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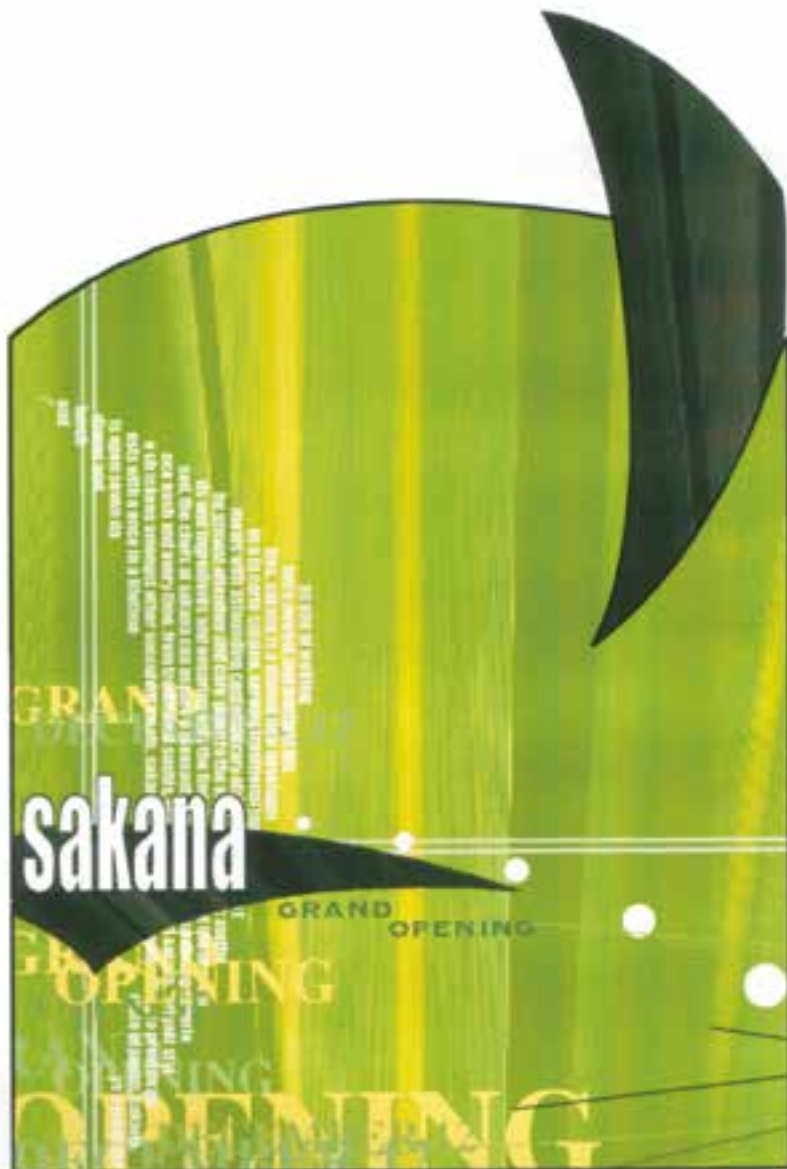

**GRADUATION 2005
MEASURING SUCCESS**

I was at an Old Boys' Dinner a few weeks ago and was told by a member of the executive that I didn't need to make a speech. Now, I have been caught out before like this.

There was a quote used by Peter Vardy* in a presentation I had attended earlier in the year and so I put it in my pocket as I left the house; just in case. As I told them at the dinner you can't put someone with an Irish background in front of a microphone and tell them not to speak.

The quote I had put in my pocket had struck me as very profound and disturbing and I'll give it to you now because I want to develop it further.

'A head teacher wrote to his staff recognising the challenge that faces educators and students;

"Dear Teacher, I am a survivor of a concentration camp. My eyes saw what no person should witness; gas chambers built by learned engineers, children poisoned by educated physicians, infants killed by trained nurses, women and babies shot and burned by high school and college graduates. So, I am suspicious of education. My request is: help your students to become more human. Your efforts must never produce learned monsters, skilled psychopaths, educated Eichmans. Reading, writing and arithmetic are important only if they serve to make our children more human."

In our Christian tradition St Paul talks of human beings coming to fullness in Christ. He makes it clear that without love we are not full human beings; we are diminished, we are less than we are capable of being.

Clearly the monstrous behaviour of those people mentioned in the head teacher's letter indicates a

frightening lack of humanity. Being fully human cannot be defined solely in terms of what we do.

We also know though, that it cannot be defined by what we own. We are aware that many of those mega-stars or our wealthiest executives who seem to have everything you could possibly want, lack some basic human qualities and values and, in their own world and work environments are capable of the same brutalities and insensitivities, though not in a physical sense.

One of the problems I think, and I read it in many of the ERO Reports coming out at the present time, is that the pressure from our political masters, driven by economics, GDP, balance of trade and other imperatives, and then felt by many parents to be the sum total of good education, is success that can be measured in 'outcome' terms only and does not take into account the higher potentialities of the human spirit.

It is still true that being skilled in IT is more valued than being compassionate – being able to invent better weapons and combat aircraft is more valued than being kind. Plans to defeat terror are better received than a plan to eradicate poverty from the world and so on.

**Dr Peter Vardy is Vice Principal of Heythrop College of the University of London. Dr Vardy is regarded as one of the leading experts on Religious and Values Education.*

Thomas L Friedman, in an issue of the *New York Times* earlier this year wrote:

"In this age of laptops and PDA's, the internet and Google, mp3s and iPods remember one thing; all these tools might make you smarter but they sure won't make you smart, they might extend your reach, but they will never tell you what to say to your neighbour over the fence, or how to comfort a friend in need, or how to imagine a breakthrough in science or literature. You cannot download passion, imagination, zest and creativity – all that stuff that will make you untouchable. You have to upload it, the old-fashioned way, under the olive tree, with reading, writing and arithmetic, travel, study, reflection, museum visits and human interaction."

And yet many parents, when pushed, actually subscribe to the notion of a caring education that looks at worthwhile values. I hope it's one of the reasons you sent your sons here to Silverstream. I had a parent this year who was changing her son to Silverstream from another prestigious secondary boys' school and so, out of curiosity, I asked her why. She told me it was because the College had impressed with the gracious young men who leave here at the end of their schooling. She said she wasn't the only one who felt that way and that it was a widely held view. It was nothing about what they could do it was about what they had become.

I think education needs to focus on both – it needs to focus on what young people are becoming as well as what they can do. I have no problems with 'outcomes' in education but some will not be defined by an exam or a survey: they will only be measured when you live, work and talk with the person and see what he stands for and why.

Education should not be concerned solely with educating people in terms of 'outcomes' to get a good job, to integrate into the economy and be successful, wealthy consumers and commodity and property owners. We must not fall into the trap of defining key competencies that are only to do with making effective workers and not decent human beings as well.

An approach to education committed to the view that what defines successful human development is

beginning the journey of becoming fully human, entails a spiritual dimension. And for us that's not just another subject on the curriculum; it's an additional dimension that permeates every religious aspect of the life of our College, and with which every curriculum area should be involved. Education must not be about shutting doors that have intangible, immeasurable relationship and spiritual outcomes. Those are the very doors we need to open.

