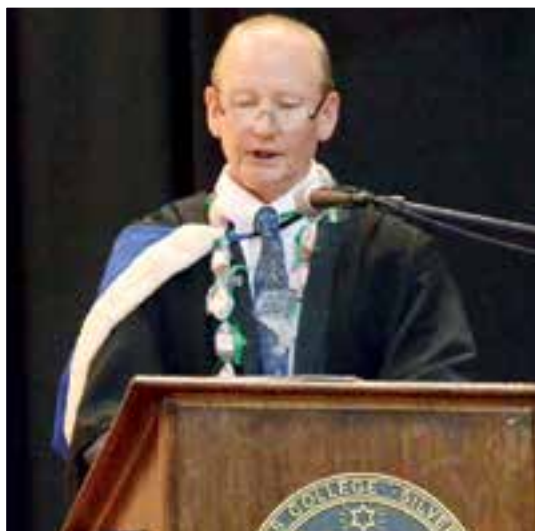

The most precious thing – is love

Good evening everyone – and welcome to our last formal
event in the 13 years of schooling for our young men.

I wish to particularly acknowledge and thank tonight our Board of Trustees Chair, Katrina Mannix. It has been a big year for the Board and I thank you Katrina for your leadership of our College. I thank all Board members – Board of Trustees and Board of Proprietors – for their very Marist commitment to Silverstream, so often behind the scenes. Katrina. Aroha mai aroha atu.

Welcome tonight to Mr David Sullivan – representing Cardinal John Dew – we are most grateful for the ongoing prayerful and practical support of the Archdiocese of Wellington.

To our parents – many of you – like your sons – perhaps at your last formal St Patrick's College Silverstream function. I hope we have partnered well with you as we have all sought the very best for your sons.

To staff members – both teaching and support – thank you for your commitment to providing the best possible holistic educational opportunities for our students.

Zach – thank you for your speech tonight and for your leadership of the student body of Silverstream in 2017. In acknowledging you, I thank all our student leaders, and in fact your whole year group – you told me 12 months ago that your year group all got on very well together and worked well together – I am delighted to report that in this, as in so many other areas of school life, you were right.

And to the students of Year 13 – not for the first time but probably for the last time in your lives – I have a few thoughts for you.

Firstly, congratulations to all our prize winners tonight – enjoy your moment on the stage – you deserve it. Congratulations also to all of you who this year have strived to be your best – strived for your own personal excellence – whether or not that has gained you an award. One of the great prizes in life is to know that we have given of our very best.



I said a few minutes ago that:

The most precious thing is love

The Gospel reading at Mass on Sunday was called the Great Commandment – to love God and to love our neighbour as ourselves.

Another much quoted extract from the scriptures tells us that “love is patient and kind” – that “love keeps no record of wrong” that “love always protects, trusts, hopes and preserves” that “love never fails”.

How have I observed or experienced this love from the St Patrick's College Silverstream Year 13 students in 2017?

I saw love when you:

- Daily as mentors walked the Year 9 Tutor lines – talking, joking, shaking hands, smiling.
- When you organised a BBQ for the staff early in the year at a time where we were all a little fragile.
- When you jumped in to stop a fight developing.
- When a group of you gave me a box of Upper Hutt's finest beverages when you sensed that maybe I might be struggling.
- I saw love when you got up early to help with breakfasts at St Michael's, when you gave up your time to academically tutor other students, when you spent time with guys sitting by themselves in the corridors.
- I saw love when you coached junior teams, organised house activities for all the students of our school or fundraised to help our neighbours beyond our gates.
- I saw love when you resolved differences, supported each other, forgave each other, prayed for each other.

So – here at Silverstream – have we got love covered off – are we done – have we got it sorted?

I think not. I think – love is a daily call – a daily challenge.

As a school – and in our families and as individuals – we are all on our journeys – ups and downs, highs and lows, good times and tough times. Tonight you finish your school journey and start your adult journey.

As you leave this place, take your love out into our world – to everyone you meet. For everyone is your neighbour. Let no chance go by to give love:

Because the Great Commandment urges us to love our God and love our neighbour.

Because the most precious thing is love

HEAD BOY'S ADDRESS

I wrote this address about four times before I eventually settled on this. In addition, one reoccurring theme that I recognized was that a frog is a very inspiring animal.

You see, a frog's life begins by living in water as an egg. From there it hatches into a tadpole, which turns into a froglet and eventually it loses its tail and becomes a frog that lives on land.

But why can we take inspiration from a frog? Because their whole lives, from water to land, they are constantly experiencing and adapting to change.

During our time at Silverstream, we have constantly experienced change. Whether that be the change from vertical to horizontal tutor classes, from the bridesmaids of Premier 1 rugby, to the victors, from the 50 cent garlic bread to the \$1.80 garlic bread, from the intimidating culture, to a culture where people aren't afraid to be who they are.

Stream has been a ledge that has supported us for the past five years; it has helped us to improve academically, physically, and socially. But not only this, it has turned us from boys into men.

But we leave this school and become one of 47,000 people starting the next chapter other lives. So aim high, use the springboard that Silverstream has provided to reach further and become the best possible versions of yourself.

Whether you go into tertiary education, trades, or sales, strive. Push yourselves to success and no matter how many times there are breakdowns in your journey, pick yourself up and continue. Because remember that your failures and the amount of changes you experience do not define you, but instead it is how you rise up from struggles and adapt. So believe in yourself. Believe you can do anything. Be true to who you are, and keep your beliefs and values central to your choices.

This address cannot go without giving thanks. To the staff, thank you for the constant passion to see us strive and grow into men. In particular, to Mr Tully who finishes his time after contributing so much to Stream. To the parents, thank you for letting us attend Silverstream. And thank you for supporting us in times of thick and thin.

From myself, thank you boys. For the experiences. For the friendships, and for entrusting me as your Head Boy. To Harrison, Teddi and Harry, thank you for the amazing support and making my job easy. I have put my heart and soul into the role of Head Boy and hope I have done the it justice.

Again, to the boys, what makes our year level isn't the number 13, but instead it is the experiences and friendships established. Because as we leave Silverstream we measure our time not by the periods, lunch breaks or exam results, but in the friendships we have made and the times we have shared together.

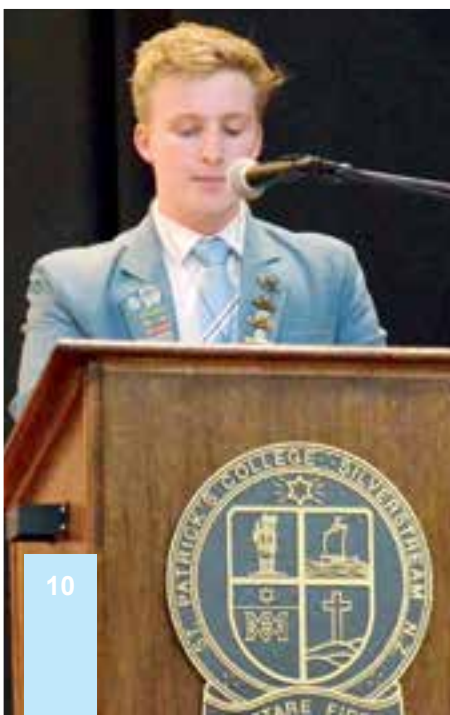

REST IN PEACE

On this page we honour two Silverstream Old Boy priests of the Society of Mary.



Fr Noel Delaney SM

Noel attended Stream from 1935 – 1940. He was Head Boy in 1940. A favourite memory for him that year was when as winning captain of the McEvedy Shield team, the shield was presented to Noel by the Prime Minister, Peter Fraser.

He left Silverstream and went to the Marist Seminary at Greenmeadows. He was ordained a priest in 1948 and served 68 faith-filled years in ministry. He returned to teach at Silverstream from 1954 to 1963 and later was Rector at Hato Paora College (1965 – 1971). He was the Marist Provincial for New Zealand from 1975 to 1981. He had a great love of music, the arts in general and whaikorero.

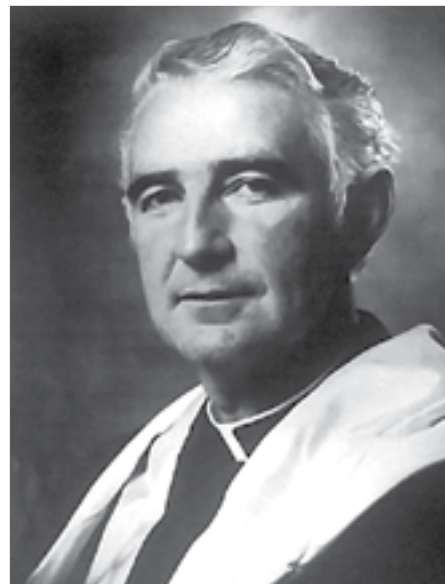
Fr Noel's body lay – accompanied by students – in the College Chapel through the night of 17 February 2016. He was farewelled by his College with a haka on the morning of 18 February, from where he travelled to funeral services at St Mary of the Angels, Hato Paora College and to his final resting place in Wairoa.

Fr Fred Bliss SM

Fred attended Stream from 1952-1954, a boarder from the Hawkes Bay.

Fr Fred was Rector of the College from 1974 – 1980. It was during this time that the much sought after College Chapel was finally built and opened. This achievement owed much to Fred's drive and determination. The arts also flourished under his leadership and he urged the highest of academic standards. He was also the Marist Provincial for New Zealand from 1981-1985 and went on to be Rector of St Patrick's College Town from 1989 – 1991. He spent many years studying and lecturing in Rome.

Fr Fred died in early February 2017. On Friday 17 February, we held a Farewell Liturgy in the Chapel, very well attended by priests of the Society of Mary, family members and students of both St Pat's Stream and Town. Fr Fred's funeral service was held in his home town of Napier.

In 2011, the year that Gerard started at St. Patrick's College Silverstream, Barrack Obama said this of teachers: "It takes a special person to light that fire, to raise our children's expectations for themselves and never give up on them, no matter how challenging it might be. Over the past six years Gerard has been that person for our community - a leader who demonstrates a deep concern for the inherent dignity of every person and a leader who is genuinely merciful and compassionate - even in the most challenging of times. In the words of Micah 6:8, Gerard has inspired those around him 'to act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly with your God.'

Gerard is a risk taker, a doer and a maker of things. He has not been afraid to try new things as Rector of the College, from trying out new learning spaces, to learning how to use Google Docs. He is a man who is willing to give anything a go if it is going to benefit our students, a man that celebrates every aspect of College life. He has had his own tutor group, coached the "mighty U55 B" rugby team, been a vital member of the Stream Youth Ministry team, and he has successfully run an @tullyatstream Instagram account that promotes daily happenings at Stream.

With his quick wit, love of the Warriors, active support of native birds and keen interest in Robert Frost poetry Gerard is able to bring energy and light to any occasion.

At the heart of everything that Gerard does is his strong sense of the Gospel values - everything he does is done in love. Gerard cares deeply for all of the Stream community, staff, students and whānau which has been so evident in all that he has done in his years at the College. He is widely respected as being a strong advocate for Te Ao Māori and the Pasifika culture. It is through this example that he inspires. He shows empathy and is able to walk in the shoes of others. He is a champion for the less fortunate. Gerard will go the extra mile for students who are struggling. He is always approachable, has an open door policy and you can be confident that you will be heard. He is highly respected by staff and students.

Gerard has been a dedicated servant of Marist Education for many years including as a teacher and Rector at St Patrick's College Wellington. For two years Gerard has been instrumental working with the JC Colin Project helping to develop the National Network of Marist Schools. He has been a strong supporter of the annual Marist Youth Leader workshops, building young leaders in the Network schools, and with the Young Neighbours Trust. He has also been involved with the Marist Youth project working with disadvantaged youth to enable some student access to secondary education in Marist High Schools. He has embraced the Marist education philosophy of educating the whole person, encouraging each child to strive for personal excellence, be humble in all things and achievements, and to be the servant of the needy and less fortunate - all in the way and example of Mary.

Silverstream has been blessed to have Gerard at the heart of our community and we thank him for all those he has never given up on, for his ability to always see what is possible, and for being gentle and relentless in his messages of peace and love.

Jeanette Duffy

At the end of the second term, Jeanette Duffy left us to take up the position of Principal, St Oran's College. Jeanette has been an outstanding and committed long-serving staff member, having had many roles in the College including HOD English, HOD Learning Support and Deputy Rector (Teaching and Learning). She brought total dedication and professionalism to each of her roles and provided strong and confident leadership to the students, staff and families of the College.

