## RECTOR'S GRADUATION ADDRESS

Ka tangi te titi  
Ka tangi te kaka  
Ka tangi hoki ahau  
Tihei Mauri ora

Nau mai haere mai. Haere mai ki te whanau whanui o  
Hato Patariki ki Mawai Hakona  
Tena koutou, tena koutou, tena koutou katoa

*Two roads diverged in a yellow wood,  
And sorry I could not travel both  
And be one traveler, long I stood  
And looked down one as far as I could  
To where it bent in the undergrowth  
Then took the other, as just as fair.*

My Year 13 English teacher was Fr Bob Graham, an American Marist priest over in New Zealand on a one year exchange programme. I learnt some wonderful things from Fr Graham – mostly about poetry, and particularly the poems of Robert Frost-like that opening verse from “The Road Not Taken”

Fr Graham helped me to understand that poetry can be about life, about what English teachers call, I think, “the human condition”. Poetry can tell of beauty and love and kindness and mystery; and it can tell of loss, despair, indifference and grief – the human condition.

I am forever grateful that Fr Graham – through his passion and enthusiasm for the poetry of Robert Frost – opened my mind to this new way of understanding the world.

But Fr Graham's influence on me was far more important than that. Of all the great lessons that I learnt in this College, this quiet humble, shy American priest taught me probably the most important lesson I ever learnt at Silverstream. In my last term here, during what I would call my personal “dark night of the soul” – troubled, worried about my future, feeling trapped by the expectations of those around me – my parents, my teachers, my friends – not knowing what to do or how to do it – I turned – not to my favourite sports coach, dorm master or teacher – but to Fr Graham – because he seemed to understand about the human condition. I explained the torment I felt. And I will never forget his advice – advice offered in his quiet calm way.

Gerard – I can't make any of these decisions for you. You are the only one who can make them. Talk to people you love and the people you respect – listen to them. Think long and hard about your choices, pray. And then make your decisions. And Gerard (and this is now the point of my story) you'll know when you have made the right choice – even if it's a tough choice – because you will feel at peace with yourself.

I have never forgotten that night – or that lesson – or Fr Bob Graham. Because I have found his advice to be true. Not so much for the multitude of straight forward decisions we face everyday – but for the big decisions – the really big decisions – the tough ones – the torturous ones – the ones that take so long to make. And thankfully – at times - I have experienced that peace.

And that is my parting advice to you men – our Years 13s. Actually it is Fr Graham's advice. As you head out into this wonderful, beautiful and sometimes brutal world – very much becoming the masters of your own destiny – when the big decisions come your way – when you have to choose which road to take – you will know when you've got it right and deep down you'll also know when you've got it wrong – by whether you find that peace, or not.

I hope and pray for great futures for each and everyone of you. I hope and pray that each of you will become your best selves.

I hope and pray that each of you will also devote large parts of your life to kindness and compassion and empathy (another Frost poem *Death of a Hired Man* is a great read if you want to reflect on kindness and compassion and empathy).

I hope and pray – that God and this faith we talk about holding fast to – will be important in your life.

I hope and pray that each of you will find peace because – then you will have followed Fr Graham's advice – and made courageous, authentic choices. You go with our love and blessings.

Thank you to all our staff for your tireless work with these students over their five years here.

Thank you to parents and families for your partnership with and support of our College – your College.

Thank you to both Boards, who also work with the interests of our whole College community, at heart.

Thank you Fr Graham (now in your rest home in Boston, Massachusetts.)  
And thank you Robert Frost

And you – you might take the one less  
travelled by  
And that will make all the difference.

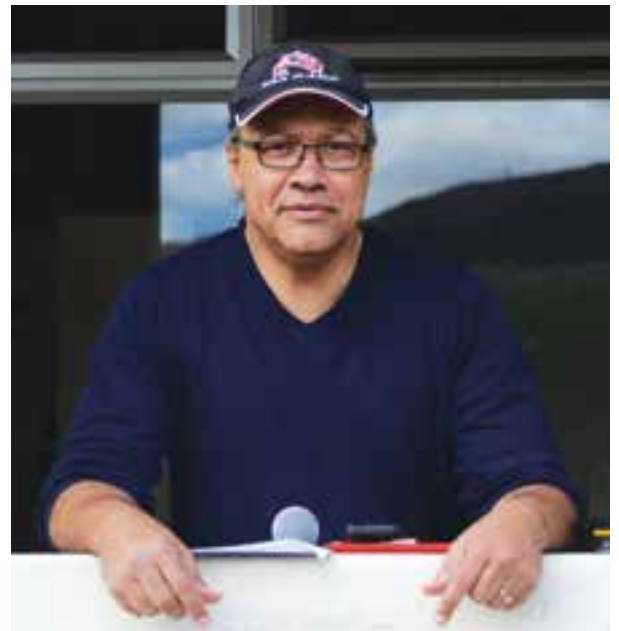

## THE IRON LADY

The first time I met Pat Lovett I felt I'd stumbled into a tornado or at least a thunderclap! I asked the Board if I could have a couple of security guards outside my office but was told that the money for that kind of expense was not available. Guess who was in control of the money? And guess whose office door was next to mine?

Over time, after losing weight and my hair turning grey, I realised that her bark was marginally worse than her bite and we settled into routines and became colleagues.

Pat was always good at finding money for causes or for new experiences for students: an Irish band to perform one St Patrick's Day in the auditorium; money for a cup for the winner of Paddy's Mile; helping students and their families to get uniforms they couldn't always fully afford, camp fees and so on. She occasionally despaired of my requests but always with a twinkle in the eye that said, "You're a pain but I'll find it!"

When we had Open Days or Fundraisers, Pat was always there giving the extra time and helping to make events successful. She would put her hands to anything and uncomplainingly got on with what was required, often taking the initiative to make some parts of the events better organised. She wasn't the only office staff member to get involved but the joy was that you didn't have to ask.

She championed her office staff and made sure they were well looked after. She listened to them and, if necessary, made changes to structures, tasks and workplace that invariably made things run more smoothly. As a result we had a hard working, cheerful and efficient band of office workers, grounds people and maintenance staff including those involved in work at the Hostel.

What became obvious to all staff was that underneath the tough exterior, and the voice and laughter that shook the hallways, was a heart of gold. And there were great values practised too. She was always keen to establish fairness when it came to budgets. She joined the meetings with HODs and championed those departments who needed more money whilst some had slightly more than they had anticipated they needed. It was only right that establishing a Special Needs Department would need a realistic budget and she would present a case to other HODs to ensure that justice was done, democratically, but in such a way that everyone felt as if she or he had benefitted. But woe betide those who were in danger of overspending their budgets!

I enjoyed working with Pat and feel privileged to have done so. She worked hard and gave unstintingly of her time. She was prepared to work after hours, during term holidays and many long hours leading up to Christmas and after New Year, taking a well-earned break to tour with her marching team. She enjoyed the end of year staff function and looked after staff welfare to ensure all were safe.

Pat was tough and in a sense what you saw (and heard!) was what you got. But she was honest, sincere, supportive, decent, disarmingly sensitive, clever, innovative and very good at her job. She became a friend and I need to explain that the sobriquet that heads this article is my teasing tribute to a lady who was far from iron and more like gold.

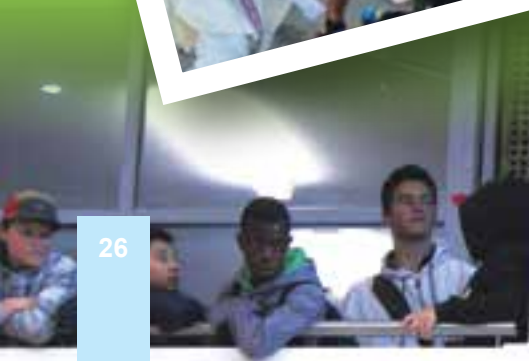

## Dare to be Different, Dare to be Great

All of us here have travelled a similar road. At times the road has been gentle and easy, and has provided us with moments of happiness. In a similar way this road has been tough, worn us rugged at times, and has tested our hearts. But ultimately the road has led us all to this very moment, Year 13, the end of an era.

Looking back, my time here at Silverstream has gone like a blur. I honestly can't remember a lot of moments that happened in Years 9 and 10. I can't quite recall the details of my first McEvedy, the time it snowed, winning the under 14 rugby final, or my first Junior Social. These moments are almost illusions to me now, memories that I can't quite reach. Be that as it may, I know that they have happened. But I do remember the first time I felt that I was truly in the presence of this school. I can clearly remember back to the Open Day, Year 8, 2010. Being able to sit firm with the pain of failure and accept what has happened, is invaluable in this life. If you allow life's betrayals to open you up, and touch the centre of your own sorrow, then you will learn, and come closer to your dreams.

I strongly believe that my success here at Silverstream, whether it has been shown publicly or known only to me, is testament to having the ability to fail.

Earlier on this year I was presented with an opportunity to do something I had never done before; compete at O'Shea Shield. Since Year 9 the O'Shea Shield has never appealed to me, I have never been confident in front of crowds, I had never done drama, or liked being in the spotlight. Despite all of that I was prepared to at least try, because I knew that I would never have this opportunity again. I ended up making the drama team, even if I may have been one of the only people that turned up to the trial.

That turned out to be the easy part because leading up to the O'Shea drama night, was probably one of the most challenging experiences during my time here at Silverstream. It required so much time, commitment, and focus and towards the end we began to question if it was all worth it. We doubted ourselves leading up to the competition, to the point where we told people not to be surprised if the drama was disappointing. We were even making changes to it just before we went on stage. But somehow, by some miracle we didn't just perform to the best of our ability, we managed to actually win! Out of the eight other schools in our section, we came out on top, we were the ones who had our moment. After weeks and weeks of late nights, arguments and people telling us that we were a joke, we had our time.

The fear of failure is a false expectation, because ultimately we can't predict what will happen. We have no clue whether we will succeed or not and we have no measure of what that success will hold. Whether we like it or not the time for being in a safe, regimented, regulated environment has come to an end. Silverstream has done all it can for us; it has shaped and moulded us into the people we are going to become. Now it is our turn. I challenge you to go out and seek for nothing less than a purposeful, meaningful and satisfying life. There is no time to wait, nothing of tomorrow is promised today. So dare to be different, dare to be great.

## Off to Abu Dhabi on \$450,000 scholarship



Academic results are not the only factor for students choosing scholarships and a place at a top university, Thomas Yates says.

A former St Patrick's College student will embark on an exciting chapter of life, thanks to hard work and a \$450,000 scholarship to a university in Abu Dhabi.

Thomas Yates leaves on Friday for Salford Island to start four years of study at New York University Abu Dhabi.

He will be majoring in economics and maths. Yates, 18, always enjoyed economics at college, taking a university economics paper in year 12.

The Abu Dhabi university seeks candidates with all round excellence for its full general scholarship, looking for extra-curricular activities, teacher

references, leadership roles and essay writing.

Yates passed eight New Zealand Qualifications Authority scholarship exams and earned the highest grade in the Statistics scholarship exam. That won him an outstanding scholar award and \$10,000.

He was flown over to Abu Dhabi to take part in two interviews in March, and also took American tests.

He was offered positions in numerous other universities such as the London School of Economics and Political Science, Yale National University of Singapore and was shortlisted for

the University of Cambridge and Duke University scholarships.

Yates said the New York University Abu Dhabi campus appealed to him because it was more international, provided more opportunities to travel and was very strong in economics.

He is "really excited to be able to be in an environment of talented students from across the world".

Yates' current plan is to complete a PhD in economics and go on to work in an organisation such as the World Bank or the International Monetary Fund. He is also keeping the finance sector in mind as an option.

For the past year Yates has been working at Crimson Consulting in Auckland, a company that helps students get into top universities and win scholarships.

His advice for other students is that while academic results are important, the biggest factor for getting into top universities is doing other activities.