We have tried to do that for you and with you and we haven't been totally successful in everything. What we have done is try to show you how you are valued as human beings and how you should value each other in the same way within the context of your faith. At a time of great uncertainty and arbitrary morality the failure to understand and value our common humanity is evident in our daily papers and on the daily news.

I hope that as parents here tonight, you can look at your son and say he has become something of what you envisaged when you sent him here to us five years ago, four years ago and in some few cases just one year ago.

I hope you can say with some confidence that since attending Silverstream he is in the process of becoming. That:

- he is happier in what he is than in what he owns,
- he understands how far he still has to travel if he is to be fully human,
- he accepts the place of the divine in him and how he must expand and develop,
- he has had more doors opened to him than have ever been closed.

And so, we have helped to prepare your son for the world and that is an inevitable and vital part of education. We have also educated your son to express the deeply divine within him so that he can transform that world. It would be wonderful if tonight, as a parent, you could fuse the two together in that ultimate model of the human and the divine and say, for all the same reasons and with absolute honesty:

"This is my beloved son in whom I am well pleased".

The Silverstream College Board of Proprietors is responsible for the special character of the College (including the associated costs of chaplaincy), the running of the Hostel and the provision of the College buildings, and the care of all nonintegrated land and buildings.

The Board has continued with an extensive marketing programme to attract more boys to the hostel. This is managed by the Rector.

The Board has developed a closer working relationship with the Board of Trustees, especially with regard to the Catholic character and finances. This relationship is strengthened through Fr Paul Martin, Dominic Outtrim and Brian McGuinness who are Trustees of both Boards.

Four Marist priests, known as the J.C. Colin Project Team, have been contracted by the Board to provide chaplaincy and priestly services to the College and to develop the position of a future lay chaplain. The Board has also approved and financed through its agency, the Catholic Schools Board Limited, the provision of the \$320,000.00 technology suite begun in 2004 and completed in 2005.

Fr John O'Neill and John Gordon have served as the Board of Proprietors' representatives on the Board of Trustees for a number of years. Both have now resigned and the Board thanks them for their support, diligence, professionalism and length of service.

It is with regret, we note, that this year Mark Guppy has also resigned from the Board of Proprietors. Mark Guppy has made a unique contribution to the Board.

The Board is truly grateful to Brian for his commitment and considerable expertise in relation to the numerous property issues which he has addressed and advised the Board on during these sixteen years.

Computing

In 2005 the department continued its growth with good numbers in all senior classes. New developments this year include the installation of a ceiling-mounted data projector in Room 4, and its use in all Computing classes. Not only has this made it easier for students to learn new software

by seeing it in use, it has also allowed them a means of displaying their own work to the class.

The standard of work reached by the students has continued to rise, with two students in particular reaching a high level of skill in the creation of computer programs. Others have continued to amaze with their imaginative use of web site and presentation software, whilst the standard of printed work continues to improve.

The introduction of teacher laptops has seen a gradual increase in the use of these in teaching, with data projectors making a regular appearance in many classes within other subjects. This continued increase in the number of computers supported within the College has led to the necessity for us to subdivide our network, and represents a significant milestone in the growth of Computing at Silverstream.

The operation is now required to be a 24/7 commercial-quality system, and the responsibility now rests on the Ministry of Education to recognise this and provide the extra funding required for full-time technical support. The College has been very fortunate in 2005 to secure the services of Mr Vincent Pang, who brings to us a wealth of experience in this area, and who has proved to be a most valuable addition to the staff.

With the retirement of the HOD, Mr Rowney, we have also been fortunate to secure the services of Mr Gil Hunter to replace him. Mr Hunter has had extensive experience as a Computing teacher, a network manager and a leader of ICT professional development for the

staff during 2003 and 2004. He will be able to continue the development of the department into the future.

The rapid increase in the use of graphics, still images and video clips in the work of students and teachers has also made it necessary for us to buy a new server. Creating backups of data in these volumes has become a significant headache and, like many other schools and industries, we are adopting an electronic backup system to hard disk rather than to tape. The total storage capacity of our servers is rapidly approaching half a terabyte, and this also represents an enormous increase in the volume of data used. For example, less than ten years ago, the total volume of staff and student data stored was less than a gigabyte; now it is several hundred times as large. Accessing, maintaining and storing such a volume of data requires a standard of computer system much greater than that used by most small and medium-sized businesses today, and represents a significant challenge for schools to manage on very limited budgets.

The growth in computer use has itself been driven by a rapid growth in the use of the Internet in classroom work. Many subjects require research and this facility is often the first port of call for many students. It has meant that considerable resources go into managing and monitoring Internet use, with much of our

protection being provided by Campus Net, who filter and monitor all traffic. Usage logs are inspected regularly by the Rector and HOD Computing and students who attempt to access inappropriate material are identified and processed.

The constant need to monitor our system for viruses, spyware and the like has also led to a reduction in the use of floppy disks. We are aiming to remove them completely, thus eliminating a major source of virus infection. Students who need to send files in to the College for printing or assessment

purposes are encouraged to use the e-mail system, which has built-in antivirus scanning.

It is not easy to say at this point which direction is best for the College as far as its computer facilities are concerned. We hope that the nature of classroom use of computers and associated hardware will make this clearer in the near future and that our students will continue to benefit from taking Computing as one of their subjects.

It is early morning and I am in no hurry as I saunter along the concourse towards the large structure that is the stadium. It towers above its surroundings and blots out the hillside behind. It sits alone, out of place; a large grey stone in a field of green.

At this point we should thank our debating coaches for the time and guidance they gave their teams in preparing and transporting them to and from their debates.

Brendan Herder was the team leader and could always be relied on to prepare well and grasp the essentials of the debate. He was best speaker in five of the nine debates we had during the year. Evan Gwilliam had a competent season but his potential was affected by his desire to dominate in the second fifteen Rugby team. Evan was best when he was making an emotional plea-bargain in a debate and appealing for a decision from the moral high ground. Ed Cade had all the skills of a good third speaker. He was quick-witted and could concisely cut to the weaknesses of an opposing case. Ed's weakness was not lack of confidence but rather the opposite. He was very often inclined to fly by the seat of his pants to the detriment of consistency and logic. However, we wish to thank the premier debaters for their efforts and their guidance of the junior debaters and wish them well in their university studies.

A college team took part in the United Nations' Association role-play conference in Wellington. Tam Irvine represented Iraq and explained the hopes of the new country rising out of the ashes of war. James Law represented Italy and spoke of its concerns with terrorism and its hostages in Iraq. We learned about

Italy as a modern, highly technical society. David Meek represented Japan and in his speech described how Japan was concerned with its regional security. War crimes were another issue that concerned Japan. Te Honiana represented Pakistan which is making peace with India over Kashmir.

The Senior Prepared Speeches

There were ten entrants for the McLeod Cup and an interesting range of topics was covered in the speeches, ranging from current social problems to the lives of folk heroes and speeches of concern about developments in the future.

