordinary history of his missionary labours until he was overtaken by the grievous illness to which he at last succumbed. God has now crowned our first martyr-missionary, and the College, though mourning with his relatives, rejoices with them at the glory which this heroic son has merited for himself, for his family and for his School. It is fitting that the College should bestow its tribute by the voice of another of its sons, who wrote:—

There is one word we speak amid our sorrow—

One lonely word of pride—

Though you would give another land your living

It was with us you died!

Ah! God was kind when you were near to dying;

Though you had pledged it all,

He gave you back your own dear hills at sunset

Before His love would call.

There was no self when Heaven held your longing;

Boyhood and hearth and sod—

These had no strength to stay when hearts were calling

To know the heart of God.

Three lonely years you had, of grace and labour,

And only God with you,

In storm and sun you taught and healed and builded—

A Paul in Tunuru!

Yet when the dawn rose on a shaggy mountain,

Your eyes would light again;

You saw a crown of snow in Taranaki

Above the quiet plain.

And when young throats were loud with youth and laughter,

A thought went winging through

To where the winds of Wellington were crying

REVD. FATHER H. A. TATE.

Rev. Father Tate, one of the early masters of the College, died during the year in the diocese of Hexham and Newcastle, England. In 1888, Mr. H. A. Tate, as he was then, came to St. Patrick's to teach. He was a convert to Catholicism. Both in the College and in the city he was interested in cricket activities, being a critic of the game for the Press. After leaving the College he went to England, where he entered a seminary, and was ultimately ordained for the diocese in which he died.

BERNARD PATRICK McMAHON.

The first registered boarder at St. Patrick's College, Bernard McMahon, played in the first College football team, and had the honour of being the first captain of the College XV., an honour which he enjoyed from 1885-87. He later served on the teaching staff for two years. A member of the invincible 1889 Ponke team, he represented Wellington. Later he captained the Buller representatives. He was also a champion swimmer and held the 440 yards record for years. In 1892 he went to Reefton, where he later entered into partnership with Mr. T. H. Lee. Retiring from this partnership, he conducted the City Hotel, Reefton, until it was destroyed by fire in 1927. Shortly after he returned to Christchurch, his native city, where he died at the age of 65 years. A man of very happy and kindly disposition, Mr. McMahon was a general favourite. His wide interest in sport embraced racing, trotting, football, athletics and cycling. He was a foundation member and former president of the Reefton Trotting Club. Besides his wife (nee Enright), he is survived by one daughter, Mrs. W. P. Monteith, of Christchurch, and one son, Mr. J. McMahon, of the Public Service at Wellington.

HONE MARIU.

The Maori people of Tokaanu lost a great leader and the College, a deeply loyal Old Boy, when Hone Mariu died as the result of an accident while engaged in one of the industries he had established for the benefit of his tribe. He had long been the father of his people, both in work and in faith. They had become self-supporting mainly through his work in connection with the large co-operative factory which he managed for them, and later through his direction of the timber mill, in which he was working at the time of his death. The passing of this great Maori, so splendidly equipped, both mentally and spiritually, is a grave loss to his sorrowing people. He has one son, Ceretti, at Silverstream. Two others, Rehi, now taking his father's place, and Kapara, were at College last year. To them and to all their relatives and to the Maori people of Tokaanu, we offer our sincere, heartfelt sympathy. We should like to associate ourselves with another Old Boy, who wrote the following verses to the memory of Hone Mariu.

*There is a sadness in a proud tree's falling—
And as the echo dies all nature stills;
Silent the birds who woke the dawn with singing;
Only a stream's low grief the forest fills.
There will be silence when your name is spoken
—Sorrow has thought no lips may form or know—
They will remember how you loved your people,
Ponder your manhood, when the fires glow.
You had the breast, the courage of a leader
Steadfast and selfless; and your mana grew;
"Sectare fidem" on your lips and forehead*

*And old St. Patrick's in the heart of you.
Yet when the Sanctus whispers words of glory
And Calvary will come by Taupo's shore,
There they will tell your name in God's own silence
—You were the first to serve and to adore!
Ah! when you come where God is with His Mother
Speak fair to Mary of her Maoris' ways;
Telling her Son the love of old Tokaanu
—And Pomparie* echoing your praise.*

It was with feelings of deep regret that we learned of the death of Mr. O'Connor at St. Vincent's Hospital, Sydney. With his wife and family, he left New Zealand only a few months ago for Australia, where it was hoped he would regain his health. Born on the West Coast, he was one of the earliest pupils of St. Patrick's College (1891-1892). As a young man, he went to Palmerston North and became a partner in the jewellery firm of O'Connor and Tydeman. Some ten years ago, Mr. O'Connor retired to private life. His father, the late Mr. Maurice O'Connor, was a very generous benefactor of St. Patrick's College, and his name will be always remembered by the O'Connor Scholarship, which he founded. This tradition of generosity was maintained by his son, who was a very liberal supporter of "Blue and White" and other College institutions.

