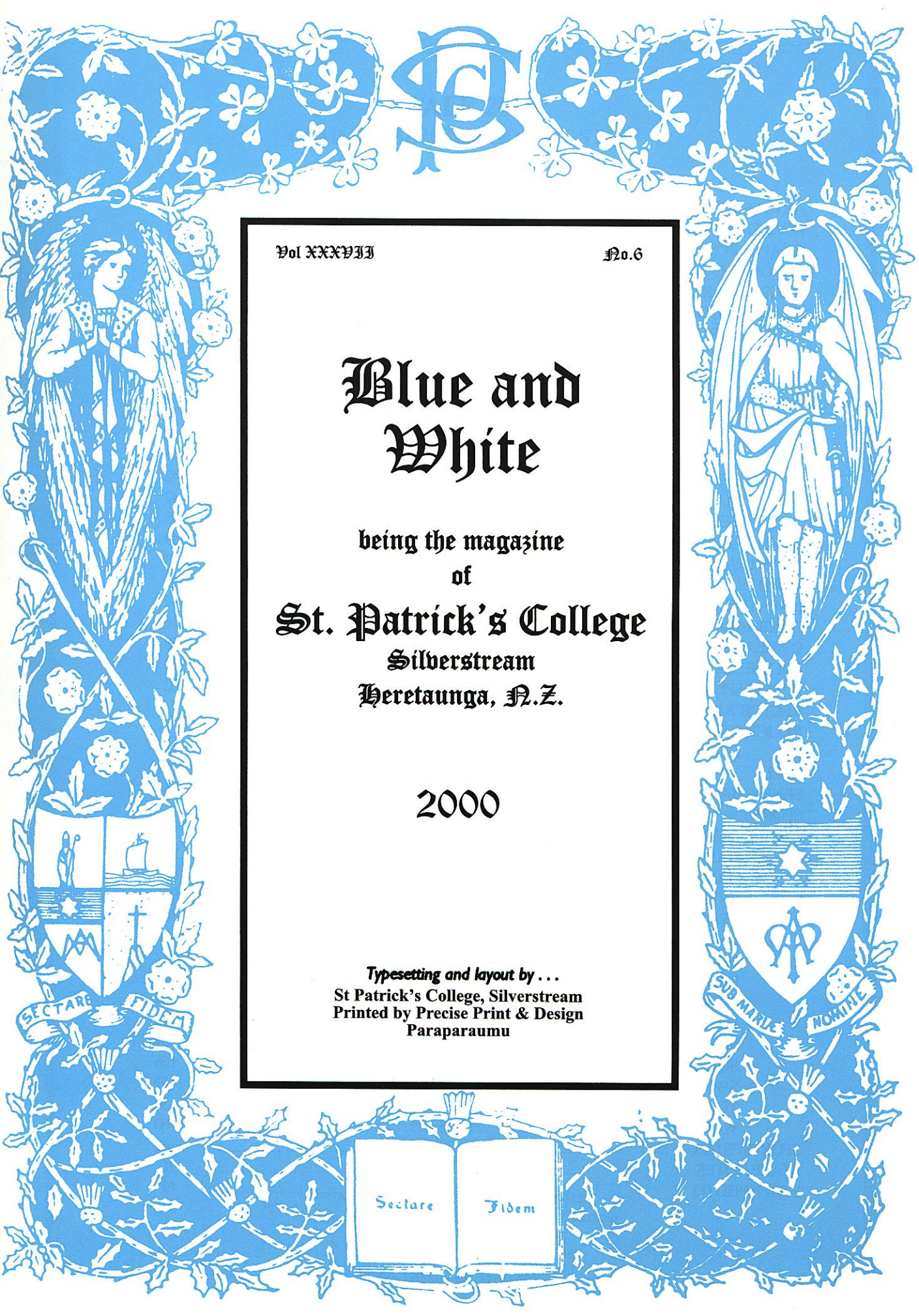

RECTOR'S REPORT

In the Sporting area you wanted to:

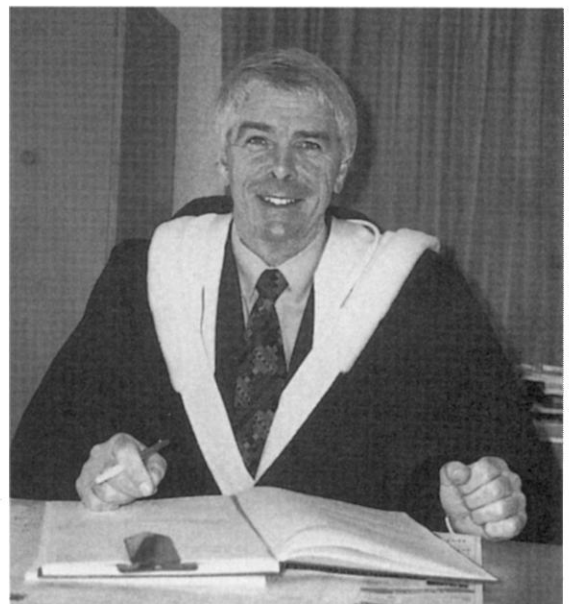

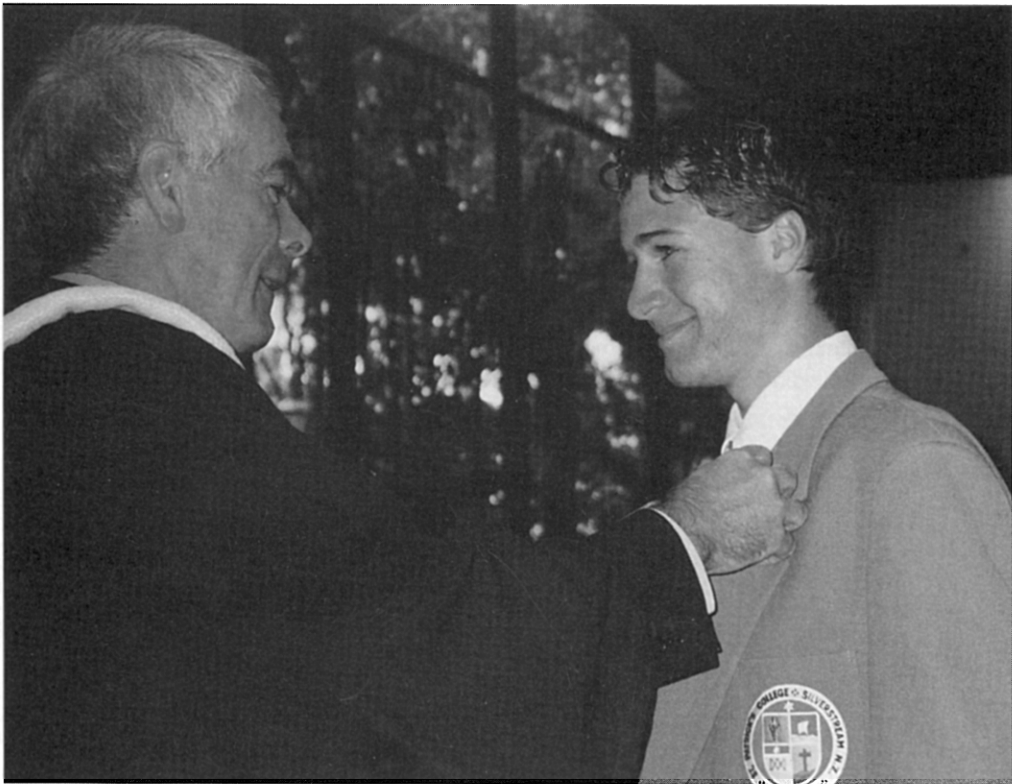
So you see what you’ve done?

Some men see things as they are and say why? Silverstreamers must dream things that should have been and say "why not?"

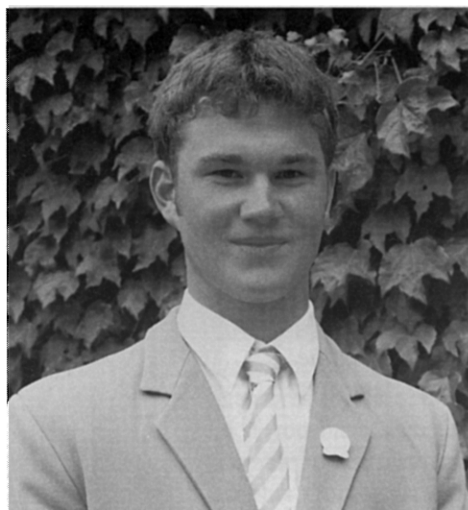
HEAD PREFECT'S ADDRESS

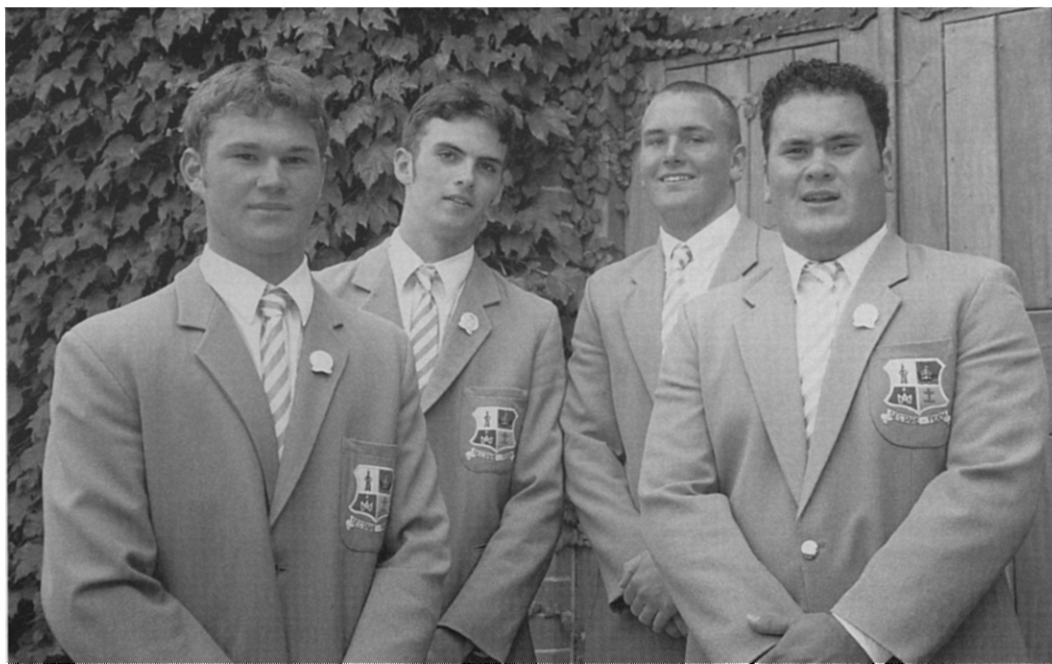
Head Prefect Matthew Egan

BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT



St Patrick's College Silverstream Board of Trustees Annual Report 2000

My last and third son Matthew completes his year 13 education this year and I will not be standing for the Board in the 2001 Board of Trustees elections. With this in mind, in my final report as the Chair I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you to the College community and staff for the education and life experiences given to my three sons. As a parent I wanted the best for my sons and my involvement in the running of the College was my way of contributing to this fine institution. My sons have challenged the system and have been challenged in turn and each has been their own person for better or worse. If they have chosen to develop their talents they have had the opportunity to do so. They all speak highly of their time at St Pat's and have developed life long friendships. As with most students they have had to face peer pressure, the desire to be part of the 'cool set' and the need to be accepted. I as a parent have had the duty of setting bounds, bounds that will be pushed but bounds that are essential for teenagers in a world where so many are self focused and the responsibility towards others is diminishing. If the College can say farewell to its students and see them leave as a self-confident person who has respect for them self and others and with balanced academic and social skills then we as parents and a college have succeeded.

This report covers the Special Character and six National Administration Guidelines (NAG) that the College operates under.

Special Character

This has been the last year for a Marist Community presence in the College. The priests who have lived on site will be moving to another locality. Fr. Mark Walls the College Chaplain moves onto Palmerston North to look after youth in the district. Once again Fr. Mark Walls has enthused the students and challenged their Christian values and attitudes towards others in the community. The liturgies of the Year 13 Liturgy Group are something that the boys look forward to each week as they contain a message that identifies with the lives the students live. Again, this year non Catholic students elected to take the Sacraments.

Mr Brown the Music Department Head has been appointed to lead the Religious Education Department in 2001. This will be a challenging task and the support of the College community will be needed.

NAG 1 - Curriculum

The new NCEA (National Certificate of Education Achievement) introduction has placed additional pressure on staff in the development of new schemes of work and evaluation. In some instances the review process has been an endorsement of existing systems while in other areas it has meant a refocus. There is some scepticism about NCEA but as with all change only time will tell. Whatever the outcome there is a need for an

education system that meets the needs of students and which produces an output that industry and employers can benchmark against.

The Government initiative of “Closing the Gaps” where disadvantaged students are given recognition and their needs addressed requires the College to continually assess if the needs of all students are being met. This is not an easy task and the necessary resources are limited.

The daily reading programme continues but the results of the initiative will take time to be fully realised.

With the demands on staff and the strong emphasis at the College to offer students a wide range of activities, a part time sports co-ordinator will be appointed in 2001.

Examination results for 2000 were reasonable but still leave room for improvement.

NAG 2 - Documentation and Self Review

The 2000 Annual Plan was partially achieved and those activities not realised will be rolled into the 2001 plan. The rolling five year College self-review is now part of the management cycle and its effectiveness will be measured by future Education Review Office (ERO) reviews.

The College is continually reviewing its operation and as part of this process the College is developing a combined Policy and Procedure manual. This manual will detail Board policy and set out the procedures put in place by management for the enactment of policy and the rules for the operation of the College.

Policy is reviewed on an ongoing basis and this year the policy “Prevention & Reporting of Child Abuse” was reviewed and updated. The Board sees a need for reporting and taking action to safe guard any student in danger from internal and external factors.

The Board is reviewing the College drug policy and is concerned with the Government push to decriminalise marijuana. The Board is proposing to introduce a minimum tolerance policy on drug use and detection in the College.

It is disappointing that nothing of substance came out of the 1999/2000 review of Catholic Education in the Hutt Valley. There is continued capital funding allocations to schools from the Catholic Education Management Board but unfortunately the lack of a vision and a strategic plan beyond bricks and mortar means possibly the most effective use is not being made of a scarce funding resource.