Tam Irvine gave a speech on the life of the musician Jim Morrison of "Light my fire" and "Riders in the Storm" song fame. He was a controversial performer of the 1960's but died prematurely in 1971. Sadly he did not bear his fame well and his life was spoiled by excess.

Robert Henderson spoke on Sir Bob Geldoff whose conscience was so stirred by the Ethiopian famine that he campaigned to raise money to help through his Live Aid concerts. He was nominated three times for the Nobel Peace Award and in his later years he campaigned to wipe out third world debt.

Michael Herder expressed much concern at the high incidence of violence against children in New Zealand. There have been many high profile murder cases. Using the deterrents model he spoke for harsher punishments instead of an easy life in prison for such criminals.

Daniel Rood entered the 'smacking debate' with the bill currently in Parliament to remove the 'reasonable force' provision allowing parents to corporally discipline children. The violence against children in our society is too big an issue not to remove the clause but some others argue that even mild discipline will leave parents vulnerable to prosecution.

Alex Scahill developed the theme of road safety when he examined the issue of using a cell phone while driving. Some countries and states in America do not allow this practice. It should not be allowed here.

Chris Tait entered the debate as to whether the Black Caps should tour Zimbabwe given the great violations of human rights taking place in that country at this time. There is every reason not to go but failure to tour could involve severe fines for not fulfilling the tour contract. Ultimately the cricket team did tour.

Evan Gwilliam gave a humorous speech on the problem of 'lateness' and the personal embarrassments it can cause. We should always prepare early for our enterprises whether it is going on a date or something more serious. This was a speech to which members of the audience could relate.

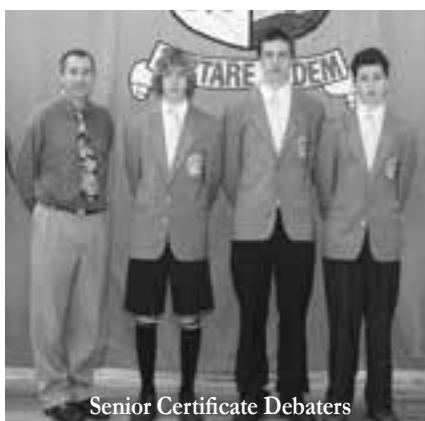

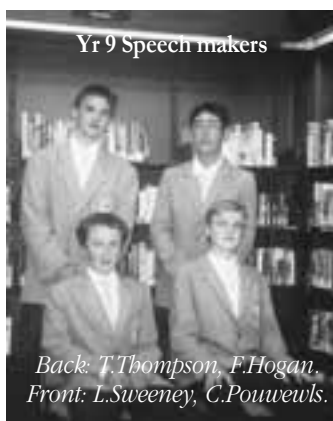
Dr Robin Fenwick adjudicated the orations and spoke of the necessary factors for a good oration: message, sincerity, pause and gesture among many others.

The O'Shea Shield 2005

This was the competition's sixtieth year and we learned a little of the history of the event. Interesting articles appeared in the local Masterton newspapers. The competition started from an initiative by the North Island Federated Catholic Clubs whose executive was based in Masterton. The idea was adopted, a shield was donated and Archbishop O'Shea of Wellington agreed to give his name to the event. He attended many of the early competitions.

In 1946 the categories consisted of elocution, prepared debate, oratory, religious questions, impromptu speaking, scripture and religious drama. It is still much the same except for the inclusion of a junior speech category. In the modern period each event is a competition in its own right and participants are marked on a scale of one to six. These points amass with the college gaining the highest number of points being awarded the O'Shea Shield.

Masterton turned on a mild sunny morning for the teams. We assembled at Chancel College for a well organized powhiri in the college hall. After the welcome we proceeded to the debating. We were pitted against our namesakes in Wellington on the topic that, "Religious Education has a place in all New Zealand schools".

Affirming the topic St Pat's argued that the innate value of a course that puts a human face on education was good. People are more than material beings. RE applies to the values and spiritual side of human life. Stream arguing the negative returned to the definition of RE. Was it Christian only? Of course not but if it was just a broad based social and cultural subject then it was redundant as many such values exist in the curriculum already. This was a very exciting and close debate between two experienced and able teams.

The adjudicator, Noeleen Hannan, gave the debate by one point to Town mainly on the basis of a little more humour. This debate was awarded the top debate in the competition and the Silverstream team was awarded the trophy for the best negative team.

Liam Sweeney was our Junior Prepared Speaker and he delivered a well crafted speech in defence of "the play station generation". He said that the hand-eye coordination and mental skills of the kids into computer games, were to be valued in a technical age.

Liam had his speech off by heart but unfortunately went over the six minute time limit and lost points and dropped a whole grade. Apart from that he had everything necessary for a junior speech in the way of presence and sincerity. He received a high merit mark.

The team scripture reader was Robert Henderson and the event took place in the small chapel on the college grounds. He read with accuracy and sincerity and was awarded a distinction grade. After this the team went down town to get a meal and join up with some of the rugby players coming up from Wellington after their game. The eating places were crowded as all

the other teams were doing the same thing.

The Drama section was held in the Town Hall and it provided an excellent venue for the event. There was a minor panic locating our drama props which arrived a little late at the venue. The theme was, "I am my brother's keeper" and was based around the events in the aftermath of a road accident when a rugby team was

travelling home after a game. The interactions and recriminations that took place among the injured was the core of the idea which was drafted by Mr Browne. Edward Watson, a student of English and Drama at Victoria rendered invaluable service in getting the drama up and running, and this within the time frame. The drama went very well and held the audience's attention as the human emotions were very real. Those in the drama were Thomas Watson, Te Honiana Ataria, Tam Irvine, Jarred Odom and Jamie Clarke. Jack Clarke did valuable work as the key person in the support crew.

The Religious Questions team presented on the Sunday morning and answered questions on the dogmatic theology of the Eucharist. The team consisted

The Impromptu Speaker was Evan Gwilliam who spoke last in his section on the topic, "Leaving home." This gave Evan an opportunity to talk about his mother and the support she had given to him in his life and how he will miss her when he finally leaves to go to university next year.

The oratory this year caused us some heartache as Keelan Law became ill just prior to the competition. The only person volunteering to take up the task at this stage was Tam Irvine. He achieved the feat of learning off an eight minute speech, adapting it to his own style

and delivering it with confidence, all in two days. The story was based around the school life of a sensitive boy in the challenging atmosphere of a large college. Tam received a well earned merit award.

The O'Shea Mass was held in the Town Hall. It was the Liturgy for Pentecost Sunday. As usual it was very well organized with well rehearsed music and had the theme, "Moving forward together in hope".

The team was billeted at Rathkeale College on the Saturday night in the section reserved for visiting sports teams. Out in the countryside there was no avenue for hijinks and the team talked and listened to music till late.

At the Award Ceremony we received some trophies but the O'Shea Shield was won for the third year in succession by St Patrick's, Wellington with Sacred Heart, Lower Hutt and Garin College, Nelson runners-up.

There was lots of sympathy but luckily the injuries were not too serious and the tramp proceeded. We made our way along the pylon track and emerged at Moonshine Road around mid-day. After lunch the groups set up their tents and then did some map and compass exercises learning about contours, physical features, grid references, bearings and back bearings. Then back to college on a very sunny afternoon.