Brian, the son of the late Mr. Patrick O'Connor, was a student at Silverstream until he went with his family to Australia. Very deep sympathy is felt by the College for Mrs. O'Connor and her children.

FREDERICK JOHN EVANS (1894-97).

The late Mr. Evans, at one time Manager of the Furniture Department, Strange's, Christchurch, was for the last three years proprietor of Morrison's Bush Hotel, Greytown. His health was seriously affected by a motor accident three years ago. Despite his ailment, he preserved his cheerful and kindly disposition, and was exceedingly popular in the district. He is survived by a widow, two sons and two daughters. Requiem Mass was celebrated at Greytown on Saturday, 11th November.

Professional Accountancy, Secretarial and Commercial

WHILE business is best learnt by being a business man, yet when a youth steps into the commercial world he makes a more easy and honourable entry, is able to discharge his duties more efficiently, and can make a more profitable use of the experience which comes his way if he has first, through study of business principles, acquainted himself with the wisdom which the experience of others can furnish. So this section of the College curriculum is specially designed to shape the general course towards being a more accurate preparation for Commercial life. In an attempt to make the boys efficient units in business as soon as they leave College they are trained according to the latest demands of the Commercial Syllabus. The courses are as follow:—

The Post-Matriculation Course.

This section is in connection with Professional Accountancy, B.Com., and LL.B. Coaching is given in Book-keeping, Economics, Mercantile Law (I and II), Company Law, Law of Bankruptcy, Rights and Duties of Trustees. Those reading Economics for B.A. are also under the supervision of this class. Facilities are provided by the College authorities so that the Accountancy students may do a certain amount of practical work in both Book-keeping and Business Methods. At suitable intervals the accounting devices used in the College Office are placed at the disposal of the class.

The Secretarial Course.

This prepares boys for the professional examinations of the Australasian Institute of Secretaries. A special feature of this course is the combining of practical teaching with theoretical explanation. The classes in Secretarial Duties and Practice are conducted in the form of a meeting, each student in turn acting as Chairman or as Secretary for a number of consecutive classes. The lecturer on each occasion is the Master in charge. Also the handling, filing and

mailing of most of the routine correspondence in connection with the commercial department is entrusted to the Secretarial students.

The Senior Course.

Senior Commercial students who are not sitting the University Entrance Examination are prepared for Senior Chamber of Commerce examinations, and are presented for the gaining of certificates from the National Business College and Southern Cross Commercial College. The syllabus for this course provides also for a thorough training in office routine and business principles, and gives an elementary knowledge of general secretarial work. The text book used is one compiled and issued by the College.

The Junior Course.

The boys are here entered for lower grade examinations conducted by the above-mentioned Colleges. To these examinations certificates of proficiency are attached.

Typewriting and Shorthand.

These very useful business arts are taught, and the entrants for various examinations during the year were all successful.

Farm Book-keeping.

Special classes in Book-keeping and general Business Practice are given twice a week to those who are engaged in the study of Agriculture.

Gratifying Results.

It is a significant fact that those who engaged in the Post-Matriculation course last year all gained good positions on leaving College.

The successes, listed elsewhere, gained in the various examinations for which the boys were presented this year, have been outstanding. The examiner of the National Business College, P. C. Brennan, F.F.C.A., in his report on the candidates, wrote: "I trust you will be as pleased with the report of the examination as I was with the high standard of the work submitted by the candidates. These papers are probably the best I have corrected this year in the Advanced Grade."