NAG 3 - Employer Responsibilities (Personnel)

David Leavy has put in place a succession plan for senior management. This will see management skilled for advancement and trained to stand in for each other, for short or long absences.

The Board has seen an increasing turn over of staff, which unfortunately is inevitable when you have good staff looking for advancement. A review of staff turnover has been undertaken showing a staff turnover profile of 4, 8 and 18 for 1997, 1998 and 1999. By far, the majority of staff turnover was due to staff moving for promotion.

The Board is always looking at ways of developing the staff so that there is a strong teaching team who will provide the best education possible for the students. This year the Board has approved a policy that gives funding assistance to staff for tertiary education where this is related to their work or the needs of the College.

Flu vaccinations were again offered this year to the staff free of charge.

As part of the relationship and governance role of the Board with the Rector the Board Chair meets fortnightly with the Rector between Board meetings.

NAG 4 - Finance and Property Management

During the year the Property Committee oversaw the refurbishment of the gymnasium and installation of a new toilet block, which was a problem identified by the Student Representative on the board.

Further upgrading has been undertaken on the staff room facilities with an air conditioning unit being installed. Facilities are still inadequate; there is insufficient workspace, and what is available is impractical as it is part of the open plan staff room, which is a meeting and time out place for the staff. The poor roof design of the staff room continues to be an annoyance due to there being no sound proofing, making the room unusable when there is heavy rain.

It is with relief that I can report that the ventilation problem of the computer suite has been attended to thanks to the property grant from the Catholic Education Management Board.

The grounds’ maintenance for the College had been outsourced in 1999 but the firm which was providing the service no longer has a presence in the North Island. This function has been brought back in house under the watchful eye of Mr Paul Robinson the College’s Plant and Property Manager.

The Finance Committee continues to oversee management of the College finances. The MUSAC accounting package has been upgraded from a DOS based system to windows enabled software.

The financial state of the College shows a working capital balance of \$210,505.00. The deficit against budget while not looking good is due to the Board approving the expenditure of accumulated funds on extra ordinary capital needs. This additional expenditure was approved so that students would

receive the benefits of College funds in the time they are at the College. Additional expenditure included \$80,000 for miscellaneous capital for College and Department needs, \$40,143.00 for repainting the College, \$26,000 for fibre optic cabling throughout the College with a contribution of \$11,000 from the Catholic Education Board, \$3,300 for the Christine Bear & Associates survey. The Finance Committee is thanked for the management of the College funds that brought about this additional funding.

At the beginning of the year the College received a \$62,000 top up from Government funding as part of catch up funding for those schools which did not receive the additional funding associated with bulk finding.

The College has moved from Telecom to Saturn for its telecommunication needs, this decision was based on better tariffs offered by Saturn.

The College has extended the computerised electricity management system to include a similar energy management system for the gas fired boilers. A Government grant of \$30,000 was obtained for this initiative and will be paid off from energy savings. In addition to the grant each Board contributed \$2,750 to the project.

The Silverstream College Parents and Friends Association have been very strong this year under the Chair of Angela Offord. The Parents and Friends have funded a number of projects including \$15,000 for new chairs for the auditorium, \$2,000 for new Religious Education text books, a CD for the Commerce Department and other miscellaneous needs. Angela is pleased to announce that there is a healthy balance in their accounts for 2001. To parents who wish to assist the College and put something back into the College the Parents and Friends are always looking for keen and willing helpers.

The Foundation Trust for the College is in place and the College is seeking Trustees to managed the Trust. The potential of the Trust is huge.

As a special project David Leavy has obtained \$70,000 through special fund raising for an extension to the Sports Pavilion. The work on the extension of the pavilion will commence in 2001.

With the move of Marist Community there is now surplus accommodation in the brick Dowling Block. David Leavy in 2001 is to undertake a review of this surplus accommodation to determine if any part of this non-integrated accommodation can be better utilised. The day school College needs additional accommodation for technology classrooms, a student common room, a Marae and staff work rooms.

NAG 5 - Health and Safety

Prior to Bruce Stevenson the Deputy Rector of Discipline and Pastoral Care moving to a new position as the headmaster at St

Thomas of Canterbury, Christchurch, he finalised the disaster recovery plan for the College. Thank you for this, I hope we do not need to use the plan.

The new discipline management system delegated more responsibility to teaching staff and the associated reporting and documentation process has worked well this year. There is a clear record of student behaviour and those students who move outside the bounds of acceptable conduct have no excuse because they are aware of any record that is kept on them.

During the year there were 657 "College Detentions", 49 students "stood down" & 12 "suspensions". The new system of awarding stand-downs to students as a cooling off periods before more formal discipline is taken has not been the success the Government had hoped. The College is to review the stand down system and look to other methods of managing student behaviour as some students see stand down as a soft option.

The lowering of the drinking age has given students easier access to alcohol and this will be an on going area needing constant attention by parents. Students are experimenting with alcohol and guidelines and parent supervision will be a continuing factor in the development of students.

The College used an external agency, Christine Bear & Associates (CBA) to survey student behaviour, attitudes to varying aspects of College, home and community life, pressures on students, attitudes to study, time allocation and nutrition habits. The response from students to the survey was high with 539 students responding out of a College roll of 650. This survey has provided the College with data that it can use to better understand barriers to learning and the thinking of students. The information will be used to improve student learning and programmes offered by the College.

At the beginning of the College year another bullying survey was conducted with the results showing a continuing downward trend in offending. Bullying still exists and ongoing programmes to combat it still need to continue. The College does not accept bullying and offenders will be subject to College discipline or, if the circumstances warrant, referral to the police.

NAG 6 - Administration

The Board co-opted one parent representative, Terry Hughes and the Proprietor appointed two replacement members, David Becker and Bob Noble-Beasley. Maori representation is still lacking on the Board which is a concern that has not been adequately resolved.

A new College prospectus has been printed and is provided to new entrants and for use in seeking boarding students.

COLLEGE TRUST BOARD REPORT

The final withdrawal of the Marist Community in December 2000 marked the end of some 70 years of residence at the College. This event does not mean the end of a Marist presence at the College as the Society has direct representation on the Trust Board and also appoints people to the Board of Trustees.

What it does mean, however, is that the lay College Communities are taking over the task of maintaining the Special Character of the College. The Trust Board has the legal obligation to the Government to preserve and enhance the Special Character and the Board has been very pleased and grateful to see the ways the College communities have responded to this challenge.

I thank the members of the Trust Board for their work during the year. The last 5 years have seen capital expenditure at the College of more than \$2 million as areas of deferred maintenance have been tackled. This work has been funded by the sale of assets. We have ended the 20th Century with the buildings and services in good order to meet the opportunities that lie ahead. Future challenges will be no less exciting than those of the past 70 years.

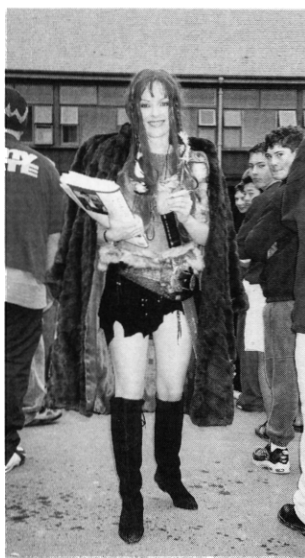
WELCOMES

Andrew Watterson joined the Silverstream staff in January 2000. As an old boy of the College, Andrew began his teaching career at Rathkeale in the Wairarapa in 1993 and subsequently taught in inner-city London for three and a half years. 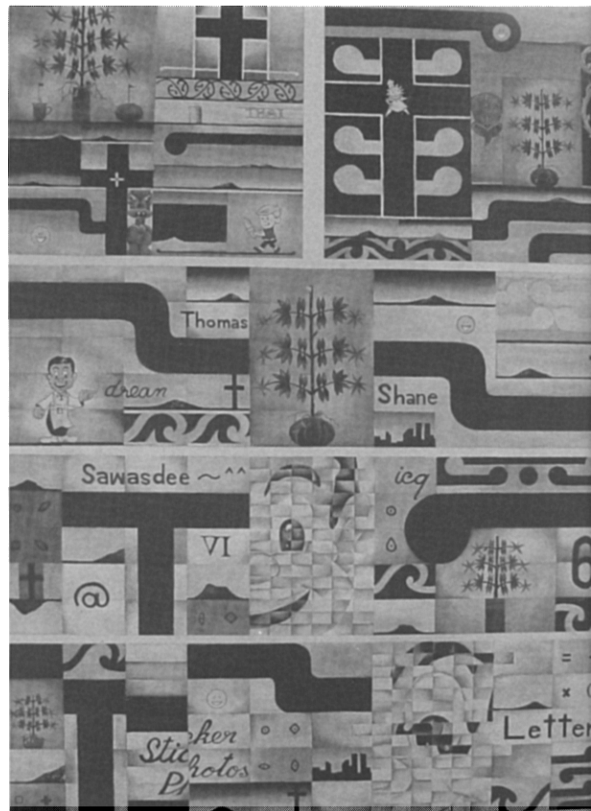

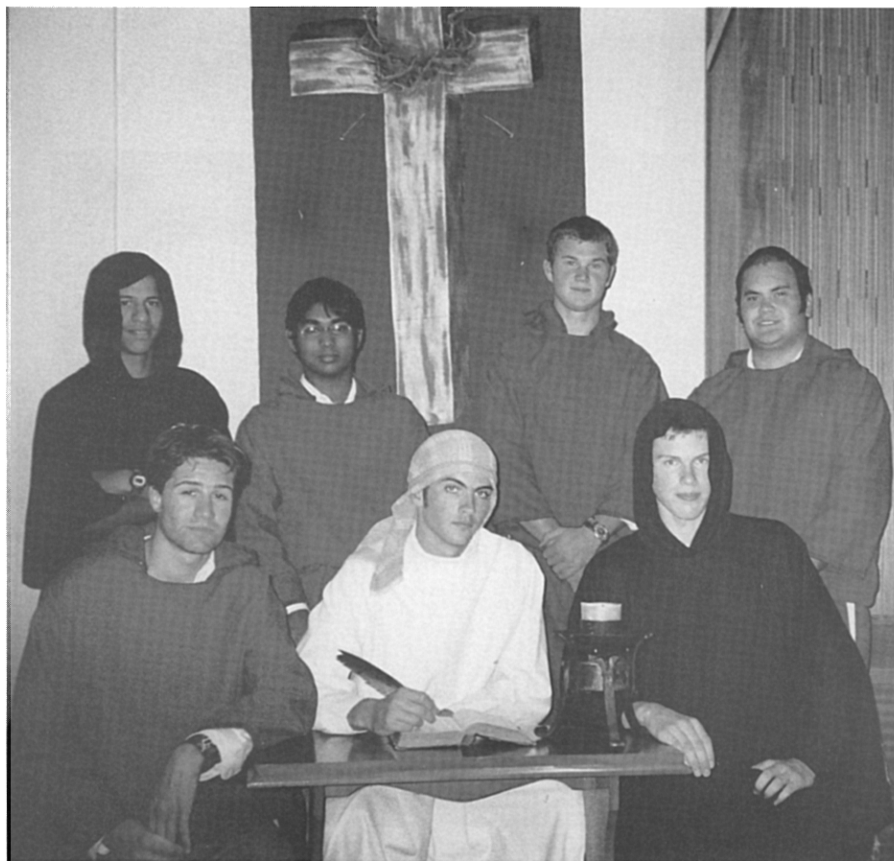
CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

The theme of the year, set by Mr Leavy, was **Be Realistic: Ask the Impossible**. The chronicle of successes for the year is recorded elsewhere, but it must be stated here that the spirit of the College continued to be very strong, and the leadership from the Head Prefect, Matthew Egan, and his Deputies, Matthew Anderson, Joseph Ritchie and Ryan Runciman, was outstanding. They were realistic, and they did often ask the impossible, both of themselves and those they served, and success beyond our dreams was the result.

Thirty students from various levels made further personal commitment to their faith in the Sacrament of Confirmation, a celebration led by Bishop John Dew in late June. Then, much later in the year, a further fourteen students received Sacraments of Initiation. It is certainly a sign of strength and growth in the College when students, of their own accord, choose Baptism, First Eucharist and Confirmation as their way of stepping forward in their faith.

The major charity initiative of this year was the preparation for, and funding of, nine refugee students from the South Sudan, and one from Eritrea. Their families arrived in the Upper Hutt area in March and we were able to provide schooling and extra help for those of secondary school age and above. It has definitely been a learning experience for both parties, and there have been concessions on both sides, but the young men are happy and relishing the chance to learn after so many years

spent in refugee camps. It is our privilege to have them at Silverstream and a great opportunity to show Christianity in action.

Finally, the year 2000 sees the end of seventy years of involvement by the Marist Fathers at Silverstream. There is a certain sadness for us Marists as we leave something we have valued and enjoyed, but there is also a sense of satisfaction and hope for the future as we leave the College in capable hands. There are staff members imbued with the Marist spirit, and the spirit in the College is strong. Silverstream continues to be a College where the Catholic Faith is taught well, and is upheld and nurtured. It is time for us to hand over what we have treasured to the local Church, and we do so with great confidence and hope. Ad multos annos!

COMPUTING

2000 was a momentous year in its own way. On the surface, very little had changed, but underneath, there was a lot going on. The major changes were in our network infrastructure. New cabling and hardware was being installed, bringing the network up to the current business standard. Optic fibre was laid to provide a high-speed backbone so that multimedia data could be transferred at high speed, and high-speed hubs and switches were installed to make sure that our new network had the capability of reaching the whole campus.

Once this was complete, the servers were upgraded during the Christmas vacation so that 2001 can start with the latest hardware and software.

The second major development was the improvement in the College's Internet connection. The old dial-up connection has been replaced with a cable modem, allowing up to 40 times as much data to be transferred. The installation of the latest Internet Security server software in March 2001 will complete this, giving us a safe and secure, as well as highly reliable, connection that will permit the Internet to be accessed from anywhere on the campus.

The College's web site has been something of a problem. We have contracted it out to be redeveloped professionally, but the existing site was accidentally erased before the new one could be put on line. We have relocated temporarily for now, but we are investigating the best way to provide high quality Internet and Intranet web services to students, staff, parents and our wider community. There will be more information about this in newsletters during 2001.

The scheduled replacement of the computers in Room 5 completes the picture, with the old ones being refurbished and redistributed to other parts of the College. This will allow more students to work with computers within their subject areas.