Two weeks later, on Sunday morning, in fine conditions we left on the main Expedition into the Tararua Forest Park. We were dropped from the bus at Kaitoke and made our way up into the foothills. We had lunch at the bottom of the Marchant Ridge and then tramped down the Dobson's track to Smith's Creek Shelter. We then made our way up the Tauherenikau Valley where we established camp near the site of the Tutawai swing bridge. After tea some groups lit fires and sat around gossiping till ten in the evening.

Next day we tramped up the river bed after leaving two boys to guard the campsite.

Some leaped into a deep blue pool for a swim but soon a misty rain driven by a brisk southerly wind began forcing a change of plan from exploring Bull Mound Stream. We went up the river to Cone Flats and after lunch on the bank we walked to see Cone Hut which was built in 1946 from adzed slabs of local native timber.

It was then we noticed how much the river had risen and the noise it was making.

We made our way down the track worried about whether we would be able to cross to reach our campsite.

Eventually after a search for suitable crossing points we managed to cross the waist deep river but not without some anxious moments. Some of the boys showed exemplary leadership and strength. The change in the river had been an object lesson on how quickly mountain rivers can rise. That night some camp groups were rowdy and had to be brought to order.

Next day we tramped out, a trip that challenged some of the group. The bus was a welcome sight at the bottom of the track and after getting heavy packs into the bus, tired bodies crashed into the luxury of the seats. A vote of thanks was passed to the tramp leadership: Mr Watson and Thomas Watson and Mr Boyle.

On the basis of camp-site behaviour, group co-operation and camp site organisation, the group led by Richard Law was judged the top group.

The Bronze award certificate and medal were presented by Mr Watson at the Junior Prize-Giving. Interest in the award remains high at Silverstream and already a large number have expressed interest in undertaking the Challenge next year.

Two thousand and five was another great year for the Library.

Six hundred and two new books were added during the year of which 373 were non fiction and 229 were fiction. The collection is building up nicely now that the security system has stemmed the tide of losses. In fact, the shelves are full and we will need to extend the shelving next year. It subscribed to several new magazines including Wacky, a magazine with odd facts and figures, Performance Car for the many car enthusiasts, Reader's Digest and NZ Musician.

On the computer front, the Library bought two new opacs with flat slim line screens which take up much less room and are much more visually appealing. The computers in the Library have been well used with the boys having access to many databases via the Library website. Parents' and Friends' Association generously paid the subscription cost for this year's access to "Encyclopaedia Britannica Online" which has been invaluable for research.

The Library has taken part in the ongoing professional development within the College and has been using techniques such as "Think, Pair, Share" when taking Library information literacy classes. And new posters on thinking skills have sprung up on the

walls. Other professional development included the Librarian attending the School Libraries' Association Conference in Auckland in July and several other library meetings. The Librarian demonstrated the Library website and the online resources to interested teachers after school one afternoon and during the year we had an ERO visit so all manuals and documentation got updated and amazingly the stackroom was cleared of junk.

During the year, the librarian entered a photo competition for library architecture. St Patrick's College Library was one of twelve photos selected for publication (and the only school library to be selected) in a national calendar on library architecture. (See photo page 12).

The Library has been a magnet to all on wet and windy lunchtimes and was also well used even when the sun was shining. It also featured as a set for filming of a children's mystery film and was used over the summer holidays as part of a Buddhist retreat. The Library hosted many after school meetings for groups planning trips, hockey meetings and debates.

The Library assistants attended to circulation duties at interval and lunchtime, and shelving on the odd occasion! Many thanks to all who helped.

ATHLETICS' REPORT

The athletics season of 2005 was always going to be challenging for us. Our year thirteen "super-stars" from 2004 had gone and we ended the year losing the Neville Shield to Town. As well, the 2004 Nationals had not thrown up any new talent. In spite of this, we did have a strong contingent of fifteen to twenty athletes who turned up three times a week throughout the summer holidays. They were extremely well led by Keelan Law who earned the captaincy for 2005. Keelan's support of the coaches and concern for the summer training squad was most impressive. His catch cry at training, "McEvedy in twenty-eight days, boys!" When school started in the new year, Keelan addressed the whole school in an inspirational, from-the-heart speech. From that moment on we were, once again, ready to take on the world.

The Old Boys' Cup

This year the Old Boys' Cup was held at Stream. This was expected to be more an indicator of what Town had to offer, rather than what we could do. We knew where our weaknesses lay. Would Town's desire to get the Old Boys' Cup and ultimately McEvedy take them past us? We knew they had an awesome sprint team and we were concerned. On the flip side we had a revitalised Brett Piggott back in action after a two year injury break and a determined new arrival to the Stream senior throwing ranks in Matt Luamanu. As usual the sprints started the day with the U14 200m. They flashed by – Town, Town, Johnny Kemp and Sam Robinson. This was expected as they had two Year 10 guys down an age group who were very good. The U15 race rolled around the bend and Mandella Nono announced his arrival at the forefront of sprinting with a slick first place, with great support from our converted middle distance man Sam Biggs who took fourth. The Town hope, Kelly, took an easy win in the next 200m but Stream took the next three placings meaning his impact

was negated. In the U17 race Andrew Olivier showed his class with first, followed by two more Streamers. Town got some points back in the senior race with their other gun, Nyel, cleaning up. They did have great sprinters but our depth held them back and the 200's ended with twenty-five points each. This really was a huge moral victory as we knew our middle-distance team would dominate and our Field team would hold its own. Sure enough, the summer training showed its worth with a fifteen to five win in the 3000m – three Streamers scoring in each grade with Richard Williams taking out the tactical senior race from "Quax" Brannigan and Sam Maloney taking fourth behind Pigou and Cooper in the Junior race to get points in his first outing for the school. The field events were proving to be very even, as was the case last year.





Town had strength in the jumps and the damage was mounting in those events. Town took three wins in the Long Jump but Andrew Olivier showed his value to the school with a win in the U17 grade as did Brett Piggott in the senior grade. Distances were not worth mentioning – the effect of not having an all-weather surface at school. We again took two wins in the Triple Jump but Town showed good depth to thump us thirty-three to seventeen overall. In the High Jump the trouble worsened with all five grades won by Town and a thirty-four to sixteen win. We had been blown away in the jumps by a well drilled and confident Town team that earned themselves ninety-five points to our fifty-five – a huge concern. The shot-put was not much better, but was notable for the first points earned for the school by Luamanu who took the U17 win with 14.70m and for a tie for first between two streamers in the U15 grade – Falesiu and Lealofi both recording 12.02m. In the discus, Thomas Key led the way with an U16 win of 40.39m – only a week after being hit square on the temple by a wayward discus during training. Luamanu and Keelan Law took first and second with 37.95m and 37.42m in the U17 grade and Brendan Herder, the Head Boy, contributed with a fine 37.46m for second in the senior grade. Kemp took the U14 throw with 34.34m and we won this event overall by twenty-six to twenty-four – great stuff and testimony to the hard work put in by the throwers. In the javelin we broke back impressively with great wins in all five grades. Matthew Johnstone led the way with a nice 53.90m, supported by Luamanu U17 with 43.12m, Peter Moll U16 with 44.28m, George Fainga'a U15 with 41.72m and Corey Casey U14 with 35.71m. We also scored four second placings as well. This gave us a thirty-six to fourteen win. By the end of the day however Town had done severe damage in the jumps and we were not able to make this up in the throws – an ominous sign for McEvedy.