Throughout his school years he took part in running, music, acting, volunteering and was a prefect at St Patrick's. It is also important to have some time off to avoid burning out, Yates said. "I took a month off school in year 13 to go back-packing in Europe".

### Connah Pamatatau

Touch footballer Connah Pamatatau is set to take on the world.

Only 18 years old but already internationally experienced at many levels of the game, Pamatatau is the youngest player in the Open Mixed Touch Black team which will play at the World Cup at Coffs Harbour, Australia.

A first year architecture student at Victoria University, Pamatatau is one of 10 men in a 16-player squad.

The Wellington Touch Player of the Year is in the side a year after playing for the Mens' open side in three Trans-Tasman tests last year — when he was again the youngest player.

The selection in a side with players up to 35 years old was a testing experience. He had represented New Zealand at under-17 but the full selection meant he "skipped" the under-19 and under-21 progression levels.

"We lost the three tests there but it was a very good stepping stone," the Te Marua local said.

"Then I got released from the squad and I've moved into the mixed open play," the former St Patrick's College Silverstream player said.

World Cup play will be further development and international experience for Pamatatau, who has loved the high action touch game since he first played at primary school level on Friday evenings, at Maidstone Park.

"The mixed game brings its own demands and tactics, three females must be on the field in the six-a-side game at all time. There's a lot more thinking on the field as you try to isolate the girls in the other team, you are always looking at all the space to see where the girls are positioned. It's the way it is played and most of the girls enjoy the challenge of that"

Connah, who plays middle or link, intends to stay in the touch game for the long haul.

He was in the Wellington Open Mixed team which took the National title last month but he knows the game's power base is in Auckland.

With his university study and his early career success he is not looking to move north "at the moment".

Pamatatau has his long goals set firmly however.

He wants to represent his country in Open Men's competition at the next two World Cups in Malaysia in 2015 and, four years later, in the United States when he will still be only 26 years old.

After the Coffs Harbour experience, Pamatatau will play 15-a-side rugby with the Upper Hutt Rams' colts playing at either halfback or first five.

"Touch does help a lot, especially with the passing and the reading of a game, " he said.

Thank you to the coaches of the events, for your time and energy to get your students prepared for this very important event on our school calendar.

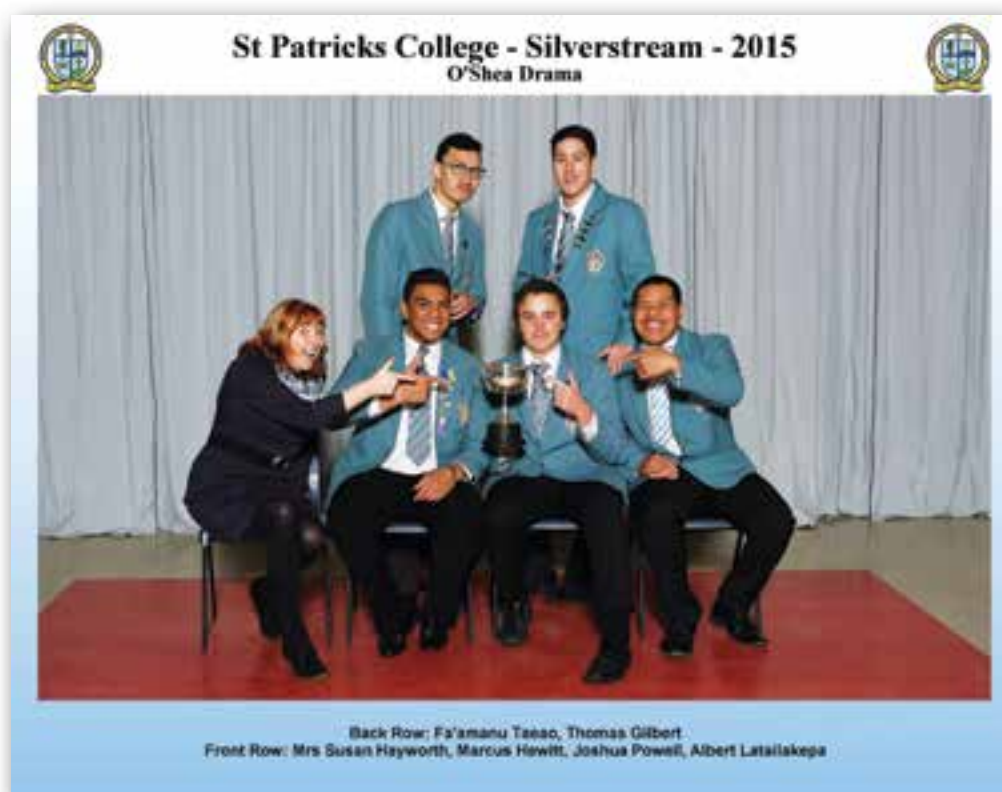

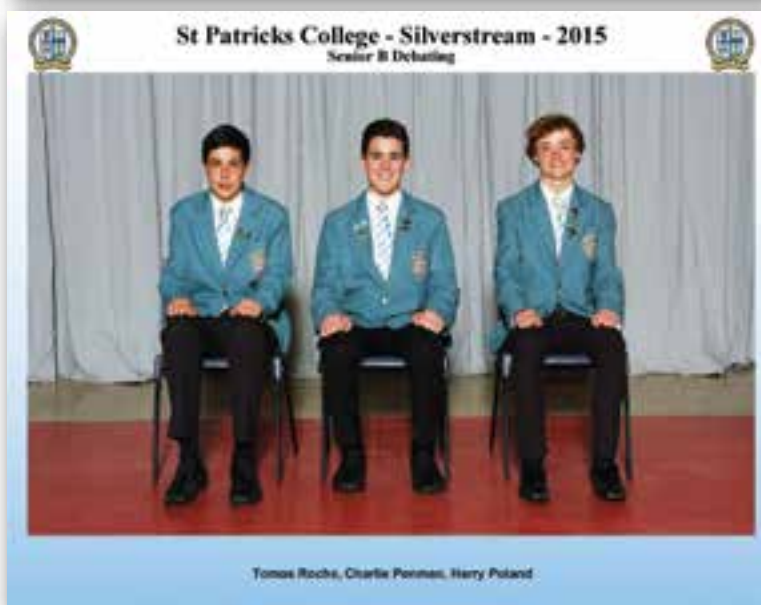


# DEBATING



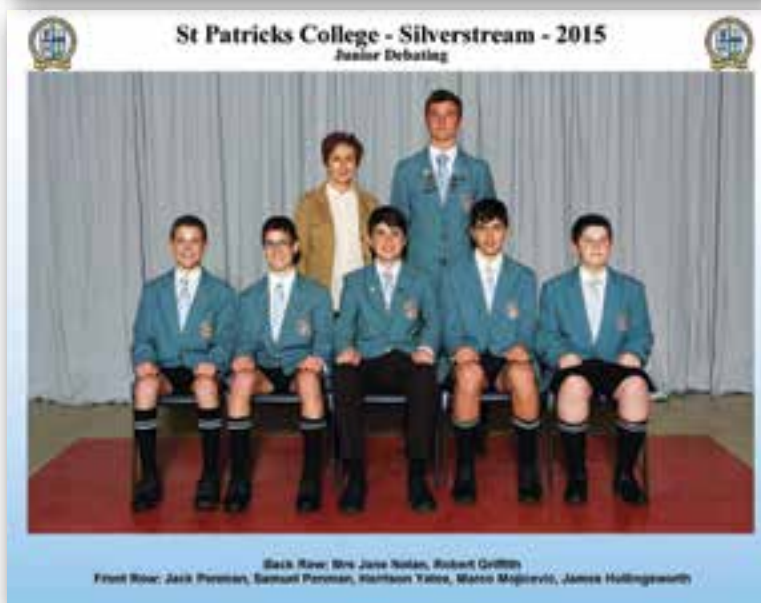

**Skills** including public speaking, gardening, singing, sports coaching, and cooking.

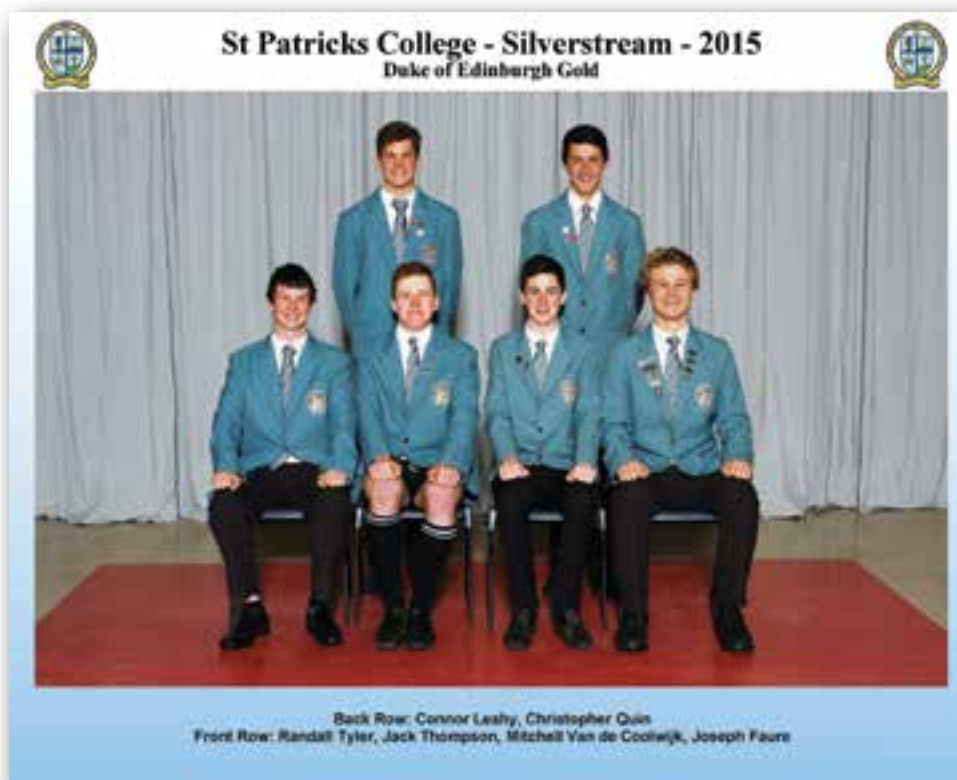
**Service to others** including volunteering for St Vincent de Paul, looking after elderly people and tutoring younger students.

The Holdsworth to Waiohine Gorge trip was memorable mainly for being a good test of our wet weather gear! We had persistent showers, southerly fronts, and single-digit temperatures for the whole trip. It was good for the boys to experience weather like this and to learn the importance of a good quality jacket and warm clothing! To give the boys more experience of navigating, they were divided into small groups and took responsibility to lead the group for a short section each day. This required them to study the maps, identify track features and introduce their section of track to the wider group. The boys enjoyed the extra responsibility and developed a much better feel for the terrain from being more involved in navigating. In the evenings we had fun cooking, playing cards and playing games at camp and in the huts. We could also shelter under our new tarp which made cooking in the rain much more comfortable!

The Gold qualifier trip to the Nelson Lakes was a real highlight this year. The scenery in the Nelson Lakes is spectacular, with dense forest, clear, fast-flowing rivers, tranquil lakes and snow-capped mountains. We were very lucky to have calm, sunny days for the duration of the trip and the boys really enjoyed being out in the back-country. In the valleys it was warm enough for shorts and t-shirts, but as we climbed up into the snow we were glad to have brought plenty of warm gear with us. The views from the top made the steep climb worthwhile, and we were treated to a view of a military helicopter carrying out training exercises in the valley below – if only they could have given us a lift to the top!







## SILVER

The Silver Tramp began after school on Friday the 18th of September. The weather leading up to this had been poor and quite a bit of rain had fallen in the Tararua catchment area. The staff had been keeping a close eye on this and the decision was made to go ahead as there was a good break in the weather and it look settled for a few days at least.