The courseware has changed as well. During 2000, the existing Unit Standards were extensively rewritten, and the resulting changes to the courses we offer will, in time, make them both more appealing, more useful and more flexible. It will not be too long before a student will be able to tailor the entire three-year course to suit his needs.

The staff also did not escape unscathed. In 2000, we joined the Upper Hutt schools in a regional Professional Development cluster for ICT. The coming three years will see extensive training provided both in and out of the classroom, resulting in more opportunities for students.

Onsite support has been enhanced by the employment of a technician, starting at three days per week, and hoping to expand to a full-time position. This will also extend the range of services we offer.

All this is not without significant cost. The department extends its sincere thanks to the Board and the Parents and Friends for their continued and valuable support. The upgrade to our system cost over \$90,000 and much of that was provided by local fundraising. Without this support, we would not be able to enjoy the facilities we have.

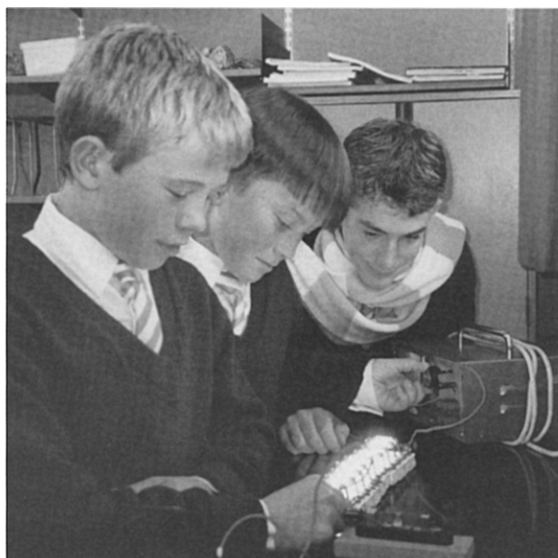
LEARNING SUPPORT

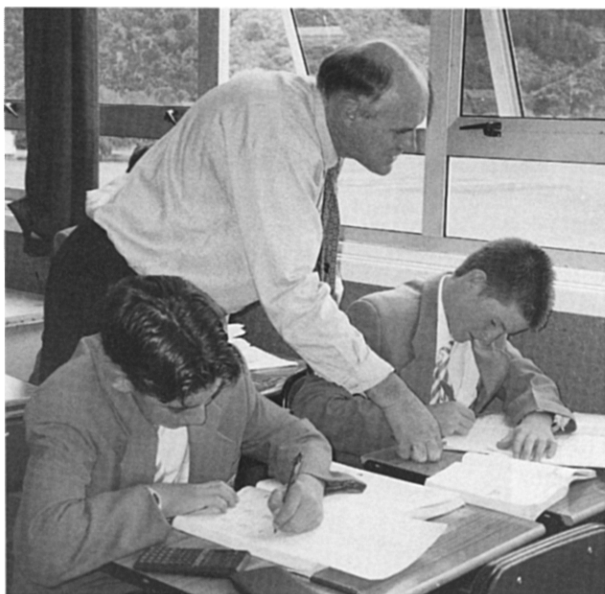

Fr Mark has made a tremendous impact on the religious life of the College and his departure with the other Marists at the end of 2000 marks the end of an era.

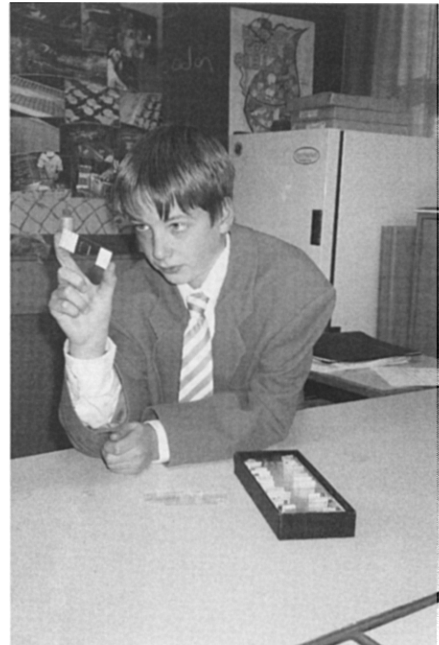

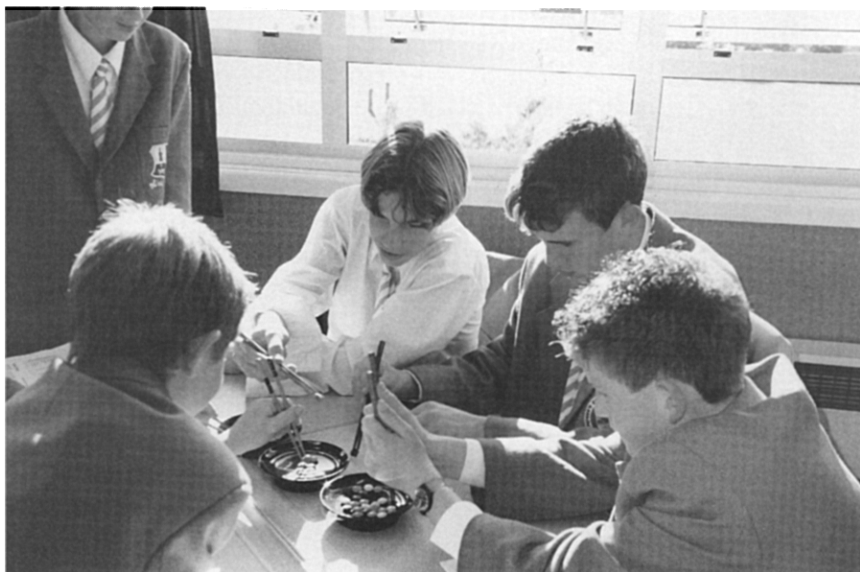

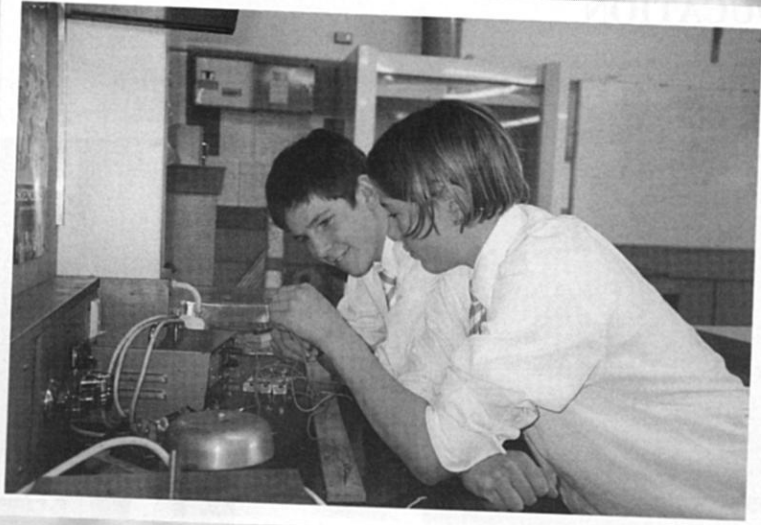

KAPAHAKA GROUP

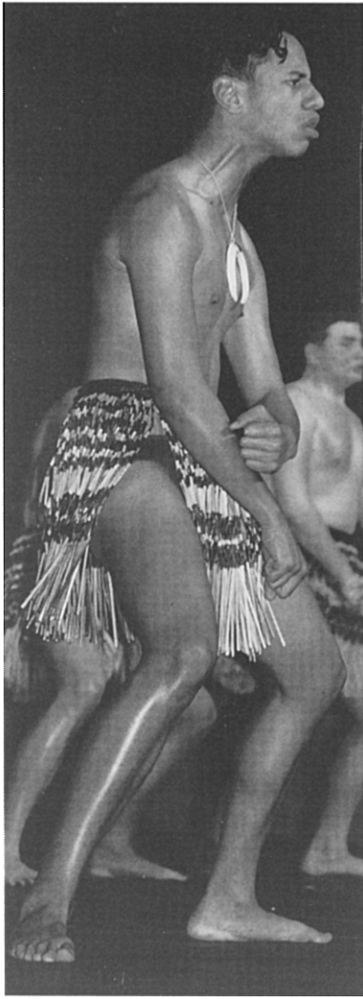

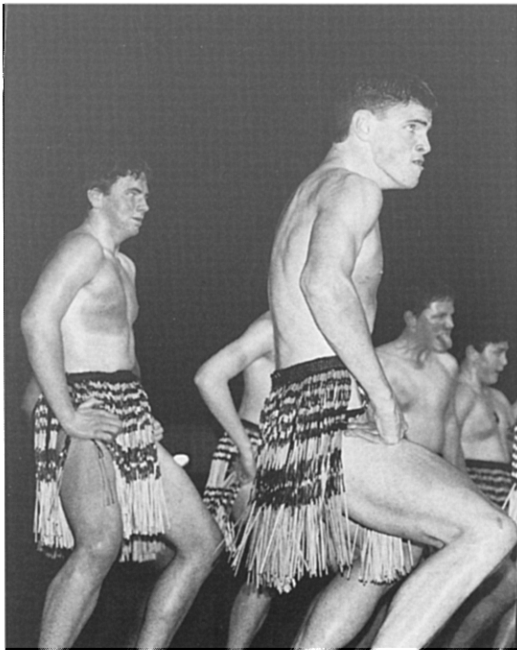

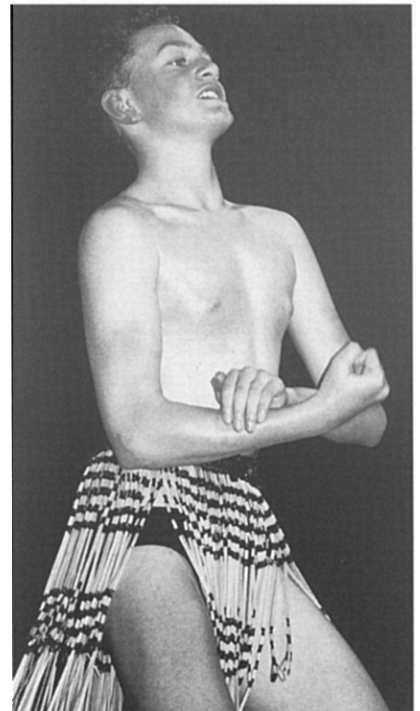

THE BONZE AWARD TRAMP

Sunday 26 November. Yes!! My prayers have been answered. It was a nice sunny day for the start of our tramp. We arrived for kit inspection and before long we were on the bus heading for the entrance to the Tararua Forest Park. We picked up Mr O'Leary in Upper Hutt on the way. This was the easy part. Before long we were dropped off and the bus disappeared down the road. It was time to beat the feet. Over-laden packs on our backs we set off in a rush up the hill: this isn't too back I thought to myself not realising what was to come. Mr Boyle gleefully informed us that this hill is called the "Puffer" and we soon found out why. The hard work had begun but it got a little easier as the body warmed up.

After about 40 minutes of up hill work, our very tired bodies collapsed at the top of the hill for a well earned rest. We could see the whole of the Hutt Valley spread out below.

Mr Boyle looking none the worse for the uphill slog then told us that the track was easier from then on. Yeah, right, I thought. I've heard that before somewhere. But surprise, surprise, it was. The track was deeply rutted and wound its way through some beech forest with the sun shining through in shafts of light. The whole group began to string out along the track: a very slow group brought up the rear.

Our lunch time stop was at the remains of the old Dobson's Hut. Some rather squashed sandwiches carried all the way from home and a bit more scroggin did the job. Lunch over, the whole party started down the track through the bush to Smith's Creek. At times a track was very steep and it was hard to keep balance with the heavy pack. However by this time I was getting used to the pack and my new boots were holding up well, no blisters yet.

We had a welcome rest here on the riverbank some of the party hopped into the river for a swim. When the slow group at last arrived we set off up the Valley using a well defined if in places very muddy track. After about two and a half-hours we reached our camp site in a manuka covered bank just near the wire bridge. Tents were pitched, fire started and some interesting looking meals produced by aspiring chefs – mum's cooking wasn't too bad compared to this. The sky was totally clear and it became very cold when the sun disappeared behind the hills. Many got into bed about 9pm as we were promised an early start next morning. Getting to sleep proved a bit difficult on the hard ground for some especially with the animal noises coming from some tents. Mr Boyle soon sorted things out though with his "I didn't bring you up here to have fun - go to sleep".

Next morning sleepy people emerged about 7.30 from the tents. Some washed their faces in the river. The water was icy cold. Breakfast out of the way and shortly after 8am the party moved out after the briefing by the leaders. This time we made faster progress as we did not have heavy packs. Over the wire bridge and along the track to Tutawai Hut which was empty. A momentary scare occurred when it was realised that two of the party had walked on up the track instead of stopping at the hut. Lucky we had two fit Golds who took off after the strays: Andrew Campbell and Todd Eichbaum. Behind the hut the steep climb up Mt Reeves started. The party went well and it was interesting to see how the vegetation changed as we went up the hill. It took about two hours to reach the top which was bare with stunted wind damaged vegetation. On the top it was very windy and we could see the cloudy tops to the Main Ranges to the north. There was a wonderful view of the Wairarapa. Willie Jephson reckoned that he could see his mother hanging out the washing.

After lunch many of the party raced down the hill eager to get out of the cold wind. We reached the Hut and then headed off to Cone Flats. When we reached the grassy flats we found huge erosion by the river with large trees tumbled into the river. After half an hour of throwing stones against the high stony bank and a swim for some, we started the long track back to the camp site before the day was over. Tea eaten many went to bed. At dusk very strong wind gusts threatened to blow us all away.

The final day brought rain and more rain. The fun had now gone and we were looking forward to getting on that bus. We had a through clean-up of the camp site and eradicated all fire sites. We reached Smith's Creeks about mid day and Mr Boyle and "Sarge" decided to do some gorging and river crossing down the Tauherenikau Gorge for about 40 minutes. "Link arms and off you go". "Sarge" thought he was back in Vietnam – "rifles above your heads boys" as we went through a deep gorge with thick bush rising about us. Back and forth we went until it was time to retrace our steps.

It was still raining but we were glad to be on the last stage home. The track was difficult as there were huge wash-outs and there did not seem to be a track. Down the "puffer" and what a sight. The bus was there, engine running. It was good to get the pack off my back, sit down and rest my weary legs. Richard Wharton made a speech to the tramp leaders and before long we were motoring back to Silverstream. I was looking forward to a nice hot shower, some hot food and perhaps a bit of kip not necessarily in that order. I had really enjoyed the experience of "roughing" it for three days however I was very glad to get home and the comforts of civilization again.