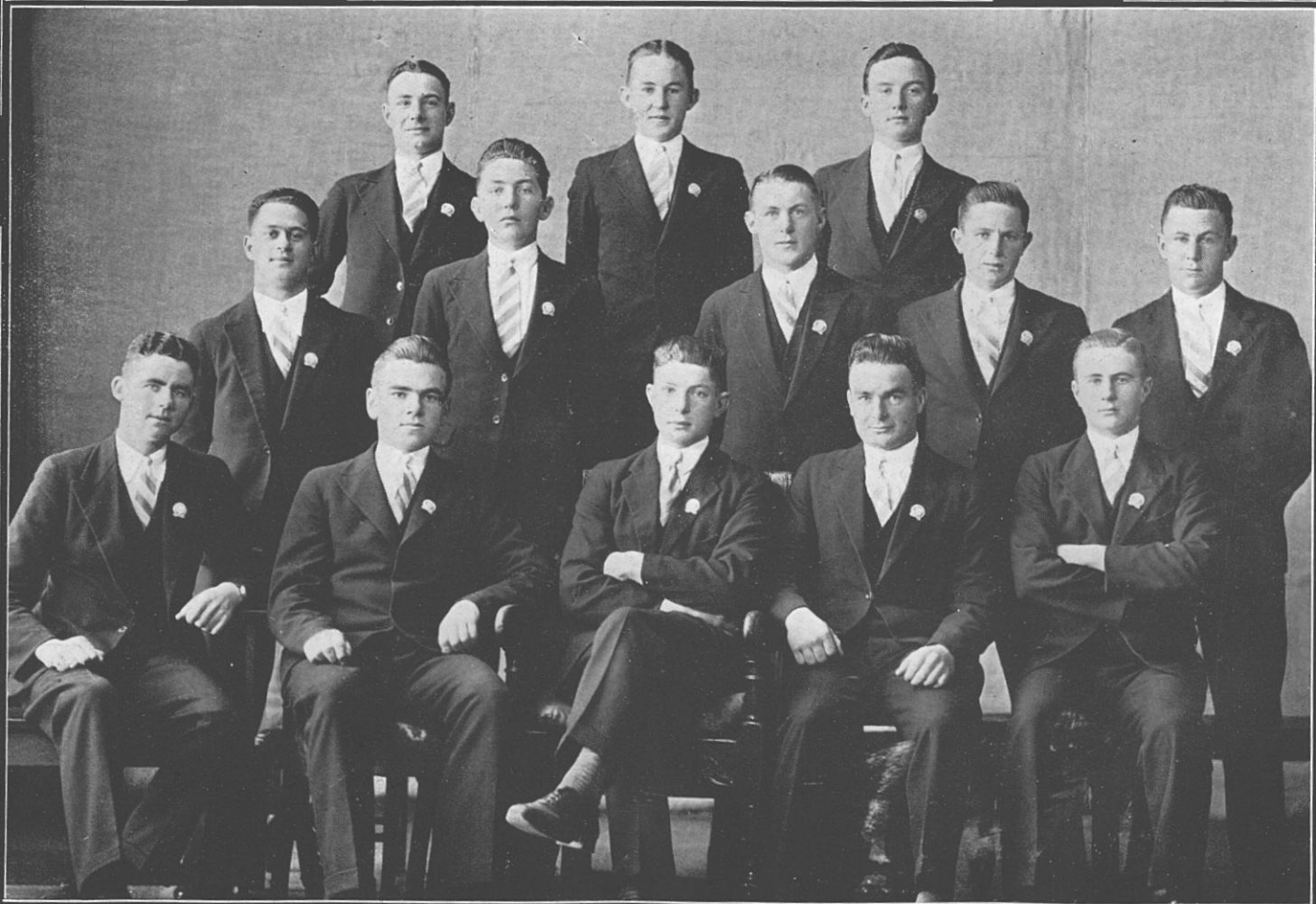

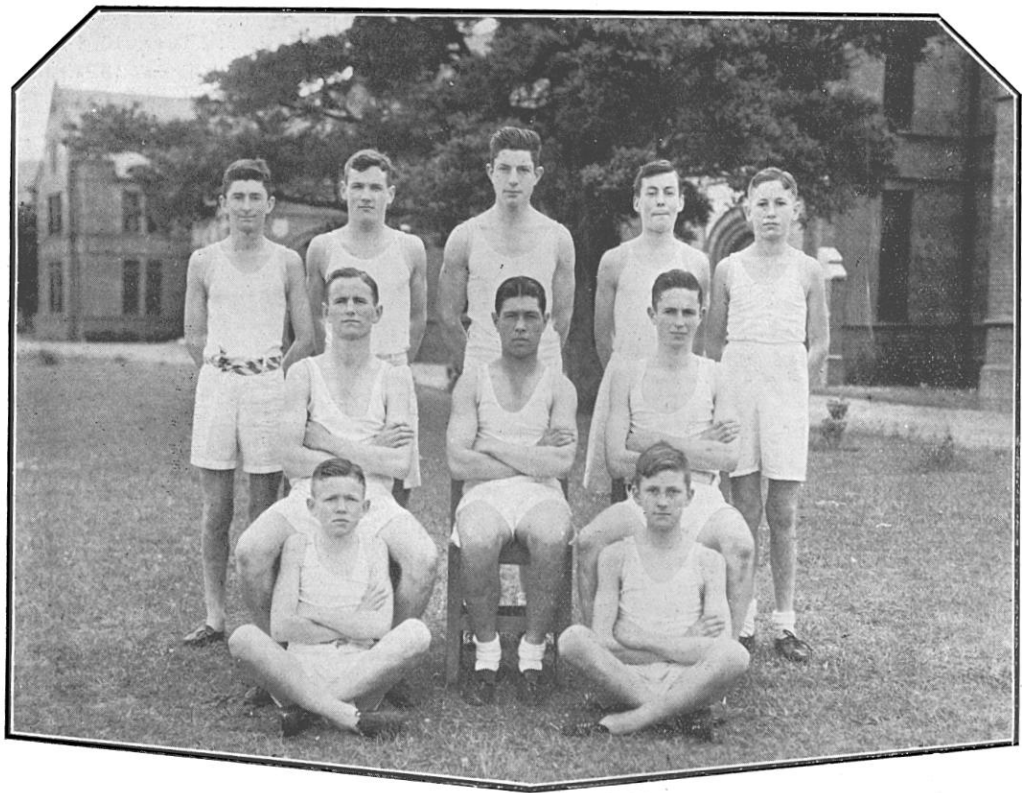

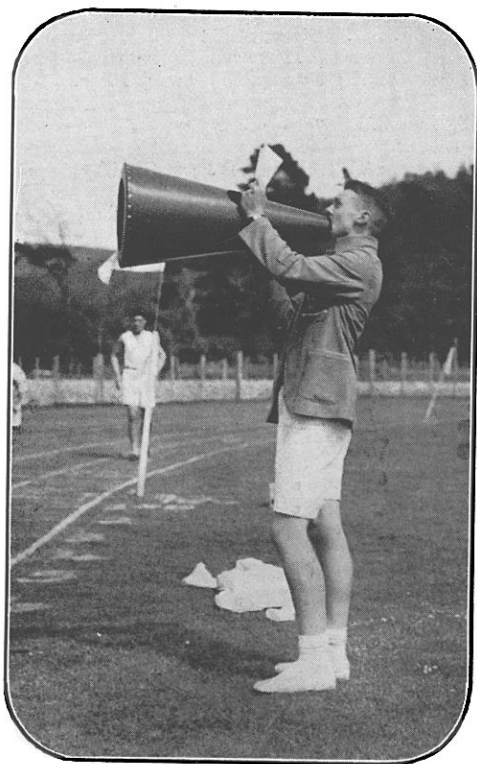