The group consisted of a mixture of Gold and Silver Duke of Ed candidates, from Year 11 through to Year 13. This year we had our own bus to transport us over to the base of Mount Holdsworth, which would be the start of the expedition. With a quick dinner stop at the New World in Carterton, we journeyed through to Holdsworth and set up camp on the grounds just before the track begins. With the boys in good spirits a fire was started and some tall stories were told. The weather seemed to be holding up ok but unfortunately this wasn't to be for too long.

Overnight a gentle Southerly rolled in bringing some light showers and a little bite to the air. However, the boys were full of energy and ready to take on the challenges of the first full day. The staff, under the sage guidance of Mr Clark, had decided to make the boys more involved in planning the routes for each day which included establishing walking times, places to reach for breaks and what land features we could expect. Each group of about four boys was given a section of track to lead and be responsible for. Time was given in the morning for planning and in their groups the boys had to communicate to the rest of us how long we would be walking and what lay ahead. The purpose of this was to make the boys more involved and to be active decision makers, knowledgeable about tramping rather than passive passengers out for a long walk.

The first day was walking up the Gentle Annie track and down to Totara Flats where we would spend the night next to the river. Under canopy for the first section up to Rocky Knob, the boys were relatively dry and comfortable. The discomfort for some, came from climbing up the hill and having to lug around a heavy pack. We were well led and made our way up to the Totara Creek track where we stopped again for a bite to eat and to put on another layer of clothing. The way down to Totara Creek had a fair amount of water in places on the track because of all the rain earlier in the week, but this more than manageable. Some of the boys had decided they wanted to keep their boots dry which led to an interesting variety of hopping and balancing acts on the way down. Arriving at Totara Flats hut all of us were by now a little wet with muddy boots and a bit cold. The relative warmth of the hut and a good hot drink does wonders on days like this and the boys were chatting and laughing away as usual after a couple of minutes. We set up camp on the flats down from the hut and got tents organised. Unfortunately the rain was still falling but not heavily. This made for the boys setting up their own tarpaulin and huddling beneath it to have a chat after dinner was made and then eaten.

Overnight the rain fell gently but it made life difficult for a couple of tents as they hadn't been recently tested during wet weather. The consequence was that a couple of boys were a bit cold for the start of day two and had damp sleeping bags. We set off again about mid morning, walking down the beautiful Waiohine River before turning southwest and heading up the ridge to Cone Saddle. The boys found the initial hour a hard slog before the ridge levelled out and became a bit easier. On reaching the saddle the wind had turned to a gentle Southerly which made conditions a bit cold so the decision was made to head down to the iconic Cone Hut. This is about a 40 minute descent on a fairly well established track but the water on the track made it important to get a good footing nonetheless. Upon reaching the hut a decision was made to push on to Tutuwai hut where we could get good shelter and let the boys dry out a little. Tutuwai is great little hut and we were fortunate to have it to ourselves that evening. Zachary Murrow collected and then chopped up wood for the fire. With a good fire roaring the boys were able to warm themselves up and dry out some clothes (and a couple of sleeping bags). A pack of cards was sourced and the games began accompanied by a lot of laughter and good banter. Despite the variety in year levels, all the boys got on really well and had a lot of fun together. The teachers made the decision to stay in the hut to let people have a dry night and restore morale after a demanding day in the elements. The boys did well in the conditions and showed good resolve, especially when the weather was not accommodating. We went to bed with the rain falling gently on the roof of Tutuwai hut, the coals in the fire glowing intensely and the hopeful expectation of clearing weather for the walk out to Kaitoke the next day.

On waking the next morning, the teachers met and decided that it would be best to head back to Cone Hut and to then go out via the Waiohine Gorge. With rain over a couple of days the usual track of heading down to Smith





Creek would have had several sizeable creeks in flood and potentially a number of slips to contend with as well. The alternative route offered a dry escape route with a scenic walk over the high swing bridge at the end of the Waiohine Gorge road. Climbing out of the Tauherenikau Valley meant a good hour slog uphill and then an easier walk along a ridgeline before a steep descent into the Waiohine Gorge area. With having to use an alternative exit, the bus would arrive a bit later so we needed to spend time in a shelter near the end of the road. The boys managed to pass the time by playing a variety of games including eye spy, whizz bong bounce and a few fun drama activities.

Thanks to the boys for having a great attitude in the face of some testing weather and to all the staff involved. Mr Clark took considerable time to plan each stage and offered valuable guidance along the way. Thanks also to Mr Wilson and Mr Fouhy for their supervision and involvement over the course of the expedition. Thank you to Old Boy Oliver McClure for his experience and the fantastic photos. Finally thank you to Mr Watson for all the hours of preparation into organising the trip and arranging transportation from Waiohine Gorge.

## OUR TRIP TO TAKAPUWAHIA MARAE

Early in Term four all of our Te Reo classes travelled to Takapuwhia Marae in Elsdon in Porirua. This is the home marae of Year 10 student, Jury Teniteni-Smeaton and his iwi Ngati Toa Rangatira. Their famous ancestor is Te Rauparaha who composed the haka "Ka mate, Ka mate" which the All Blacks perform.

In our travelling party to the marae were twenty five students studying Te Reo, our chaplain Fr Pat, German gap student, Jacob and Matua.

When we got to the marae, we were warmly welcomed on to the marae in a powhiri ceremony by Jury and members of his tribe. After the speeches and songs were completed we did hongi and shook hands with each other then we all went to the dining room for a delicious morning tea. The name of the Wharekai is Parehaunuku and the name of the wharenuī or meeting house is called Toa Rangatira. Following morning tea, we learnt about the history of Ngati Toa Rangatira. We heard the story of how the tribe, led by their chief Te Rauparaha left their home in the Waikato area in the 18th century and travelled south all the way to Porirua to settle there. We also learnt the story of what led to Te Rauparaha composing his famous haka. (He was being chased by enemies and hid in a kumara pit till his enemies had passed.) We listened to the stories about the carvings and the ancestors or tipuna who they represent in the tukutuku panels in the beautiful meeting house.

After a very yummy lunch we got to play Ki o Rahi in the afternoon. This game is a traditional Maori sport our ancestors would have played. This involves throwing, running and catching. It was heaps of fun. We think we should get a school team together next year.

We really enjoyed our stay at Takapuwhia marae. It was the first time in a long time that we had been in a powhiri and we learnt a lot more about the marae and why everything happens the way it does. We enjoyed the great stories told to us by the gifted storytellers. We also really enjoyed the food that was given to us and we were treated really nicely. We'd like to thank all the tangata whenua/host people for giving up their time to look after us, with short notice, at the marae.

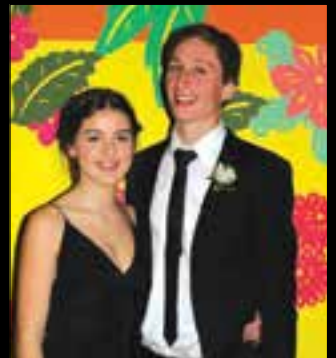

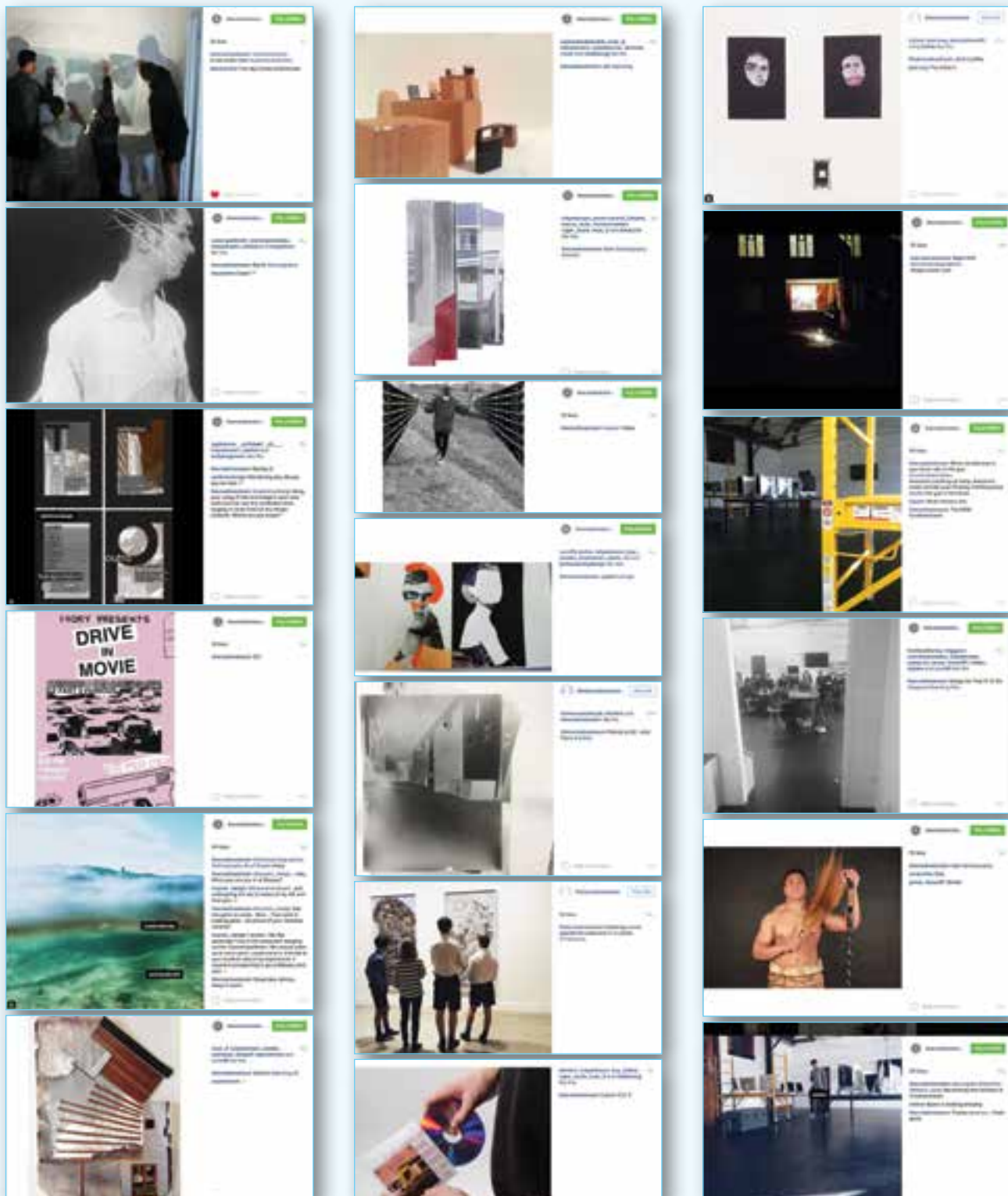

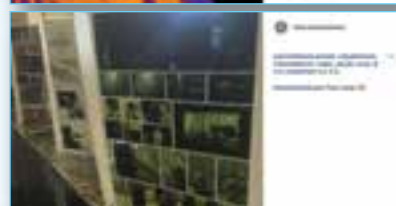
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# CAREERS & GATEWAY

# DRAMA

## **Junior Drama**

The year began at with a two-term option with Year 9 where they spent time concentrating on mime and movement and moved into producing a short production called 'SNAPSHOTS' at the end of Term 2. Family, friends and teachers attended and they all enjoyed this funny performance.

Year 10 have been working hard on their Drama option during Terms 3 and 4. They performed a movement piece in Term 3 and will be performing a short play called 'RATZ' at the end of Term 4. This is a modern version of 'The Pied Piper of Hamelin'. This has been a short taster of the type of things studied for Level 1 NCEA and the students have enjoyed a variety of onstage and backstage opportunities.

## **Senior Drama**

There were two senior Drama classes in 2015. Class 1 had a number of Year 11, Year 12 and Year 13 students. Class 2 had Year 12 and (mostly) Year 13 students.