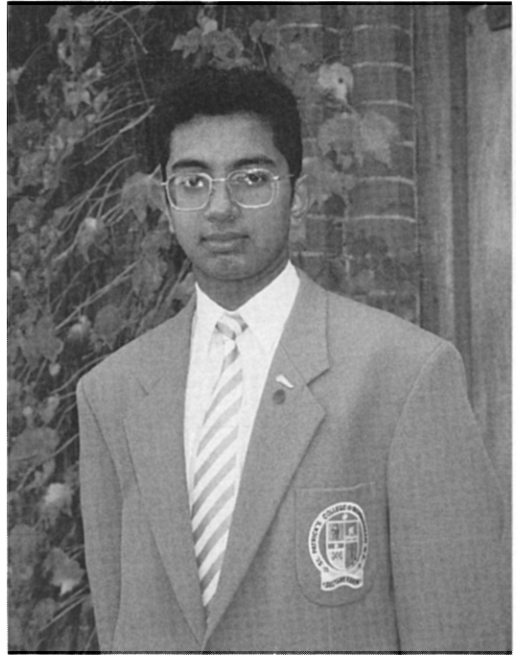

PUBLIC SPEAKING

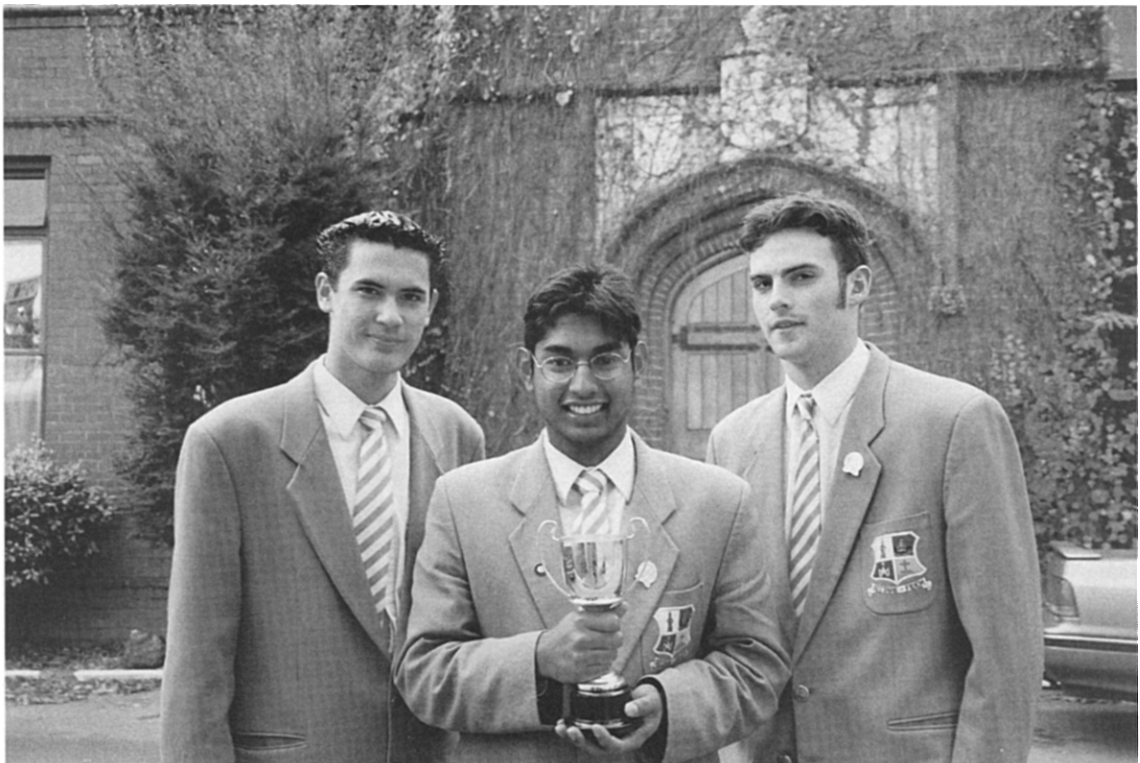

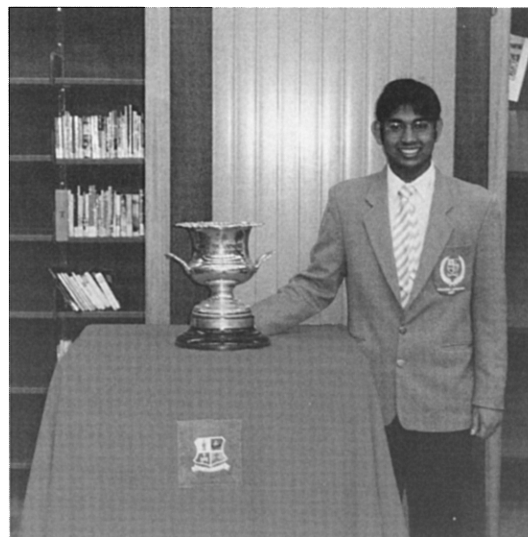

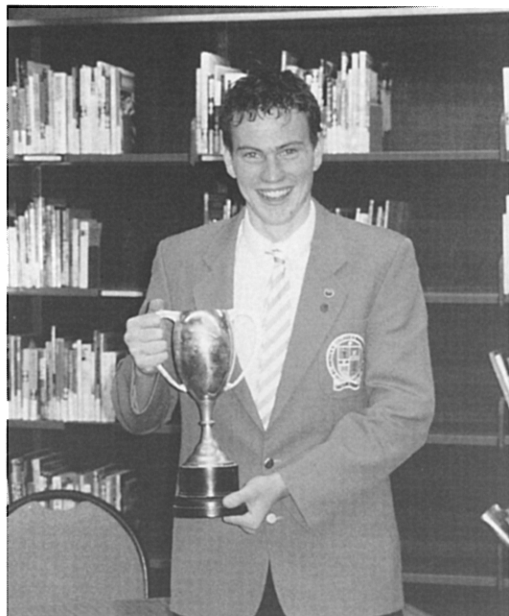

THE COLLEGE ORATORY CONTESTS

Five students entered the Intermediate Oratory Cup and four entered the Gallagher Cup. Again this year initial interest did not always result in eventual delivery of an oration. Congratulations to those who did enter.

Justin Laing chose to speak on the Wellington Rugby captain Norm Hewitt. The speech was delivered without notes. He examined the effects that the professional game and public expectations had on the life and family of the players.

James Boyle showed how commercial forces exploited animals even to the point of cruelty. He described the artificial life of the animals in pig farms where they are placed in confining cages that restrict their movement. He advocated a free-range life for all animals.

Simon Basil-Jones gave a short speech on the Fijian situation currently in the news. It seems that the Army were supporting rebels who have overthrown an elected government. He examined the issue from both sides.

Stuart Hinkley choose a slightly unusual topic for an oration: the existence and role of the local library. His concern was the access to literature being denied to lower income people if local libraries were put under threat.

Hadyn Rattray led us through what he called one of the most alive moments of his life. He was sitting off Wellington harbour in a boat fishing with his family. The sun was setting behind the mountains of the South Island. His speech had colour and feeling.

All the speeches delivered were worthy of this traditional trophy.

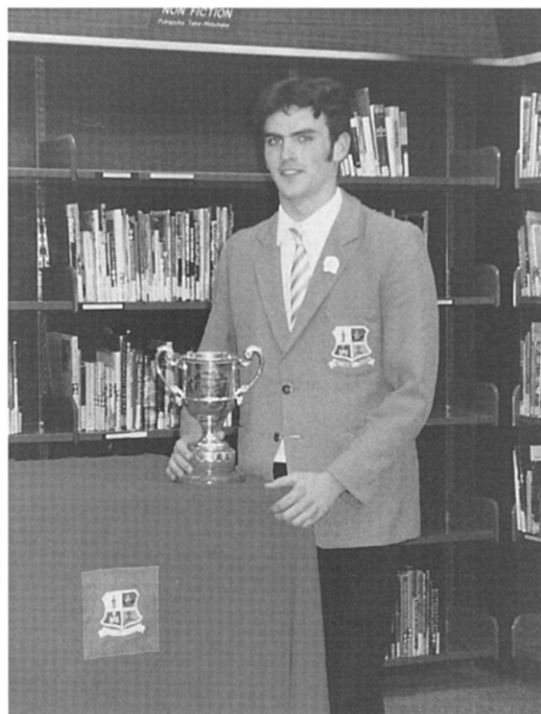
Matthew Anderson asked us to think about how we use life's gifts. Ian Thorpe the Olympic swimmer was visiting a young friend who was terminally ill and the speech centred on this relationship. Adversity can defeat us only if we allow it.

Andrew Beaumont based his speech on an incident of gratuitous violence on Foxton Beach where a young seal was brutally beaten to death. He reflected on the society that produces such people.

Brendan Moon chose as his subject the venerable figure of Mother Theresa who has given her life to work for the poor of India. Daily she gathered abandoned babies off the streets of Calcutta.

Daniel O'Neill spoke of the human domination of the animal world 'Our power is unchallenged'. Why then do we feel the need to attack weak and defenseless animals for sport?

Dr Robin Fenwich adjudicated and drew out attention to the salient aspects of oratory: the emotional power, the colour and images and the message. The Trophy for this year was awarded to Matthew Anderson.

THE SENIOR PREPARED SPEECHES

Entrants are asked to deliver a speech on a current issue or problem of recent times.

We had twelve entries and a wide range of topics were discussed.

Matthew Blundell chose to speak on the history and spirit of the College in this the final year of Marist presence. After five years the traditions of the old school 'seep into your bones'.

Daniel O'Neill entered the current debate about the legalization of cannabis which has been started by some Green MP's in parliament. He gave a balanced outline of the issues on both sides of the question.

Anthony Maher gave a most interesting speech on the landscape and the changing economy of the Wairarapa. It has changed from a pastoral sheep area to one based on wine and tourism and niche industries.

Philip Grace described from personal experience the pain associated with arthritis. Philip has had operations and now can enjoy freedom of movement to play that he never experienced before. He has been made a spokesperson for the Arthritis Foundation .

Andrew McCauley allowed himself the luxury of what he would do if he were Prime Minister. He saw the main challenge was to consult the people. He would get out and knock doors and speak to people on the streets about their concerns. High on the list for sorting out would be Student Loans.

Brooke Sullivan who has a natural interest in politics gave an analysis of how he sees the country has changed since the election of the Labour Alliance Coalition Government of Helen Clarke. The fall in the value of the NZ dollar is helping exporters and may help home production. Many radical social policies are planned by the new government.

Bede Cope also indulged in social analysis describing how society is changing at the turn of the Century. The world does not speak now of a nuclear war but religious and ethnic conflicts are very common. Green politics and instantaneous communications via the net were other features of the modern world. Moral issues such as euthanasia and genetic engineering were now being discussed. Religious belief is declining in western society.

Gregory Cole spoke as a member of the Upper Hutt Youth council. He hears the common complaint of boredom for the trouble local youth get themselves into. There are more things than ever organised but teen groups prefer to 'hang out' and make their own 'fun'.

Matthew Egan drew a parallel between the grey stormy waters of the Irish Sea and the troubled history of the relations between Britain and Ireland. The story of power and religion continues even to the present day as old memories and hatreds are stirred up annually during the marching season. Many people are hoping the Peace Accords will hold.

Matthew Anderson closely examined the paradoxes that exist in modern life. We enjoy the wealth and conveniences of modern life yet many long for the pristine values of the past. Modern life brings stress and new diseases.

Anthony McMahon was chosen to be one of a group of students to accompany the Prime Minister Helen Clarke to Gallipoli this year. He described the marvelous experience to visit the historic ANZAC Cove where major allied forces landed to try to capture the Gallipoli Peninsula from the the Turks.

Andrew Beaumont chose for his topic the current conflict on the West Coast between those who want to exploit the native beech forests in "a sustainable way" and those who want stop all native logging despite the loss of jobs involved. The government wants to stop the logging and introduce a compensation payment to be spent on new lines of development.

Todd Beaumont commented on the recent Sydney Olympics "the best games ever". He showed how striving to be the best was the ideal of the founder of the modern games, Baron Pierre de Coubertin. His dream was that the games would end international rivalries and religious tensions.

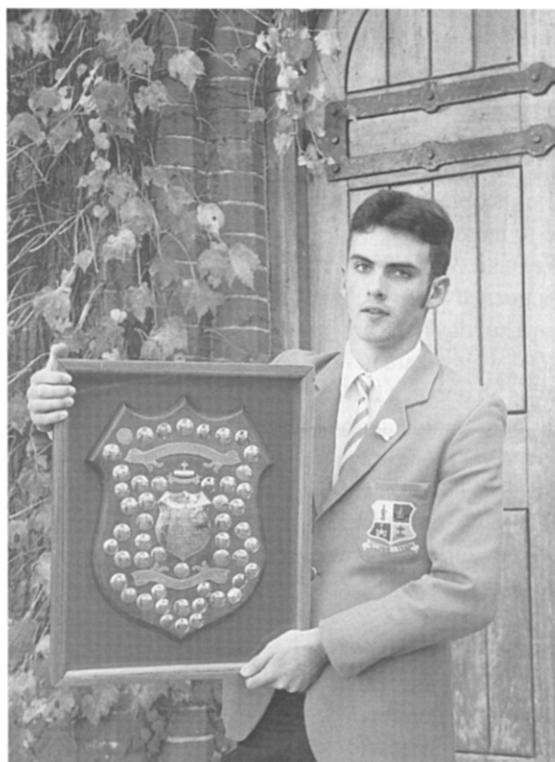
Revelation. They answered well but with the suggestion that they consulted as a team too much.

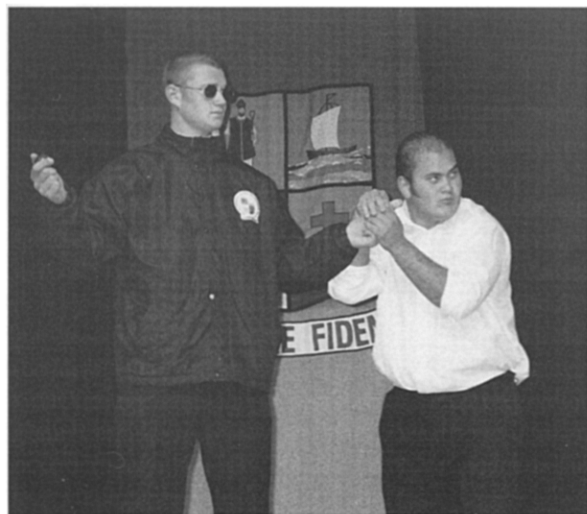


Team captain Matthew Anderson proudly displays the O'Shea Shield

ANZAC DAY ESSAY

This writing is dedicated to my great-grandfather, Archibald Gordon McDonald, who fought with the Otago Mounted Rifles in Gallipoli and France during World War I.