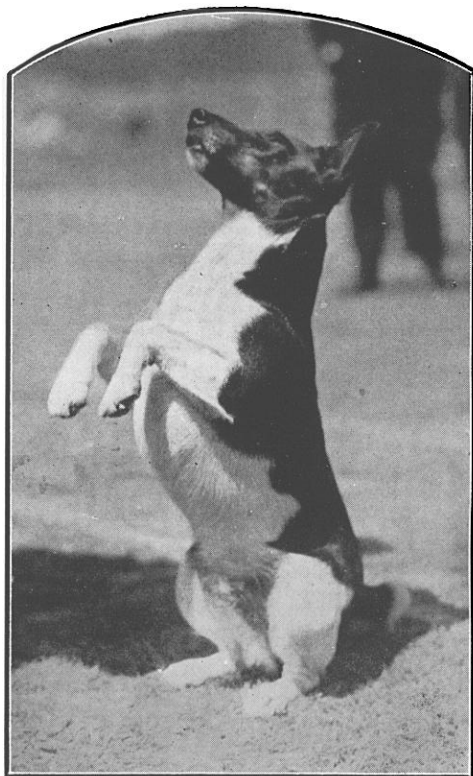

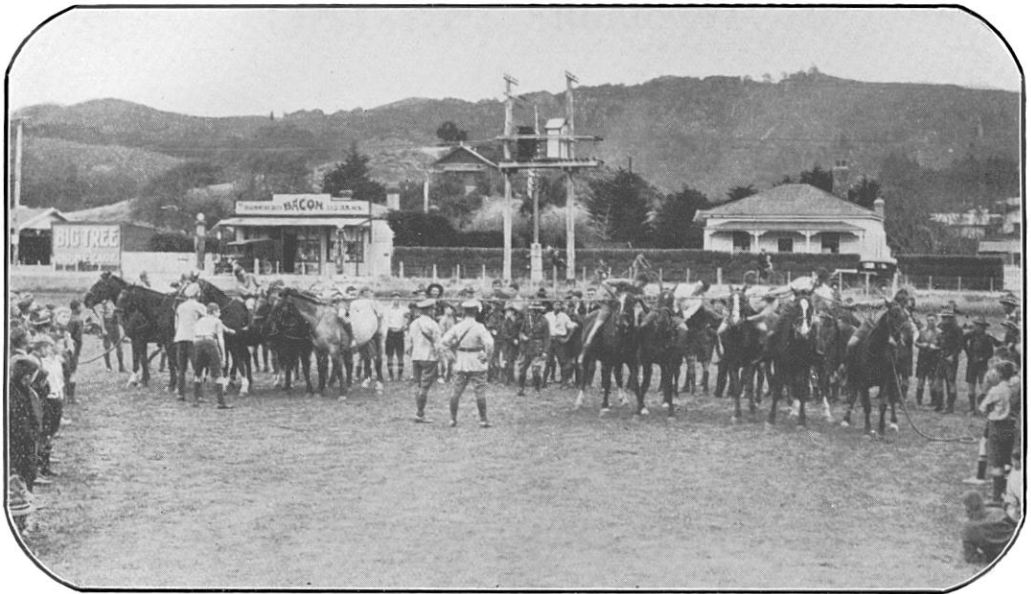

Middleweight.