Jeanette was very well read and up to date with the latest thinking in education. She was highly respected, nationally and internationally, for her work, particularly around Teacher Inquiry. In 2013, she presented at an international education conference on best practice in teaching in San Francisco, and was regularly involved in presenting at conferences/seminars in New Zealand.

Jeanette had a wonderful way of working with individuals, whether staff members or students. She cared deeply for the progress and growth of each person with whom she dealt.

In Term Two, 2016 Jeanette was Acting Rector while Gerard Tully was on his sabbatical, and Jeanette did an outstanding job. It came as no surprise to any of the staff,

therefore, when news came through of her appointment as Principal at St Oran's.

On Monday 24 July a strong contingent of staff and students accompanied Jeanette to St Oran's for her Powhiri and official "handing over". She goes with our love and our gratitude for her passionate service to our community.

Aaron Columbus

Aaron Columbus joined St Patrick's College Silverstream in 2011 as a teacher of Social Studies and History. At the time, History was almost non-existent in the College. Aaron used his inordinate passion for History, in combination with his enthusiasm and teaching style to quickly grow History and Classical Studies into popular subjects, which now have at least one class at each level in the senior school. He was also Assistant Head of Social Sciences and in this role, he helped write new schemes of work, new assessments and organise and run successful field trips. Aaron was also the Dean of Year 11 in 2013 and then Year 12 in 2014. He was well respected by students and staff and always went the extra mile to form positive relationships by making the effort to get to know his students. Aaron also joined the acclaimed Silverstream running crew alongside life members Hugh Steel and Simon Fordyce. He was part of several team-running events and completed a number of half marathons.

In late 2014, Aaron successfully applied for the role of Assistant Rector with his focus being on curriculum development, a role he has now held for the past three years. While a large part of the role is administration, such as overseeing Weekly Notes, attendance and reports, Aaron has successfully implemented changes such as the NCEA credit reduction at Level 1 in 2016 and Level 2 in 2017. He was also largely responsible for the changes to 90 and 45-minute periods in the school, and the revamping of the reporting process - which is now conference based, one, which utilises the power of the relationship between students, teachers and families.

Aaron also organised and led three overseas trips. The first trip was to Vietnam in 2013. A smallish group of 20 students spent time in Ho Chi Minh, Hoi An, Hue and Hanoi over a two week period. The focus of the trips was to learn about the History behind the Vietnam War, and an excellent cultural experience learning a new language, dealing with a foreign currency, trying a variety of authentic local foods, and interacting with local Vietnamese people. In 1993, Mike left teaching at Marlborough Boys High and brought his young family over the ditch, to a new family home in Pinehaven. This was the beginning of what would for Mike turn out to be a quarter century of service here at Stream. He has seen many changes, being appointed by Fr Jim Dooley the last priest Rector of the school; he really developed the role of School Counsellor under David Leavy, and all the subsequent lay Rectors, even the delightful nickname of Soul Man at one stage. Mike's office has been a safe haven for the support, nurturing and healing of many a student over the years. From the earliest days, Mike partnered with Libby Kirton in running a pro-active and effective Counselling Team.

There's more to this man however.....

Mike was never content with just doing his job as a counsellor in the available hours. He was readily available to meet families when and where they were at as needed. Mike made himself an essential member of the Boarding Community by being available Thursday evenings over so many years. He has called on his teaching skills, developing a Year 9 and 10 Health Curriculum until 2011. He had a particular fondness for Year 13 RST classes.

Believing firmly in the importance of relationships outside of the classroom, Mike put ten years of his time coaching Football, and later, Dragon Boating as well. He ran a Peer Support programme for 12 years and the Young Marist Heroes for six. Mike's continual presence as Staff Representative with the Parents and Friends' Association since 1994, helping raise tens of thousands of dollars over the years. It is impossible to overestimate his part in enriching the wider Stream community. Mike was not just available for parents and students however; he was always available to, supportive of, and a sounding board for so many staff in times of stress and difficulty. 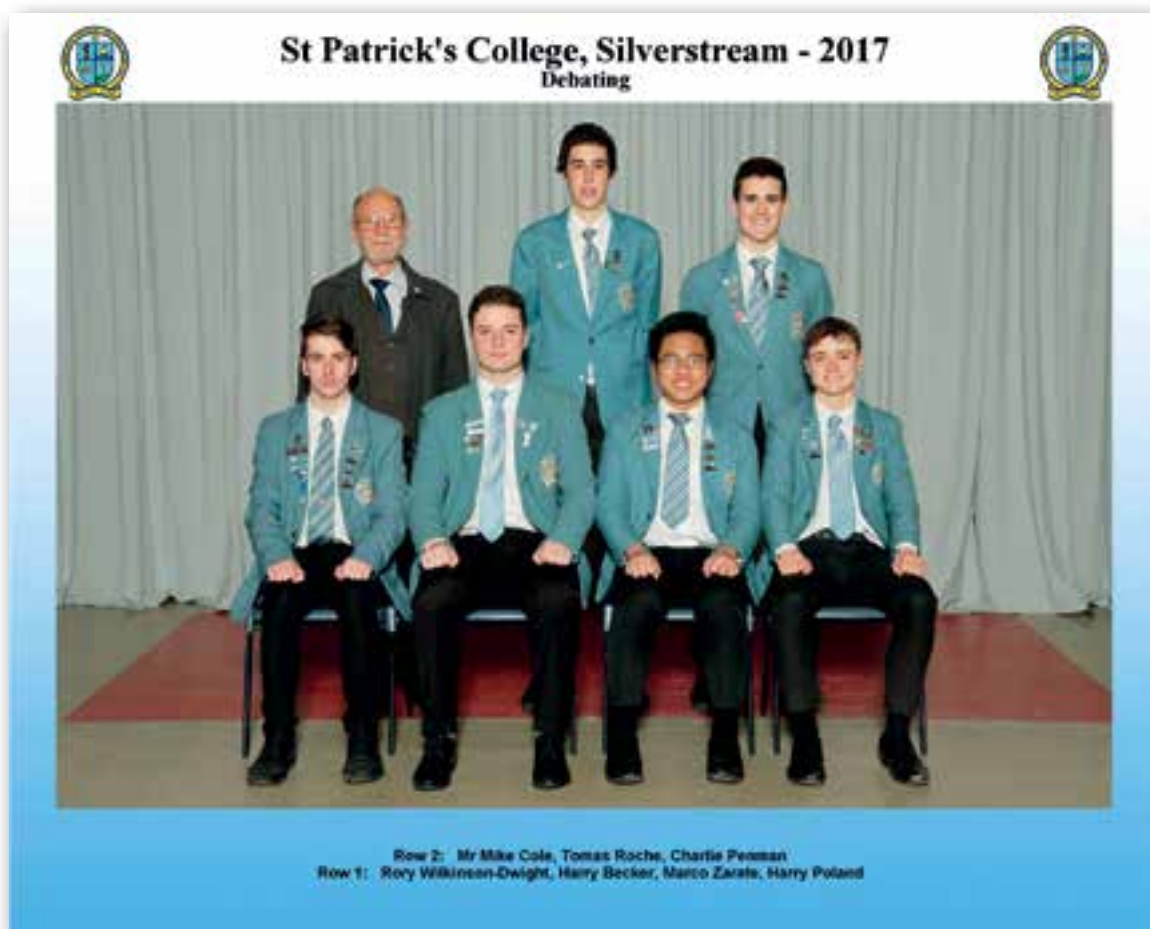
It was a pleasure captaining this team, and I wish them all the best for the future years.

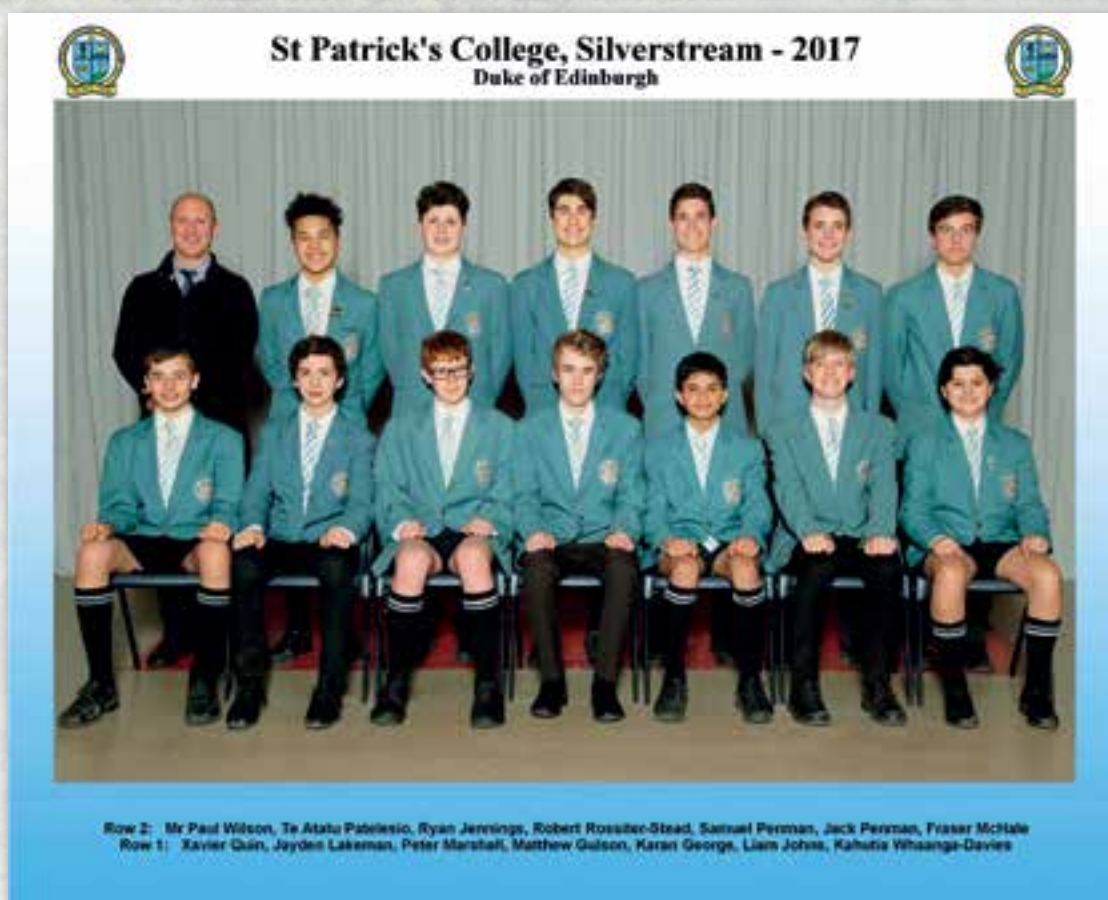

DUKE OF EDINBURGH



Duke of Edinburgh Tramp - October 2017. Makahika Outdoor Centre

Navigation, packing, emergency management, and river crossings were all things unbeknownst to the majority of us as we went on our way to Makahika in Levin. Duke of Edinburgh provides students with an opportunity to learn these skills through a three day Tramp. Although this was a practice Tramp, the challenge was undoubtedly genuine. Out of the van and into the base. This would be our last taste of civilisation before the training and the trek. Bronze, Silver, and Gold were represented from our school, a decent showing but not as many as we have had in previous years. Prior to this year, Duke of Edinburgh was run through school but this year the activity was outsourced to the professionals at Makahika. This meant that we gained a lot of useful knowledge over the course of the trip.

The first day began an hour after arrival with emergency management and an overview of the skills needed for tramping. While the Bronze and Silver groups focused on basic skills such as map and compass work, myself with the Gold group began our training with a decent walk and some navigation skills culminating in an emergency night out in the bush. Sleeping under a tarp on dead ferns was not as bad as it sounded. Nevertheless the next day started slowly just before dawn as we gathered the fuel needed for the fire in the form of the rare dry dead sticks. We learnt about more emergency management including hypothermia. The gold leader Russell shared with us some stories of his experiences with hypothermia which sent shivers down my spine. Needless to say, an extra layer was accumulated before long. The tramp back to base took the better part of the day while the Bronzes and Silvers continued their training. The final night before the long adventure was spent with some charades, indoor cricket and spotlight. A sampling of the "scrumptious" tramping dinners was a taste of what was to come in the area of food for the next few days. The final planning was done and our heads hit the pillow as we rested up for what would be a gruelling three day trek in unfamiliar territory.