At the start of the year all these students attended a performance of 'The Brave', a devised theatre piece, performed by young men belonging to the Massive Company. Inspired by these performances the boys in both classes undertook a piece of theatre we called 'BEING BOLD' and they performed these pieces inspired by their own lives. These were funny, moving, truthful and accomplished. The audiences thoroughly enjoyed them.

Mid-year saw both classes undertaking significant performances. First up was 'WAR HERO' by Class 1, a dramatisation of the life of ARCHIBALD BAXTER during WWI written by Michael Galvin. By the time the national register was taken in 1915 – requiring men to register their preparedness to serve – he was committed to rejecting the war both as a pacifist and as a Christian socialist. This play was about the stand that he and others took to remain pacifists despite being sent to the front and tortured for their beliefs.

Local playwright Dave Armstrong came into school to discuss his play 'THE TUTOR' which was performed by the Class 2. The play is about John Sellars, a hard-nosed, self-made millionaire and solo father of recalcitrant fifteen year old Nathan, who has been expelled from three schools in the past year. Sellars hires Richard Holton a left leaning maths teacher to tutor Nathan privately at home. Armstrong was invaluable with his advice to the students in their preparations for the production and also helpful with exam study advice.

The final performances for the year saw both classes using drama techniques in Shakespeare's 'MACBETH' AND Caryl Churchill's 'LOVE AND INFORMATION'. The boys acted in pairs or solo and this was also a well-received evening where the boys performed proficiently.

## **Shakespeare**

The Shakespeare Globe Centre New Zealand, University of Otago, Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Festival, is the full title of a nationwide event, in which high school students perform five and fifteen minute scenes from Shakespeare's plays, set in any time, place, dress – though definitely in Shakespeare's words. This year, we entered with a scene from Twelfth Night directed by Mrs Hayworth. The adjudicators said, The scene really excelled in the moments of audience connection, like Sir Toby offering the audience a drink and Feste, entering through the audience playing his guitar.

# ENGLISH

## STAFFING

We congratulate both of them on their significant achievements! We also wish to thank Kate Lyde for stepping in at short notice to cover both Lisa's and Claire's classes while they were away. Kate did an awesome job and we wish her all the best.

The only permanent newcomer to the English Department this year has been Dan Sales. He arrived fresh from a year's overseas travel, having previously taught at Hastings Boys' High. He has already made a very positive contribution to our department and the wider life of the school.

## TEACHING AND LEARNING

A good question to ask any school is: Are you a Teaching school or a Learning school? I like to think that as a department our primary focus is on learning and as such, we have introduced a number of new initiatives to help foster this learning.

The introduction of the Year 9 Hubs has seen a significant change from the more traditional teaching model, where subjects are kept quite separate from each other even if there are natural links. English and Social Studies are good examples of this, with both subjects requiring similar skills even though the content is different. The Year 9 Hub model here at St Pat's has seen those subjects that have natural links integrated as much as possible and taught by the same teacher.

At Level 2 we introduced a new achievement standard to our programme which was better suited to our students' needs. AS 2.9 Reading of Independent Texts required the boys to read a total of six texts and then respond to them. One obvious benefit has been the increase in reading mileage gained by the boys but of equal importance has been their improved time-management.

At Level 3 we decided to be more flexible with our teaching programme. As a consequence we offered boys more freedom in their choice of topics and this better suited their individual learning needs.

As the academic year comes to a close, our senior students are busy sitting their external exams. I am heartened by the response to our department's offer of an optional practice exam last Saturday morning. The uptake was overwhelming: we had close to eighty boys turn up to practise their essay writing and to get feedback from one of the English teachers who had also given up their free time. This was a very positive way to end the academic year and a reflection of the dedication of our students and staff. I thank you for that and wish you all the very best.

# GEOGRAPHY

## Level 1

We spoke to a representative from Meridian Energy about the positive and negative impacts of generating wind energy before walking down to Makara beach for the afternoon.

# MATHS

This year we welcomed two new staff to the department, Mark Winfield and Nathan Beckman. These two came from quite different places and backgrounds; Mark coming out from England with his family and Nathan coming from the Waikanae Coast.

Both have strengths in technology, and both have applied their knowledge to the benefit of the students and staff during the year.

Nathan has focused on the Junior school, introducing the staff in general to a primary school approach to the teaching of Year 9, which was a good fit to the Hub concept adopted by the school this year. His skills have been much appreciated by his students who seamlessly move from BYOD device to workbook, to exercise book.

Mark has taken on the Senior side of the school, looking after Year 13 Calculus this year. He has enjoyed our senior boys, and I believe they have enjoyed working with him. His general knowledge and ability to convey this is first rate, and the boys have picked up on this. Mark has put his tech knowledge into practice and as the year has gone on, has taken a greater role in up-skilling staff as well as students.

Both of these gentlemen make the Maths department that much richer and we look forward to the next year with confidence in our ability as a group to be 'better tomorrow than we are today', our mantra over the last 2 years.

2016 will be an exciting year with larger steps than ever before as the school embraces a modern learning environment. Longer periods will create change in the way a maths lesson operates. We have no doubt it will provide a challenge, but we do recognize that what worked 40 years ago in a maths classroom cannot be what we still do today – it is time to be radical.

We are radical people by nature, some would say irrational at times, others absurd, but we do enjoy our subject and will be focused on having our maths students discovering the root concepts to all the complex problems they meet – real and imaginary.

Mathematics is a subject that inspires – our goal next year is to expose our students to this experience. We have larger numbers than ever before in the senior school in 2016. This subject challenges students, and we believe that is a healthy sign for the academic progress of our boys that they wish to take it. We have reduced the amount of Statistical topics in Years 12 and 13, with boys often underwhelmed by the constant repetitive nature of data analysis topics that have infiltrated the maths curriculum, these require skills more related to English, which disengages those boys looking for a mathematical challenge. We now have Year 13 Mathematics and Year 13 Calculus, no longer Year 13 Statistics as a course. We believe, and have feedback from students, that this is a good decision.

I would like to thank the Maths staff not mentioned already for the significant amount they contribute towards your son's mathematical progress: Tony O'Connor, Kirstin Stern, Jane Nolan and Paul Wilson.

The Junior music class also very successfully ran music demonstration performances for the new Year 8 students coming to Stream in 2016. They did 12 performances during that day and the new students left with a lot of enthusiasm about music at Stream.

We have also been host to a number of National music events this year. This included over 250 musicians visiting the College for the Wellington Band and Orchestra Festival. The highlight of the Festival would have been the 80 piece Symphony Orchestra from MacLean's College in Auckland. They were outstanding. We also hosted the National Conductors Clinic with concert band, orchestral conductors and music teachers from around the country, spending two days at the clinic with Special Guest Dr Bruce Pearson from the USA and the NZ Youth Symphonic Winds. I was very proud to have one of our boys, Year 13 music student Andy Chang as part of this group of outstanding musicians.

# PHYSICAL EDUCATION

2015 was one of the most exciting years in the history of the Silverstream Physical Education, Health and Food and Nutrition Department. This excitement stemmed from our establishment in the state of the art Father Peter Blake Centre for Physical Education and Sport. This is without doubt the best College gymnasium in the Wellington region, and puts us in great shape as the College moves towards a modern and dynamic teaching and learning environment. The Centre is a fantastic physical space, but is also well supported by state of the art technology allowing our department to operate at the forefront of modern, technology based teaching practices.

The Centre has also allowed the Department to work much more closely alongside the College's Director of Sport, Mr Warrick Bowden, which is already reaping rewards in terms of what we can offer to our students. The other significant move towards greater collaboration that has occurred has been the move towards Year 9 Health and Physical Education teachers also delivering the Year 9 Food and Nutrition programme. With these 3 learning areas all existing on the same page of the NZ Curriculum document this seemed a natural progression for us to make. Our PE teachers have worked much more closely with Mrs Nicola Potts, to ensure continuity of delivery between our various department areas.

## Year 9 Physical Education, Health and Food and Nutrition

As previously mentioned, all three of these subject areas were delivered by the same person in 2014 and 2015. This allows for much greater continuity of relationships and content delivery than ever before. This also presented an exciting challenge for experienced and inexperienced department members alike, to challenge themselves in an area that was in some ways foreign to them up until this year.

Highlights of the year included the move towards BYOD and the use of the Google platform for all Health and Food and Nutrition material, Term 1 Aquatics programme, culminating in the Silverstream Junior Aquathon champs, Ultimate frisbee coaching from the NZ Ultimate Association and a myriad of other sporting and physical activity opportunities, designed to develop the students physical and interpersonal skills.

## Year 10 Physical Education and Health

The Year 10 Physical Education and Health programme continues to be supported by a personalised Silverstream Physical Education workbook. This allows teachers and students alike to reflect upon and evolve their thinking around their experiences in this area, far more than ever before.

The content of the course is designed to build upon their Year 9 experiences, but also to set them up effectively if they are to go on and study Physical Education in any form in the Senior school. New content included professional Water Polo and Ultimate coaching, principles and methods of training and a greater focus on social responsibility development.

This focus was particularly prevalent in not only practical Physical Education but, also in Health classes where 'interpersonal skills' were identified and discussed, and individual students were observed demonstrating these skills.

Highlights of the year most certainly include the Aquathon that was undertaken by all Year 9 and Year 10 students at the end of Term 1, after a period of intensive training in preparation for the event. The event was a tremendous success particularly in the levels of participation. Since then there has been a sustained uplift in the levels of motivation and enthusiasm shown towards the subject of Physical Education and Health by the vast majority of Year 10 students. This has largely been due to the opening of the new Centre for Physical Education and Sport facility at the College, which is proving to be very well utilised at all times.





## Year 9 and 10 Sports Institute

In both the Summer and Winter Sports Institute programmes this year, the boys have been very fortunate to have the benefit of the expertise of 'outside' coaches coming in to College to pass on their knowledge of each of the respective sports, being available in the Sports Institute.

Numbers for the Summer Sports Institute programme- which involved the sports of cricket and athletics, totalled over 50 boys and each boy worked hard to improve the practical elements of their chosen sport.

In the Winter Sports Institute programme, there were three sports available to choose from, and those were basketball, soccer and rugby. Again, the number of boys totalled over 50, and in fact reached over 60 early on in the programme, and the level of enthusiasm shown by each boy throughout the programme, was clearly evident.

## Year 11 Physical Education and Enhancing Performance

This has been a great year of new and innovative learning through this very important curriculum area of "Physical Education, Health and Food and Nutrition". There have been many new aspects of these two courses that have contributed towards this fun and productive years' work. Without a doubt the most significant change has been the opening of our new sports complex. This has invigorated and excited virtually every student in this fine College towards experiencing the higher levels of physical, mental, social and spiritual gains that this subject and facility offers. Apart from the obvious aesthetic features of the complex we have also introduced a number of technological and course content advancements. A set of 10 ipads used for research and technique analysis and the large screen TV, situated in the Gymnasium for playback of group videos. The students can research new sports, how they are played, their skills and techniques. We have many other apps that will also be of use in the different learning areas of these two courses.

The Aquathon at the end of Term One was a new initiative across all courses and we felt it was a very effective addition to our assessment work in training and performing a physical activity in an applied setting. Most of the students took up this challenge and achieved very well while having fun at the same time.

The Enhancing Performance course has also been a huge success based on the numbers of students that have opted to take this subject on for next year, for the first time or a continuation from this year work. We have put a lot of work into providing these two courses for next year with completely different credits across all three year groups, to cater for those students that see this subject area as a future career option.

## Year 12 Physical Education and Enhancing Performance

Year 12 Physical Education and Enhancing Performance contrasted practical performance Achievement Standards of Multi-Sport and Fijian Touch, alongside that of skill analysis and the study and application of the principles of training. Students aimed to improve components of fitness through designing personal training programmes. Hellison's Model of Social Responsibility was implemented throughout the year, challenging the students to display positive behaviours and model them to others, both within and outside of the classroom.