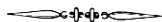

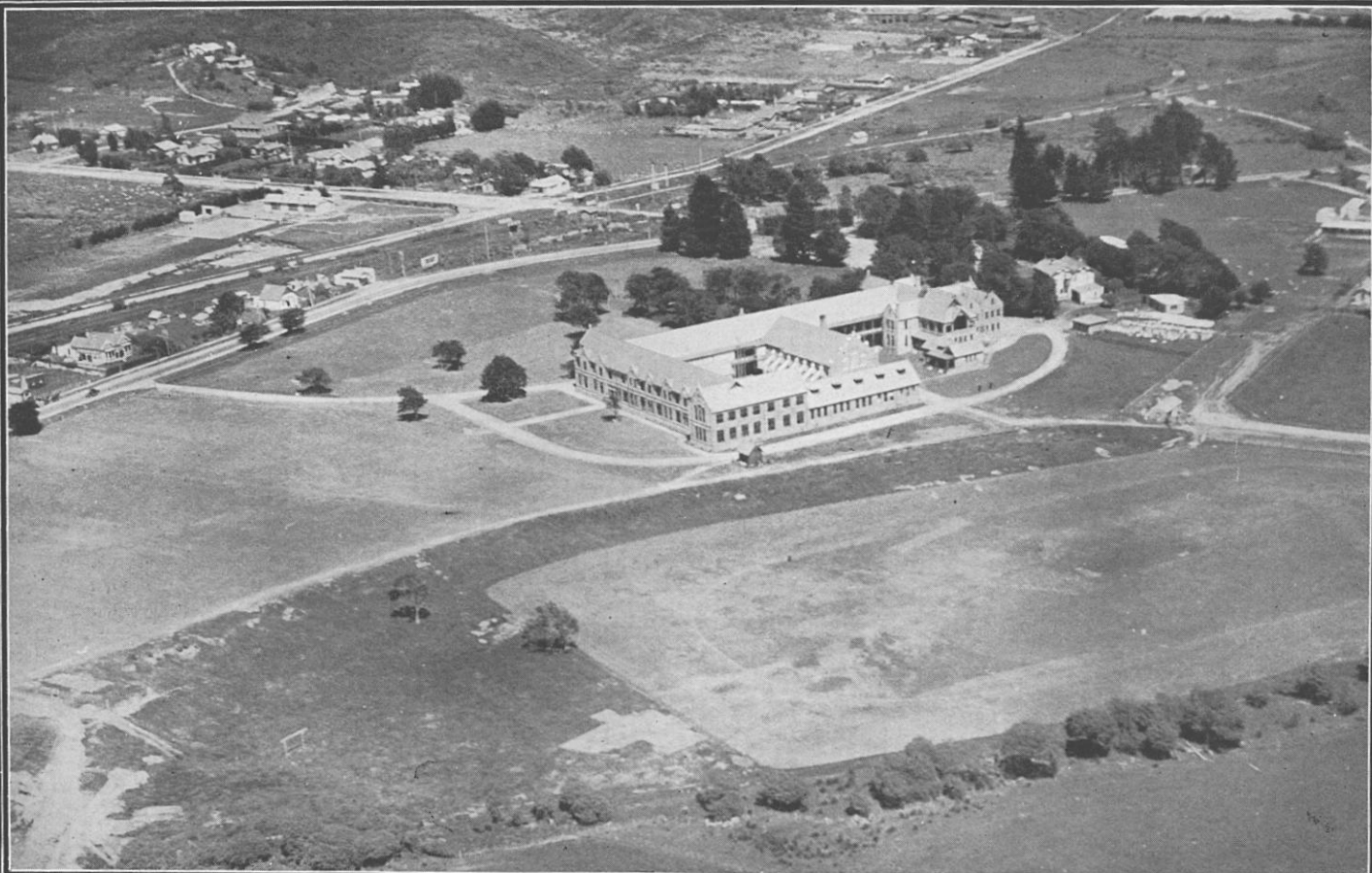

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Old Boys' Association

THE Annual Meeting of the Old Boys' Association was held in the Assembly Hall of St. Patrick's College, Wellington, on the evening of Monday, March 27th, 1933. In the absence of the President, Mr. B. McCarthy, Mr. D. Madden presided.

The Chairman expressed the feeling of all Old Boys in referring to the death of the late Mr. M. J. Crombie, who had been elected President of the Association at its last general meeting. Mr. Crombie was one of those who had kept in touch with his old school from his college days. By his death the school lost a loyal supporter, the Old Boys a most respected friend, and the Association a very able President. As a mark of respect to his memory those present stood in silence.

The proposal to establish a social room at the College in Wellington for the use of members of the Association was fully discussed, and it was unanimously decided to recommend the Committee to avail itself of the opportunity of converting what was formerly the boy's dining-room to meet the purpose.

Reference was made by the Secretary, Mr. B. Cahill, to the fact that the College would celebrate its golden jubilee in June, 1935. Though the event is some distance ahead, it is one of such outstanding importance in the history of Catholic education in New Zealand as to warrant this early mention. The occasion would demand extensive preparations if the jubilee were to be worthily celebrated. The executive desired that the matter be widely discussed among Old Boys.

The Rectors of the two Colleges were present as joint Patrons, and both spoke in congratulatory terms of the work of the Association. Revd. Father Dowling assured Old Boys of the interest which the staffs took in past students, and stressed the fact that though the personnel may change from year to year the spirit of the school remains, and that the new masters welcome the opportunity of becoming acquainted with those who re-visit the school. The Revd. Father Cullen urged a more active interest in the doings of the College