Rise and shine, an early start was followed by a quick re-pack and the introduction of three new tramping buddies. Gold and Silver would begin their tramps today while Bronze had another day of preparation before crunch time. The first day began with a flat hike and a chatty atmosphere amongst the group. That slowed down as we begun the slightly steep ascent. We passed a group of elderly day hikers who seemed to be trudging in the deep mud with less effort and to a greater pace. We stopped at various times during the day but managed to miss the Horowhenua lookout, one of our main planned stops. One



of the main lessons by the end of the week was the significance of stops along a tramp. The day was a little over 6 hours of walking with 15kg packs on our backs and ended with an incredibly tough descent down the hill. Half of the group ended up sliding down the hill, near-missing sharp rocks and always managing to hold onto trees that seemed desperate to fall over with the slightest force. On the other side of the hill, we met the very basic hut with delight. Although it wasn't the best of facilities, the view was unbelievable and I speak for everyone when I say huts are better than tents, and quite a bit better than an emergency tarp as we had experienced. Immediately we started the fire and got cooking. Morale was lifted back up to its peak and we started reviewing the current day and planning for the next. It was to be a slightly easier day before the real challenge. If there was one lesson learnt by the group at this hut, it was that you don't leave your tramping boots unattended in front of a fire. Luckily the holes in the boots didn't seem to affect performance. A dodgy looking bunk bed in which a short turn in the night could spell disaster, surprisingly didn't provide the dreams I would have liked (yes, more sarcasm). Our leader told us the chilling story of how a mother had died whilst crossing a river we would cross the next day on a trip with her son. Although it wasn't the heart warming story I would have liked before shuteye it taught us a valuable lesson about crossing rivers when the water level is up.

The next morning began early and we started our second leg around sunrise following a breakfast and a mocha (yeah I brought my own mochas). We had to get used to getting our socks wet early as we literally spent half the day jaywalking a river. Like much of the week, we also spent considerable time bush bashing our way through the thick greenery. There is nothing more frustrating than spending half an hour trying to navigate thick bush and slippery mud only to get a bit better than nowhere. At times we got up to waist high in the water and finished this leg of the tramp much earlier than we expected. Still, we spent 5-6 hours walking that day along some difficult terrain although nothing like we would face on the last day. Compared to our last hut, this was an absolute luxury. As well as a fire in the centre, this new hut provided a spacious room that encapsulated comfortable clean bedding, a nice yet simple kitchen and a real laugh reading some of the journal entries for the huts book. It was definitely intriguing to hear some of the tales of previous occupants, tourists, and visitors. Russell went out and cut down some sticks for the next day's climbing. The weather had been very kind to us over the trip and the last night was warm enough for us to unwind and rest up. Some cards were played and some treats were had, I even had a few more mochas. We could see the route for the next day and already we couldn't begin to comprehend the difficulty of it. We literally looked straight up and the hill seemed to incline at an impossibly steep gradient. This would be our task for the next day. At ten that night we hunkered down for our last night, a bit tired and weary and deserving of the rest.

We woke to fog and a big challenge. After breakfast in the dark we began the last trek of the trip. With our walking sticks in hand we started off, and before long crossed a river to which we began the climb of our lives. Eventually we climbed to a point over a kilometre in the air. This climb would be over 550 metres vertically in tough terrain. What could be worse I asked? Well, that's when it started to rain. After an hour of quad-killing climbing, I was reminded of Russell's expertise around hypothermia. I was shivering tremendously and I was covered with goose bumps. At this point we were surrounded by fog and couldn't see anything a few metres ahead of us. After a while, I decided it was time to change shirts. Changing clothes was a fantastic decision. I went from frozen to genuinely warm and comfortable. This didn't last long. The frustration of the never ending climb got on all of our nerves. One of us kept asking when the descent we were promised would begin. Unfortunately the descent proved to be just as difficult. When we finally got to the top of the top, we stopped for some quick snacks in the exposed chilly winds while our leader took some photos. If only everything wasn't whited out, the views would have been extraordinary. As we began moving downwards we headed into trouble. Steep muddy slips came at regular intervals. Most of us ended up just falling down twenty metres before luckily flying into bush. This descent lasted what felt like a never ending period. Fortunately it did end and after the better part of 5 hours of tramping we sat down for a meal. Morale was being built back up and the next 3 hours finishing off the long trek would be spent gossiping and gabbing. Most of this last part was flat (thank the Lord), but we somehow managed to veer off the track. Lucky for us, our leader decided to inform us of this. This added to our already long day. Finally seeing civilization after 8 hours of tramping in the day and over 30 kilometres of walking over the trip with food, clothes, and emergency supplies in muddy terrain meant we were extremely happy to be back in the comforts of society. Unfortunately for us we didn't realise we still had a 45 minute walk and a large river crossing before we were back at base where Mr Wilson was waiting. The Silverstream boys were happy to see me as it meant we were finally on our way home. This was not before thanking Russell Higham for the extremely good job he did as our leader on the trip and a thank you to all of the leaders at Makahika who make it possible. I could not possibly describe the elation of reaching base and the feeling of overused legs being superseded by the happiness of knowing that a hash brown or two was waiting at home only to be followed by a beautiful bath and not having to worry about the next km or the weight on my back. As we entered the van, it was "sayonara" to a week of tramping and G'day to normal life again.

Months on and I look back to this tramp as a truly special and unique opportunity to make connections as well as learning some valuable and pretty awesome lessons. None of this would have been able to occur without the help of Mr Wilson, the coordinator of Duke of Edinburgh this year, after Mr Watson ended his long reign.

This has long been the aim at Silverstream, to further recognize the rapid growth of the Pasifika presence in several aspects of the College through our Pacific students, families and cultural events that have been strongly displayed throughout the year. With a large number of new entrant Pasifika students walking through the gates of Silverstream for the first time, it was clear that as a College community and staff, systems needed to be put in place to cater to our Pasifika students to create a sense of belonging and positive learning environment.

2017 started with our annual Pasifika Parents' and Students' BBQ Evening, which was a huge success. Part of this success can be put down to collective planning efforts from our Pasifika Parents' Support Group and staff members who decided to, for the first time, to hold this event on a Sunday evening tied together with our Community Mass. An encouraging initiative, which enabled parents and families to meet and greet with staff members and other families of the St Patrick's College, Silverstream Pasifika Community. This event was hosted by our very own Pasifika student and Head Boarder, Teddi Afamasaga Hern and Year 13 Leader, Albert Polu. In addition, new Year 9 students Elisaia Stowers-Kasiano (dayboy) and Solomon Tuia (boarder) confidently spoke about their experiences as new Pasifika students starting at Silverstream followed by a tasty BBQ dinner! The presence of Pasifika culture incorporated into College Masses continues to be a highlight for the boys. This has spread to the celebration of Pasifika languages throughout the College where annual celebrations such as Samoan and Tongan Language Week were introduced into the school. Throughout these particular weeks, nationwide celebrations within families, schools and communities continued right through and this year. We decided to join in. Each day started with a prayer in either Tongan or Samoan followed by a "Word of the Day" being introduced to the whole school by Pasifika students at Ranks. This included words such as "Hiva" (sing in Tongan) and "Fiafia" (happy in Samoan) encouraging everyone to use these words around the school



grounds to join in on the action. Pasifika students were also able to wear, for the week, suitable cultural attire with their standard school uniform, which the boys took full advantage of. Finally, the Samoan Language Classes commemorated Samoan Language Week 2017 with a special community event where they showcased for the first time at Silverstream, cultural traditions such as the 'Ava Ceremony, formal Samoan speeches and the "Taualuga" (Samoan dance) in front of their parents and families. Mālō 'aupito, mālō le tauivi!

2017 has yet again, seen major accomplishments from our Pasifika students in the sporting facet of the College. With many competing in a variety of sporting codes, it is hard to go past the historic efforts of the Rugby 1st XV and the individual achievements of outstanding Pacific Island athletes in the likes of Eddie Korent and Demitri Perez. Co-Captained by Albert Polu, this year's 1st XV will go down as one of the best in College history by winning the Grand Slam for the first time since 1987, becoming Weltec Premier One Champions and Hurricanes' Region Finalists against eventual National Champions, Hastings Boys' High School. Demitri Perez not only proves to be a threat in Athletics for Silverstream, but also showed his worth in representing New Zealand in the Under 23 Men's Softball team, which travelled overseas. Demitri was also a nominee for this year's prestigious College sporting award, the Victor Ludorum Trophy. Sports Captain for 2017, Eddie Korent continues to be an excellent role model for young Pacific athletes. This year, his hard work ethic and dedication has seen him triumph in several sports such as Basketball, Volleyball, Athletics and Rugby. Although, Eddie was also publicly recognized at the Annual College Sport Awards becoming the deserved winner of the CSW All-Rounder of the Year for 2017. The introduction of the famous Pasifika sport, "Kilikiti" was also played on our school grounds for the first time in an official match between the Junior and Senior Samoan language classes. Congratulations to all our Pasifika athletes and those who represented us in regional and national teams this year. Mālō le fa'amālosi, mālō le fīnau!

The academic targets for our Pasifika students continues to be our primary focus and an area that staff have committed to maintaining in order to lift the achievement rates for students particularly our Senior Pasifika boys. Working hand in hand with the Pasifika Parents' Support Group we held for the first time, a Pasifika Achievement Evening in early Term Two to outline some of the key statistics for Pasifika NCEA Achievement rates, assistance around understanding how NCEA works, providing realistic home solutions for parents and two key presentations from external Pasifika providers, Mani Malaueulu (Key Skills Recruitment & Old Boy) and Fa'aaliga Leota (Victoria University Pasifika Outreach). In addition, staff were also treated with keynote presentations from Victoria University Pasifika Lecturers explaining how we, as teachers could best cater to the academic needs' of our Pasifika learners' within our own classrooms. This enabled positive discussions, close analysis of our teaching and learning methods, and led to the establishment of a staff Pasifika Focus Group. The outcomes of these increased efforts from staff and our Pasifika families have been very encouraging by creating further opportunities and learning spaces for our Pasifika students to achieve at a high level. This can be seen in the fact that Pasifika students are now able to gain NCEA credits through the Polynesian Group who perform at the annual Polyfest. In addition, our very own Pasifika students have become regular attendees at the weekly Hutt Valley "Power Up" sessions, which is aimed at assisting Pasifika students with their academic studies. 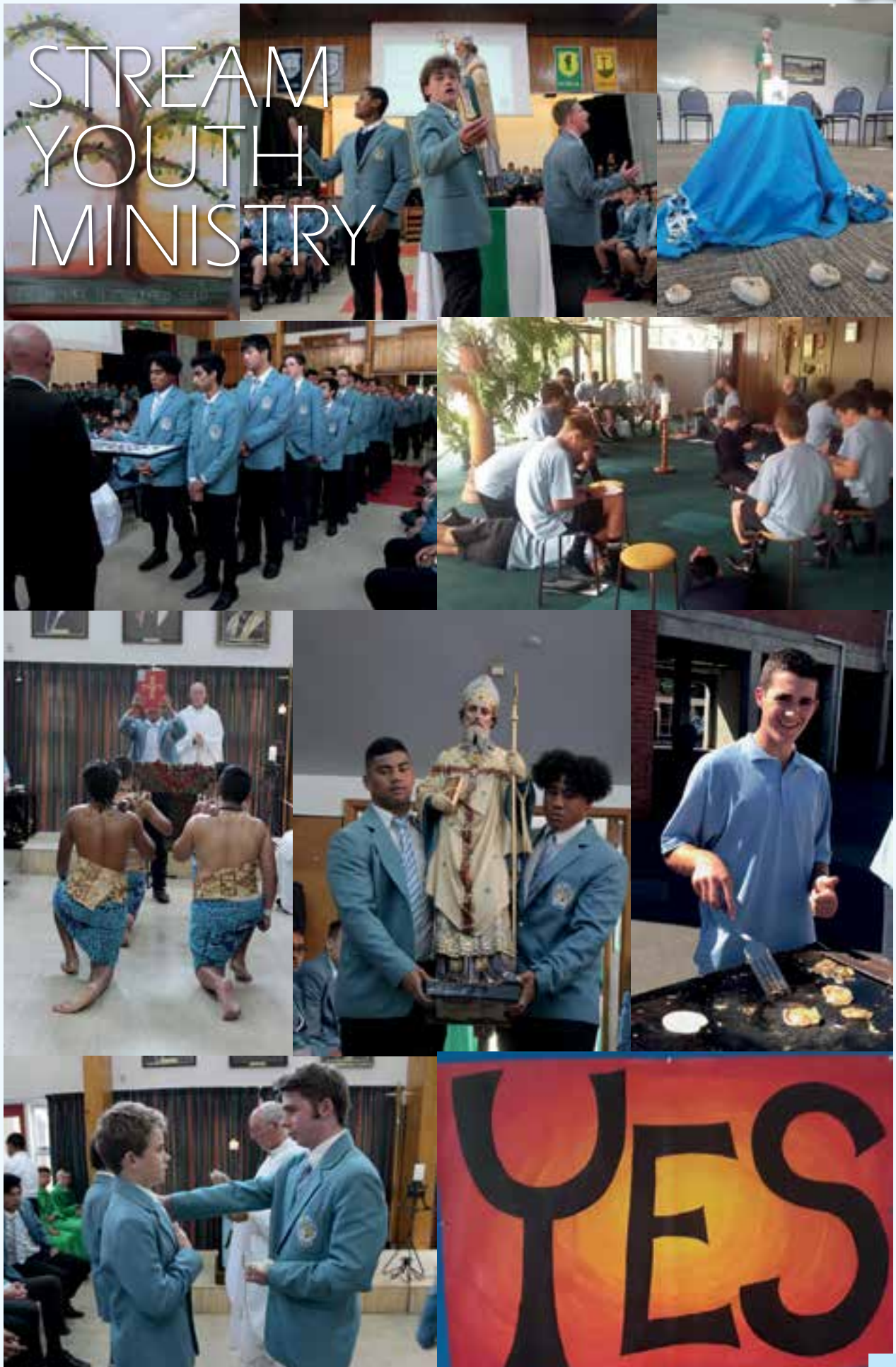
some of the other school's Vinnie's groups have been able to achieve and I am sure the rest of my group feels the same way.