After making the move to our impressive Gymnasium the Department secured ten new iPads, providing exciting opportunities in supporting the learning for our students. The purchasing of several modern applications complements a new information technology system, unlocking additional assessment opportunities which better suit the needs of each individual, as well as providing an exciting and interactive modern learning environment.

## Year 13 Physical Education and Enhancing Performance

Year 13 Physical Education was taken to a new level this year with many high achieving academic students recognising its importance for their career paths, or tertiary aspirations, and therefore moving into the subject area from other courses. This allowed us to approach learning in this area with even higher aspirations than normal, and most students responded with a great attitude towards the pursuit of excellence.

The practical element of the Human Performance Course in 2015 gave the boys the opportunity to take part in the 1st St. Patrick's College, Silverstream Triathlon at the end of Term 1. Each and every boy trained particularly hard for the event, and difficult conditions on the day- particularly for the bike leg of the Triathlon, proved very demanding.

The theoretical element of the Human Performance course allowed the boys to gain NCEA credits through the Star/Gateway programme offered by the Manukau Institute of Technology, and involved completing two Unit Standards with the use of a workbook.

# ATHLETICS

Athletics in 2015 was notable for the effort, first and foremost, from the Year 13 leadership of all we did. These students took responsibility for us having a team that was worthy of Stream, and did this by their own example. It's fair to say the efforts at Old Boys' and McEvedy from Stream were significantly better than the last year because of them. I salute these athletes, in particular Ken Tuffin, Ryan Scaife and Tom England who did all they could in competition and training, with superb support from great team guys like, Andy Chang, Andy Jordan, Regan Wright, Ryan Fraser, Nathan Lenihan and Sione Uvea. It was no surprise that Ken Tuffin gained the greatest number of points for Stream at McEvedy – an extremely unusual occurrence as generally the competition is way too hard at Senior level to pick up points in as many events as he did.

2015 was marked by the arrival of two superstars at Stream, Nick Smith and Eddie Korent, and with the return from injury of Max Press. These three blazed a trail across Old Boys and McEvedy, with Max going on to success at regionals and North Islands, while Nick just kept going all the way to the Commonwealth U18 Youth Champs. Here he came up against athletes who could well be at the Rio Olympics next year; the winning time in the 100m being 10.20secs. They certainly gave the team real impetus and support for the Year 13 leaders.

As the year comes to an end the record will show we lost Old Boys – again – and came 3rd at McEvedy. It will not show the work many boys put into representing Stream at these events, with some getting little recognition. I am pleased that in 2016 all competitors in McEvedy and hopefully Old Boys will get points, from first getting 8 points down to 8th getting 1 point. This will be great for those who make the team, knowing that while superb stars may not be reachable, the team aspect of McEvedy becomes even more valuable with everyone's performance now gaining points.

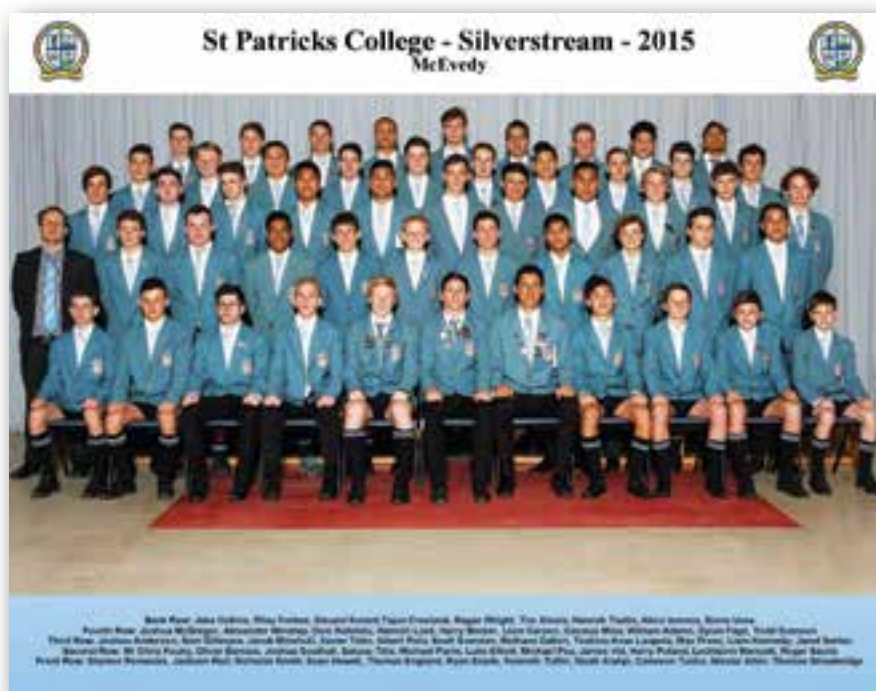


### NZSSAA Athletics Champs 2015

### Neville Shield 2015

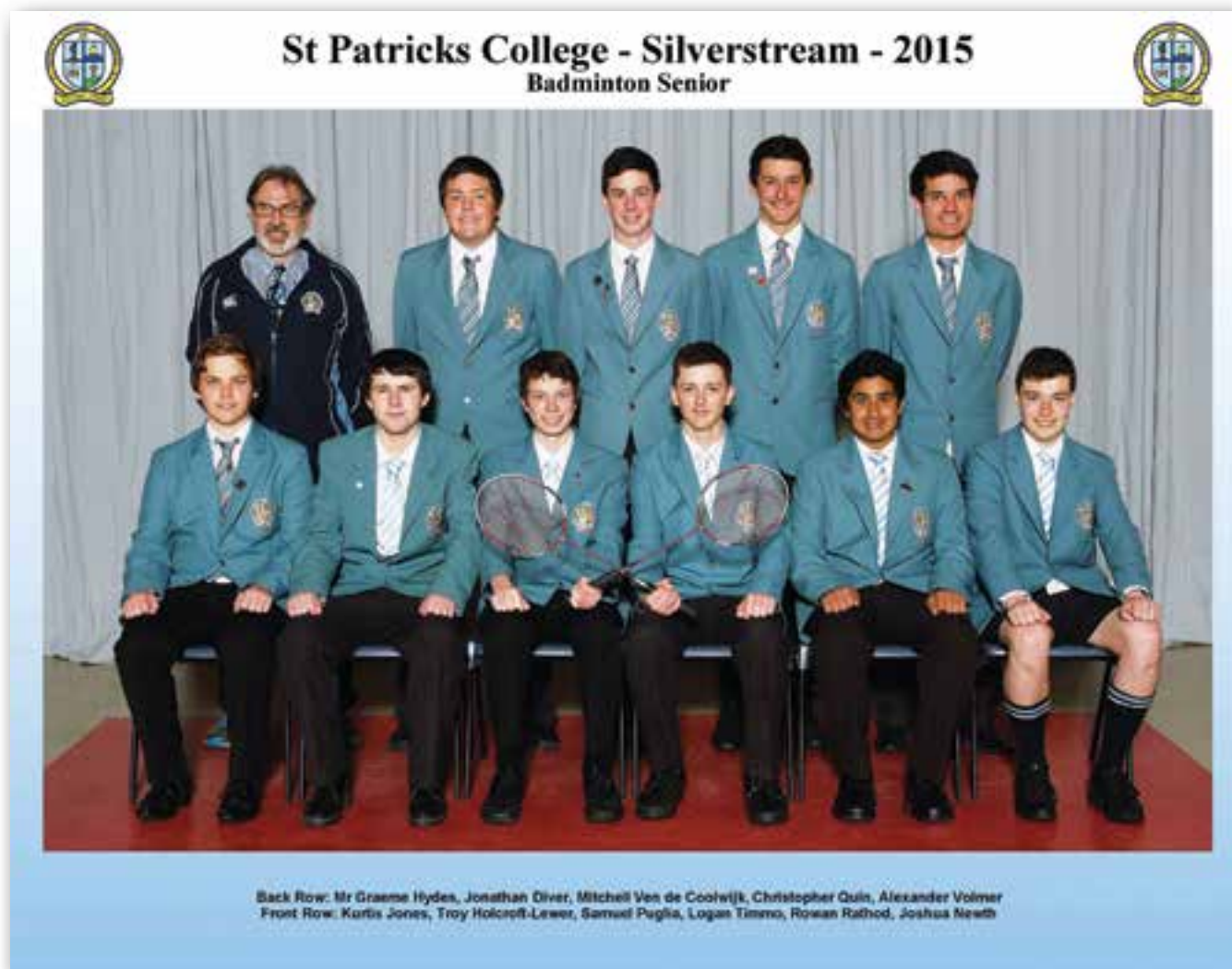

## St Bede's

The last Traditional of the season was played against St Bede's in Christchurch. The toss was looking like it was going to be crucial and with Stream losing the toss they were asked to bat in difficult conditions.

The pitch lived up to the early expectations and we were quickly in trouble, slipping to 49/4. With Stream in a precarious situation the middle order began staging a fight back. Solid batting from Callum Mclachlan (40), Sam Von Hartitzsch (62), Jono Tuffin (50) and Jae Neshausen, saw Stream post a solid first innings score of 249. Given the difficult early conditions this was a great effort.

St Bede's made a solid start to the run chase, getting to 203/4 on a pitch that was starting to flatten out. The Stream spin attack toiled solidly with the ball and began fighting their way back into the match. Some patient bowling and good fielding saw St Bedes bowled out for 331. The spin pair of Navroz Singh (5/107 off 26) and Peter Aitken (4/91 off 33) being the main wicket takers.

Stream began their second innings looking to erase the 82 run deficit and set a competitive target to entice St Bede's into a run chase to try and take the match outright. Stream again suffered the loss of early wickets slipping to 36/3 before Callum Mclachlan put together some solid partnerships with Sam Von Hartitzsch (57) and Ken Tuffin (84) to get us through to 177/5 before Mclachlan was bowled for a fine 83. Jono Tuffin continued the good work combining well with Ken Tuffin (40) and the rest of the lower order to get Stream through to 282/9 when J Tuffin was bowled for an outstanding 60. Stream declared, leaving St Bede's 201 to win the match outright in a session and a half.

Stream started well with Sam Von Hartitzsch (4/30 from 16) taking early wickets to have St Bede's 21/3 but time was running out and a strategy was going to be needed to entice St Bede's to continue the run chase. Despite Stream offering up some enticing bowling but with St Bedes only needing to draw to hold the trophy, they decided to shut up shop and bat out the remaining overs and the match ended in a draw.