by the individual members. The Executive, he stated, did splendid work, and the Annual Report showed that it spared no effort in pursuing the aims and ideals of the Association, but he pointed out that only by direct contact with the School maintained by the members themselves could there spring up that close co-operation and co-ordination between the school present and past, which is such a vital factor in an effective Association.

THE ANNUAL REPORT.

The following are extracts from the Annual Report:—

"Death of the President.—It is with deep sorrow that this report records the passing of the late Mr. M. J. Crombie, the newly-elected President of the Association, whose death on the 23rd of April, 1932, came as a grievous shock to the Association Executive and Old Boys throughout New Zealand. At his Solemn Requiem the Rectors of the two Colleges officiated, Old Boys acting as Pall-Bearers and present boys as a Guard of Honour. A remarkably representative gathering of Commerce and the Professions bore a striking tribute to the wide esteem in which our late President had been held.

"New President.—At its first meeting the Committee, in exercise of the Rules, duly elected Mr. Bernard McCarthy, of Hawera, to the position of President. Mr. D. Madden was elected chairman of the Committee.

"The Two Establishments.—Congratulations are extended to the Rectors of both Colleges on the extent of their Rolls and on their current successes. It is noteworthy that the Roll for 1932 at Cambridge Terrace comprised 200 day boys, while that of Silverstream comprised 181 boarders and 23 day boys. The Staffs wish it known that they are glad to welcome and make the acquaintance of visiting Old Boys.

"Membership.—That the financial membership of the Association has been maintained at its previous level at the present time may be regarded as fairly satisfactory. The need for a considerable increase, however, still remains. Difficulty is still experienced in regard to the whereabouts and changes of address of many Old Boys. Old Boys are asked to notify whereabouts and changes of address to the Secretary at the Association's P.O. Box or c/o the College.