Special Character is an area which we have aimed to strengthen at Stream in 2017. This year, the Ministry team set out to deepen the students experience during Retreats, to make our various College masses more engaging, and to give the students opportunities to live out their faith in community engagement.



Retreats

This year, our main aim was to make a comprehensive Retreat programme across the College. This meant shifting from what used to be full day Retreats towards two 90-minute class Retreats per year, with a specific focus.

In Year 9, we focussed on Prayer. In Term One we had a Retreat for each class in the Chapel, which aimed to teach the students different ways we can pray and to make them feel welcome in our sacred place. A second Retreat in Term Four explored prayer in our everyday life, and where we can take time to recognise God's presence. In Year 10, we decided to keep going with our Pilgrimage in and around Upper Hutt. This was not only a great way for staff

and students to experience God in nature, but to also spend quality time with each other on the journey. In Year 11, the first Retreat had a theme of Mercy and the second was on empathy, the idea of walking in others shoes. Both of these Retreats focussed on developing compassion, understanding of others, and where to use these qualities in our daily lives. In Year 12, our first Retreat focussed on what it means to say yes to God and caring for others. The second Retreat focussed around Suzanne Aubert and her example as a Servant Leader. The second Retreat also allowed the boys to experience walking around the Stations of the Cross in our own front field. Year 13 explored the theme of compassion in Term One and what that means for them as young men moving into society. In Term 3, a whole day was spent exploring living Sectare Fidem outside of college. Mr Tully led this Retreat, accompanied by old boys Fr. Bob Lee S.M., Tim Mannix, Chris Alosio, Hohepa Thompson, Liko Aloisio & Charlie Lloyd who all spoke about what Sectare Fidem has meant for them since leaving the College.

Whakapono Leadership

This year we have been blessed to have the Whakapono leadership pou working alongside the Stream Youth Ministry Team. This year Whakapono has endeavoured to renew the sense of vibrancy to our large school masses. At each of our whole school masses we have had a different drama which was student written and performed. This has led to an increase in student involvement and participation in our College masses. Several different students have stepped up and supported us, which has meant that the message has been clear and refreshing. Even though this is a small new initiative, we believe that our small contribution is making a difference. The faith and religious side of our college has seen major change in terms of energy, involvement and interest. It was great to see 16 students receiving their sacraments of Initiation. The general nature of the College's faithful side has changed considerably and the Marist values have become present and lived amongst our students.

Things that we learnt that we did not expect:

- How people were willing to embrace the new tutor time masses.
- Sometimes we can forget that we are a Catholic college so it is good to be reminded of why we exist.





College Mass

There have been many opportunities for staff and students to attend Mass at the College throughout the year. Tuesday 8:00am is primarily a Mass attended by staff members, however it was lovely to see some of the boys come along too. Thursdays at tutor time students have the opportunity to come to Mass, and this generally resulted in 80-100 students steadily coming each week. Finally, what was known as Boarder's Mass on Sunday evening is now advertised as a Community Mass and it has been fantastic to see a number of dayboys attending with their whanau, as well as members from the local Silverstream community.

Again, this year we have gathered each term for a School Mass in the auditorium, with a Mass of Dedication to start out year, St. Patrick's Day Mass, Sts Peter and Paul in July, and the Assumption of Mary. A highlight has been the full participation of the students in singing and dramatic presentation of the Liturgy of the Word.

St Patrick's Feast Day celebrations saw staff and students really enjoy our Feast day as a College. Together the whole school celebrated Mass and together we gave thanks for the wonderful opportunities to learn we have each day. Students and staff then spent the middle part of the school day playing a variety of sports. Senior students refereed the games, but only if required! It was great having staff and students just hanging out together competing for their house in a relaxed atmosphere. After lunch, the year 13's competed in an obstacle course around the exterior of the grounds and then the finale was a hilarious Tug of war competition. After traditional green Moosie and juices, we finished the day with Prayer lead by Year 13's. A great day to celebrate and enjoy each other's company.

This year we once again offered the sacramental programme where sixteen students received some Sacraments of Initiation, four of them receiving Baptism. A senior group met on Sunday evenings and the younger students on Tuesday and each group quickly formed their own identity. It is a courageous step for young men to take this action before their peers, and we wish them well on their faith journey ahead.

Living our faith in the real world

This year we have been able to provide the students with many opportunities to live out their Christian values. The Manaakitanga Leadership Pou endeavoured to do this throughout the year by looking after those in need in our community. This group had three main aims – pastoral care of younger students in need, community outreach, and charity appeals. Some things that this pou did were:

- Arranging for students to be rostered on to serve breakfast every two weeks at St. Michael's in Taita.
- Cooking and providing pancakes for the whole school on Shrove Tuesday
- Looking after younger students who needed a big brother to support them.
- Providing a BBQ for staff to say thank you for their efforts.
- Hoops 4 Hope Charity fundraiser that raised over \$6000 for the Young Neighbours Trust.
- Other charity appeals throughout the year.



The Social Justice Class also helped out in the community by frequently visiting our two local schools St. Brendan's and St. Joseph's where they would spend time playing at break, then move into the classroom to help the young students with their learning. Some of these boys also helped coach the younger boy's rugby teams for a tournament. The SJC class also produced a video based on Pope Francis' message in Laudato Si to care for our home. The boys aimed to encourage our students to make sure that they keep our environment free for future generations.

The Stream Youth Ministry team would like to say a huge thank you to any teachers who gave up their time to help lead and support the special character of our College. Our Catholic and Marist traditions are something that we hold dear and look to continue strengthening in 2018.

The Makara windfarm trip was towards the end of Term 1, which meant most of the students had a swim at the end of the day. The purpose of this trip was to investigate the various perspectives held by people who were affected by the construction of the wind farm. Our trip to the Wellington Airport looked at the potential Environmental, Social and Economic impacts of extending the length of the runway. Then in Term 3, we took a quick trip to Mojo Coffee where we learnt about the various types of coffee, the roasting and brewing process, and the range of countries who grow coffee.

The annual Level 2 Geography trip to volcanic Tongariro and Taupō saw 20 students squeezed in to mini vans with Mr Tait and Mr Hicks at the wheels and Mr Wagenhals along for support.

After a quick lunch stop and a gumboot throw in Taihape, the boys sat back and enjoyed the scenery through Waiouru and along the Desert Road. Mountains dominated the view with their snowy-topped peaks. We arrived at Lake Taupo Christian Camp to set up and be organised for the days ahead.

With the weather favourable, we headed off early the next morning to complete the Tongariro Alpine Crossing. The first part of the walk curls up the Mangatepopo Valley, which bears the scars of the large glacier that filled the walls of the valley.

The first stop and muster was at Soda Springs. A quick refuel, as well as a visit to the delightful long drop toilets, and we were on our way again. The gentle path of the Mangatepopo Valley quickly turns in to a steep ascent to the saddle between Ngauruhoe and Tongariro.


The views are spectacular with mountains towering overhead. Finally, we reached South Crater and the relief flattens allowing for an enjoyable walk across this moonscape. Another ascent up to Red Crater sees us reach the highest point of the crossing at just under 2000 metres and we are rewarded with a panoramic view of the area.

We take the steep shingle scree down to the Emerald Lakes with a few nervous explorers taking their time. We stop for lunch and then carry on across the Central Crater with its impressive lava flows on display. After another climb, we walk past Blue Lake and start the long descent between North Crater and Te Mari Crater stopping at Ketetahi Hut for a rest and another toilet break.

The last couple of hours are downhill through thick beech forest. Just when you think, the walk will never end you pop out of the forest to the car park feeling a great sense of relief as well as achievement. We headed off back to camp for a well-deserved meal then to the Tokaanu hot pools to soak sore muscles.

Our next day is far more relaxed. We headed to Taupō to collect data on the impact that tourism has on the region. We stopped at the Lake Taupō Hole on One Challenge where Mr Hicks schools everyone on how to hit a ball. Then we headed to the impressive Huka Falls, followed by Huka Jets and Prawn Farm. The final stop is at Taupō Bungy where a few students decide to throw themselves off the bridge. The afternoon is spent collecting data relevant to the individual research assignments being completed back at school.

The final day is for pack up and we headed back to Silverstream with a few stops on the way to enjoy the scenery. This was another successful Geography trip where students' experience cements what they have learnt in class.



Mr Hicks, Mr Tait, Mr Tinney and 25 Level 3 Geographers set across the Cook Strait with sights set on the distant destination of Pohara, Golden Bay. The focus of our trip was to study the interacting coastal processes at Wharariki, Tata and Onekaka Beaches. We arrived in Picton, picked up our rental vans and tracked west towards Nelson. After a long days travel we eventually made it to the Pohara Top Ten Camping ground, which is set right on the beach in Golden Bay. Day two started with communal breakfast in the kitchen before we headed to the West coast of the South Island to Wharariki Beach. Our first stop was Cape Farewell – the northernmost point of the South Island. At Wharariki Beach, we split into our data collections groups and collected a range of beach data from both the northern and southern ends of the beach. We got back to camp around 4pm and had free time to swim and play cricket and touch rugby on the beach. The focus of Day three was to visit Onekaka and Tata Beach. On our way to Onekaka Beach, we stopped for a look at the Waikoropupu Springs. This is an amazing feature where thousands of litres of clear water emerges from a couple of holes in the ground. After this, we headed to Onekaka then Tata Beach to continue collecting beach data in our groups. Day four. After breakfast, we jumped in the vans and headed towards Tataranui, the northern entry to the Abel Tasman National Park. We left the vans and walked into the National park to a small remote beach called Anapai Bay where we went for a swim and played some beach cricket. This was an amazing opportunity to experience one of the most beautiful places in New Zealand. Day five. After an early start, we hit the road for our trip back to Picton. It was a quiet trip with most sleeping in the van on the way. After dropping the vans off, we grabbed some lunch in Picton before boarding the ferry. Just over three hours later, we arrived in Wellington and headed home to rest up. The trip was a real highlight for us all, the teachers were relaxed, the accommodation and food was outstanding, and the location and sights were breath taking. I will definitely be revisiting this place at some stage.

LEARNING SUPPORT

The Teacher Aide support team are highly skilled individuals who have specialist skills associated with supporting students and teachers in the classroom. Let us not forget their support in the extra-curricular activities that help form solid and trusting relationships.