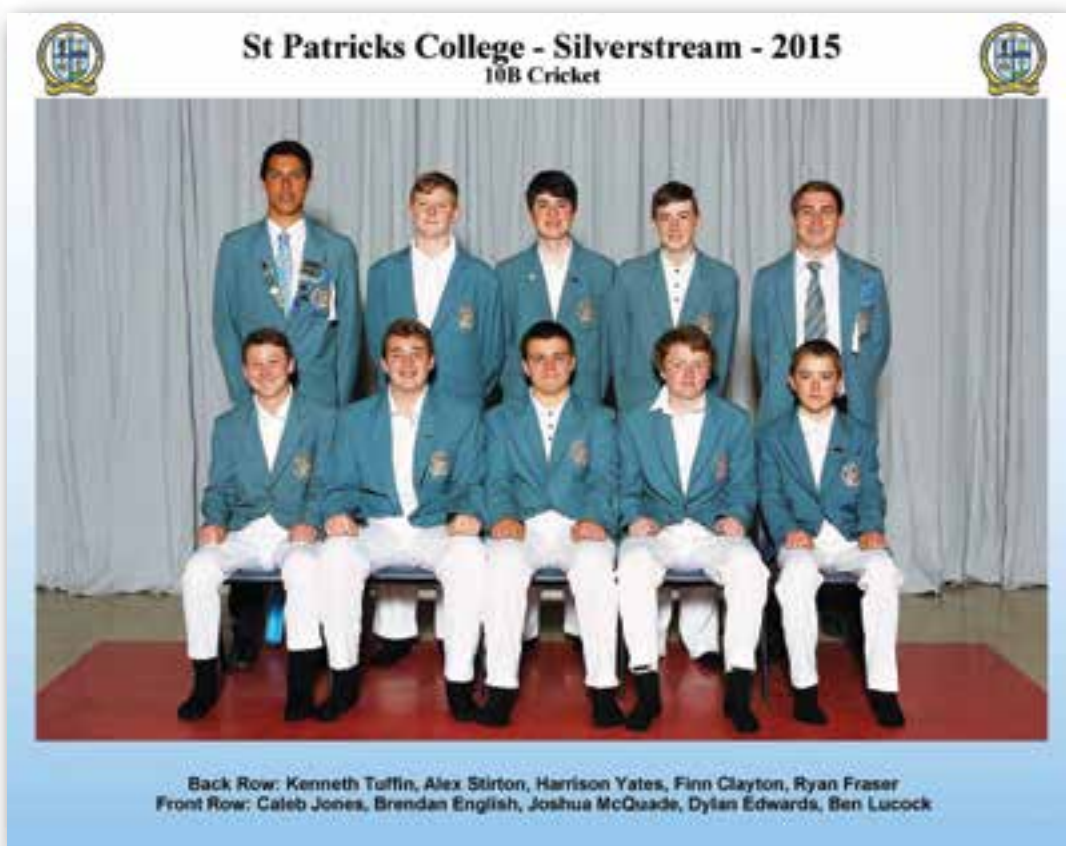

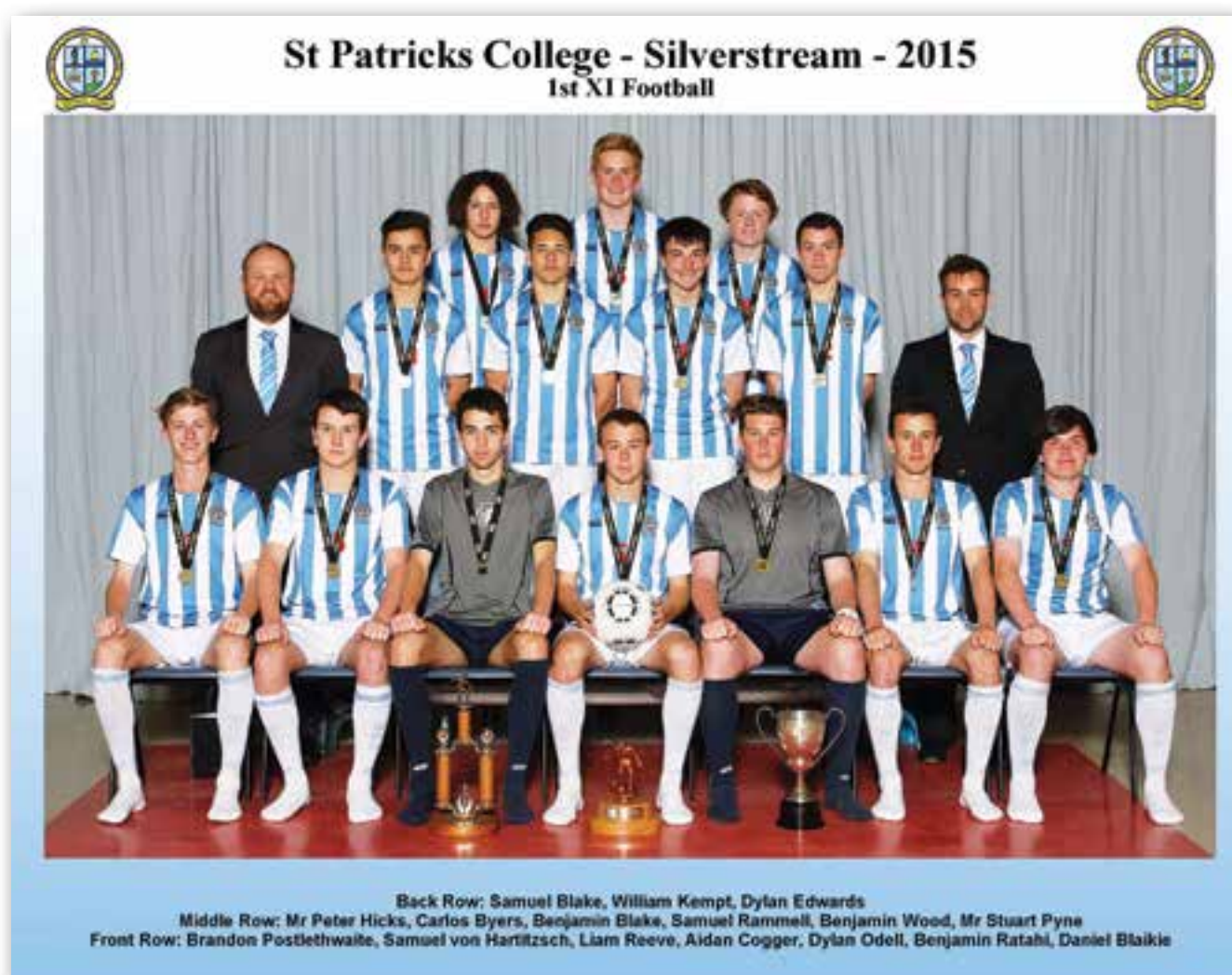
# FOOTBALL

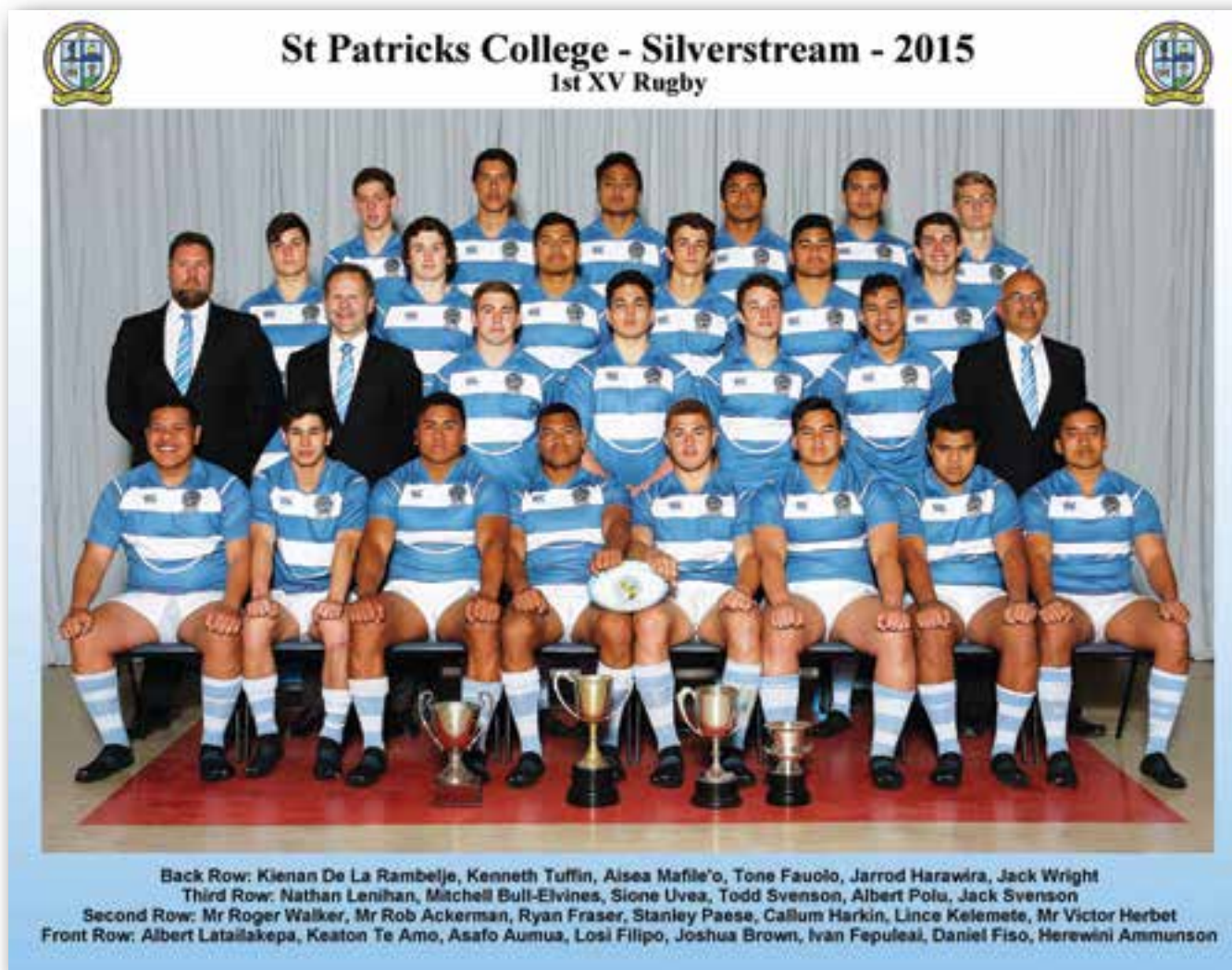

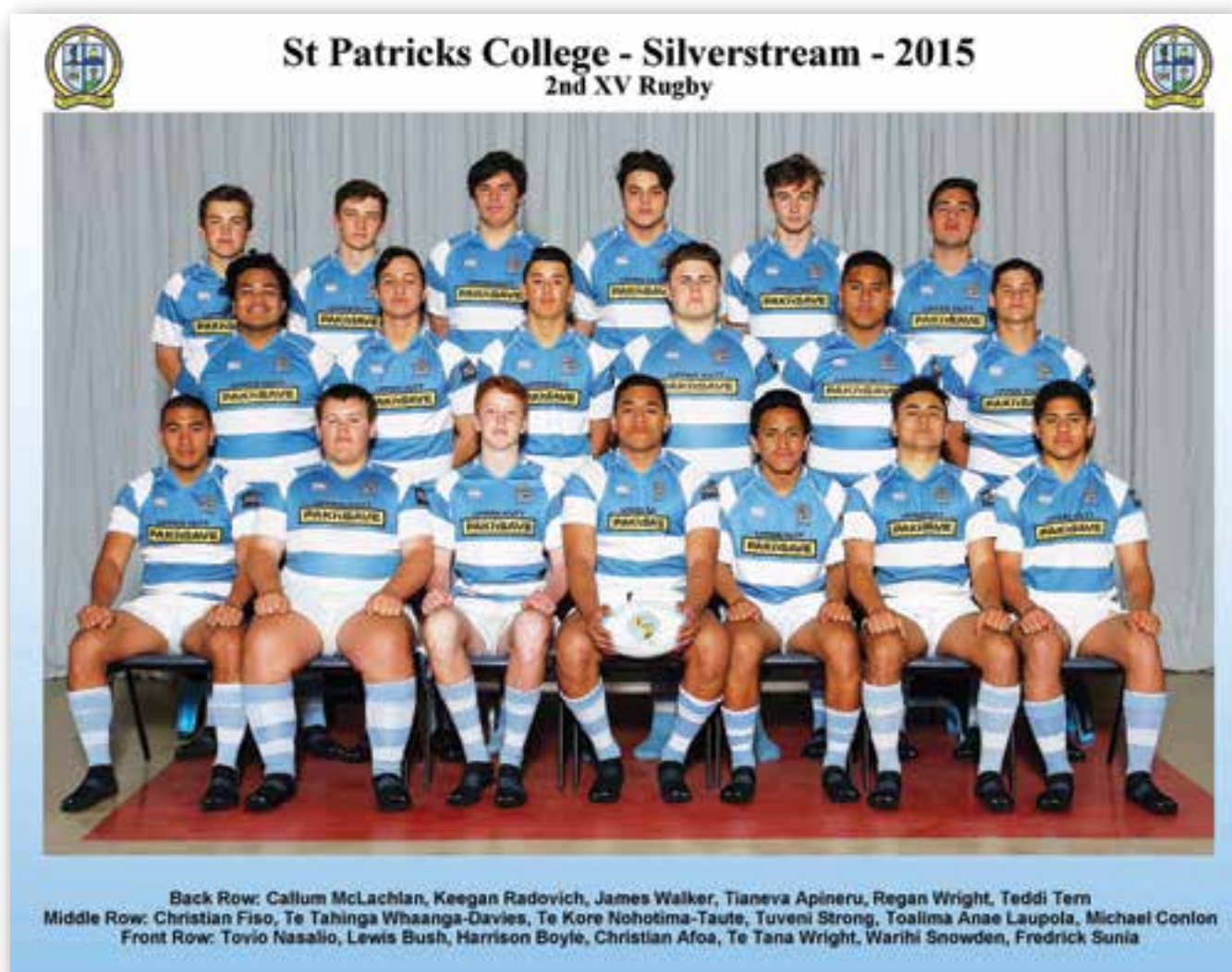


# RUGBY 2nd XV

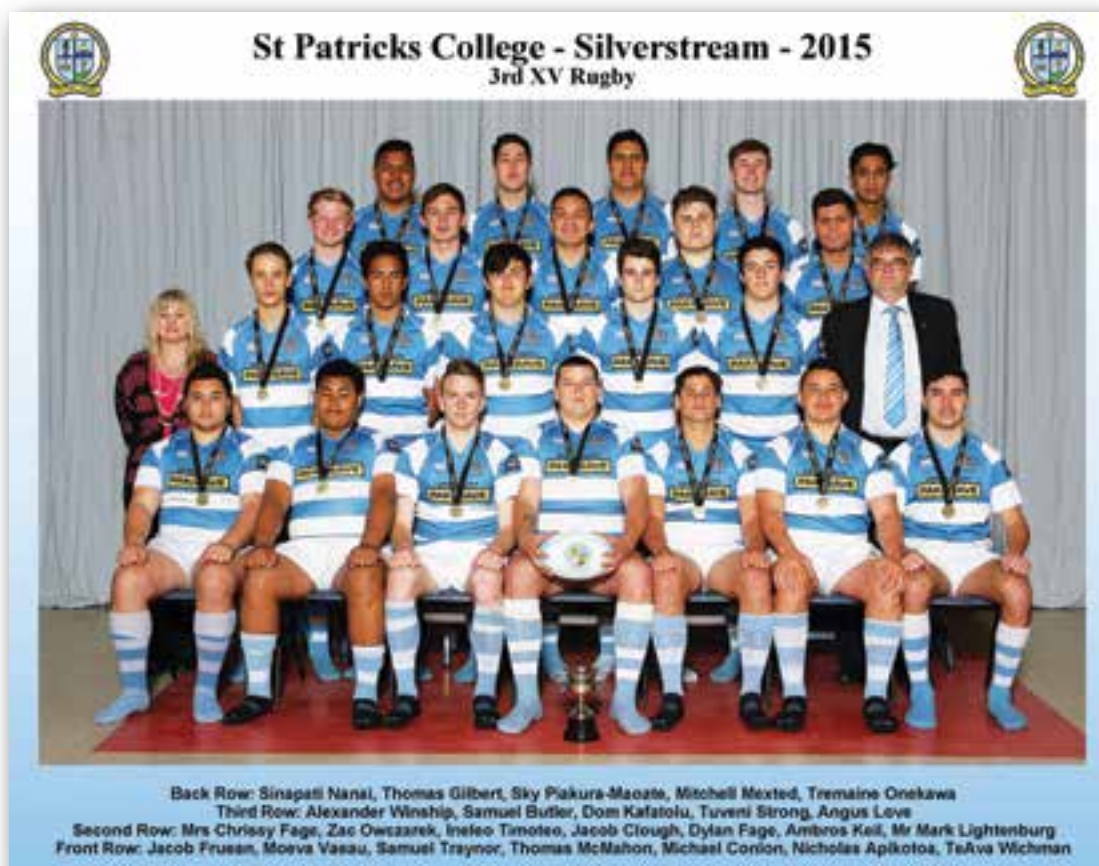

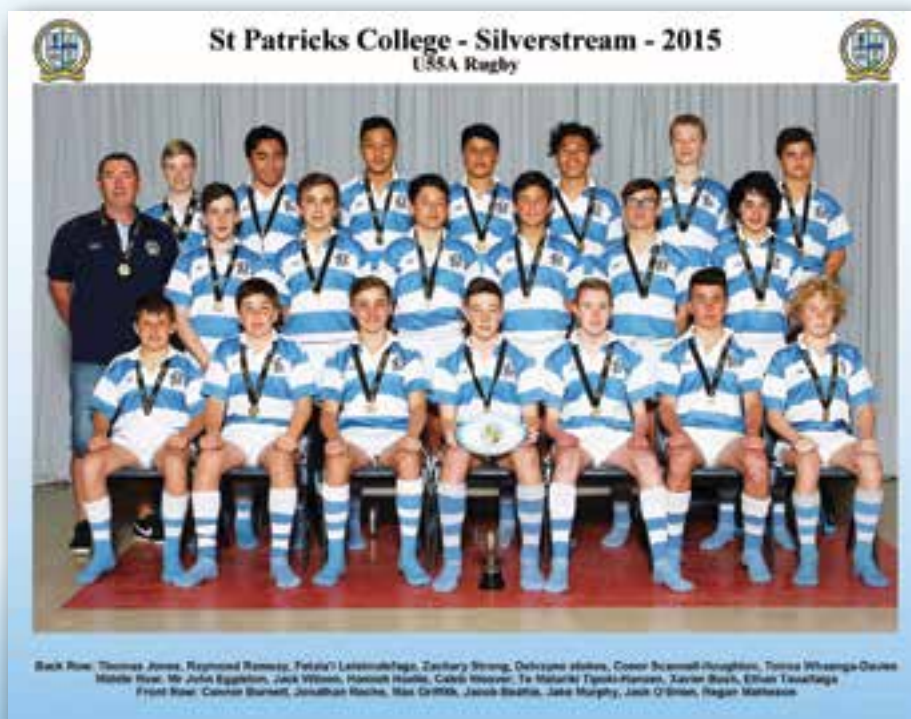
# U55A RUGBY

# U65A RUGBY

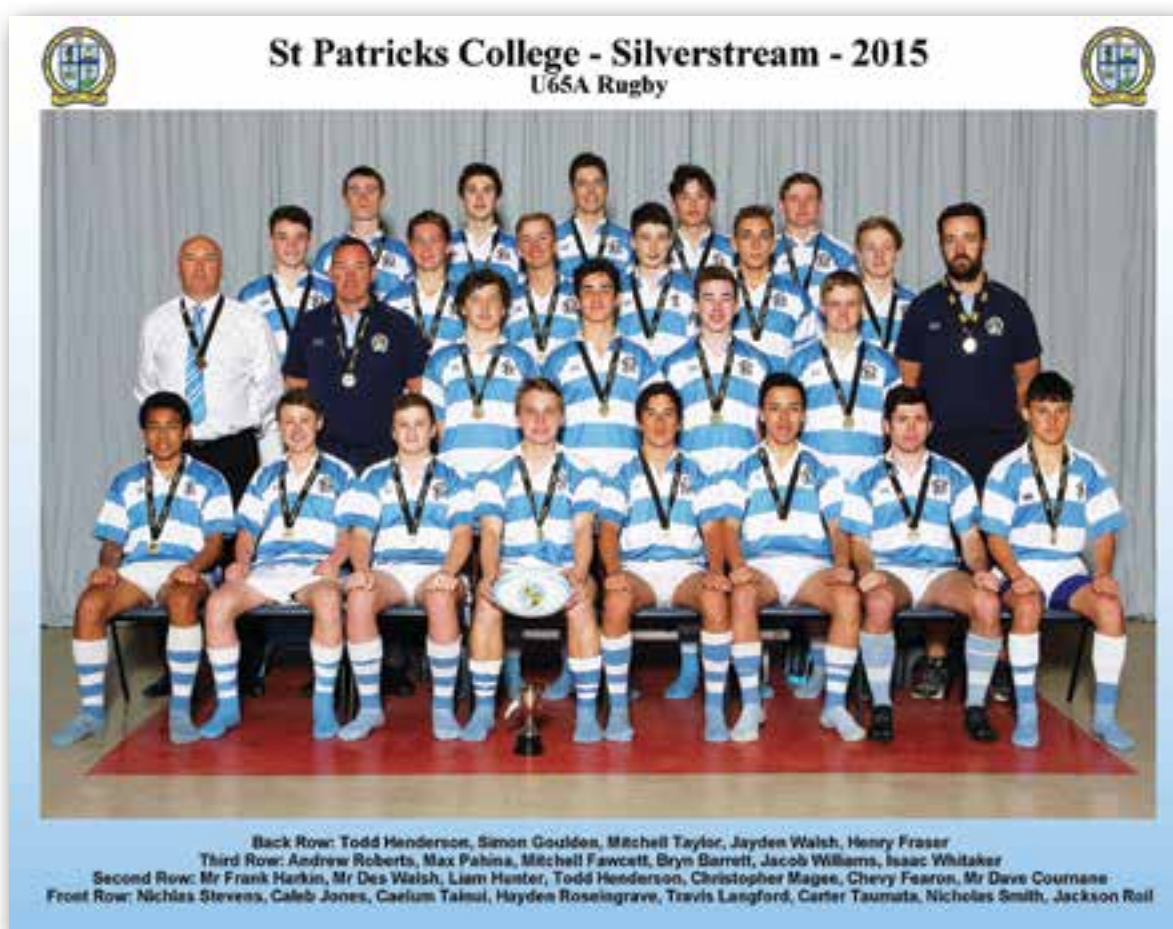