"Activities.—The following are the principal events of the year:—

"(1) Sectional Re-unions: Very Revd. Father Cullen having kindly placed at the disposal of the Committee the late Refectory of old St. Patrick's for use as a social room, a number of sectional re-unions of an informal type were held. "(2) Present Boys: A number of contests were, as usual, engaged in with present boys.

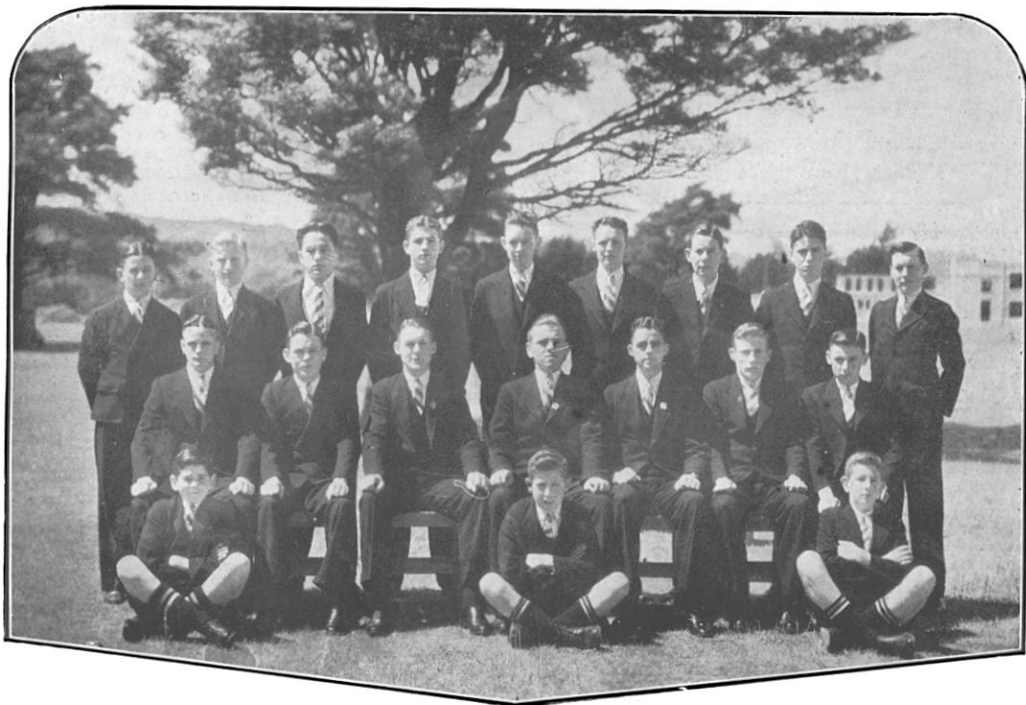

Old Boys' Football

THE year 1933 marks a step forward in the growth of the Club. It is the first year in which the Club has attained the Senior A Grade. Commencing the season in the Second Division of the Senior A Grade, the First XV. of the Club was the leading team in the Division at the end of the first round. This meritorious performance earned promotion to the First Division. It was not expected that such a young team would seriously challenge the leading teams in this Division, but it made a remarkably good showing. It succeeded in winning two games against old and experienced combinations, and, though it was beaten in the other games, it was not outclassed in the sense that the opposition could trifle with it. The experience gained this season will certainly bear fruit next year.

One of the most pleasing features of the Club record is the way in which several of the teams persevered in spite of repeated losses and finally won their way to victory. The Seniors gave an excellent example. Though they lost all the earlier matches in the second round, they profited by their defeats, and in their last two matches gained meritorious victories. In this respect, the Third Division (formerly the Fourth Grade) deserve to be commended. They sustained a series of defeats, but at the end of the season won four of the last five games.

With an active membership of eighty, the Club fielded four teams. Great credit is due to such staunch club-men as Messrs. P. Kennedy, T. Mulcahy, F. Kelleher, L. Day and M. Rafter, who have done such a great deal to assist the players in their training. The old College gymnasium and yard were available for training on Tuesdays and Thursdays, thanks to the courtesy of the College authorities. Flood-lights were used in the yard, and proved a very satisfactory addition. After training, the Old Boys' Association club-rooms at the College were very popular with all members. Cards, ping-pong and supper made these evenings most enjoyable. A card evening was held at the College, and the thanks of the Club are due to the ladies of Brooklyn, and to Messrs. The College Prospectus *Silverstream.*

"Silverstream," or the new St. Patrick's College, Silverstream, has been erected amid delightful surroundings in the most beautiful and picturesque portion of the Hutt Valley. Travellers to Wellington are well acquainted with the magnificent property which lies between Heretaunga and the Taita Gorge, about sixteen miles from Wellington. It would be difficult to find in all New Zealand a more perfect setting for a residential college.