Back on the track however it was a different story,

if not a repeat of the last few years. In spite of their best efforts our strength on the track saw a dominance of all remaining events bar one, the Hurdles. The 800m was completely dominated by Stream, with Casey, Fitzgerald, Millynn and McPadden winning their grades with style. Simon Millynn took the fastest time overall with 2min 8.12secs in the U16 grade. Four titles were taken in the 1500m as well with Alex Scahill's 4min 32secs in the U17 grade the best of the day. In the 400's the Stream team took a thirty-two to eighteen win with Jacob McCann outstanding in taking an U17 win in 54.6secs, his best result for the team in a while. The only down side to these performances was the realisation our seniors did not have any lightning quick men and this would be a problem in the next competition. The 100's showed an improvement over the 2004 loss as we won this twenty-seven to twenty-three. However, the times again were not super-slick, with the U16 man from Town taking the fastest time of the day, 11.31secs. Town clearly had faith in their sprint team and this was enhanced with a twenty-eight to twenty-two win to them in the Hurdles, taking four titles in all. Rory Davidson showed fine form to take our single title in the U16 grade, with 14.55secs for the 100 Hurdles. The relays were more a disappointment for Town than great for us as they had one team disqualified and narrow losses in the other grades.

Stream won by forty-two points, as compared to the seventy-three point win of 2004. It was a bit disconcerting, but it was a confirmation of the rising strength of Town. We had a few problems and they were surfacing. The senior track team did lack lightning speed and was likely to struggle in spite of their best efforts. The Field points total was our lowest in the last four years. On the other hand, we did have strength in the Junior grades and huge talent as well. Would they balance the known fallibilities? Time would tell.

McEvedy Shield 2005 “Impossible is Nothing”

Here we go again – Wellington College (Coll) the holders, us the challengers, with Town much more confident than in previous years. The Junior 3000m kicked off the day and Rongotai took first, Town second and Coll third and fourth – no points for us. The Rongotai runner was well known to us – a very talented middle distance man. They also had other talented athletes and were in a position to cause damage – they certainly started well. The 200m was next up and Town really came to the fore – they won one title and took the twelve points to Coll’s thirteen – we got nine points with Nono a very fine second in 24.6secs, Sam Robinson and Johnny Kemp second and third in the U14 spots with 24.9secs given to both and Brett Piggott fourth in the senior grade in 23.7secs. Our lack of lightning speed was evident but we were fighting. The senior 3000m then followed and Coll was one with Rongotai two – then Stream taking three and four, thanks to Brannigan and Williams who ran with true Stream spirit in the hardest race of the day.

The 800’s that followed gave us a boost as we placed well in all grades, unfortunately though, behind Coll apart from the U14 race won convincingly by Casey in 2min 10.6secs. Coll got twenty-one points here and we got fourteen. It was evident that we were going to struggle to stay with Coll and we had an even bigger battle looming against Town. The field events had been proceeding with the shot-put being another great event for Town – they were only a point behind Coll. Johnny Kemp, Greg Lealofi and Matt Luamanu gained points for Stream but that was it. The discus was a very even event with eleven points for Coll, Town and us. Ernest Ulrich made his mark for Stream with second in the U15 grade throwing 41.99m, with Charlie Falesiu backing him up with 40.35m for third. Hitchman gained points in the U14 grade as did Thomas Key who was second in the U16 grade. Keelan Law, the team captain, made his own contribution with fourth in the senior event throwing 40.20m. This was a great reward for a great Streamer – well done Keesh. In the javelin, our traditionally strong event, we resumed our challenge with awesome leadership by example from Matt Johnstone for the second year and, this time, Matt

Luamanu who took first and second with 58.96m and 54.86m respectively. This was a best performance for Matt J and was in fact the last time he threw the javelin for Stream as arm injuries meant he didn’t continue past this event. It was a fitting performance for a hugely talented athlete who would have made a fine decathlete with his all-round ability. George Fainga’a showed his big-match temperament with a win in the U15 grade with 39.92m while Kyle Hitchman came from nowhere to reach 39.35m and win the U14 grade. We ended this event with sixteen points to Coll’s five and Town’s six.

Lunchtime came and we were neck and neck with Town, Coll having a handy lead already. Rongotai was losing ground in spite of some talented performers taking big points. Hurdles time – and it proved to be just the tonic we needed. A strong event can restore a team and in this event one school got sixteen points – Stream. Awesome performances by Lifo Savea, Matt Johnstone, Rory Davidson, Luke Faulkner, Sam Robinson and Johnny Kemp – what depth. Unfortunately Town got seventeen points as the two of us shut out Coll and Rongotai. It meant we stayed battling Town. Back at the field the trend of the late morning continued with three schools fairly even in the High, Long and Triple jumps. Unlike 2004, which saw us gather a disastrous ten points over all three, we held our own. This was achieved by greater efforts in training from this group and they could feel proud of their improvements. Only one Stream athlete took a title in these events – Mandella Nono with 12.01m in the U15 triple jump. The points were gathered by Stream guys who just did the hard yards and held their heads up to get points. Stand-outs were Andrew Olivier who ended his Stream career at McEvedy with a fine 12.55m and second in the senior triple jump, Brett Piggott who gained points in the triple, long and high jumps to back up his fourth in the 200m and Jared Wilson in the U14 grade who took second with 10.68m. Back on the track it was all Stream and Coll. The 100’s saw Town re-emerge as their sprinters gave them a seventeen point gain to our five, gathered in by Andrew Millynn who came a gutsy fourth in 11.7secs in the senior 100m and Nono with the same place in the U15 grade.





Johnny Kemp continued his fine day with second in 12.2 in his grade. The 400m events were awesome for us in our McEvedy title years. This year we did ok but were beaten by Coll. It really showed how hard it is to win McEvedy if the killer punch cannot be thrown in a sprint event. Coll took three titles. We took one, courtesy of a great 57.7secs run by Sam Robinson in the U14 grade. Sam Biggs ran a gutsy second in 55.4secs in the U15 grade, just in front of Dion Fitzgerald. Town scored only four points in this event and we felt we had them beaten. The 1500's were our last chance this year to consolidate our position. Casey led us well with a clear win in the U14 grade in 4min 31secs. James Charlesworth ran well to get second in the U15 grade with 4min 33secs behind the Rongotai gun. The next grade saw no points for us, while Alex Scahill gained us fourth in the senior race with 4min 29secs. We lost the 15's to Town by one point and to Coll by seven. It wasn't pretty. Town had a sniff of catching us while Coll was well clear.