After being placed in the 3rd Division and losing our first couple of games, we set a goal of winning 1 game. We were always training hard and were always the last team to leave training.

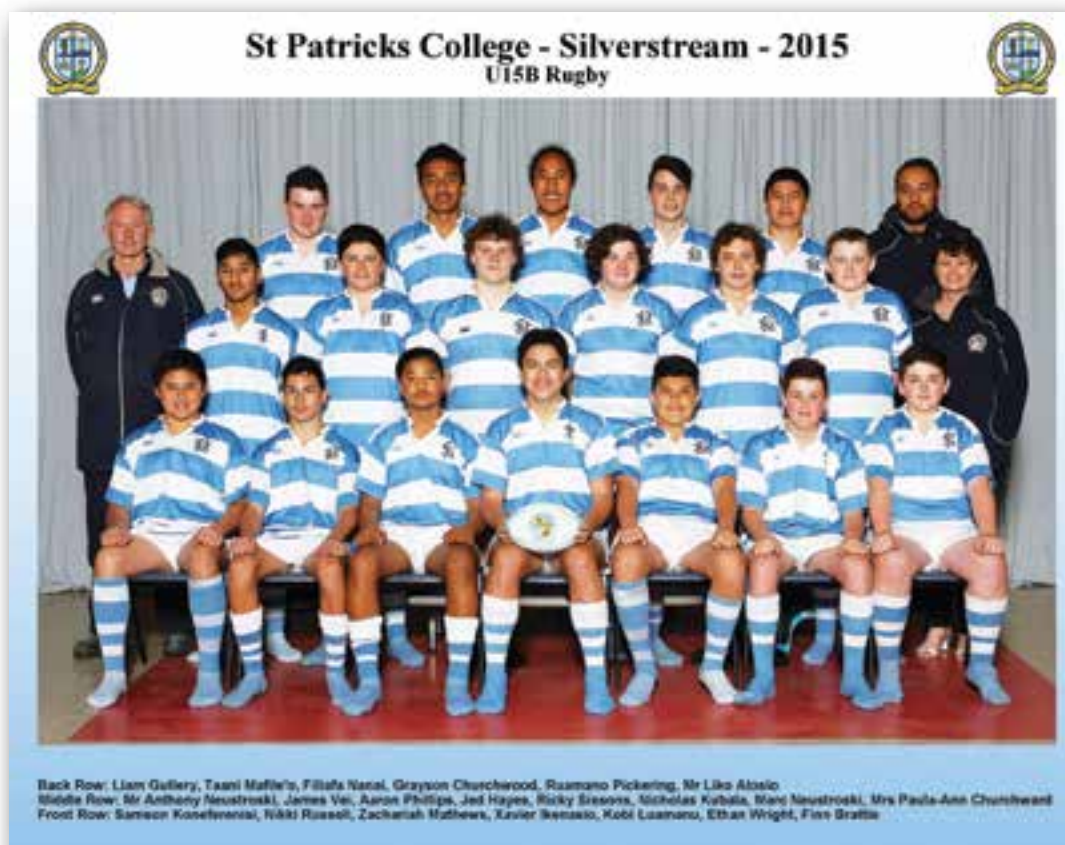
We started to play better and achieved our first goal with a win at home against St Pat's Town.