Throughout the year teacher aides have been involved in a variety of senior and junior of classes. Their strength, knowledge and support have played a major role in the all round success of each student and class they have been working in. They have also been heavily involved in the Learning Support option classes reinforcing concepts taught in classes, revising for tests and building on literacy skills. You all epitomise the phrase "hidden and unknown" in the world.

Special Assessment Conditions

HISTORY





On Thursday 13th April 35 Year 12 and 13 History and Geography students gathered bright and early at Wellington airport. Our destination? China. We arrived in Shanghai later that day. The Friday was spent exploring this mind blowing and ever growing super city. A visit to the urban planning museum certainly gave us a clear sense of the vastness of Shanghai, as did the suburb views from the Oriental Pearl Tower and the river cruise we took along the Bund that evening.

Saturday April 15th was the first of three excursions from Shanghai, with Suzhou, a 'small' city of 9 million, our destination. We visited the tranquil 600 year Master of Nets Garden, toured a silk factory, and enjoyed a relaxing canal cruise and rickshaw ride around the old town.

On Sunday we drove an hour or so from Shanghai to the old town of Tongli, described as the 'Venice of the East'. This was an opportunity to simply wander and soak up the atmosphere of old China.

Our final day trip from Shanghai was south from the city to Hangzhou. Following a cruise on the West Lake, we visited the Lingyin Temple. This is a large Buddhist temple set amidst rambling woodland and ancient Buddha statues carved into the side of the mountain. This was a highlight for many boys.

On Tuesday 18th April we left Shanghai and took a flight 2.5 hours to the northeast and the city of Xi'an, home to the famed Terracotta Army. Over the next three days we visited the Shanxi History Museum, old and chaotic Muslim Street, the Neolithic village at Banpo, the rural village of Huxian and the studio of a famous Chinese painter, embarked on an amazing cycle tour of the 13km long 600 year old city walls, and of course visited the Terracotta Army - a mind blowing experience.

The highlight for many boys though was our guide organising tickets to see the local professional football team play. The Xi'an supporters were impressed by our enthusiasm and zeal and invited the boys into the raucous members area. The following night a football match was organized between Stream and our guide's social team at a local stadium. After a relatively close game, Xi'an finished with a late flourish of goals and the win.

On Saturday 22nd April we said sadly fare welled Xi'an and boarded a bullet train for the 5.5-hour journey north to Beijing. The following day provided an opportunity to visit Tiananmen Square, Forbidden City and the National Museum of China.

On Monday 24th April we travelled an hour or so from Beijing into the mountains and walked a stretch of the Great Wall of China. This was another highlight for all involved. On our return to Beijing that afternoon we took in the site of the 2008 Olympics.

Our final experience of Beijing was not cultural or historical, but rather of the commercial variety, and involved an afternoon at the Pearl Market – home to an array of fake good market sellers.

We departed Beijing on Wednesday 26th April and once again boarded a bullet train, this time for a 5-hour journey to Shanghai. Many boys attended an impressive acrobatics show that evening.

Our time in China was almost at end, but we did manage to squeeze in an afternoon at the fake goods market in Shanghai ahead of our transfer to the airport on Thursday 27th April and return to Wellington.

Our two weeks in China was an enjoyable and eye-opening experience. Whatever preconceptions we collectively had of the country prior to visiting were certainly waylaid by the reality of a country in the midst of immense change. We were humbled by the openness of the people and the experience of a country very different to our own. Plans are afoot for a return in 2019.

Thank you to the boys for their openness to new experiences and the enthusiastic manner in which they approached the trip. Thank you also to the wider staff team of Mr. Tinney, Mr. Sales, and Mr. Johnsen.

Year 11 Well-Being Project

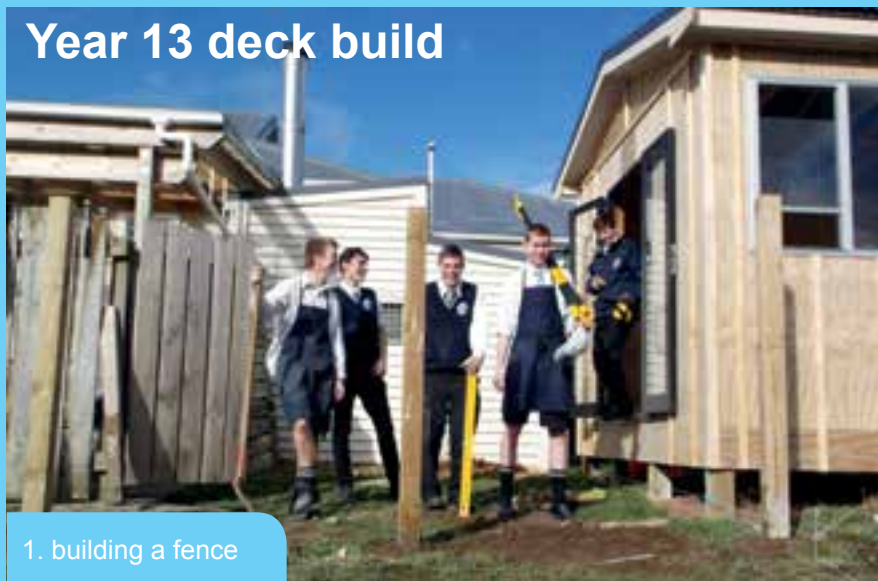

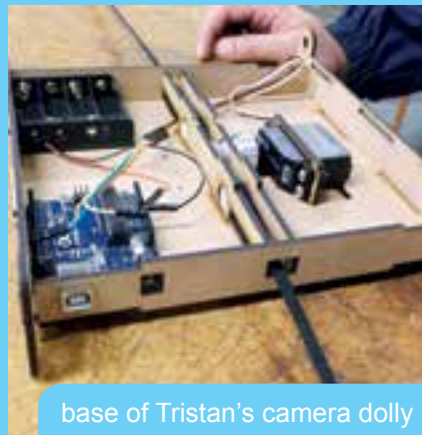

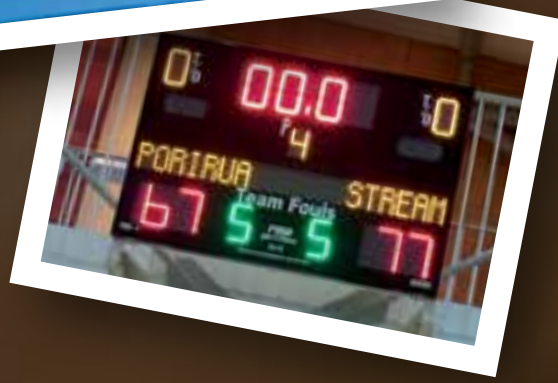
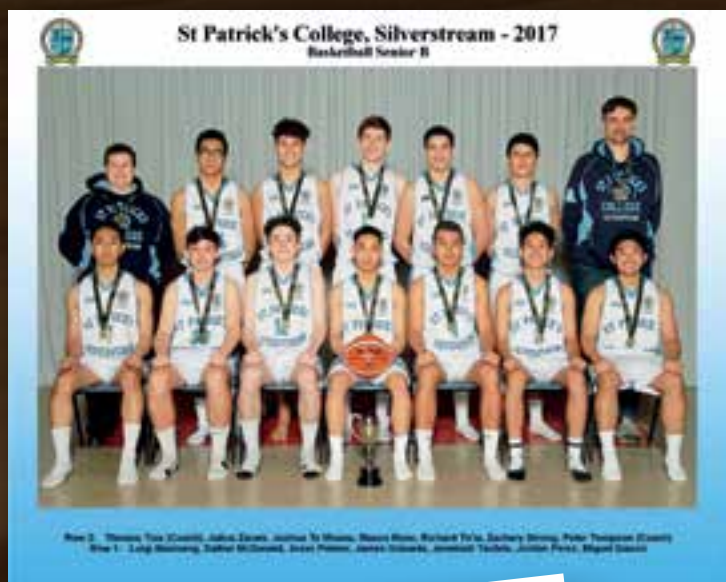


Badminton continued as a sport that provided a gateway to regular exercise and teamwork for many students.

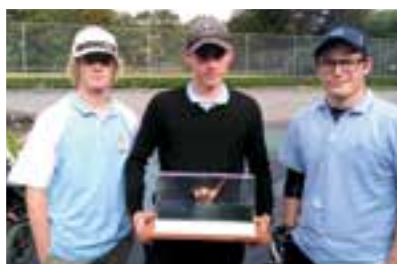


GOLF

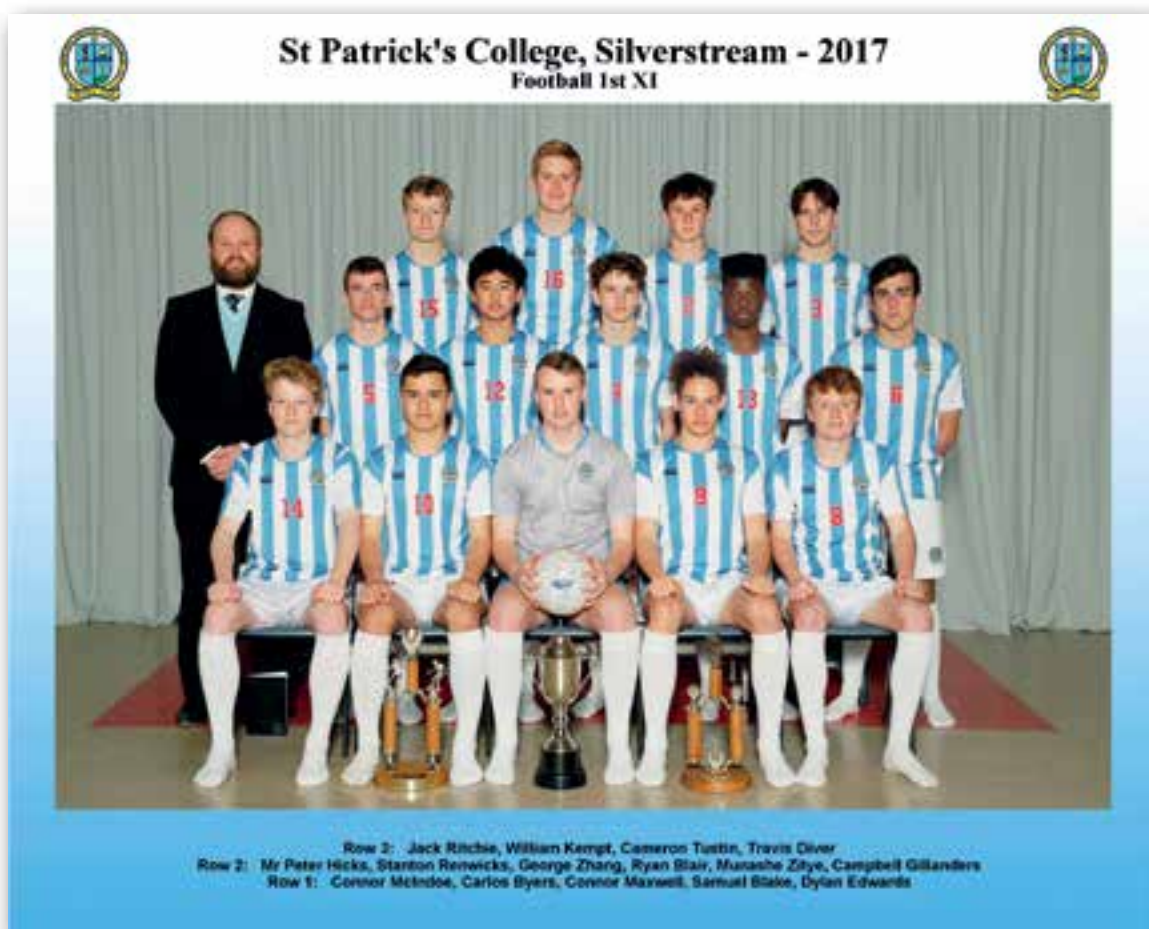


FOOTBALL

Memorable performances for the team include a bittersweet battle against St Patrick's Town in the 3rd/4th playoff Wellington final at Fraser Park – the game went into the second round of extra time, and with only 7 players on the field for each team, St Patrick's Town narrowly gained victory finishing the game 3-2. The team had an impressive 5-2 victory against Kapiti on Kapiti's home turf that helped the team gain confidence after a weaker grading round, which lead to further strong performances in the remainder of the season. The team attended the Rankin Cup, hosted in Hamilton. This competition saw the team competing against schools with much larger numbers of players, and larger players themselves. For such a young and small squad, the 1st XI did well to compete and remain a tough opposition throughout the whole tournament. Unfortunately, after being plagued by injury and sickness, often having only 1 substitute per game, the team did not manage a victory at the tournament. This was disappointing for all involved, as there were a number of very close games that could have gone either way. Despite this, the team gained valuable experience playing at a much higher level than what they are used to, which will set us up well for 2018.