The relays were now crucial for us and Town. We won the U14 race in 49.4secs but that was it. Town took the senior race. The team and management

waited anxiously for the final points and it was with great relief we ended up 5.5 points clear of Town – they had performed very well and they knew how close they had come to taking us down. Meanwhile Coll had won – again.

We had lost some ground in the track but had improved in the Field. This was necessary after the 2004 result. Town had been the big mover overall and had taken points from Coll. On the other hand Rongotai made no overall move but must be ready to explode as they find some depth to back up their talent.

The analysis here suggests that Coll is weak in the junior grades with Town and us looking strong and Rongotai absolutely on fire in the U15 grade. It will certainly be interesting in 2006 as it would still appear the dominance of Coll in the U16 grade will continue. As always, the U14 athletes will have a huge influence on McEvedy and may truly be the deciding factor as to who holds the shield high. And, isn't this exactly what is so great about McEvedy – every age, every athlete contributes. "Let's go, Stream", in the words of Keesh.





The NZ Secondary Schools' Athletics Champs

These champs were held in Auckland at Ericsson Stadium. We had a team of twenty-seven well trained and talented athletes in attendance. With such a large group we have focussed this year on the top performers from the team, not forgetting that each and every member contributed with his effort and preparation in the months preceding.

Top Eight Performances

The Junior 4x100m team. We had won the title last year and the pressure was on the team of 2005 to at least gain a medal. Two had been in the '04 team, Mandella and Sam. The boys comfortably qualified in the heats and set a handy time despite some sloppy changes. The final was tense with two false starts. Johnny K kept his cool and led off strongly around the curve. A perfect change to Mandella saw us take the lead on the back straight. Another good change to Sam saw him fly around the last curve and hand on smoothly to Danny. Danny had very little experience at this level but showed no sign of this as he pinned his ears back and set his eyes on the line ahead. The chasers made no impact on the two metres he had and the boys won in a school record time of 46.02secs.

Gold Medal – Johnny Kemp, Mandella Nono, Sam Robinson, Danny McIlwee

Corey Casey arrived at the meeting from the Australasian U14 champs in Melbourne a week or two prior. He had run extremely well there, setting new school records for the junior 3000m (9mins 31.83secs) and the U14 800m (1min 58.19secs) – both Silver medal performances. At these champs he came up against an equally promising athlete, one year older than himself, from Nelson. In the final Corey played all his cards but couldn't match his older rival. Still, he took the Silver medal with another great time of 1min 59secs.



Mandella Nono This guy absolutely exploded onto the national scene. He looked the part in his early rounds in the 100m and took a deserved Bronze in the final, after setting a new school record in the semi of 11.62secs. He was cruelly robbed of a probable medal in the 200m when he accidentally stepped out of his lane in the semi as he rounded the bend. Mandella took this in his stride and went on to feature in both relay teams.

Junior 4x400m

This was a very strong team. They had some very talented middle distance runners and sprinters. After three gutsy laps, Mandella was given the baton to finish for us. He was up against the junior 400m gold medallist and gave a huge effort to hold the lead gained by Sam, Corey and Dion until the final 50m. The boys were still pleased to have taken the Silver and almost take the school record set by our legendary stars who helped take McEvedy a few years before.

Result

Silver medal; time, 3min 37.09secs; team – Sam Robinson, Dion Fitzgerald, Corey Casey, Mandella Nono.

Honourable Mention

Dion Fitzgerald took fourth in the Junior 800m, being pipped for the Bronze in the last ten metres after running a personal best and school record of 2min 00.32secs. He couldn't have done much more and was given some reward when his strong effort in the 4x400m relay helped the team to a Silver medal. Charlie Falesiu took fifth in the Junior discus with a 43m throw with the 1.25kg disc. Charlie suffered a bit from lack of experience but managed to get himself into the top eight against a good field. He can go better yet.

Neville Shield 2005

This event, held in the last week of the year marks the beginning of our 2006 season. It is a great warm-up for us and Town. This year it happened once again just before the NZ Secondary School Champs, so many of our athletes were wary of over-extending themselves on the day but worked hard anyway

The Shield came home in style.

Some great involvement from the Year 9 athletes in the Field events saw us clean up Town on this occasion – they were simply blown away. Our junior team is beginning to look very good. Well done, guys – the Shield came home in style.



Epilogue

Summary: the Champs and Athletics 2005

It was the last time for two of our Year 13 athletes who had contributed much in their five years at Stream – Keelan Law and Shaun Brannigan. Both had fully embraced the spirit that drives athletes at Stream to be the best they can be and were superb team men. Both had also struggled at senior level to gain the glory that sometimes rewards effort, although Keelan did make the top eight at these champs in his favourite event, the discus, while Shaun had the consolation of having run well in the winter and made a conscious effort at these champs to enjoy his final race for Stream – thus taking the lead in the 3000m final for almost two laps. It was a real shame that more seniors couldn't make the champs in their last year, particularly Matthew Johnstone who had led the throwers in the school in the last three years by example. The strong showing by many of our Juniors at the Nationals, in spite of not making finals, was an encouraging sign, coming on top of the emergence of some talent at the Neville Shield. Also encouraging was the spread of coaching responsibility amongst the staff, with Adrian Armstrong (High Jump), Peter Hicks (Long and Triple Jumps) and Mike O'Leary (Javelin) making these events their own. Things are looking good. How good? Don't know yet.

National Champs – Wanganui

Over the weekend of the seventeenth of June the Cross-Country team competed at the NZ Champs, held at Wanganui Collegiate School. The course traversed the school's undulating back fields, used by the school for golf practice. The day was perfect for running, steady drizzle, no wind and firm under-foot. The year nine team took part to develop runners for the future as withdrawals in the weeks prior to the event meant they could not field their A team. In retrospect this may have been a mistake as the boys had not the required training behind them and, apart from the first three, were not at the standard of previous Stream year nine teams. Matthew Deng showed the desired promise with our best performance of seventy-fourth placing in the field of 214, closely followed by Caleb Owczarek and Lachlan Donnelly.

In the senior race of 234 runners Shaun Brannigan 35th, Richard Williams 55th and Alex Scahill 56th performed superbly to take tenth in the three-man team event – our best three-man senior result in a very

competitive grade – heading off schools such as Shirley Boys', Tauranga Boys', Rongotai, King's College and St Kentigern's. The remaining team members found the six km a challenge and their conditioning let them down – a lesson for the next few years.

The under sixteen team was our big hope for the champs – they had won all local events this winter and had set their sights on going one better than their fourth place of last year in year nine. Success, however, at the very top level, is certainly never guaranteed in sport regardless of the amount of work put in by any team or individual. In any event, if a goal is really worth attacking it must also be accepted by those involved that it will be elusive and may not be reached. For the under sixteens the goal was set high – to emulate the title-winning junior team of 2001. On this day their fate was sealed in the first 200 metres. A mass sprint of the field of 187 aiming for pole position through a narrow five metre wide gap onto the course proper decided the race. Corey Casey came out of the first 500 metres and into the first of the hills on the shoulder of the leader, with James Charlesworth and Ryan Maguren back in the forties and the rest of the team in the next fifty. With no immediate back-up to Corey it was already looking a huge challenge and as the race progressed, in spite of James and Ryan moving up, the gap created in the initial sprint was not breached. The team achieved fourth place once again. While this was extremely disappointing for all, in retrospect the team's placing ahead of the top team of last year, Auckland Grammar, and the defeat of such schools as Palmerston North Boys', New Plymouth Boys', Tauranga Boys', Napier Boys' and many more, was impressive. The character of the boys in this team will see them setting their sights on senior teams' titles in the next few years as they move up the grades. Corey Casey combines under 65A Rugby commitments with his running and while this did affect his ability to stay with the leaders over the second half of the race, he showed tremendous spirit and determination to overcome the pain of extreme competition. His final placing was well deserved. Corey achieved fifth in the NZ Junior Boys' Cross-Country race of 2005.