It's five in the morning, 25 April, the sun hasn't even risen and I'm up, standing on the side of a road, standing amongst a crowd of people I do not know, but feel part of. Waiting for a parade to march past, waiting in the soft rain that is natural to New Zealand. What exactly are we all waiting for? What could have happened that would cause a whole country to get up so early on a holiday? The answer is simple. The Gallipoli campaign of 1915 is why we are here, remembering the ANZACs is what this day is all about. The ANZACs, a group of men who fought a battle on a peninsula they had never heard of, in a country they had never thought twice about, for a war they didn't really understand. And yet, here, and in every city and town around the country, we remember these fallen heroes and the day they showed the world that New Zealand is a nation of individuals and warriors.

But why do we still remember them? Why do we wait in the early hours of the morning, often in the rain, for a ceremony that lasts less than ninety minutes? It is because we are proud to be New Zealanders, we are proud that our ancestors fought so that we could be free, and we will remember, we will remember them.

It was on 25 April, 1915 that a group of men, 20,000 strong, landed on the shores of what is now known as ANZAC Cove, to fight for a cause. The conditions were tough - mud, disease, and the constant barrage of artillery and small arms fire from the

Turkish enemy kept the ANZACs holed up in an area of land the size of a dairy farm, but still they did not give up. Around them the numbers of dead and wounded fell in ever increasing numbers, but still they did not give up.

It was the battles at Gallipoli, when the British sent New Zealanders to their peril, that New Zealand realised one thing - they were no longer a part of Britain, they were their own nation. They were New Zealand. They fought for New Zealand, under their own banner a flag which identified them as what we are.

This helped develop New Zealand to what we are. We showed the world that we would not be subjected, and we would never give up. This is the dedication that New Zealanders, both young and old, carry out into world arenas still. Not just in sports, not just in politics, but in all the day to day things we do. From standing up for our own rights, to standing up for the rights of others. When we go out into the field as peacekeepers, the local people recognise us as New Zealanders, they know of our heritage of helping those in need.

It was the courage of the ANZACs during those long, cold, frightening months isolated on the barren hillsides of Gallipoli that has inspired our small nation to strive to be the best. New Zealanders of today remember those who fought so we could all remain free. It's the courage of the ANZACs that has given New Zealanders the choice for 85 years to rise at five o'clock one morning every year to pay tribute to those who fought, and those who never returned from war.

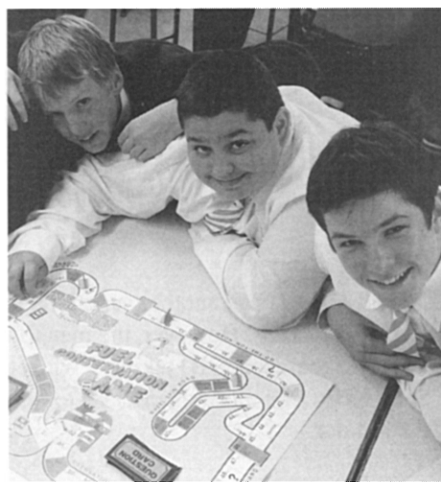
Week 8 20–26 March.

Wednesday. The ground is still hard, the sun still shining and the temperature is 28°C at 4pm in the afternoon. This can only mean one thing...Rugby Trials.



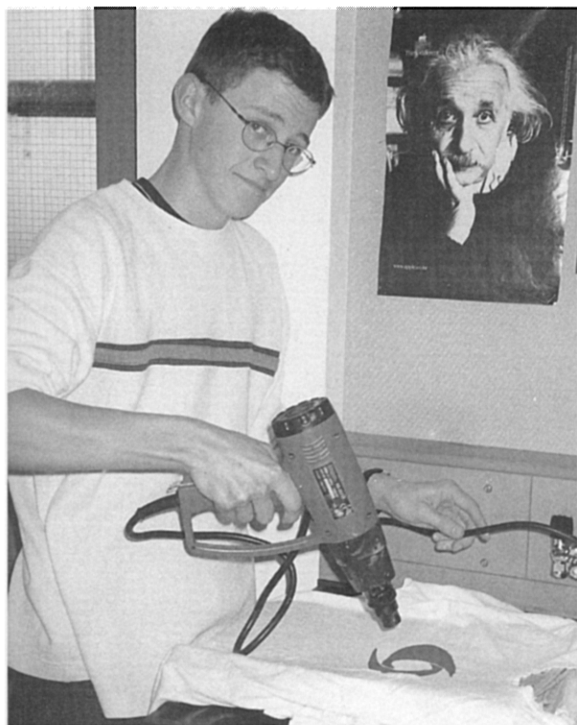

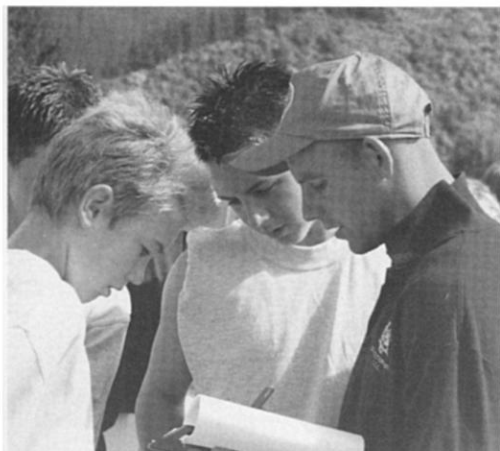
Week 2.

1–7 May.

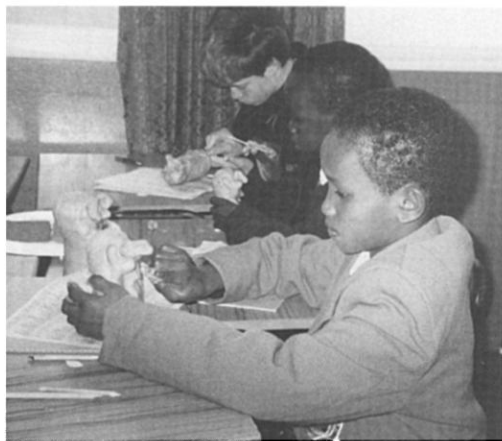

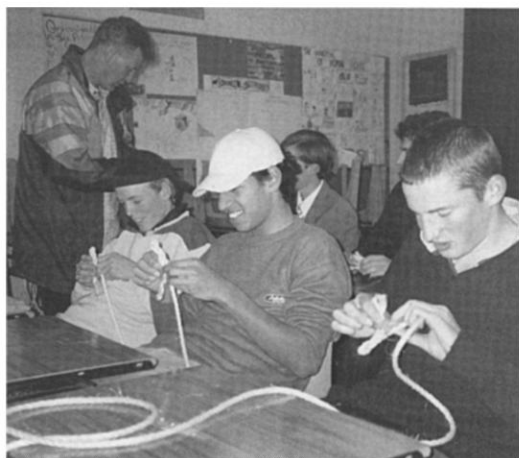

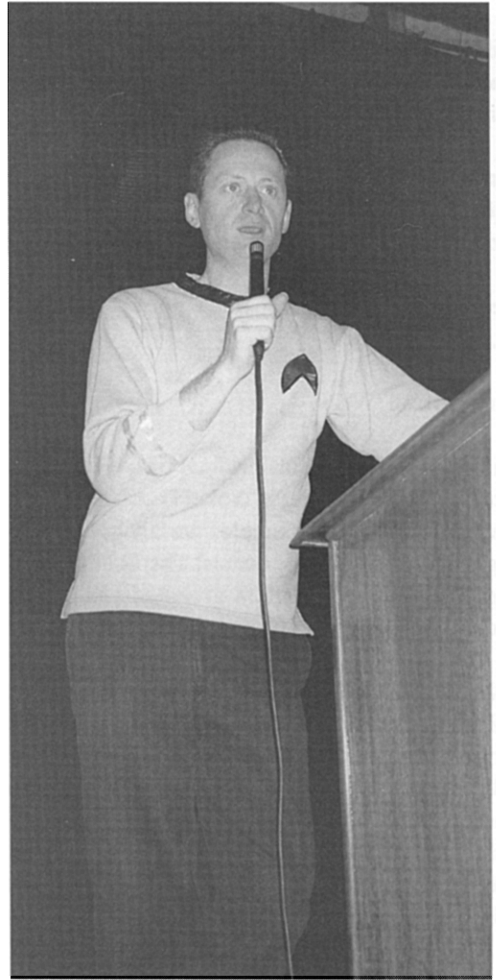

Senior impromptu debates on Thursday night.

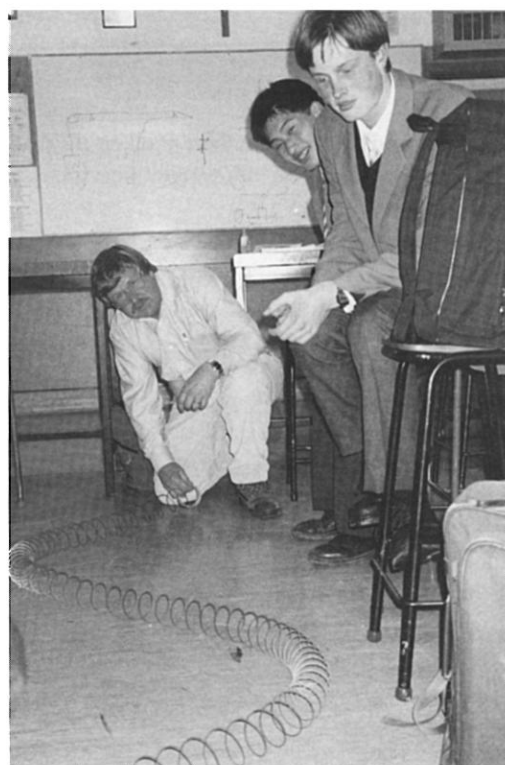
Week 3

An unconfirmed sighting of Mr. Packer in Wellington on Saturday night. The year 10's grow nervous...he's still in England isn't he????

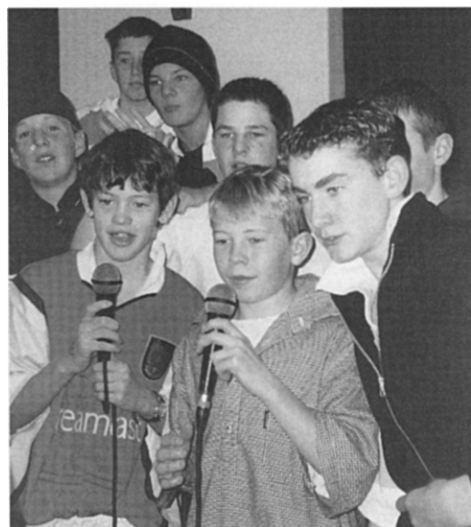
Week 5 14 - 20 August.

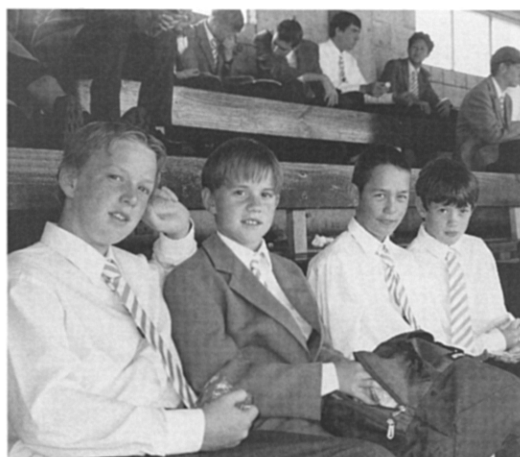

The Athletics season of 2000 was always going to be promising for Stream. We knew we had a good group of Juniors coming through and the sprint team looked strong with a silver medal winning national Junior 4 x 100 team from 1999 moving into the senior ranks.

The school sports days were keenly contested with the depth in the sprints exceptional. For the first time in a number of years we had 5 seniors running low 11 seconds for the 100m. Shaun Mahoney was the leader of the sprint group with his dynamite start and overall strength. The school champs were enhanced by the house colour T-shirts obtained by Mike O'Leary – it was great to see the keenness of all athletes to wear their colours even if it did mean having to collect 600 odd at the end of the day – not to mention poor old Mike having to wash them all!! We finished the School champs confident in the team we could select to represent Stream.