Rugby 1st XV

What an extraordinary season in the history of Silverstream rugby. The 1st XV achieved record-breaking success and five other teams won their respective grades with three sides going through the entire year unbeaten.

The record of the 1st XV speaks for itself. From an exclusively statistical viewpoint only, the 1953 and 1955 sides, who did not lose a single game, enjoyed superior success. The 2017 team played 18 games and enjoyed 17 wins, suffering a solitary defeat in the Hurricanes Regional final to eventual National Top Four champions, Hastings Boys' High School. The 1st XV scored a school record 982 points and only conceded 138. The previous record for most points in a single season was 897 in 1988, but that side played 25 games. It should be noted however; the 1988 team scored 164 four-point tries as opposed to the 2017 team who crossed the chalk for 157 five-pointers.

The 2017 team was only the tenth team, and first since 1988, to be unbeaten in all six annual Traditional fixtures in the same season. Silverstream was completely dominant in the 'college games' scoring the highest aggregate of any team to have completed the sweep. The scores and individual records achieved in each fixture were as follows:

1st XV Highlights

Silverstream won the WelTec Premiership for the fourth time, and for the first time since 2012, beating Wellington College 17-11 in the final. Silverstream scored a record 606 points in 11 games.

The 1st XV did not attempt a single penalty goal all season. They held six opponents scoreless, including five in a row.

The biggest win of the season was 97-7 against Kapiti College. The only larger win the 1st XV have enjoyed was 108-14 against Poneke Under-19 in 1982. Jeff Karam scored 10 tries that day.

A staggering 23 players in the squad scored at least one try. Only three members, two of whom were not regulars, failed to cross the chalk.

Centre Albert Polu scored 27 tries which was the most by any individual since Gavin Foster scored 29 for the 1973 Moascar Cup holding 1st XV. Harrison Boyle was the top point's scorer with 132 points.

Old boys Tim Mannix and Nigel Bingham coached the team. Tim Mannix is the first man in Silverstream's history to play in a 1st XV (1985) and coach a 1st XV that has won all six of their college matches.

Josh Southall was selected for the New Zealand Secondary Schools who won all three games on their Australian tour. Josh appeared in all three games, starting in the 49-6 trouncing of the Australian Barbarians. In July, Southall scored two tries for the Hurricanes Under-18's in their 25-10 win over the Crusaders. The match was played at the Westpac Stadium as a curtain raiser to the Hurricanes v Crusaders Super Rugby encounter.

Kienan De La Rambelje started in the New Zealand Barbarians wins against Tonga Schools (33-19) and New Zealand Maori (28-24). In the later fixture, Kienan scored two tries.

Rocco Berry scored two tries for the Wellington Under-16's in their 31-19 win over Hawke's Bay Under-16's in the final of the Hurricanes Under-16 tournament in Wanganui. Berry was a starting first-five for the 2nd XV. The Wellington Development team beat the Hawke's Bay equivalent in the B decider.

The Under-15 premiers beat St Peter's College, Auckland 31-11 in the final of the Hurricanes Under-15 tournament. No. 8 Peter Lakai was named tournament MVP. Silverstream have won the tournament twice. The Under-15 premiers won their two traditionals against Hastings Boys' High School, 36-12 and St Pats Town, 19-12.

After two rounds of grading the Under 55kg division was split up from an A and B team arrangement to two even teams all playing in the same division. Under 55kg White (effectively the A team) won the championship defeating Under 55kg blue (effectively the B team) in the final. The blues defeated the top ranked Wellington College outfit in the semi-finals, rallying from an early deficit.

Alex Blackmore scored the winning try on fulltime in the Under-15 Division 3 final.

Across the six competitions, Silverstream only suffered a single defeat in 47 competition games. Only two grading games were lost.

Silverstream won five grades last year, the most of any Wellington school. In 2010, four grades were won.



At the start of Term 1 when many of the senior rugby players assembled to go over the pre-season rugby plan for 2017 it was clear that, there was a lot of anticipation and excitement for the season ahead. It was also exciting to see that many players had committed to their strength and conditioning training over the summer period, and looked in good physical shape for the start of the season.

Throughout March and April a large group of senior players took part in the pre-season training sessions and games to compete for selection in the final squad – it was pleasing to see the competition for places and a strong 1st XV squad was named in mid-April.

In the first two weeks of Term 2 - time was spent on forming the team, identifying the key behaviours we wanted to display as a team and working out how we wanted to play. The first two games of the season saw the team qualify for the Wellington region College Sports Premier 1 competition and this was quickly followed by the start of our traditional fixtures and the Premier 1 competition. It became very apparent as we got into these early games of our programme that this squad had the ability to play quality team rugby and individually the players displayed great ability and commitment to the team and a readiness for challenges ahead.

As the season progressed the team performances continued to grow – the foundation of this growth and development was the effort and energy the players put into their training and performances as well as their support of each other. This allowed us to quickly achieve a high consistency of performance in games, which continued right throughout the season.

Highlights of the season saw the team become the first 1st XV since 1988 to win all six traditional fixtures. There was a real sense of achievement in the group when this was achieved by winning the sixth and final traditional game against St Pat's Town. Although there were many good performances in our traditional fixtures, the game against Palmerston North BHS was particularly pleasing and perhaps one of team's most complete performances of the season as both our attack and defence play was consistently good throughout the entire game.

The team also finished as the top qualifying team for the Premier 1 competition play-offs and defeated St Pat's Town in the semi-finals to make the final where we would meet Wellington College. In a very tight final, the team displayed great effort, teamwork and composure in windy playing conditions to win the game 17-11. This completed a goal that the team identified when we first came together in April.

The team then progressed to the Hurricanes region 1st XV qualifying tournament for the National Top Four tournament. We qualified for the final by beating Palmerston North BHS in the semi-final and this set up a final against Hastings BHS. In the final, we started slowly which Hastings capitalised on to jump out to a comfortable lead in the first quarter of the game. It was however pleasing to watch the boys battle their way back into the game. Although we were beaten on the scoreboard when the fulltime whistle went, it was pleasing to see the skill, commitment and effort we had displayed all season shine out against a very strong Hastings BHS team that would later go on to become 1st XV National champions.

While this season will be remembered for the great achievements the team had in winning all six traditional fixtures and becoming 2017 Premier 1 champions, it was also very pleasing to see the way the players represented the school and displayed the school values both on and off the field.

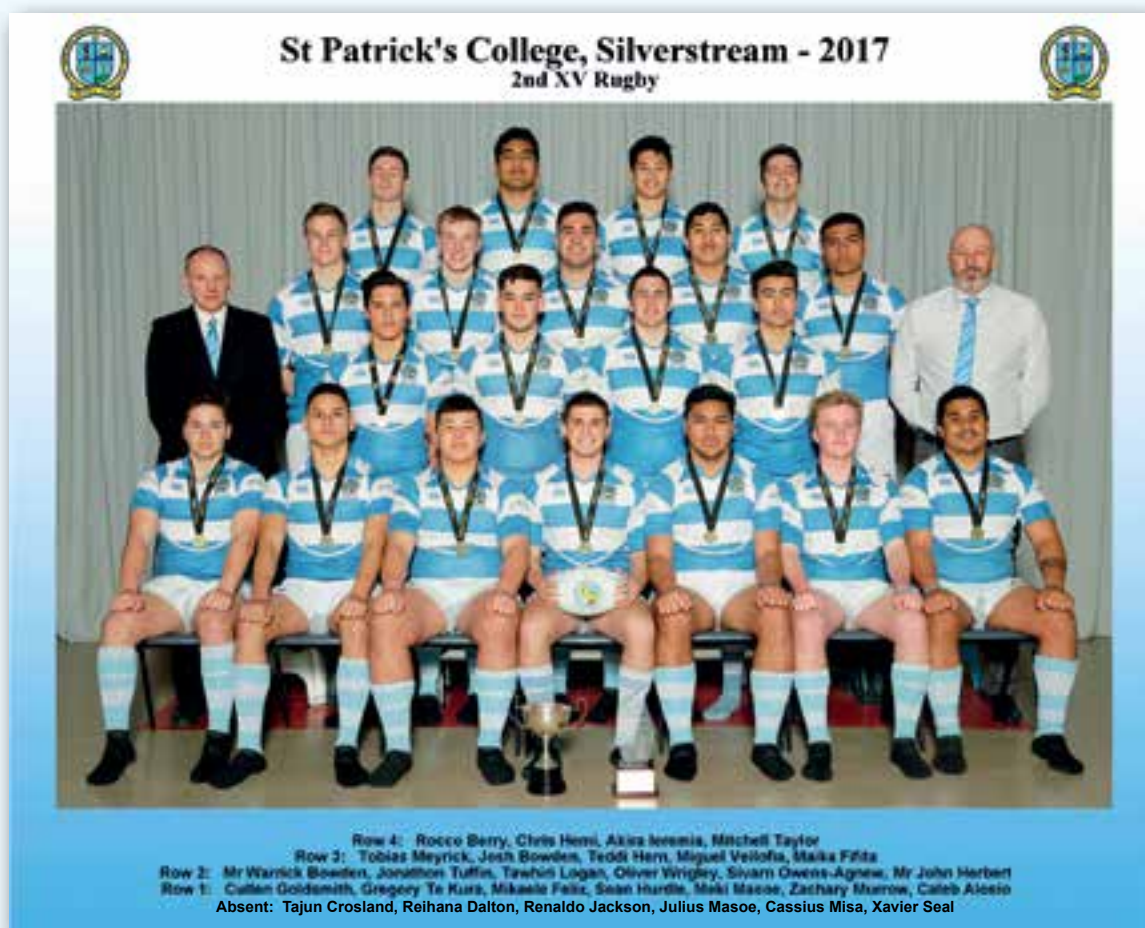

Rugby 2nd XV

2017 was another successful year for the 2nd XV. We achieved the ultimate goal of winning the Murray Jensen Premiere 2 title for the second year in a row, as well as the preseason Hope Cup. We were 1 from 2 in the Traditional matches, beating Palmerston North Boys' High comfortably but losing to a well-resourced Hastings Boys' High.

The year started with a lot of selection dilemmas. While some players stood out immediately there were a lot of talented players who were very unlucky to miss out. This dilemma stayed with the team throughout the year and especially in regard to our outside backs, competition for places was fierce. The game plan reflected our commitment to Stream rugby as it mirrored what the 1st XV were trying to achieve and this helped when 2nd XV players moved up.

Our preseason against Scotts Australia and Hasting Boys' were both close run games but our lack of game time vs sides that had been training together longer showed. The preseason Hope Cup tournament saw us short a few players but the boys fronted well and retained the title beating HIBS in the final. This set us up well however for the Prem 2 qualification matches and we carried that form into the regular season.