Cahill Trophy 2005

Raced over two and a half kilometres, this event signalled our final warm-up for the Australian trip. The event was held around the old CIT campus at Trentham. We were never threatened in any grade, despite Town being

St Pat's Silverstream at the Australian Cross-Country Champs

In late 2004, team management discussed the possibility of taking our dedicated runners on tour overseas. The discussion led on to a plan to attend the Australian Champs where we could test ourselves against the best Aussies and also reward the huge efforts put in by the boys on behalf of the school. We organised a trip also to the Gold Coast – rest and recreation – plus a visit to a top school in Brisbane, St Joseph's, Nudgee, the school that old boy Dan Keating (year nine 2004) was attending. The following is the report given at assembly.

A team of fifteen boys, mostly from St Pat's, Silverstream, arrived back in NZ on Thursday last week after an eight day tour in Australia. The purpose of the trip was to give the boys a taste of top international competition and this certainly was achieved with the Australian Champs held in twenty-two degree heat (extremely demanding) in Adelaide. Athletes in Australia all qualify from their state champs and therefore, all were very strong.

The top performers for the team in the under sixteen grade were: Corey Casey, Ryan Maguren and Dion Fitzgerald; they were followed in by Jesse Patel, Evan Cooper, Sam Maloney, Adam Hunt and James Charlesworth. Corey Casey came thirtieth out of the seventy-six competitors after being with the lead group over the first half of the race; Ryan Maguren was forty-second and Dion Fitzgerald came in at forty-eighth.

In the senior under eighteen race Shaun Brannigan led our team in (forty-fourth in 21:19) followed by Richard Williams (fifty-ninth in 21:42). Alex Scahill, Patrick Bourke and Simon Millynn followed soon after. The field numbered ninety-six and the strength of the runners was evident in the times of the first ten place-getters – all running under twenty minutes for the six kilometres, compared to the NZ Champs where only around three would achieve similar times.

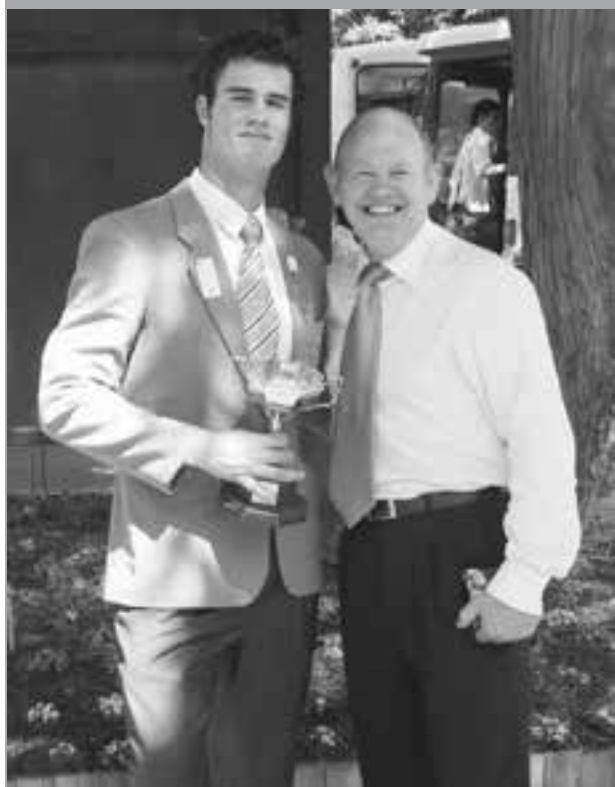

The team then raced a few days later against the St Joseph's Nudgee middle-distance team in a four by one kilometre relay on that school's all-weather track. The A team from St Pat's managed to show good depth, overtaking the Nudgee A team in the middle of the race after St Joe's first runner, a talented 1min 51 second 800m athlete who recently came eighth in the World Youth Champs in Morocco, gave them a handy ten second lead. This was a great victory for the boys against a top-ranked Queensland College. This was a great finish to an excellent trip and set the scene for the planned return trip to Australia in 2007. The team was a credit to the school throughout the eight days and the bonds developed with Nudgee by students and staff will hopefully see more interaction in the near future with this prestigious college.

The Australian trip was awesome. In retrospect it was a little too long and the competition was too elitist with most runners from Australia having qualified from State Champs. We will go again, but plan to make a trip to the Victorian State Champs where the fields will contain a range of runners, including all the top performers, as this state is the strongest in Australia. Thanks to the parents who supported our fundraising so well and in particular to Karen Casey who did a lot of work on our air travel.

And so ended our cross-country season. The trip to Australia had been well worthwhile and we look forward to a repeat in 2007. Commitment amongst the boys has been terrific and special mention must be made here of the contribution from Shaun "Quax" Brannigan who developed into a fine runner over his time at Stream and an awesome leader of the younger guys by example and attitude. We look forward to hearing more of Shaun as he develops the strength required to overcome his current lack in basic speed.





Rugby Report – 2005

The 2005 season was another successful year for rugby at Silverstream. Fourteen sides took the field each Saturday; this made us the biggest rugby college in the Wellington region. The under 65A's won the championship while the under 75A's and under 15 Open B's both made their respective grade finals. This year we entered two under 15 open teams in the competition with both teams performing well. It is hoped that this grade will provide a developmental pathway for these players into the 1st XV and the 2nd XV.

There were many highlights of the season, but the following need mention:

A 16% increase in the number of registered players from 2004. We registered 342 players which is 53% of the college roll and made us the biggest rugby college in the region.

The under 65A's retained the Ina Hansen trophy. This team only lost one game during the season and was well lead by their captain Chris Tait and coached by Phil Bennett and Stuart Bruce.

The under 15 Open B's made their grade final and were very well coached and organised by Tony and Mark Brockie.

In addition the under 75 A's made their final and were narrowly beaten by Wellington College. This team was well coached by Russell Poole and Pat Coffey.

Specialist training was provided by Chris Stirling – the CCO of Wainuiomata – and Chris Boyd the Wellington Lions NPC assistant coach.

The introduction of two under 15 open teams – the first time since 1996. This grade caters for the boys of this age and weight. A few of these players have developed well in this grade and will push for higher honours in 2006.

A rugby/sports quiz was held in March as a way of raising money for the 1st XV development team to tour Australia. This was well supported and a good time was had by all.