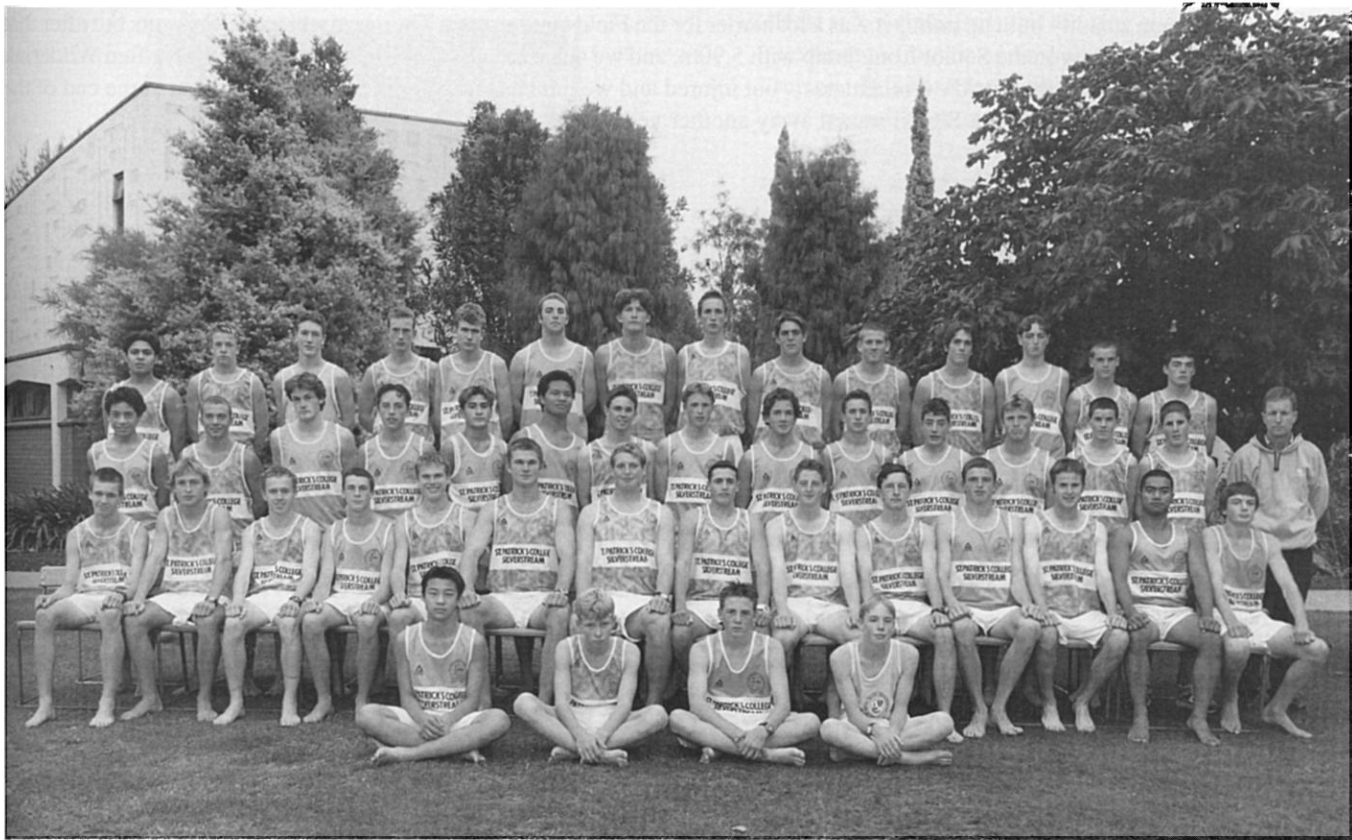
THE OLD BOY'S CUP

Pay-back time for the drubbing we got from Town last year! We fancied our chances after the demolition job done by the Juniors to win back the Neville Shield – the only question was had Town actually just been under-prepared for the Neville Shield

and would we get the backlash! The Stream sprint team had its first chance to impress and that is exactly what it did – the 200m races were first up and by the end of them Stream had achieved 38 points to Towns 12. The writing was on the wall! In a truly amazing exhibition Stream won every track event apart from the Senior 3000m, the Under 14 relay and the Under 14 Hurdles. It is hard to highlight any individuals in such a performance but Shaun Mahoney, the Athletics team captain, (3 titles in 100m (11.19), 200m (22.41) and 400m (53.80)) was pure class as were Paul Thomas (Under 17) and Willie Ung (Under 15) who both also collected the sprint triple. Michael Kingsbeer set a new school record in the 100Hurdles with 13.78 secs.

However, we fell behind in Field events with Town showing traditional strength. Thomas Waldrom picked up the Senior Discus and Shot titles with ease but, apart from the High Jump, we generally struggled. Ben Wilderink showed his talent with a winning 12.33m Triple Jump in the Under 16 grade and Gareth Edie took the same place in the Under 15 grade with 11.40m. At the end of the day the points gained by us in the Track proved decisive – The Old boys Cup came home with the following points totalled:

McEVEDY SHIELD

So, on to McEvedy 2000 which was held at Stream. We knew our sprinters could do some damage and if Town could repeat their Field events dominance from Old Boys the shield could find itself back home. The school track was in superb order and the day was hot and calm. The field was superbly prepared and the "McEvedy 2000" painted in the infield by the finish line looked superb (and a heck of a lot cheaper than the proposed 4 dragons which we discovered would cost us around \$15,000!) The sprints again began with the 200m. Wellington College proved to be stiffer opposition than Town and we only achieved 1 win, Willie Ung in 24.3 in the Under 15. Shaun Mahoney took 2nd in his grade in 23.2 behind the Rongotai runner. Stream

actually won the 200m event overall by 5 points. Ominously though, a few Field event results came in with Wellington College taking the major placings and Stream not even achieving a point. As the morning moved on the track team managed to keep in contact with Wellington but the expected impact from Town in Field events did not eventuate and the gap from Wellington College to us in 2nd place widened. An excellent 800m by Jeremy Pigou, winning the Under 16 grade in 2mins 5.5 secs, and an awesome effort by David Stacey in the Senior 800m, 2nd in 2mins 0.8 secs, gave us some hope for the afternoon. Paul Thomas ran a strong 400m in 52.6 secs to win the Senior 400m, Edwin Crossling took the Under 14 1500m in 4 mins 55.6 secs and

David Stacey came back to take the Senior 1500m in 4 mins 27.8 secs. The hurdlers – Kingsbeer, Egan and Blazkow did it again – dominated their event. This marked the 4th year that Matthew Egan and Daniel Blazkow had taken 1st and 2nd in their grade hurdles – awesome stuff!

While the track team steadily built up points it was a lot harder for the Field team – again Thomas took out his 2 events but after that we struggled. Lale Petaia won the Senior Long jump with 5.90m, and we achieved no other Field title. We did have Ben Wilderink and Brad Quinn – two very able Field event athletes – out injured and we did have athletes picking up points but at the end of the day we couldn’t get enough and the Shield stayed away another year!

This was a fitting way to end Stream's athletic season for 2000 – from apparently nowhere, Stream now had a sprint team capable of winning NZ titles!

This event, held in the last week of the year marks the beginning of our 2001 season. It is a great warm-up for us and Town. Last year we cleaned up and, realizing Town wouldn't be too happy about that, expected a much tougher time this year. It proved to be tougher, but not as tough as we thought. The Year 9 team threw up some new sprinters in the form of "Marty" Romanos and Jared Hammington who took placings in the 100 and 200m and a terrific Year 10 relay team well led by an in-form Gareth Edie who smoked the 100m. The middle distance lads

were impressive in their domination of Town in both year groups apart from one tenacious Townie who has a history of tussles with Brent Cooper – it was 1-1 this time, Brent running strongly in the 1500m for a great win. Jonathan Bentley carved up in the Year 9 1500m and looked in great form for the NZ Champs a week later. The field event boys were finding it a little tougher, with only Hayden Ayrton really dominating for us with some great high-jumping, almost making 1.75m. At the end of the day we came away with a comfortable victory and a new bunch of talent discovered!

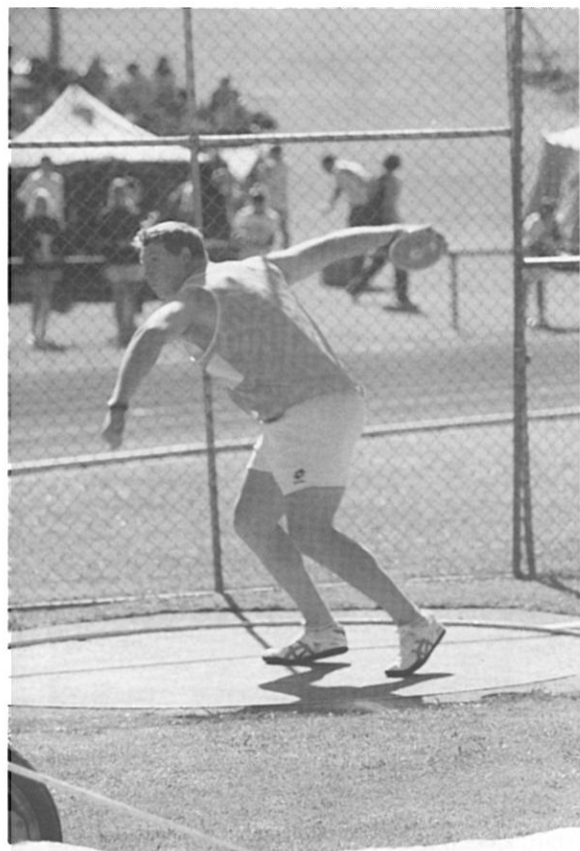

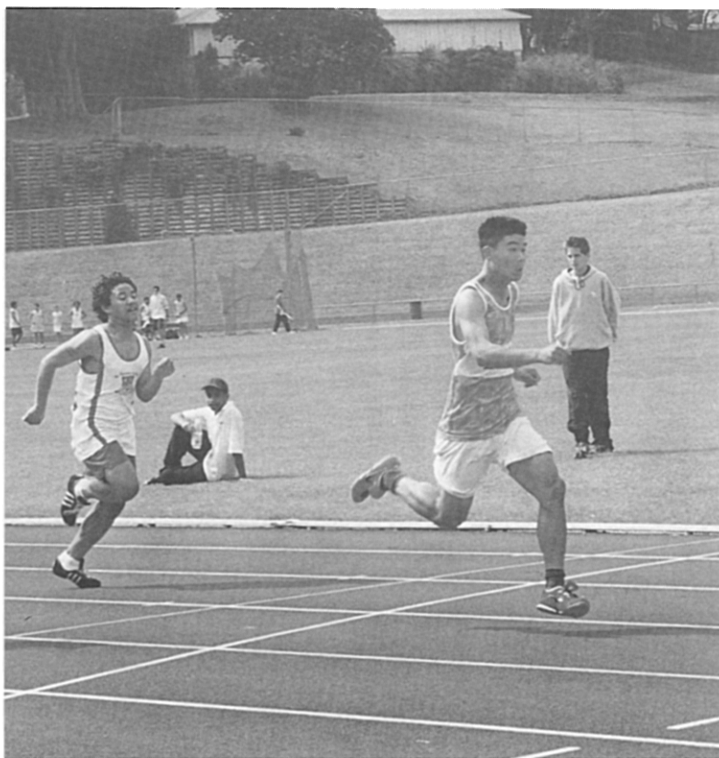

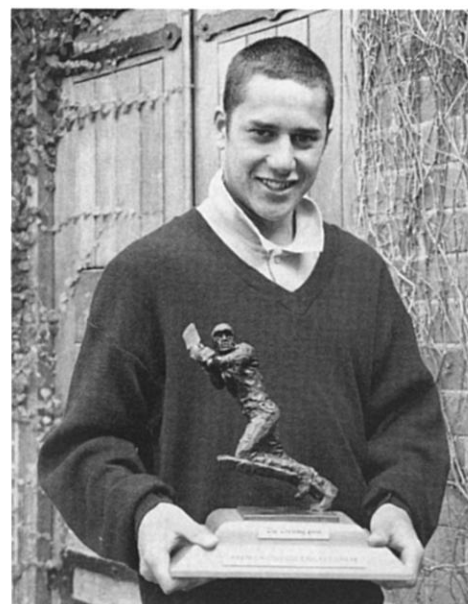

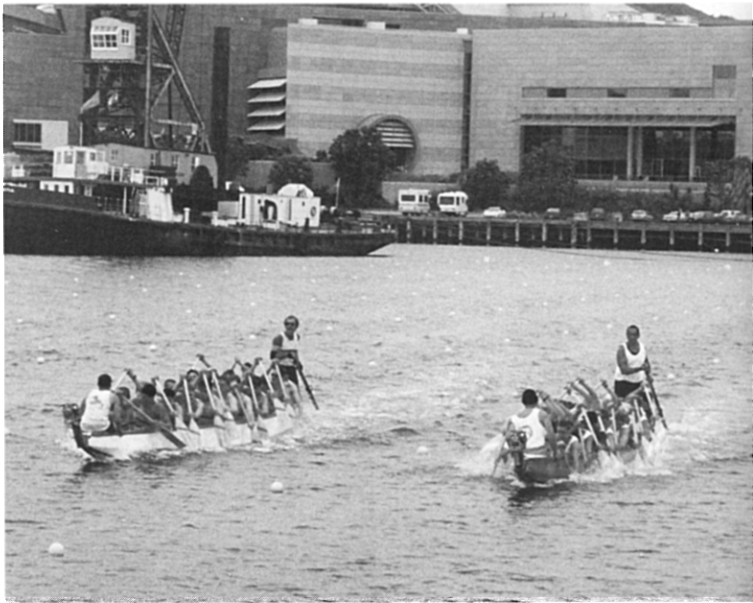

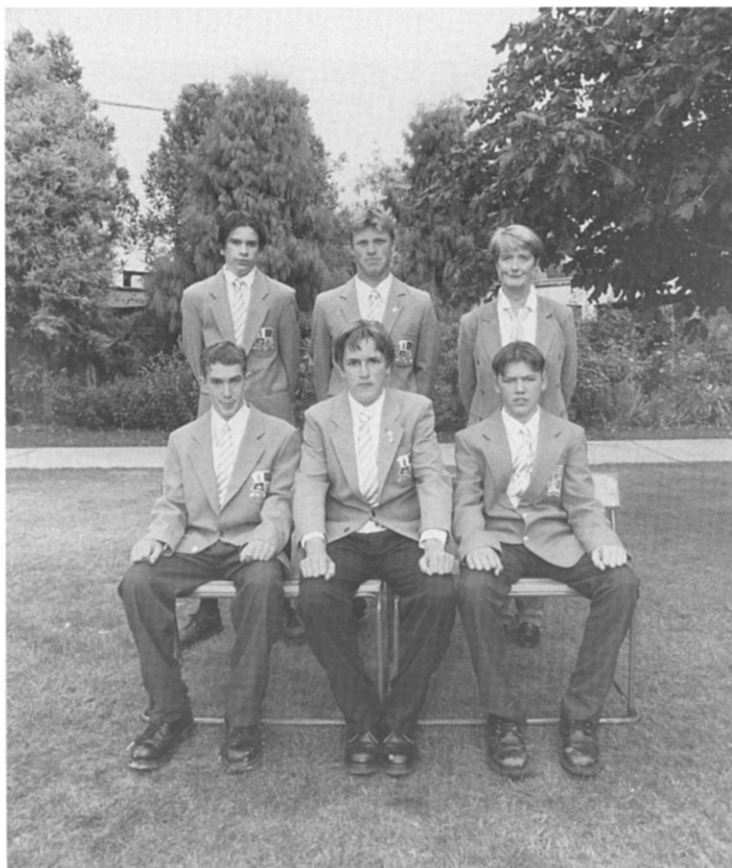


Stream paddlers show the strain as they compete in the 2000 College Dragon Boat festival