The regular season highlights included 101-5 victories against Bishop Viard, 90 -0 over Wellington College and competitive matches against HIBS and fellow finalists St Bernard's. At the end of the regular season we were 8 from 8 with 479 points scored and 56 against. The semifinal against Aotea was one of our best games; we executed well, defended well and showed the composure required to deliver the edge to edge game we had worked so hard on during the year. The final was played at Stream on a very wet field and the SBC team took it to us. The lead changed a number of times and SBC played a wide game that took us a little bit of time to adapt to. 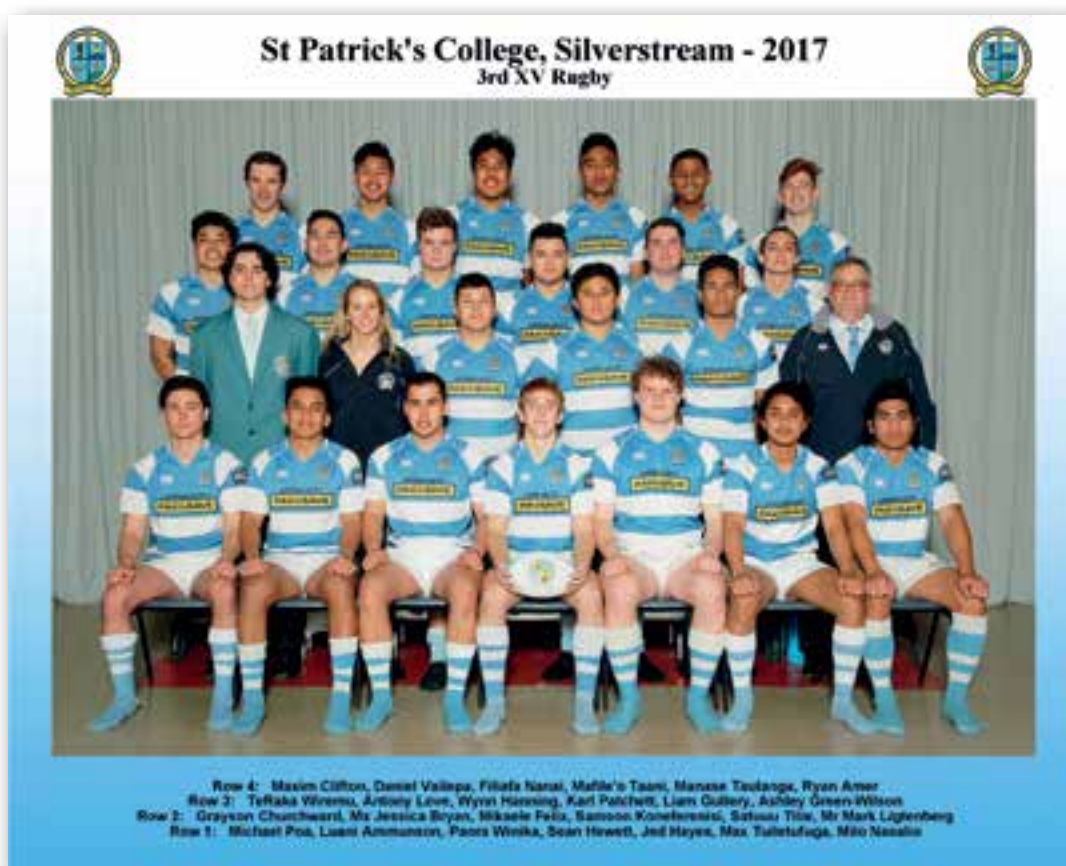

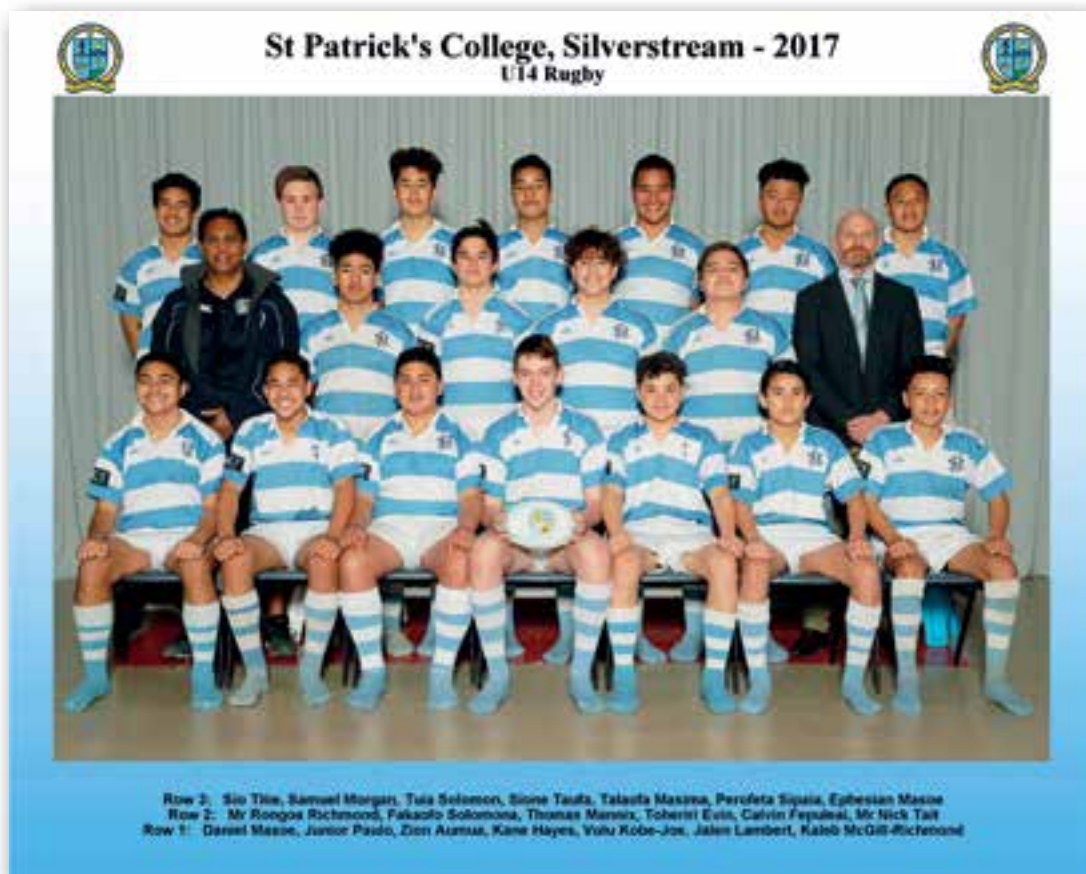

Also congratulations to the U15A team and U15 Colts team for winning their respective grades. This shows the strength of Silverstream rugby in this age group.