John Kendall – the Wellington Rugby Football Union referee developmental officer provided a theoretical and practical referee course to some of our players.

The under 15 open team participated in the North Island Under 15 Catholic tournament hosted by Francis Douglas Memorial College in New Plymouth. The team played four games and won two with Cameron Hake being voted as the Silverstream player of the tournament.

Stream hosted the Foyle and Londonderry College team from Northern Island. Even though the results were one sided with the 1st XV winning 78-0 and the 2nd XV winning 46-6, a good time was had by the players and the management.

The 2nd XV and the under 15 open team travelled to Hato Paora College for traditional fixtures. Our under 15 team won 30-19, while our 2nd XV lost narrowly to their 1st XV by 13-19.

Sir Geoff Pinglesby was forty years of age when he was knighted. He is a man of great knowledge and has achieved many things in his life. His contribution to society was enough for him to gain the Queen's recognition. Intelligence, courage and determination are just a few of this wise man's many qualities. Over the years, he built quite a name for himself, not just in his hometown of Wellington, but around the world as well. 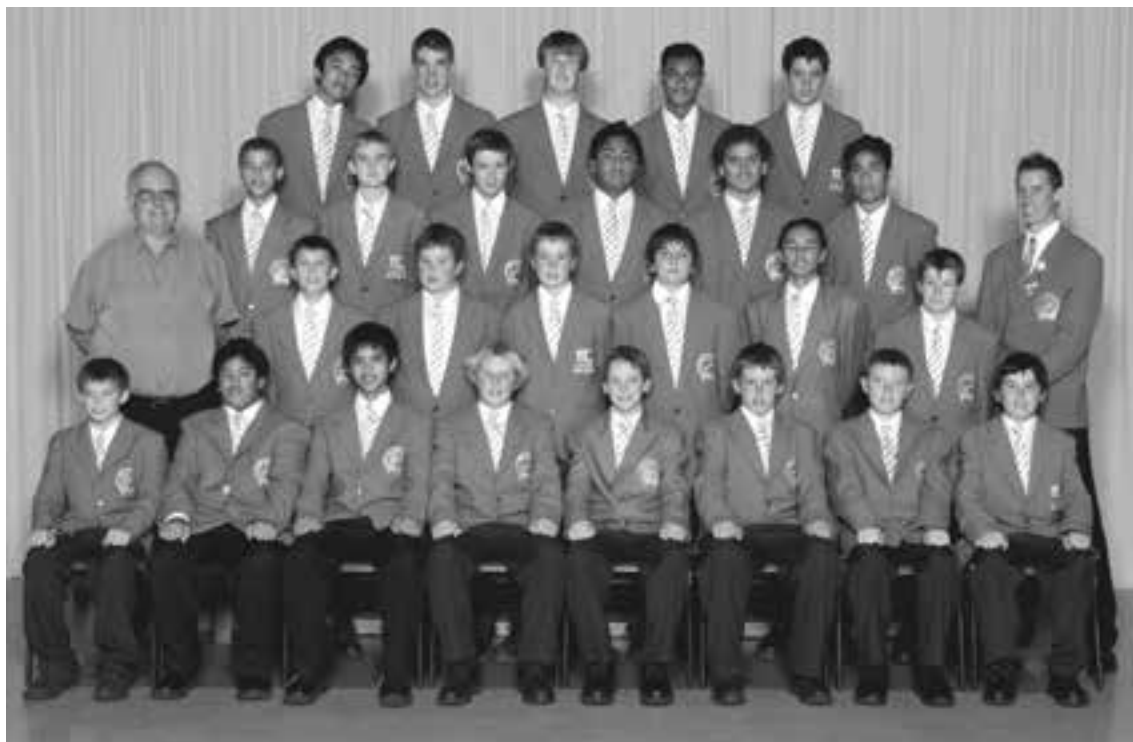

His favourite subject, above all, was science. He graduated with honours and a diploma in medicine before moving to America.

Geoff had proved his intelligence by gaining top marks in the Mensa Science Test. The United States Government noticed his skills and offered him a job he could not refuse – to work at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington D.C. This is where he resides to this very day continuing his research in the field of medicine. His studies led him to the discovery of a certain formula which later proved to completely cure cancer – a lifetime of achievement.

Sir Geoff is unsure of his future although he is on track for many more breakthroughs with his scientific work. 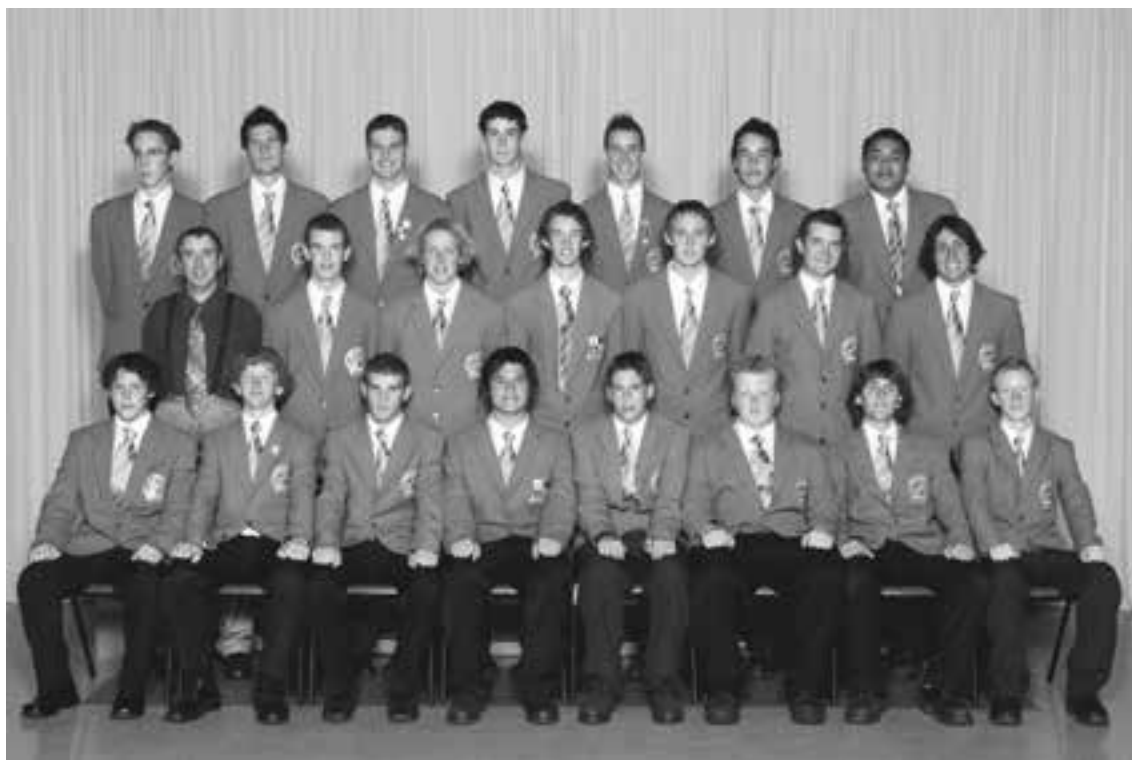