THE BUILDINGS. In the design of these the comfort and health of the students has been the first consideration. All dormitories and class-rooms have the benefit of cross-ventilation and are so arranged as to obtain the maximum of fresh air and sunshine. In the most sheltered and sunny portion a sleeping-balcony has been provided. Since there are five separate dormitories the boys can be properly graded.

The buildings comprise a magnificent Assembly Hall erected at a cost of £12,000; senior and junior Common Rooms or Recreation Rooms, Study Hall and Boys' Library. Bathrooms have been provided on a lavish scale, and each boy will have the benefit of a hot or cold shower every day. The Science room is one of the finest in New Zealand. It is hoped that in a short time equipment will be provided for a large workshop and woodwork room. The College Hospital, which is a semi-detached building, has two large wards, nurse's room, ward-kitchen, bathrooms and sun porch. The various locker-rooms will provide three lockers for each boarder, one for linen (in charge of matron), one for suits, etc., and one for boots and shoes. In addition to these each boarder will have a locker for toilet requisites, etc., alongside his bed.

ADMISSION. Parents or guardians intending to send boys should apply to the Rector. Care is taken to admit no students who do not bear a good moral character. The Rector may demand testimonials as to character from Parish Priest or teacher of last school.

Courses of Instruction.

Three Courses of Instruction will be provided:—

- (A) Professional or General Course the aim of which is not only to prepare students for the professions, but also to impart a general culture, which is the first essential in all education.

Instruction is given in the following subjects:—English, Latin, French, Mathematics, History and Civics, Physics, Chemistry, Geography, Drawing.

- (B) Commercial Course. Students taking this Course substitute Book-keeping and Business Methods, Shorthand and Typewriting, and Economics for several subjects of the professional course. Senior students are prepared for Accountancy Professional Examinations.

- (C) **Agricultural Course.** The Course in Agriculture is designed to meet the requirements of boys definitely taking up farming when they leave school. To several subjects of the general course they will add instruction in practical and theoretical agriculture, wool-classing, book-keeping and economics.

It must be remembered that the College property comprises 200 acres of first-class dairying land and 600 acres of hill country suitable for sheep.

Students take part in actual farm work; in milking, ploughing, sowing, fencing, etc.

BOARD OF HONOUR. Every week each Form Master gives to the students under his charge a mark for work and progress, the highest mark being 5. Marks are also given for conduct and diligence at study. A student who obtains an average of four out of five has his name inscribed on the Board of Honour for the week. If he fails to secure such average all privileges are withheld for the week and he is liable to detention.

REPORTS.—Reports embodying the examination results and the weekly marks are forwarded to parents or guardians every term.

INSTITUTIONS. The College has its own Choir, Orchestra, Sodality, Camera Club and Senior, Junior and Intermediate Debating Clubs.

COLLEGE MAGAZINE. At the end of each year the College Magazine, the *Blue and White*, is published. Price 5/-. The boys also print a monthly paper, "Silverstream."

PHYSICAL CULTURE AND GAMES. Great importance is attached to physical development. Every boy must undergo physical training and play games unless he is, for good reason, excused. The College property affords excellent facilities for cricket, football, tennis, golf and swimming.

- (2) **The Junior School.** This department follows the recommendations of the Education Department in reference to Junior High Schools. A wide range of subjects is taught. Students who have reached Standard IV. are admitted to the Junior School.

Fees.

Boarders (Tuition and Board): 22 guineas per term, reducible to £22 if paid in advance.
The year consists of three terms.

Day Boys (Tuition), £4/4/- per term.

For Boarders and Day Boys: Stationery 5/- per term, Games 10/- per term, Library 2/6 per term, Laboratory fee 7/6 per term.

Optional: Music (Violin or Piano), 3½ guineas per term. Dancing, £1/5/- per year.
Boxing, one guinea per year.

Entrance Fee: All newly-entered students are required to pay an entrance fee of £5 for bed and table linen, to be provided and washed at the College expense; this charge will cover the whole time a boarder is in residence.

POCKET MONEY. No pocket money will be advanced to any student without a written declaration from the parents authorizing a certain amount to be given weekly.