# SOFTBALL

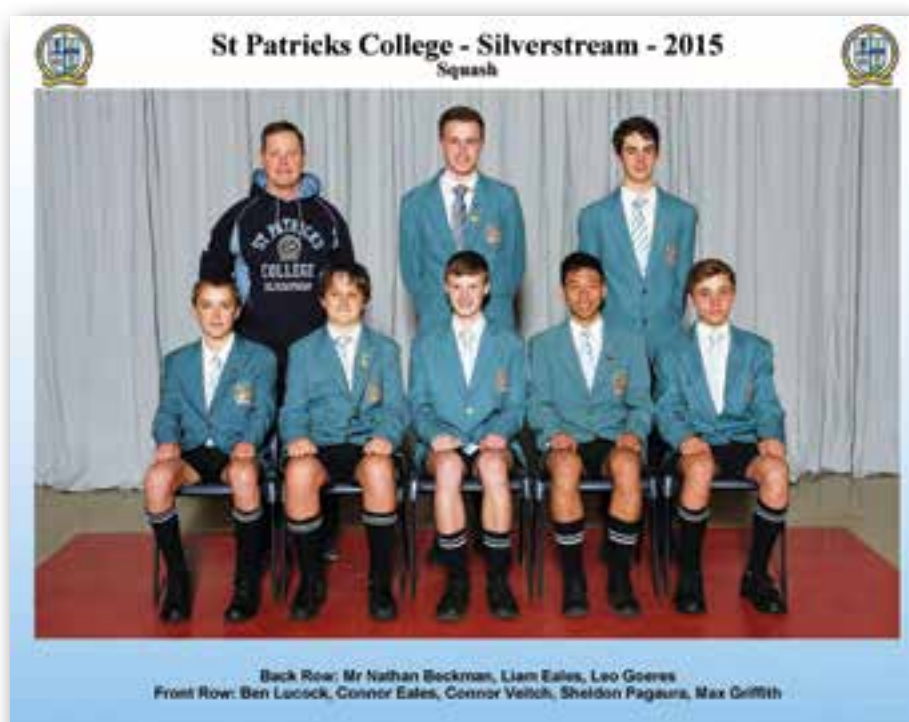

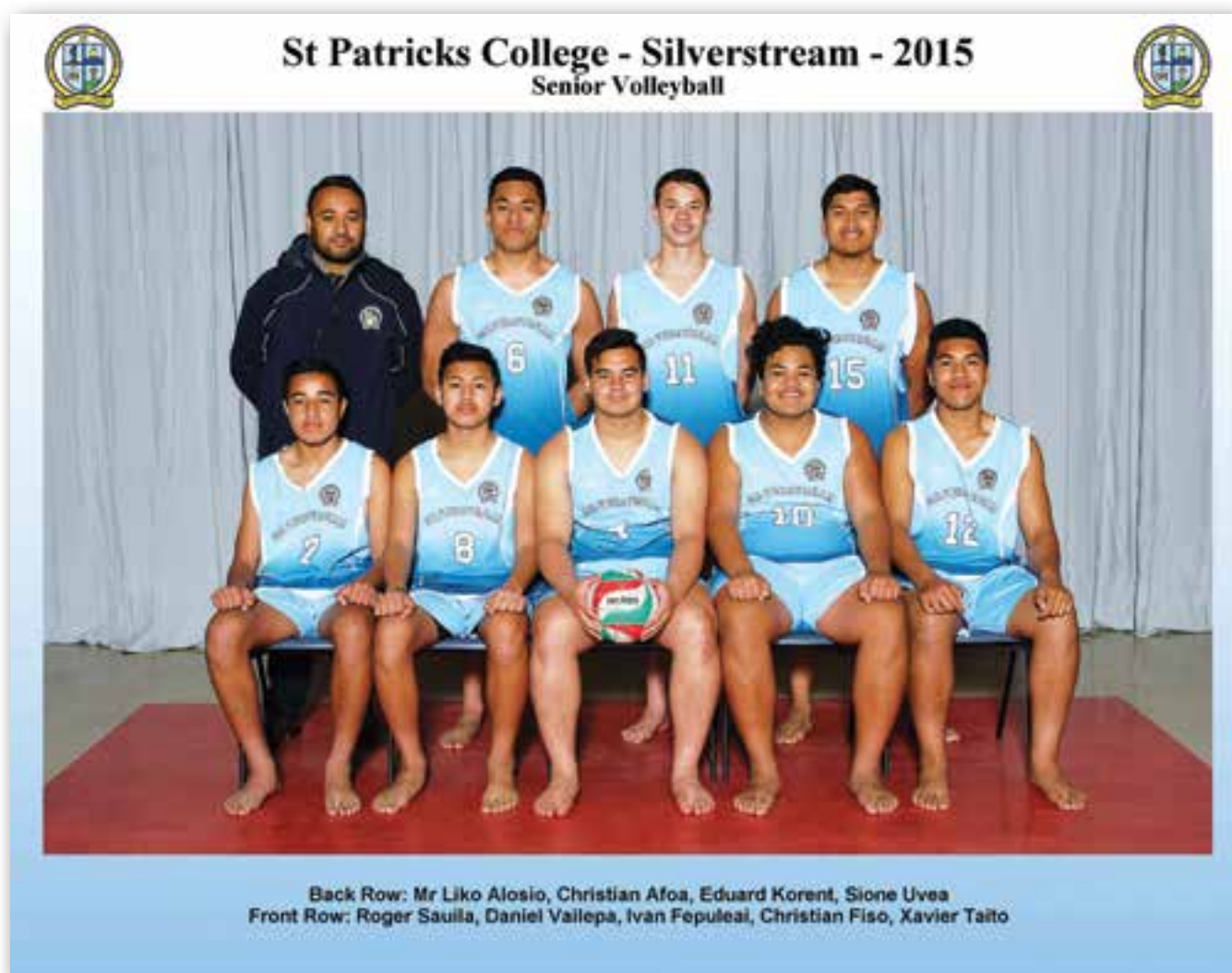






# VOLLEYBALL SENIOR

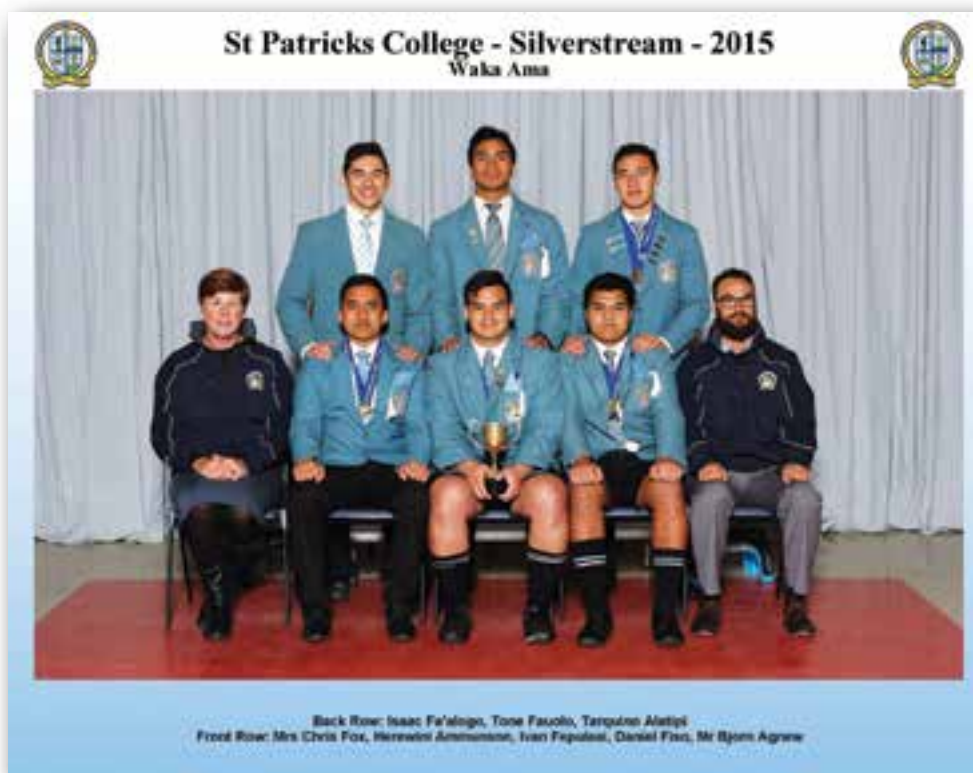

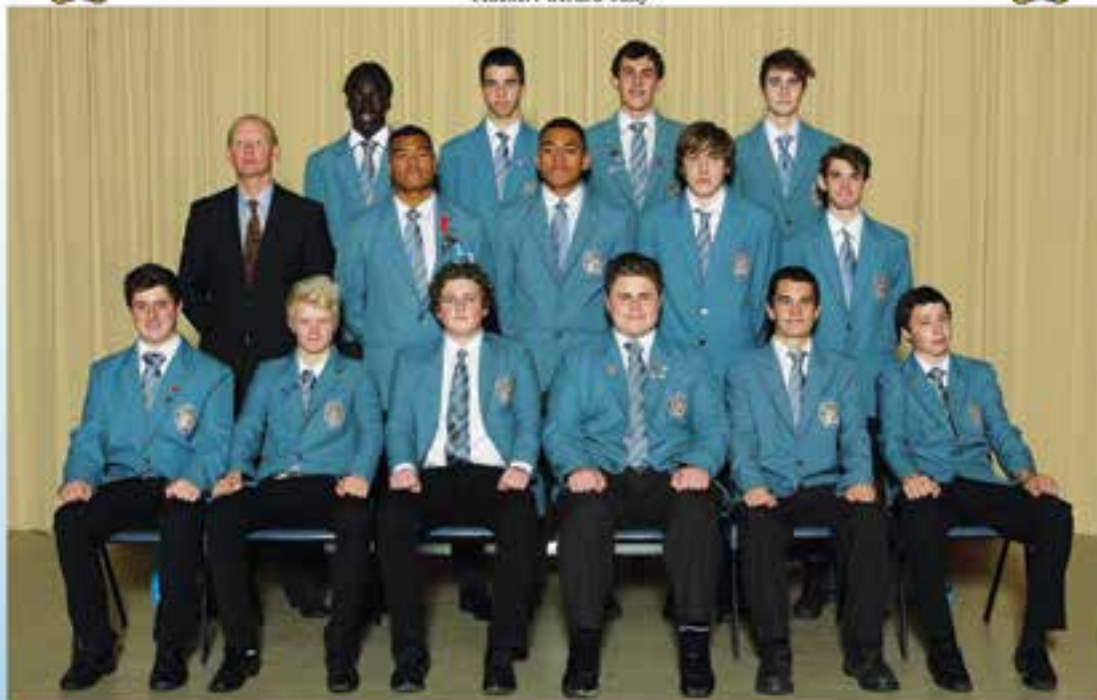