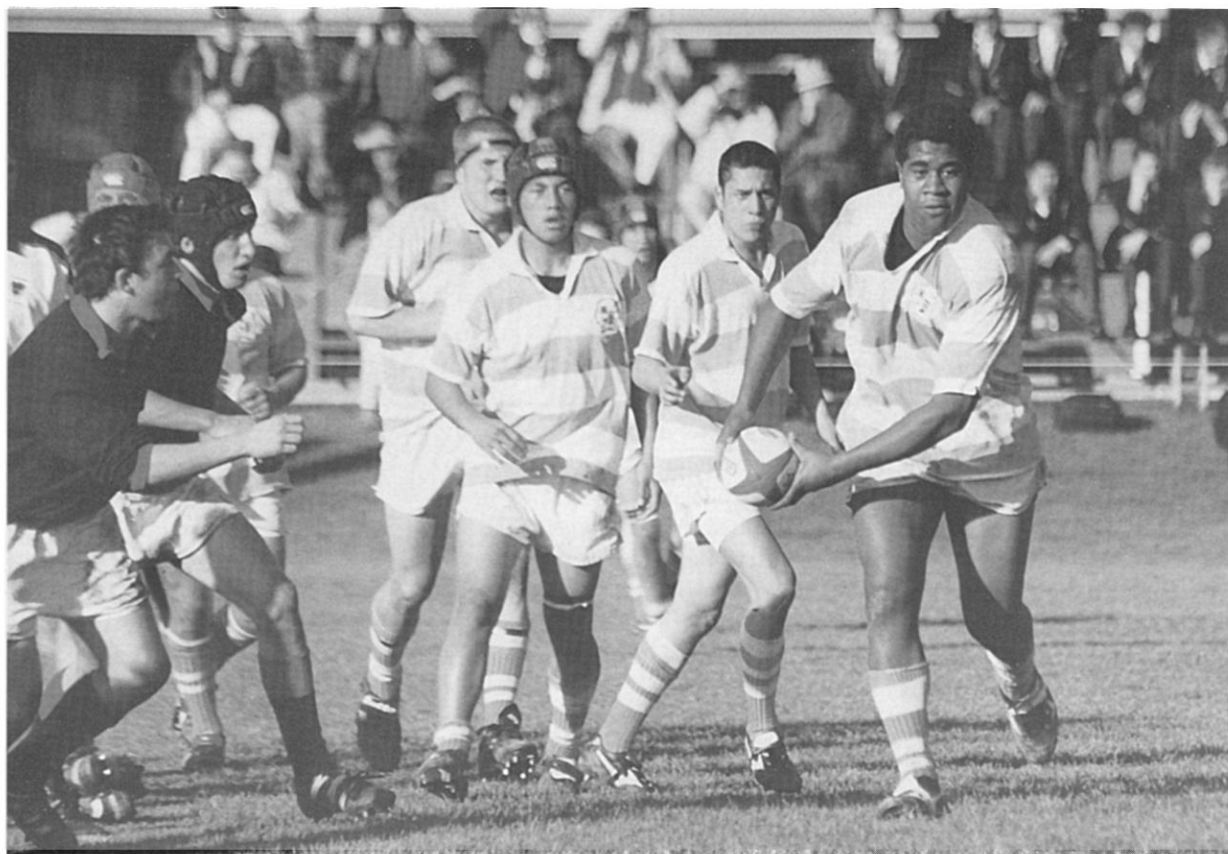

The future also looks bright with the planning of a sports pavilion. As well, two scrum sleds were built and provided to the College at no charge by Mr Ian Rattray, and we thank him for his support. Most teams took advantage of the sleds at some stage during the season and they were helpful in establishing good driving forward play.

Early in the season we hosted the New Zealand sevens squad as they prepared for the Wellington leg of the inaugural World Sevens Circuit. Coach Gordon Titjens ran the team hard during an extended practice, and although they failed to win the Wellington event it was good to see the team triumph overall by winning the final event in Paris.

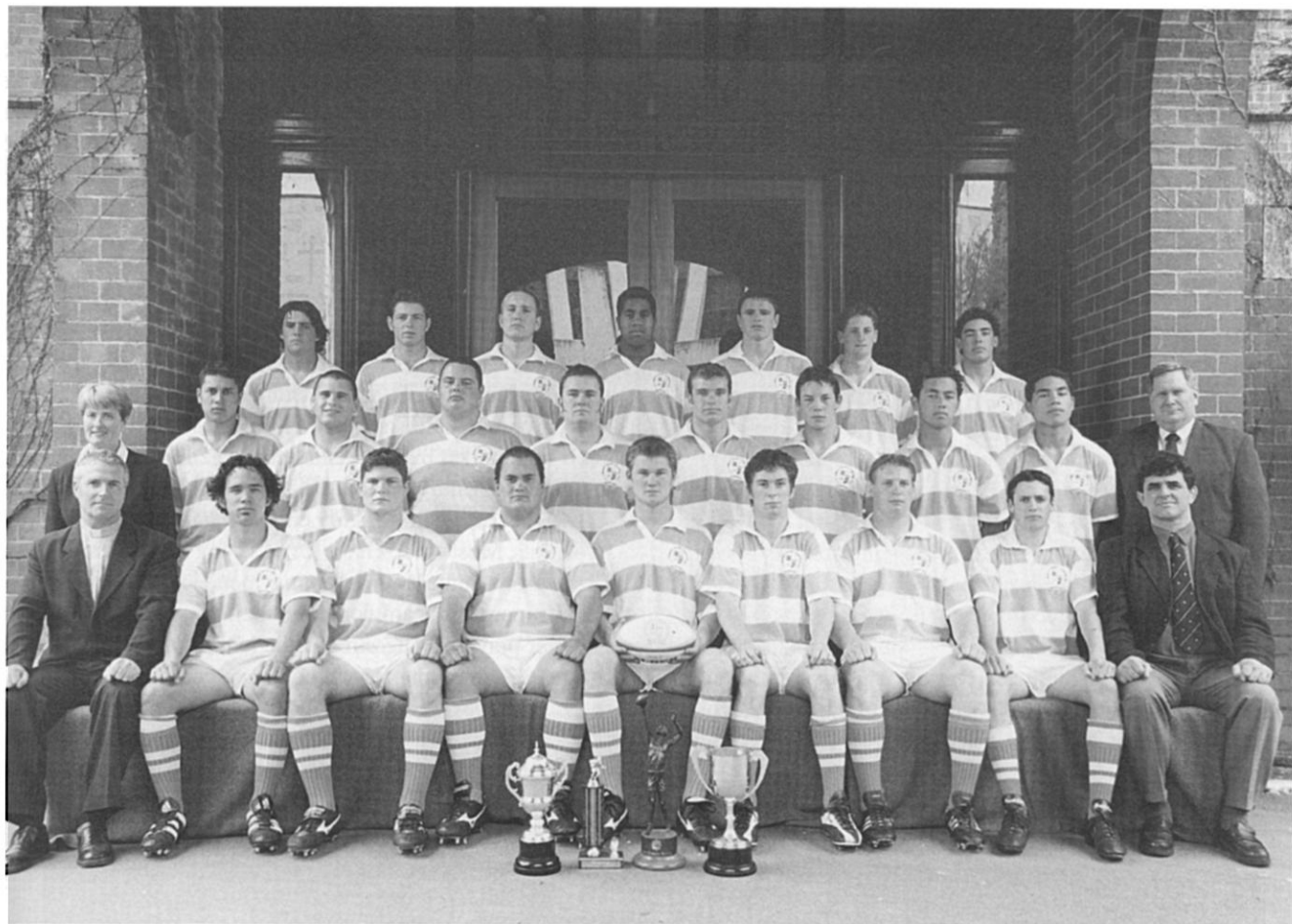

The 2000 season saw the 1st XV return to the Premier 1 College Grade for the first time in some years. It was not a decision taken lightly because the exposure to tough rugby every Saturday in the Under 21 Grade has served us well. However, it was felt that there were some points to be made to some local colleges and administrators about the strength of Silverstream rugby. Despite the youth of the team, which included four Year 11 and six Year 12 students, the point was well-made, and the 1st XV took out the Premier 1 championship after a tense and courageous battle in the final with Wellington College. Four out of six traditional matches were won, with the highlight of the whole season being the win in a pulsating game with Palmerston North Boys High School. Down by seventeen points after ten minutes, the real character of this team was shown in the fight-back which led to a 28-20 victory. It is important to put this game, and indeed the Premier 1 final,

into a real context: the programme of traditionals and grade semi-final and final meant that the 1st XV had to play St Patrick's Wellington, St Bede's, Rongotai College, Palmerston North and Wellington College all in seventeen days. Five wins out of five against such opposition reflects well the character and ability of the 2000 1st XV.

Matthew Egan captained the team and set a fine example for the others to follow. In his third year in the side, he commanded deep respect from the players, and his reading of the game and his own consistently high standards of performance strengthened his authority. He was helped immensely, on and off the field, by Joe Ritchie who so often provided inspiration at key moments during the season. Anthony Maher was the back line leader. Already a fine defensive player, his attacking skills sharpened considerably as he rose to his responsibility.

Mr Jim Laing was again the Coach of the forwards. He got the best from the experienced players, and at the same time he brought the younger players through, ensuring a good turnover of experienced forwards for the next few years. He is held in enormous respect by the players for his ability as a coach and for his sound common sense. He has been a huge part of the success we have enjoyed over the last two seasons and I am very grateful to him.

His cheerfulness, even in the face of adversity, was always greatly appreciated. Mr Paul Runciman gave significantly of his time, and sponsorship, to be our bus driver throughout the season. Again, he was a popular and key member of this successful management team of 2000.

Mr Tony Sellars and Mr Mike Boyes made sure that we had the finance required to continue being as competitive as we are. Their efforts have made a significant difference to the team in the last two years. McDonalds Silverstream continued their generous sponsorship, and as usual we are indebted to Rosalio Nasalio who does all our laundry, and to Paul Robinson, Wayne Bingham and Colin Guppy who look after Number 1 field so well.

It has been my privilege to coach the 1st XV from 1985 - 1988 and from 1996 - 2000. There have been the usual successes and failures. I have had outstanding assistant coaches in Mark Guppy, Colin Guppy, Tim Mannix and Jim Laing. I have been surrounded by an outstandingly generous management team led by Libby Kirton. I have had loyal and committed Captains. I have thoroughly enjoyed the committed support of parents. Most of all, I have loved seeing the players develop, both in the game and as young men, learning the arts of commitment and teamwork, and then passing them on to the younger players. Therein lies the real privilege of coaching this team, something for which I have been most grateful.

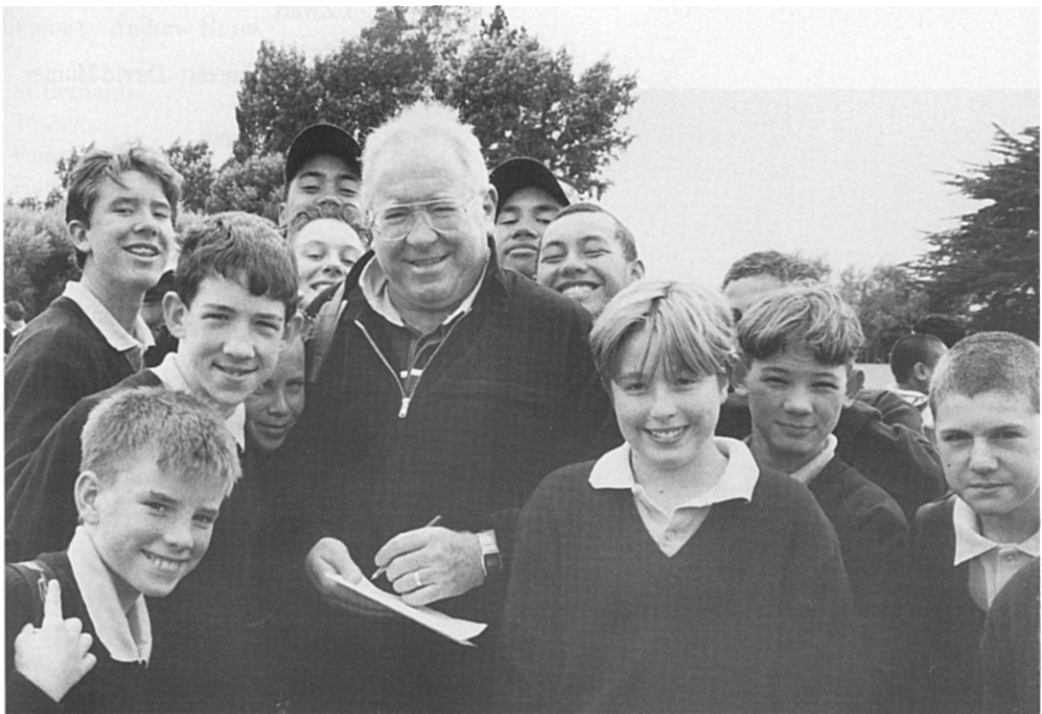

This is complemented by a growth in self-confidence as the realisation develops that no-one can shoot your target for you. Members of the squad received a commemorative medal to record their efforts in this Millennium Year.

2000 WINCHESTER

NZ INTER-SCHOOL POSTAL SHOOT

'Stream again entered two teams involving 13 shooters in this national competition. Each shooter had 15 targets and could score a maximum of 45 points or a potential team total of 225 points. The College shot their targets on 18 September at the Hutt Valley Gun Club grounds and the results were posted off to the Christchurch co-ordinating centre.

As usual, competition was fierce. 22 schools with 26 teams involving 154 shooters took part and the standard was excellent. The year 'Stream came in with an eleventh ranking after posting 183/225 points. Perhaps slightly below potential, but a great warm-up for the Nationals later in the year.

Top 'Stream shooter was Stephen Pritchard-Hansen, who scored 40/45, which resulted in a 31st equal position over the entire field of 154. Not far behind were Daniel McCormack and Stephen Andersen with 38/45s. Each 'Stream shooter taking part received a personal Certificate on their endeavour.

2000 SECONDARY SCHOOL NATIONAL & SOUTH ISLAND CHAMPIONSHIPS

Two teams each of six shooters attended these Championships in Christchurch over the weekend 6 - 8 October. Whilst 45 targets were shot each day, the Teams Event comprised 20 Targets Point Score at which a maximum of 60 points per shooter could be achieved. The five highest scores in the teams counted making the team competition, the best out of a possible 300 points.

Silverstream A Team more than rose to the occasion with an outstanding 265/300 points, i.e. an 89% strike rate. This earned an overall 4th position for the College, which is the best result achieved over recent years. It was even more meritorious against a field of 190 competitors, in 32 squads representing 18 secondary schools. The National Championship was won with a score of 278/300 by Paeroa College. The 'Stream Team headed off' all private schools.