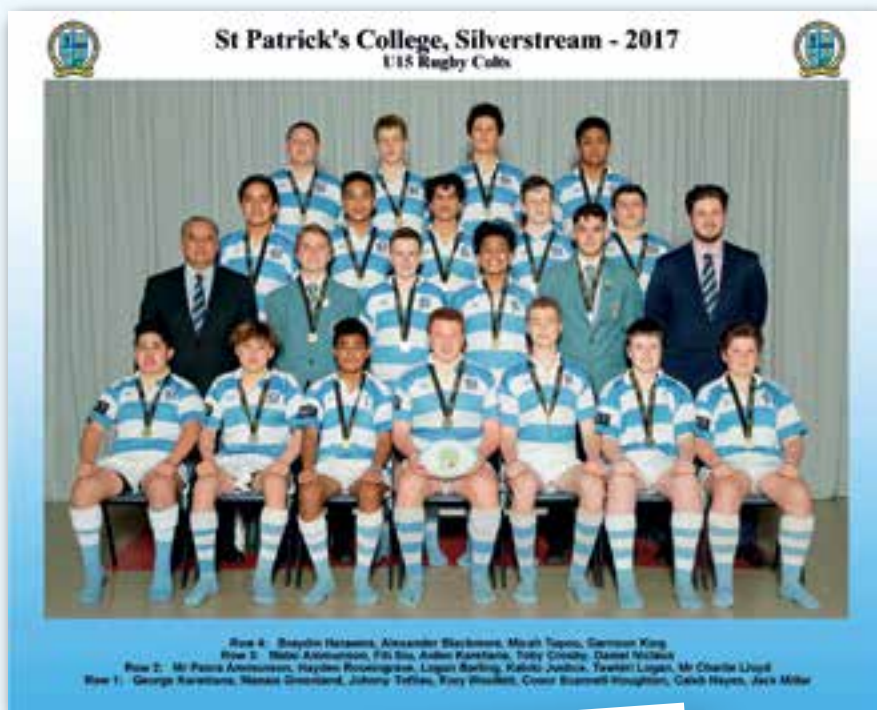

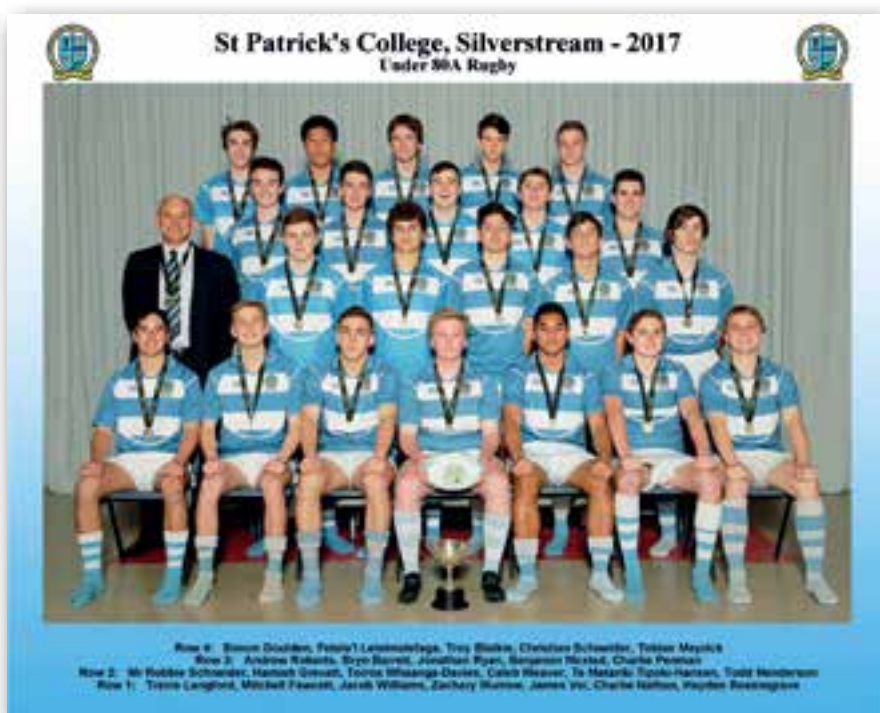
Under 80's

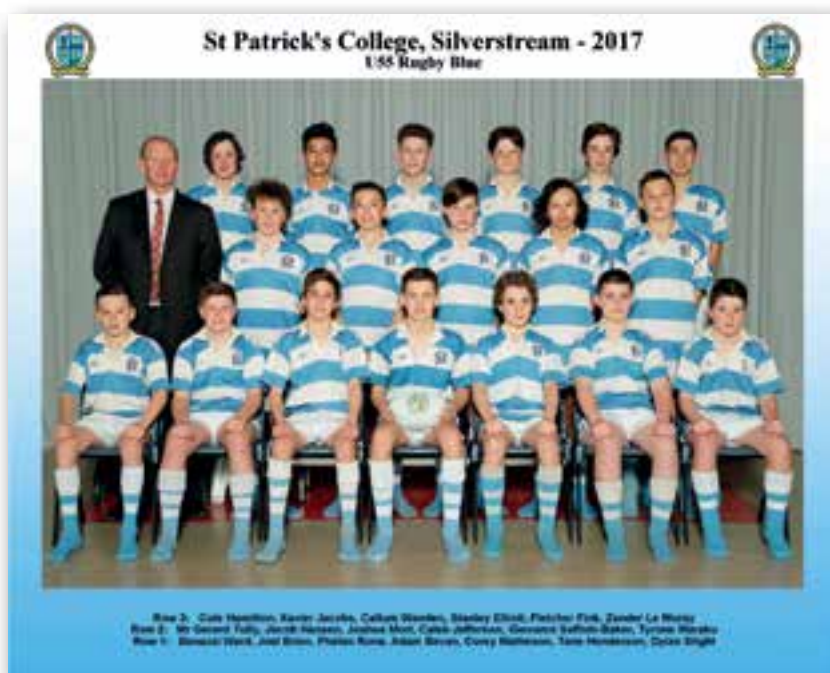

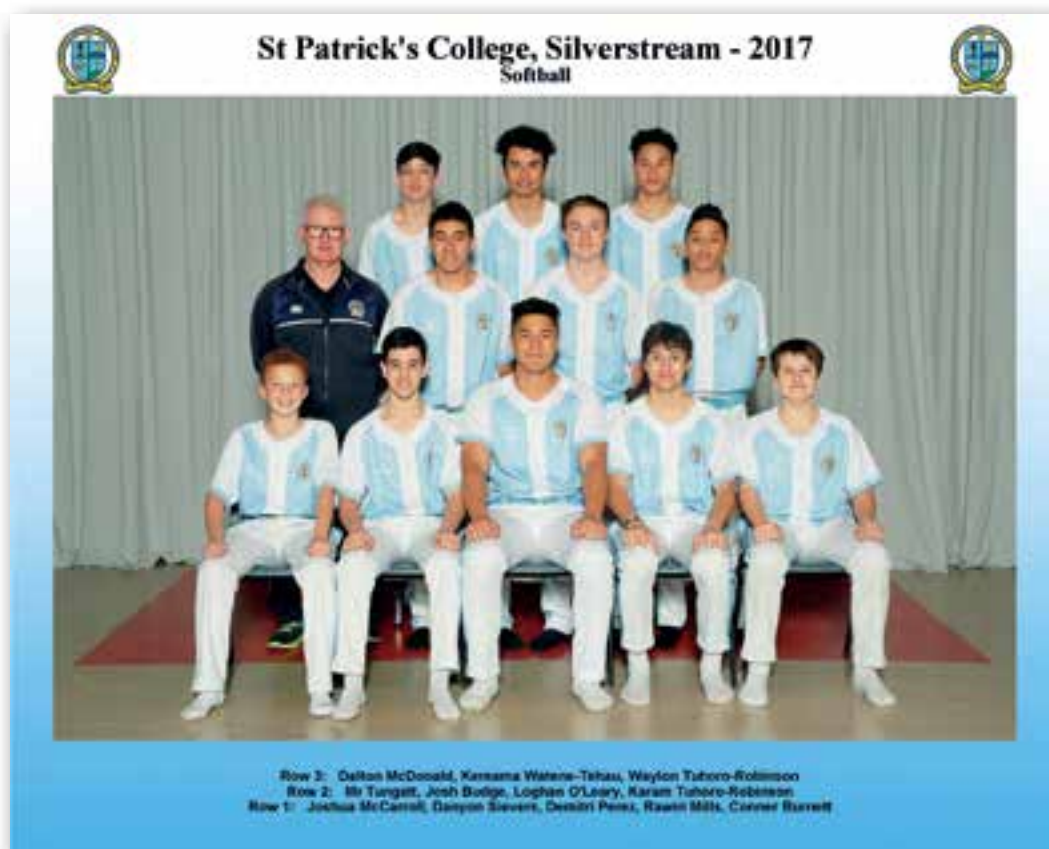

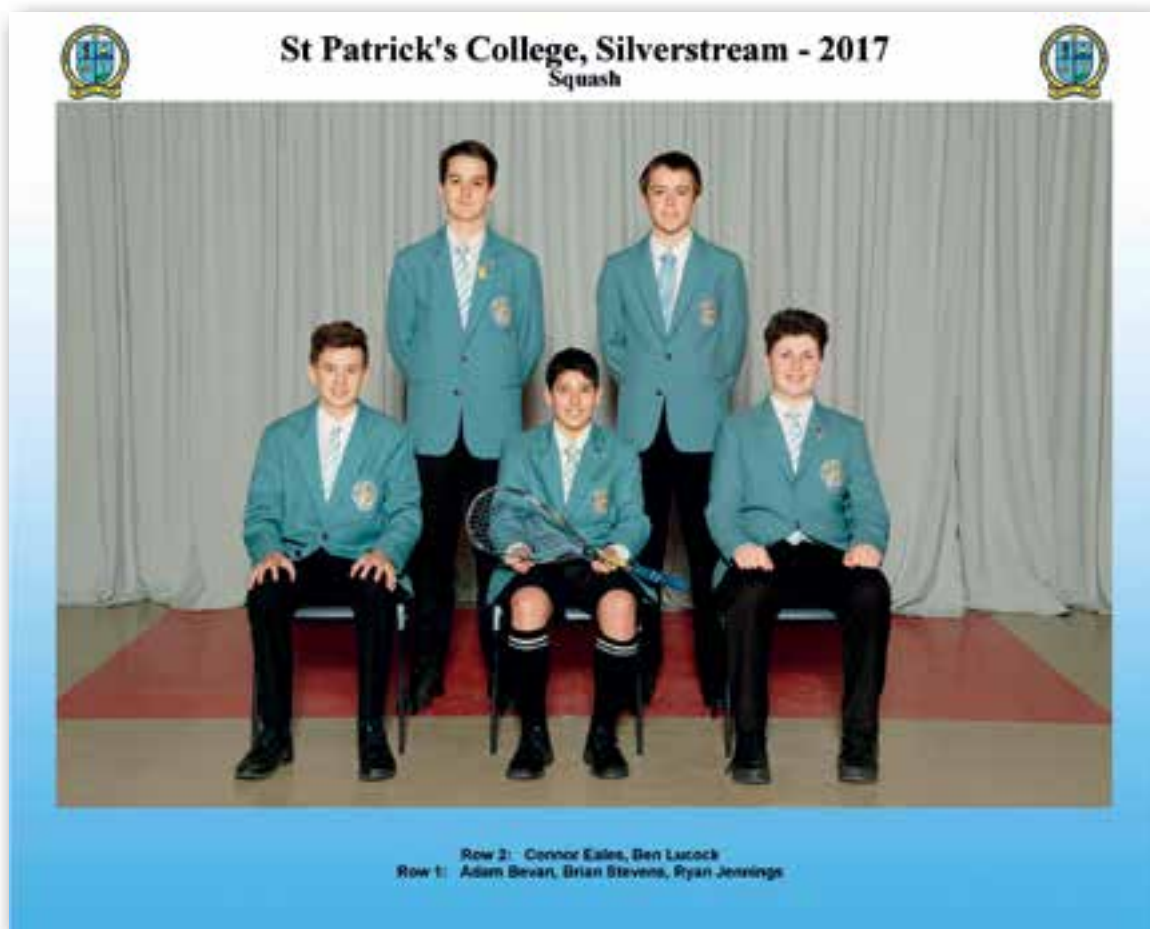
Our results for the Round Robin were -

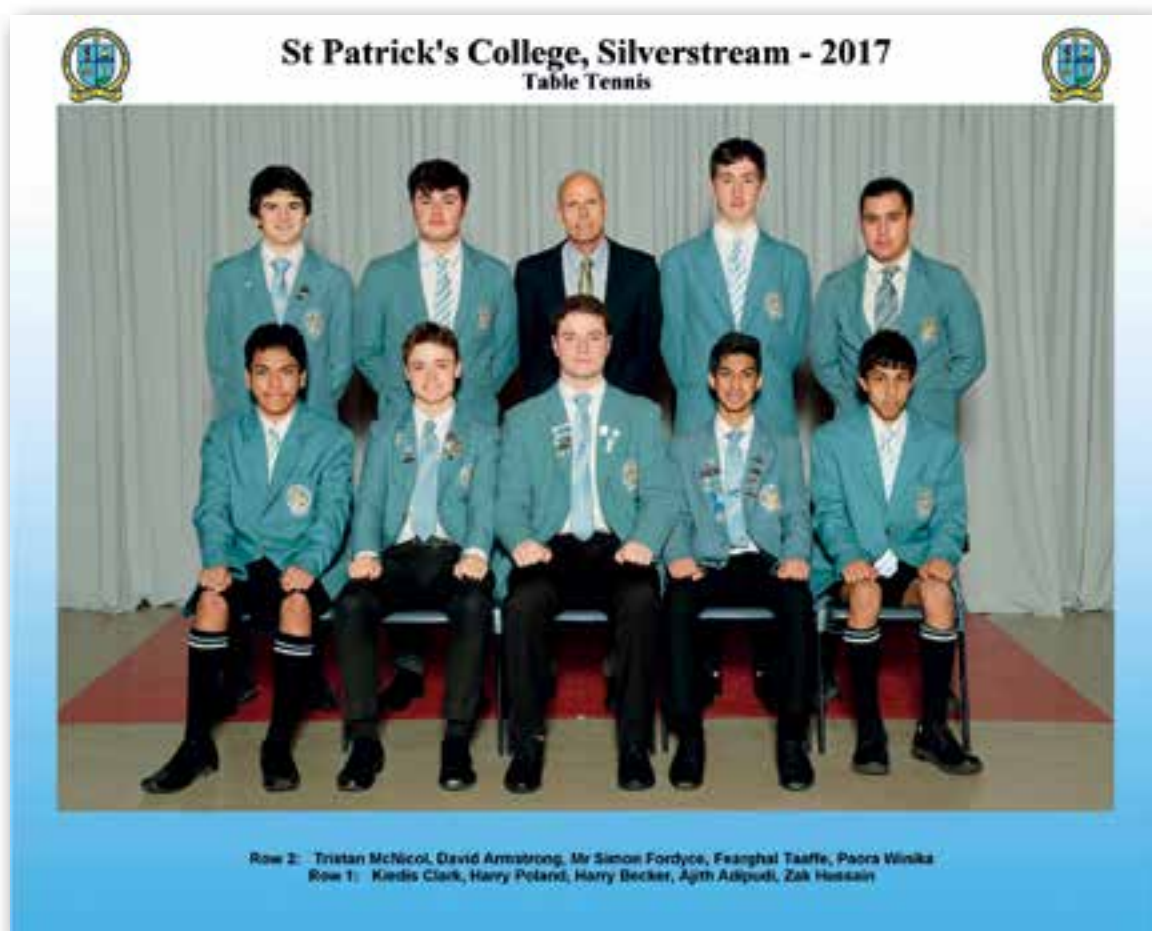

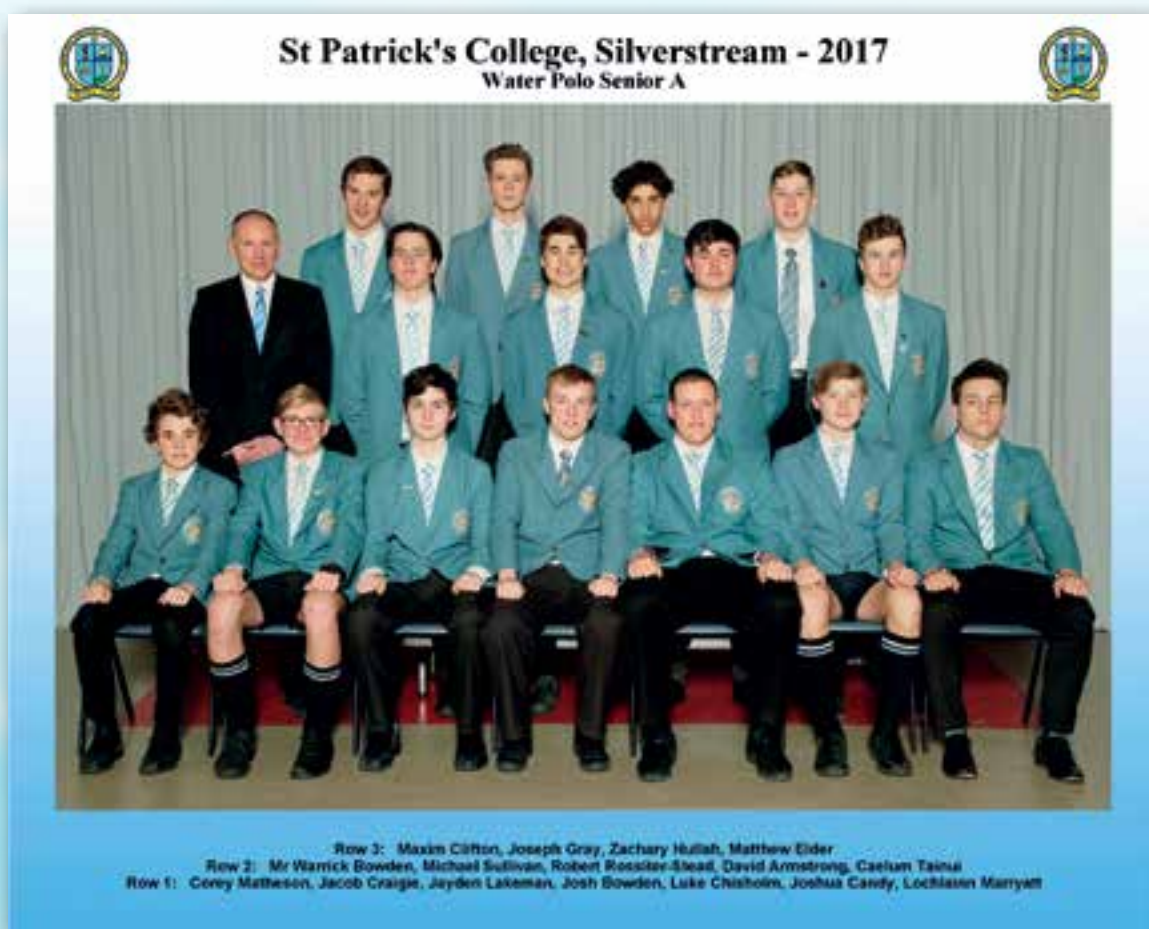