On the day, Daniel McCormack and Colin Berkett led the charge with 55/60 points each followed by other counting scores of 53/60 points from Stephen Pritchard-Hansen and 51/60 by each of Michael McFarlane and Matthew McGavin. A great team effort.

Silverstream B also performed well with 179/300, led home by Troy Laurent scoring 47/60. This experience is a great proving ground and augers well for the future.

There were also some outstanding and personal best scores shot overall, as the weekend's events. Leading these were Stephen Pritchard-Hansen who returned 56/60 points in the South Island Championship and came 8th (out of 190 shooters) over the entire day. William Jephson also distinguished himself with a 53/60 in this event.

In the South Island Single Rise 15 target match Bede Busby peaked with a 14/15 in very competitive circumstances. Daniel McCormack in the National Event also achieved this same score the next day. Perhaps however, the personal best accolade goes to Troy Laurent, who managed 9 out of 10 in the most testing National Single Barrel Event on the Sunday. A very fine performance indeed.

Overall, it was a rewarding experience for the 12 'Stream Shooters who took part. They learned a good deal about team effort in adverse weather conditions and under competitive pressure. They also learned something of their own hidden resources.

SMALLBORE SHOOTING 2000

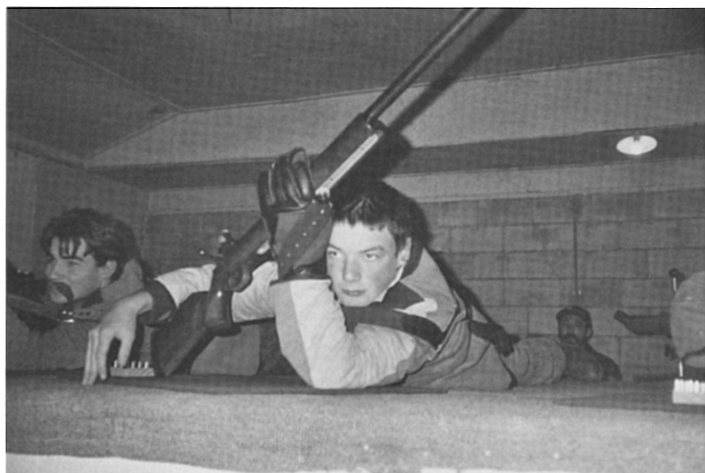

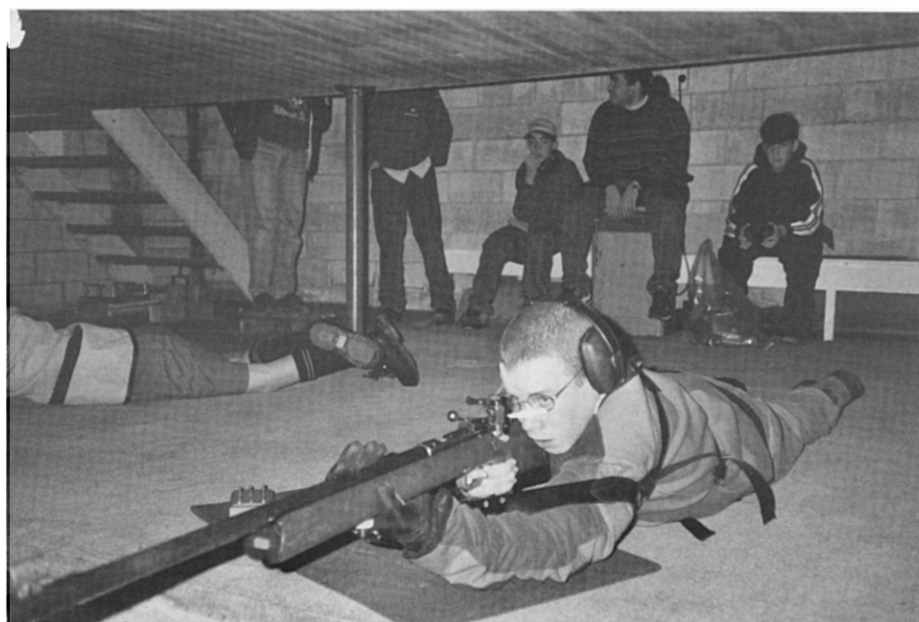
Luke Barber continued to shoot consistently well and emerged from the competition at the end of the season as our best aggregate shooter. Well done Luke!

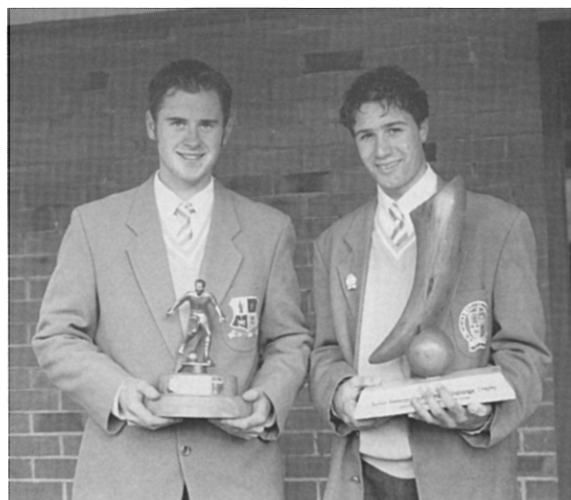

FIRST XI REPORT 2000

With most of the previous league-winning seasons' players back we were confident of doing well. I set the team the following goals:

- winning back all of the traditional college match trophies
- qualification for the National Tournament
- winning the Wellington league for the second season running
- gaining a top 10 finish in the National Tournament.

Ambitious, though we certainly had the squad to do it. I said from the beginning that the atmosphere in the squad would determine everything. I knew I had good leadership within the team, and that there was competition for places throughout. An outside coach, Tom Randles, was recruited to help out and we started our pre-season training and hill running.

Pre-season friendlies saw us dispatch Heretaunga, Tawa and Town comfortably. We put four past Newlands in our first league game, then were 4-1 up against Wellington College when Martin Latham dived at the feet of their centre forward, leaving Martin with a broken arm. This looked like a major set-back. We would have to trial another goalie with the season already in full swing and qualification to the Nationals at stake. Luckily Matt Crozier stepped in, and was an excellent replacement. He worked hard on his game from the outset, and deserved his inclusion in the squad that eventually did travel to Christchurch.

We qualified comfortably in the end, winning all 7 games of the first round. We then went on to win every College trophy, and Martin was back for the second round of league matches. We won all of those too, though Martin did not finish the second round game against College either (the less said about that the better).

This season the league was decided with a final against the second placed team- Wellington College Second XI. The 3-2 win was closer than we would have liked, but nevertheless Wayne Rooker's last minute penalty brought the trophy back to our cabinet.

The statistics of the league season make remarkable reading. We won every game, scoring 83 goals and conceding only 19- an average of a 5-1 win! Jamie Etridge's goal-scoring record throughout the season was unbelievable. He scored 31 goals in 17 league games and college matches, earning him the nickname of Jamie Hat-trick.

We were frequently reminded of course that Wellington College First XI played in senior grade, but we managed to silence those voices by finishing 7 places above them at the National Tournament.

We regained all of our traditional fixture trophies- sealing this with an 8-1 win away at St Bede's.

At the tournament in Christchurch we qualified unbeaten from our pool play and entered the last 8 for only the second time in our history. Our final placing put us in the top 6- the highest ranking team in Wellington- including Wellington College.

So was all this inevitable given the strong side we had on paper at the start of the season ? Not at all. As I said before the season began, everything depends on attitude and the atmosphere in the camp. A group of good players don't make a team without commitment and hard work. We had the latter in abundance, and had a captain who led by example.

Training sessions were rarely missed and the atmosphere was always supportive. The quality coaching provided by Tom Randaes helped every player develop. Behind the scenes we had outstanding support from parents, notably Mr and Mrs Latham, the Doigs, LeProus and the Rookers. Mr Ung also showed his culinary talents at tournament.

All of this makes a coaches job easier. I've some great memories of this season- the bus to the final (the road to Wembley) , the college match win over New Plymouth and the win over Burnside to make last 8 in Christchurch to name but a few. This, to coin a phrase, is what it's all about.

I hope that we've sent a clear message that football is alive and kicking in this traditional rugby school. It makes me look forward to next season.

Wayne Rooker

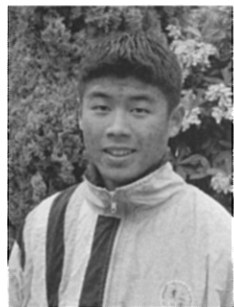

RONGOTAI (H) 5-1 WIN

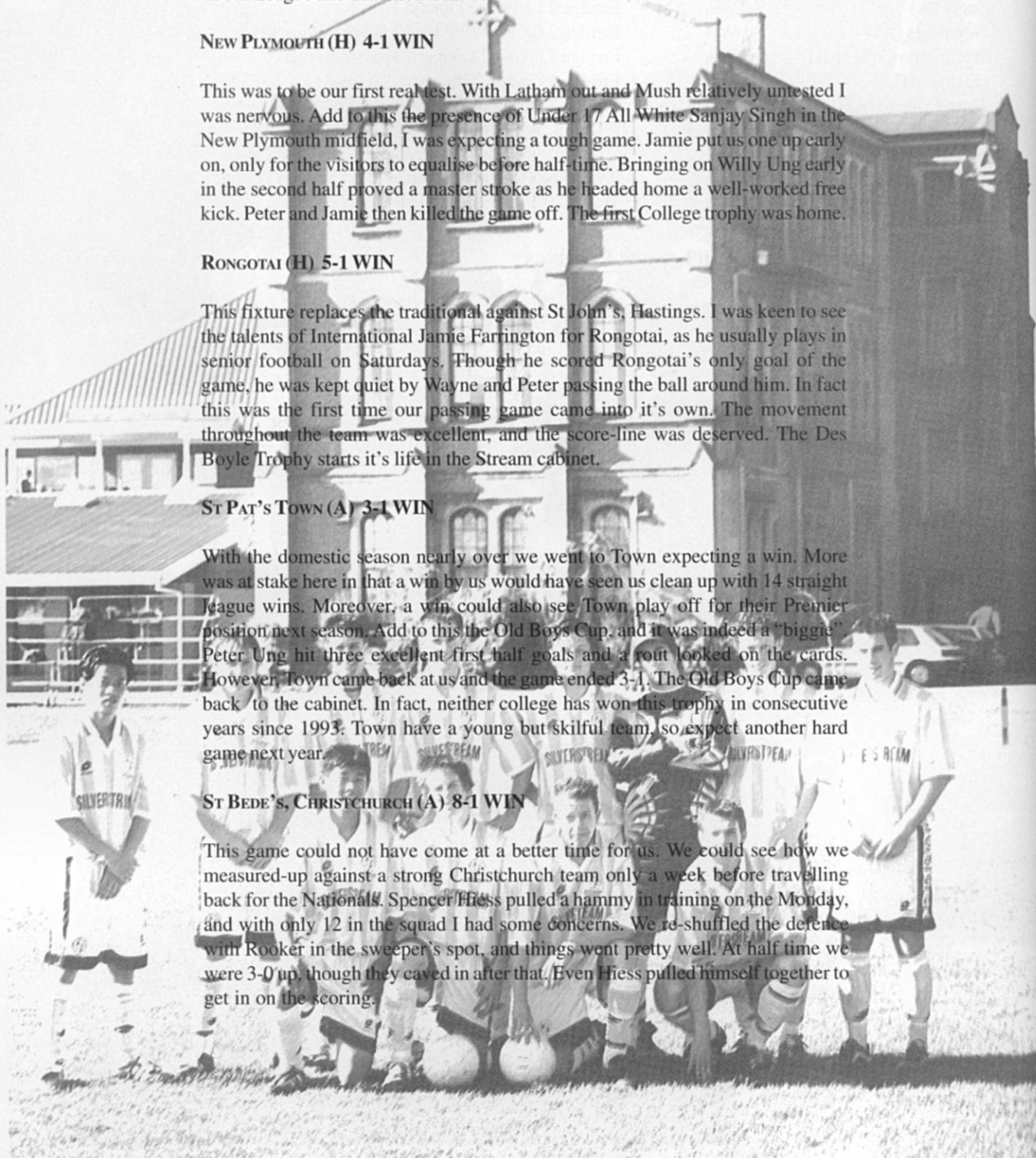

Silverstream fielded three senior and two junior teams in the Hutt Valley mid week competition. The top senior team won its grade and the top junior team came second in a very competitive field.

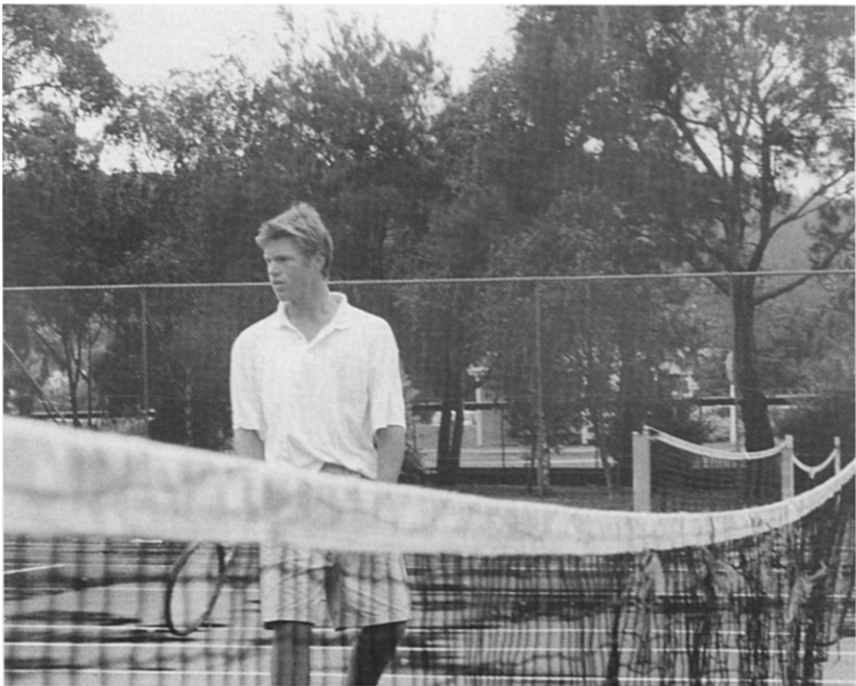
